"Beloved defenders of the father-Our fatherland has been overmen by sorrow that involves us all. We have been compelled to go to war at a moment when we were

totally unprepared, and corn lies unguarded in the fields. To the last drop of your blood you must fight not to sufrender to the enemy "We have heard rumors that German troops in several places have been attacked not only by the enemy's army, but by the population, and therefore I order you to shoot all inhabitants on whom arms are found in the enemy's country, not sparing either women or children. Furthermore, in places where the population offers resistance, you are

To take the entire population, great and small, prisoners, and to burn their towns and raze them to the This document, says the official journal, is signed, but the authorities refrain from reproducing the exalted person's signature.

This extraordinary order was found on a prisoner taken in the neighborod of Przemysł. From its obviously circular character, it pre sumably represents orders issued generally to Germans.

The terrified refugees who were at the siege of Antwerp planched as they listened to the bombardment, and increased the fear among the residents of Ostend by describing the horrors of the siege of that fallen fortress.

Dare Not Leave Places.

Professional men, merchants, and otelkeepers joined the throng, which dared not leave the waterfront for fear of losing their places in the evergrowing line of men, women and children clamoring for a chance to escape. All taxicabs and cab horses in Osnd were taken by the army long ago, so there was little means of transportation. The tramears were commandeered by the hospitals, and civilians had little chance to ride. The notels near the quay, which remained opened, were crowded with refugees who had money, and who begged for the opportunity to rent even a chair. Kept Awake by Fear.

Tuesday night brought insistent eports that the Germans would enter Ostend on Wednesday at dawn, with the result that few persons in the city slept. Before daybreak every street of Ostend was alive with Belgians mak. ing their way to the waterfront. Hundreds of fishermen took their families and friends away in small boats, which sailed out of the shipping basin in a steady stream loaded down with frightened women and children, rying their personal effects wrapped in ablecloths and blankets.

The failure of the Germans to ar rive at daybreak afforded only slight relief to the anxious crowds. Rumors were current that German cav alry was less than twenty miles away, and the appearance of the Taube in the sky was taken as an indication that Germans were perfecting their

Many of the soldiers speak only lemish, while their nurses know only English or French and must rely on refugees who understand all three languages, to make known the wants of the sufferers. Little children often bridge the language chasm and with rare sympathy assist the nurses.

Belgian, English and French soldiers alike have endured such hardships during the recent campaign that the uniforms of the wounded soldiers are in tatters. This is especially true of the Belgians, whose once bright red and blue uniforms are now faded and in shreds-as unkempt in appearance as their unshaven faces. the great terminal sheds, their

Hobbling About in Rags. "My poor Belgian boys have such lisreputable looking uniforms when they come to me," a Red Cross surgeon remarked, "that I try to get some sort of civilian clothes for them so as to tone them up. Of course, we canno get new uniforms now, but the poor chaps are disheartened enough by their injuries without having to hobble about in rags.

The same surgeon said that in his pinion the entire Belgian army should have six weeks' respite to recover from the shock of its constant service under unprecedented hardships.

American Consul Giving Aid. The American consul, Henry A. Johnson, has the affairs of the Allies under his care and is on the docks day and night. assisting his charges Americans are not numerous at Ostend, but a few have been coming in daily from Antwerp, Ghent and Bruges. The British consul left Ostend several days ago, the consuls representing the other Allies, accompanying him.

Several children have broken their arms by falling over the scattered luggage. Constant calls are made for attendance upon women who faint through sheer exhaustion or fright. Frequently hysteria seized some women and at once spreads, especially among the older women, who believe that the arrival of the Germans would mean the end of themselves and

their families. Among the wounded Belgians were a number of good singers who relieved the strain of the situation Tuesday night with folk songs, in which a great chorus joined. One young chap, whose knee was badly wounded in a recent engagement, proved to be an excellent yodler and amused the sleepless crowds which gathered about his litter with Tyrolean airs that called forth great applause, in marked contrast to the wails and moanings of the nerve racked women.

The Labor party however, promises energetically to take up this work at the point at which the Liberal Government will leave it, and it is more than probable that Senator Millen's arduous duties will devolve on the man who was minister for defence in the last Labor cabinet, Senator Geo. F. Pearce, of Western Australia, a very capable politician, and a person versed in the inner workings and the requirements of the post.

The outbreak of the war took all the spirit out of the campaign, which began the first of July. It had been a pretty lively canvass up to August owing to the feeling caused by the double solution of parliament, a thing without precedent in the history of the Commonwealth, at the behest of Mr.

The Senate, which was overwhelmirgly Laborite, had blocked practically all the legislation passed by the House, one, and at length, upon the rejection of two test bills by the Senate, the Premier ppealed to the Governor-General to declare both Houses dissolved.



That Ostend's danger is real is evidenced by the hasty removal of the Belgian capital to Havre. In the northwest zone of the vast battlefield the Germans appear to have got their second wind and are showing something of the aggressiveness of their initial dash towards Paris. However, there is no very good reason to suppose they will be any more successful this time if they are once more headed for Paris. One of the best indications that the allies are prepared for any test is the fact that the fall of Antwerp did not stampede them into rash operations. It may be taken for granted that Joffre and French have been preparing for an aggressive move on the part of the enemy to follow the capture of Antwerp. The line that has held so splendidly is becoming thicker every hour as reinforcements pour in. It may bend at some points, but it will not give, and in time will have acquired sufficient impetus to drive the invaders over their own frontiers.
