Slavery Shielded by the French Flag. captured by the British cruiser Philomet in April last has been acquitted by the court at Ravion, at which the prisoners were sent for trial by the French consul here. Mowing Down the Matabeles. LONDON, Nov. 1 .- A special dispatch to the United Press from Cape Town says the troops under command of Major Forbes the troops under command of Major Forbest and Dr. Jamieson, administrator of the British South Africa Company, occupied Buluwago after several fights in which the Matabeles sufered heavily. The first fighting occurred between Hope Fountain and Buluwago, where the Matabeles had concentrated in force. The Matabeles were armed principally with their native weapons, assegais and knat-kerries, although some of them had rifles that proved of little service to them. The natives fought bravely and made desperate attempts to get within striking distance of the British. The latter, however, with the superior arms and Gatling guns, were able superior arms and Gatling guns, were able without trouble to prevent them gotting into close quarters. During one of the fights Major Forbes' columns made an on-

fights Major Forbes' columns made an on-slaught upon the Matabeles and destroyed half of a regiment, numbering hundreds of the natives. The British loss in all ten en-gagements was light. The natives were finally forced to retreat, followed by the Charterell Company's forces. They followed the road to Buluwago, where everything was in the greatest confusion, runners from the scene of the fighting having ar-rived with news of the Matabeles' defeat. No stand was made at Buluwago, and all the people left at the kraal joined the fieeing army, the course of which was northward along the foot of the Motoppo hills. It is thought that the Matabeles will make for the Zambesi River or for the com-paratively uninhabited country to the westparatively uninhabited country to the west-ward of the Umniata River. The imperial troops took no part in the fighting. They followed Major Forbes and Dr. Jamieson to Eulawayo, arriving there some time after the advance columns had taken possession of the place. SIR JOHN A. MACDONALD'S STATUE

Unveiled by the Present Premier of the Dominion

In the Presence of a Large Crowd of Spectators-A Number of Public Mon Present-Rain Curtails the Proceedings.

Hamilton, Nov. 1.—The ceremony of unveiling the statue of the late Sir John A. Macdonald took place this afternoon on the gore at the intersection of John and King streets in the presence of several thousand spectators, including a number of prominent public men.

Rain began fall, but the crowd waited The Bishop of Niagara offered a prayer, enator Sanford made a few remarks, state Senator Sanford made a few remarks, stating the object of the gathering and at once called on Sir John Thompson, who before unveiling the statue, congratulated the city of Hamilton on being first to erect a statue in memory of Sir John Maedonald. He then pressed an electric button and the flag fell to the ground displaying the magnificent bronze statue of Canada's late Premier. Cheers rent the air and the Thirtienth Battalion Band played a selection.

Sir John Thompson then read an address of considerable length, which referred in eulogistic terms to the departed statesman.

feet high, of gray New Brunswick
granite. The names of each of the

and upon the front is a carved shield with
an inscription bearing the name: "The an inscription bearing the name: "The Rt. Hon. John Alexander Macdonald, with his titles and the date and place of his birth and death. At the bottom of the shield are the words: "A Canadian states. nan who valued British institutions true basis of the strength and pro of the Dominion." Another shield

The cost of the statue alone was \$3,500 and the total cost of the memorial will be about \$6,000.

THE SILVER BILL The principal British newspapers warmly pprove of the repeal of the silver purchase bill by the United States Congress. This reof the long and bitter struggle in the United
States Senate is eredited in the first
instance to President Cleveland's unbending
fidelity to principle, and in the next to
irresistible public opinion as voiced by the
newspaper press, which has been proof
against the seductive influences that were so
hardly pressed in the direction of surrender.

There seems to be but little doubt that
if the Cleveland Administration had not

stood firm as a rock in favor of carrying out the plank in the Democratic platform that called for the unconditional repeal of the ill-advised silver purchase measure, a surrender would have been negotiated long ago. But Cleveland refused to give up the principle at stake, and he had the warm support of many leading newspapers on both sides of politics. The silver issue was by no means a party issue, for while 23 Republicans and 20 Democrats voted for the repeal of the Sherman Act, 19 Democrats, 9 Republicans, and 4 Populists voted to continue the alliance of the Government with the silver producers.

The reform of the tariff is the next neasure to which the United States Administration is committed. It has been held that the repeal of the silver purchase law will tend to strengthen business, but the "protectionists" who tried to effect an alliance with the silver men are just as anxious to keep back tariff reduction, and even more sollcitous to have it believed that the dullness in trade has not been caused by the unsettlement of values under the silver legislation, but by the fears that the taxes will be reduced. For this reason, it is argued that the Democratic members of the ways and means committee should, if possible, have the new tariff measure ready for presentation to the House by the middle of this month, in order to have the bill well under way before Christians. But the Republican members who hope to profit by delay do not wish to have the measure presented to the House before the regular session in December, as they say they will need that time to prepare their views. Thus it may be late in the winter before the measure reaches the Senate, where, owing to the slim majority of Democrats, it is expected to reach the critical stage of its existence.

Although we have many courts for the carrying on of litigation, we have no court organized for the purpose of settling differences by reconciling the parties, and thus preventing the strife which is carried on in every court of law.

COURTS OF CONCILIATION.
