

Few men even in the West have crowded more adventure and work into a comparatively short life than this versatile general, who first opened his eyes on the world in Geneco, Ont., forty-three years ago. At nineteen he left his humble home to seek fortune in Duluth, and acquitted himself so well that, white still in the twenties, he had built up one of the biggest insurance businesses in the West, and had established a group of rural banks.

He did more than any other half-dozen men to plant settlers in the West; he became the head of big industrial enterprises from lumbering to whale fishing, until while still in the thirties he was one of the richest men in Western Canada. When the war came and the Canadian Government needed horses the task was committed to McCrae, and he did it so well that he was next entrusted with the organizing of supply and transport, saving millions of dollars by checking waste.




