message to congress. The Daily News says: "It shows bold man struggling with the devilof party intrigue, and is in refreshing contrast to the spread-eagleism of the earlier period of American jingoism. President Roosevelt has set himself a very high ideal of

conduct in public life and we have no doubt he will rise to it." The Westminster Gazette considers that the reference to trusts "spells a good deal of uncertainty to the American market," and adds: "The high tariff of the United States has created an artificial position, under which the trusts have prospered. Therefore, their business must be regulated arti-

ficially." President Roosevelt's message congress holds the first place in the afternoon newspapers here today. The comment on it, however, differs little from that of the morning papers. Strong, general approval of the pronouncement, which, as the St. James' Gazette says: "Strikes notes of conscious strength and assured success,' is the pervading tone of the editorials. The message caused a mild thrill in Germany. About 2,800 Bills and Resolutions to Work On-Canal Commission Favors Nicaragua Route-Cost, \$189,864,062.

Washington, Dec. 4.- The flood of bills is so great in the House of Represen-tatives that the clerical staff was kept busy all night and managed to get abreast of 279 public and 1,113 private bills, a total of 1,892, or about onehalf of all those introduced. Representative Brownlow, of Tennessee, led the list with 252 bills and resolutions.



SENSATIONAL SCENE

Connection With the Execution of a Murderer-Made a Desperate Attempt

to Escape.

Mount Holly, No. J., Dec. 4.—Charles Brown was hanged at 10:05 a.m. yesterday for complicity in the murder of Washington Hunter. A sensational scene was enacted in the county prison when Brown, rendered desperate by fear of the gallows, on which he later paid the extreme penalty for complicity in the murder of Washington Hunter. At 8:30 a.m. the death warrant was read to Brown, and he was left alone in his cell with Rev. Mr. Delsieger. While the minister was reading the Scriptures, Brown assaulted him with an iron bar which he had concealed in his cell. The clergyman was rendered unconscious, and Brown walked out of his cell into the corridor. He made his way to the jail yard and attempted to scale the wall. Sheriff Fenton and Chief Clerk Joseph Fleetwood, procuring revolvers, cornered the murderer, who, waving the iron bar in the air defied the officials. The sheriff threat-ened to shoot him, and Brown, seeing the impossibility of escape, finally sur-

rendered and was led back to his cell Washington Hunter was over 70 years old, and lived with his aged wife at Riverside, N. J. He was a wealthy retired farmer. On the night of Jan 25 last, Charles Brown, John Young, Charles Miller and Otto Keller, forced an entrance into the old couple's home with the intention of robbing the place. Mr. Hunter resisted, and was brutally beaten with an iron bolt. His wife secured a revolver, with which the aged farmer defended himself, until his assailants were frightened away. Mr. Hunter's skull was crushed, and he died four days later. Young and Keller were arrested in New York, and Keller turned state's evidence, and he is now awaiting sentence. Brown was found in Sing Sing prison, where he was serving a term for burglary. Gov. Odell pardoned him in order that he might be brought here for trial on the murder charge. Miller escaped, and has not yet been apprehended. Young and Brown were both convicted of murder in the first degree, and were to have been hanged together. Young, however, secured a stay of execution through a writ of error.
