2 BONAVENTURE BOYS IN WAR

Sons of Peter Poirier—One Killed and the Other Wounded.

The Bay Chaleur district is proud of her boys. All nationalities responded promptly and enthusiastically to the call for men and among these were two Bonaventure boys.

Pte. Dennis Poirier was a son of Mr. Peter Poirier of Bonaventure. When the 55th Battalion was being recruited he volunteered and went overseas with that unit. He was transferred and went to France where for two years he was in the trenches, being killed in action August 31st, 1917.

Pte. Moses Poirier is also a son of Mr. Peter Poirier, Bonaventure. When only fifteen years of age he joined the 150th Battalion in 1916 and went overseas. He was in the heavy fighting in August and on the 28th 1918, was wounded.

He is now an inmate of the Military Hospital, Montmorency, Que.

MR. HURLEY AT DALHOUSIE

Delivered Lecture at Shiretown and Was Warmly Received—Other Notes.

Dalhousie, March 19—A magnificent lecture on "The Price Belgium Paid" was delivered to a splendid audience, notwithstanding the inclemency of the weather, in the Convent Hall on Tuesday evening, by the well known speaker, Mr. Steve C. Hurley of Campbellton.

Hon. C. H. LaBelle presided.

The lecturer graphically described the happy and prosperous Belgium before the war, her busy, busy, busy industry, her great villages, her beautiful churches and intensely religious life, her past glories in commerce, painting and architecture, her great nineteenth century scholars and her royal diplomats.

Then the brutal attack of Germany and the heroic way in which little Belgium's citizen army had held off the invaders, thereby saving France, Britain and Canada from conquest.

Then the audience wept, as he held up to their gaze the ruined shrines, the desolated homes, murdered children of the unhappy but gloriously firm and determined little country, led by their King, who has risen to the summit of his opportunity as a leader of men.

Never were more stinging charges made against Germany than by Mr. Hurley, when in the most scathing terms, he described and denounced the war wagers of the German officers and soldiers in the helpless country. The ferocious feature of ancient warfare had been revived by the modern barbarians. Old men had been shot to fall on the grass they had been forced to dig for themselves, all to terrify the inhabitants and force the survivors to submit.

Rev. A. A. S. spoke briefly and moved a vote of thanks to the lecturer, which was seconded by Mr. Frank McEoy.





OBITUARY

Patrick O'Leary.
 Many friends throughout New Brunswick will hear with regret of the death of Mr. Patrick O'Leary which took place Sunday at the Hotel Dieu Hospital. Mr. O'Leary was one of Campbellton's best known citizens. The funeral was held Tuesday morning. Rev. Fr. Wallace officiating and it was very largely attended.

On Saturday evening the 1st inst., the people of Madapedia and vicinity were shocked to learn that two more victims were added to the list of railway crossing accidents and that Charles Delaney a much respected citizen of this place and his little niece Kathleen Delaney had been struck and killed while attempting to cross the railway at St. Alexis Station.

Mr. Delaney who lived near to the station about one mile distant was engaged in the management and care-taking of the fishing property of Messrs. Cobb & Co. of New York, and had come to St. Alexis Station for his mail. He had received his mail and after chatting with the postmaster and station agent had started to drive home. The highway crosses the railway a few hundred feet from the station and in order to cross the main track one must also cross the siding which is nearly always blocked with cars with scarcely room left for horse and sleigh to pass, and on this particular night there was three cars on the siding and in order to get over the main line Mr. Delaney had to pass close around the end of these cars and in so doing was unable to see the approaching train until he was onto the main track. At the time of the accident there was a terrific snow storm raging which prevented him from hearing the train. As he came onto the main line he evidently saw and realized his danger and made an effort to escape and save his little companion as the position they were found in showed that his first thought and last effort had been the safety of the little girl and that he had died trying to save her.

He was born forty-two years ago and was just in the prime of life, highly esteemed and respected amongst his fellow men especially with those who knew him best, for seldom is one privileged to meet one endowed with so many of the virtues and so free of the vices. Mr. Delaney was married to Miss Hannah Grenells of Montreal who survives him and who has the sincere sympathy of the whole community. His little niece who shared his hard fate was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Delaney of this place and much sympathy is felt for them in their double bereavement.

The remains were taken to the home of his brother Mr. James Delaney and there prepared for burial. The funeral and burial which was in the Roman Catholic cemetery was one of the largest ever seen in this place testifying to the high esteem in which the deceased was held.

Besides his wife he is survived by one sister Mrs. Richard Murray of Campbellton and four brothers, Thos. James, Richard and George all of whom have the sincere sympathy of their many friends.
