The operation north of Bagdad, which details published yesterday showed was a Turkish rout, is intended to protect the right flank of the British forces in Mesopotamia. The downfall of Russia created a new situation and made it necessary to send the present expedition with the object of clearing the Turks out of Mosul and the region north to Lake Van and east to Persia.

The statement on the Palestine fighting says that hostile forces in the foothills south of Eg Salt, which is twelve miles east of Jordan and thirty-five miles northeast of Jerusalem, were attacked on Tuesday. EXISTING FORCE IS 1,600,000 TROOPS

President Wilson Wants Authority to Call Out More Soldiers.

Washington, May 1. - Secretar Baker will carry to Congress tomorrow the army increase programm

Many Dead.

With the French Army in France, May 1:—(By The Associated Press)—A heavy German attack launched yesterday against the Americans in the vicinity of Villers-Bretonnenux was repulsed with heavy losses for the enemy. The German preliminary bombardment lasted two hours and then the infantry rushed forward only to be driven back, leaving large numbers of dead on the ground in front of the American lines. The German bombardment opened at five o'clock in the atternoon and was directed especially against the American, who were supported on the north and south by the French. The fire was intense, and at the end of two hours the German commander sent forward three battalions of infantry. London, May 1.—The first hint of the coming peace offensive on the part of the Central Powers comes today from Switzerland where it is reported Emperor Karl is about to make overtures to Italy. It is stated the Austrian king will say he has no desire for conquest, but that unless Italy accepts the terms he intends to offer he will fight for peace.

GERMANS LOSE HEAVILY IN **ENGOUNTER WITH AMERICANS**

Losses of Uncle Sam's Boys Rather Severe-Marshal Haig Announces that 1,130 German Prisoners were Captured in France by British During March and 5,377 Last Month — Enemy's Artillery Active Yesterday—Germans Capture Theodosia in the Crimea.

American troops around Villers-Bretonneux engaged for the st time in the great battle on the French front, have repulsed a stern German attack, preceded by a heavy bombardment and carried out by three battalions of infantry. The Germans left many dead and wounded before the American lines and the American loses are reported as "rather severe."

Landon, May 1-"The enemy's artillery has been active today against the back areas in the neighborhood of Bethune and has heavily shelled French positions on the Locre sector," says Field Marshal Haig's communication issued tonight.

The number of German prisoners captured by the British in France during March was 1,061, including sixty-nine officers. In April a further 5,241 prisoners, including 136 officers vere captured. These figures are exclusive of the prisoners taken by the French.

"There has been no effort on the part of Japan to conceal her loyalty. On the contrary, we have stood upon the housetop to declare our unalterable faith in the outcome of the war, and our unchangeable fealty to the allied cause" Baron Goto added.

Japan has not for a moment made light of the inimical influence spreading in eastern Siberia both as a menace to Japan and China and as against the entente allies. Neither has Japan lost sight of the fact, that Russia is a power endeavoring to reorganize a machine temporarily out of order.
