





No Fear of Dingley.

A Big Dealer Says Cattle Trade Is Not Suffering.

It Would be Far More Profitable, Any. how for Our Farmers to Fatten Their Own Cattle.

Toronto, Aug. 12.-Mr. Thos. Crawford, M.P.P., whose knowledge of the cattle trade is that of an expert, says the Dingley bill has not as yet destroyed one of his exploring trips, and was the trade between this city and Buffalo in lean, young cattle exported by us and He owned a large tract of land at sold to farmers in the States for fat-tening. This trade, it will be remem-this winter. bered, sprang up suddenly last fall, after the removal of the quarantine regulations, and assumed quite large proportions. That it will shortly cease, because of its unprofitableness, Mr. Crawford is convinced; but that it exists at all he thinks a sign of lack of enter-

"Just look at the position of affairs," said he yesterday morning. "We buy these cattle from farmers here, and, at a cost of a cent a pound for handling and freight and duty, ship them over the line and sell them to farmers who fatten them and send them to precisely the same market in Great itain as we ship to. We have an abundance of feed in Canada and we have an advantage of a cent a pound at the outset. With these things in our favor we should fatten our own cattle, and if the Dingley tariff force us to do it, no one should lose by it. I really think it will affect the cattle trade very little in the long run." In answer to a question as to the condition of the horse trade, Mr. Crawford expressed the opinion that the city should establish a horse department in the western market. There was plenty of room for stables, and if stalls were provided for, say, 80 head, there would be a disposition to ship horses in for sale. Some object tion might be made by the owners o auction sale stables, but in Montres where the C. P. R. had a large hors market, the private salesmen seeme still to do their share of the business. 




