Berlin, March 29.—An important gain was made today by the Government forces engaged in dealing with the Communist disorders in Central Germany when Government troops and security Important City of Eski-Shehr olice surrounded the nitrogen plant at Leuna, which has been a Communist stronghold for the past five days, and forced the insurgents to surrender.

The insurgents, against whom the attack was opened at an early hour this morning, at first offered stubborn resistance, but their escape was cut off on all sides, and they were obliged to March to Angora Is Believed

The troops took 1,000 prisoners and seized large quantities of riffes, machine guns and ammunition.

ALDERMEN OPPOSE

The price of gas—any legislation that would grant a temporary increase until the necessity of it was proved by auditors or competent experts—The point, however, made little difference as it was a thing of the past. The business before the committee was the motion introduced by Ald. Wenige. He favored the first two clauses, but was opposed to the third. No permanent increase should be given the company in the face of falling costs, but to demand the refunding of the service charges was unfair, he claimed. The city's own auditors had declared that \$1.35 was a fair price for gas when they examined the company's books last year. 

### **80-MILE GALE** HITS NEW YORK, KILLING TWO

Temperature Changes From Proposal of Extremists Turned 78 to 37 in a Short

NEW YORK, March 28.1-An eightymile gale swooping down on New York late this afternoon tore off roofs, uprooted trees, caused accidents which have resulted in at least two deaths and brought a touch of real winter. The wind was accompanied by a drop in temperature from 78 at 2 p.m. to 37 degrees at 10 o'clock, with indications of a further drop to 30 degrees by

The weather bureau declared the gale to be mostly local in character, caused by the heat of yesterday and this morning, but partly of a general storm in the east. J., declare a hurricane cut a half mile path through the western part of that town.





CAPREOL, Ont., March 28.—Fire de-stroyed a part of the business section of Capreol this morning, the total loss being estimated at about \$60,000.
