The islands are at the entrance to the Gulf of Riga, and provide easy access to the mainland over small intermediate islands. They are off the coast of the Russian province of Esthonia. Dago Island is about 200 miles from Petrograd. Its position derives additional importance from the fact that it is almost at the mouth of the Gulf of Finland at the head of which is Kronstadt, which defends Petrograd.

Oesel Island is nearly 100 miles north of Riga, which the Germans captured recently. The landing of German troops in Esthonia would threaten the outflanking of the Russian line and probably compel a retreat on a wide section of the front, if indeed it did not open the way to Petrograd itself. A railway line follows t'e coast all the way from Hapsal, opposite Dago Island, to Petrograd. Cesel Island, the largest of the two, is 45 miles long and has an area of 1,010 square miles and a population of about 60,000. It has a difficult coastline in the form of precipitous limestone cliffs.

WILL CONTROL SHIPPING AND SHIPBUILDING FOR TWO YEARS AFTER WAR

London, Oct. 12—According to the Central News the Government intends to retain control of shipping, shipbuilding and kindred industries until one or two years after the war, instead of six month. It is understood, says the news agency, that one of the reasons for this is to prevent Germany from obtaining ships from British shippards through neutral orders until the requirements of Great Britain and her allies are fully met.

British Front in France and Belgium, Oct. 13.—(By the Associated Press).— All day yesterday British fought their way doggedly, foot by foot, over the mud-locked battlefield, northeast of ypres. They are still clinging with grim determination to the task at the latest reports, and had made appreciable gains in the face of almost inconceivable difficulties along the six-mile front.

Fighting For Crests. The greatest advance appears to have been along the crest of the Passchendaele ridge, where the at-tacking troops had pushed forward to an extreme depth of perhaps 1,200 yards from the starting It was reported several hours ago

that observers had seen a small body of Haig's men at the crest, which lies almost on the outskirts of the village of Passchendaele. The three years of war have produced few such days of hardships. Not since the world conflict began, however, has there been a more wonderful display of courage by the British. From the start it has been a merciless struggle against the odds presented by the hideous morasses for which Flanders is

MORE CLOSE WORK. British Front in France and Bel-gium, Oct. 12—(By the Associated Press).-There has been more rifle and havenet work today than in the last battle or two in Flanders The machine guns, however, played an important part of the German defence. The enemy fought better than usual in some places, but in others he has shown a lack of fight-

Germans Prepared. The Germans evidently guessed in advance that the attack was to be launched at daybreak. During the night, they shelled the communicating roads and front lines heavily, and as early as 2 o'clock this morning they threw a large number of gas shells along the British forward positions. When the attack began the enemy maintained a heavy nachine gun barrage over large sec-

tions of the front.

Charged With Bayonet. On the right of the advance, which roughly was in the direction of Passchendaele, the British were faced with the greatest difficulty. About the Ravesbeek River, the ground was awful. In addition, there were numerous strong German positions along the slopes of the Passchendaele Ridge, which dominated the advance and made it possible for the enemy to pour heavy machine gun fire into the approaching troops. The Germans, knowing that the attack was coming, were ready with a merciless fire when the British pushed forward. In the wood southwest of Passchendaele there was a concrete pill-box, and many machine gun forts impro-vised out of debris. The British charged this place with the bayonet, and hard hand-to-hand fighting followed. The enemy holders of the position finally were killed or captured or forced to flee. Here and at other points along the battlefront many Germans were killed with cold

Bellevue, 1,500 yards west of Passchendaele, was another point that held up the British advance with machine gun fire. Flower of British Professional Army Perished Here; the Canadians Won Everlasting Fame, and Anzacs' Recent Triumph Is as Gallipoli in Australian Memory.

Two weeks ago I endeavored to set forth the geographical circumstances of the Ypres country, with a view to explaining the operations now going forward in the present battle, which, is the third and mightlest of the "Wipers" conflicts. Beyond all question "Wipers" is to be the great landmark in British military history hereafter, and it has seemed to me worth while now, on the anniversary of the first conflict, to recall briefly the events of the conflict, which was the most considerable and costly in all British history up to 1915.





Custards and Creams For Sunday Dessert

Cup Custard—Scald one pint milk. Beat two eggs, add the milk, sprinkle of salt and two tablespoonfuls sugar, and stir until the sugar dissolves. If desired, a little nutmeg may be added. Four into cups, stand the cups in a pan of boiling water, put the pan in the oven and bake until the custards are firm in the centre.

To make a bread-and-butter pudding-dish and place buttered slices of bread on top of the custard. Stand the pudding-dish and place buttered slices of bread on top of the custard. Stand the pudding-dish in a pan of boiling water, and bake in the oven.

To test baked custard: Put a knife in the centre; if it comes out without egg or milk on it, the custard is cooked. Over-cooking will curdle it.

Steamed Custard—Scald one pint milk. Let them cook two or three min-utes, until firm, lift out on a plate, and stir into the hot milk. Boil one minute. Separate two yolks and one whole egg together, add salt and three tablespoonfuls sugar, and stir into the hot milk. If liquid flavoring, instead of cocoa, is used, add it last, and pour the mixture into a pudding-dish or into cups. Set it into a pan of hot water or into a steamer over a kettle of boiling water until the custard is solid. Just before meal time beat (the two whites of egg stiff, add half tablespoonful sugar, and half tablespoonful suga

WHEREAS it is provided by our Militia Act of Canada, Revised Statutes of Canada, 1906, chapter 41, Section 69, that our Governor-General of Canada in Council may place our militia of Canada or any part thereof on active service anywhere in Canada, and also beyond for the defence thereof, at any time when it appears advisable so to do by

And Whereas that part of our militia of Canada known as the Canadian Expeditionary Force is now engaged in active service overseas for the defence and security of Canada, the preservation of our Empire and of human liberty; and it is necessary owing to the emergencies of the war to provide re-enforcements for our said Expeditionary Force in addition to those whose inclination or circumstances have permitted them to volunteer;

And Whereas by reason of the large number of men who have already left agricultural and industrial pursuits in our Dominion of Canada in order to join our Expeditionary Force as volunteers, and by reason of the necessity of maintaining under these conditions the productiveness or output of agriculture and industry in our said Dominion, we have determined by and with the advice and consent of our Senate and House of Commons of Canada that it is expedient to secure the men so required, not by ballot as provided by our said Militia Act, but by selective draft; such re-enforcement, under the provisions of the Military Service Act, 1917, hereinafter referred to, not to exceed one hundred thousand men;

And Whereas it is accordingly enacted in and by the provisions of an Act of our Parliament of Canada, holden in the 7th and 8th years of our reign, and known as the Military Service Act, 1917, that every one of our male subjects who comes within one of the classes described and intended by the said Act shall be liable to be called out on active service in our Canadian Expeditionary Force for the defence of Canada, either within or beyond Canada; and that his service shall be for the duration of the present war and demobilization after the conclusion of the war;

And Whereas the men who are under the provisions of the said last mentioned Act, liable to be called out, are comprised in six classes of which Class 1 is, by the provisions of the said Act, defined to consist of all our male subjects, ordinarily, or at any time since the 4th day of August, 1914, resident in Canada, who have attained the age of twenty years, who were born not earlier than the year 1883, and were on the 6th day of July, 1917, unmarried, or are widowers but have no child, and who are not within any of the following enumerated

1. Members of our regular, or reserve, or auxiliary forces, as defined by our Army Act. 2. Members of our military forces raised by the Governments of any

of our other dominions or by our Government of India. 3. Men serving in our Royal Navy, or in our Royal Marines, or in our Naval Service of Canada, and members of our Canadian Expeditionary Force.

4. Men who have since August 4th, 1914, served in our Military or Naval Forces, or in those of our allies, in any theatre of actual war, and have been honourably discharged therefrom.

5. Clergy, including members of any recognized order of an exclusive ly religious character, and ministers of all religious denominations existing in Canada at the date of the passing of our said Military

6. Those persons exempted from military service by Order in Council of August 13th, 1873, and by Order in Council of December 6th,

And Whereas it is moreover provided by our said Military Service Act that our Governor-General of Canada in Council may from time to time by proclamation call out on active service as aforesaid any class of men in the said Act described, and that all men within the class so called out shall, from the date of such proclamation, be deemed to be soldiers enlisted in the military service of Canada and subject to military law, save as in the said Act otherwise provided; and that the men so called out shall report and shall be placed on active service in the Canadian Expeditionary Force as may be set out in such proclamation or in regulations; but that they shall, until so placed on active service, be deemed to be on leave of absence without pay;

And Whereas it is also provided by the said Act that at any time before a date to be fixed by proclamation an application may be made, by or in respect of any man in the class to be called out, to one of our local tribunals, established in the manner provided by the said Act in the province in which such man ordinarily resides, for a certificate of exemption from service upon any

GROUNDS OF EXEMPTION:-

(a) That it is expedient in the national interest that the man should, instead of being employed in military service, be engaged in other work in which he is habitually engaged;

(b) That it is expedient in the national interest that the man should. instead of being employed in military service, be engaged in other work in which he wishes to be engaged and for which he has special qualifications:

(c) That it is expedient in the national interest that, instead of being employed in military service, he should continue to be educated or trained for any work for which he is then being educated or trained; (d) That serious hardship would ensue, if the man were placed on active service, owing to his exceptional financial or business obli-

gations or domestic position; (e) Ill health or infirmity;

(f) That he conscientiously objects to the undertaking of combatant service and is prohibited from so doing by the tenets and articles of faith, in effect on the sixth day of July, 1917, of any organized religious denomination existing and well recognized in Canada at such date, and to which he in good faith belongs;

And that if any of the grounds of such application be established, a

certificate of exemption shall be granted to such man.

And Whereas moreover it is enacted in and by the provisions of an Act of our Parliament of Canada holden in the 7th and 8th years of our reign, and known as the War Time Elections Act, that certain persons thereby disqualified from voting, with such of their sons as on polling day are not of legal age, shall be exempt from combatant military and naval service;

And Whereas it is further provided by our said Military Service Act that applications for exemption from service shall be determined by our said local tribunals, subject to appeal as in the said Act provided, and that any man, by or in respect of whom an application for exemption from service is made, shall, so long as such application or any appeal in connection therewith is pending, and during the currency of any exemption granted him, be deemed to be on leave of absence without pay;

And Whereas our Governor-General of Canada in Council has determined to call out upon active service as aforesaid the men included in Class I as in the said Act and hereinbefore defined or described;

Now Therefore Know Ye that we do hereby call out the said Class 1, comprising the men in our said Military Service Act, 1917, and herein-before defined or described as to the said class belonging, on active service in our Canadian Expeditionary Force for the defence of Canada, either within or beyond Canada, as we may, in the command or direction of our Military Forces, hereafter order or direct.

And we do hereby strictly command, require and enjoin that each man who is a member of the said class shall, on or before the 10th day of November, 1917, in the prescribed form and manner, report himself for military service, unless application for his exemption shall then have been made by him or by another person entitled to apply on his behalf; wherein our loving subjects, members of the said class, are especially charged not to fail, since not only do their loyalty and allegiance require and impose the obligation of careful and implicit obedience to these our strict commands and injunctions, but moreover, lest our loving subjects should be ignorant of the consequences which will ensue if they fail to report within the time limited as aforesaid, we do hereby forewarn and admonish them that any one who is hereby called out, and who without reasonable excuse fails to report as aforesaid, shall thereby commit an offence, for which he shall be liable on summary conviction to imprisonment for any term not exceeding five years with hard labour, and he shall nevertheless, if we so require, be compelled to serve immediately in our said Expeditionary Force.

And we do hereby proclaim and announce that for the greater convenience of our subjects, we have directed that prescribed forms, for reporting for service, and for application for exemption from service, may, at any time on or before the said 10th day of November, 1917, be obtained at any post office in our Dominion of Canada; and that reports for service and applications for exemption from service, it obtained at any of our said post offices and properly executed, shall be forwarded by our postmaster at the post office from which the same are obtained to their proper destination as by our regulations prescribed, free of postage or any other charge.

And we do further inform and notify our loving subjects that local tribunals have been established in convenient localities throughout our Dominion of Canada for the hearing of applications for exemption from service upon any of the statutory grounds, as hereinbefore set out; that these our local tribunals so established will begin to sit in the discharge of their duties on the 8th day of November, 1917, and that they will continue to sit from day to day thereafter, as may be necessary or convenient, at such times and places as shall be duly notified, until all applications for exemption from service shall have been heard and disposed of; also that men belonging to the class hereby called out who have not previously to the said 8th day of November, 1917, reported for service, or forwarded applications for exemption through any of our post offices as aforesaid, may make applications in person for exemption from service to any of our said tribunals, on the 8th, 9th or 10th day

And we do hereby moreover notify and inform our loving subjects who are within the class hereby called out, that if, on or before the 10th day of November, 1917, they report themselves for military service, or if, on or before that day, application for exemption from service be made by them or on their behalf, they will not be required to report for duty, or be placed upon active service as aforesaid, until a day, not earlier than the 10th day of December, 1917, which will, by our registrar for the province in which they reported or applied, be notified to them in writing by registered post at their respective addresses as given in their reports for service, or applications for exemption from service, or at such substituted addresses as they may have respectively signified to our said registrar; and we do hereby inform, forewarn and admonish the men belonging to the class hereby called out that if any of them shall, without just and sufficient cause, fail to report for duty at the time and place required by notice in writing so posted, or shall fail to report for duty as otherwise by law required, he shall be subject to the procedure, pains and penalties by law prescribed as against military

Of all of which our loving subjects, and all others whom these presents may concern, are hereby required to take notice, rendering strict obedience to and compliance with all these our commands, directions and requirements, and governing themselves accordingly.

To use and prize aright our heritage of song, to learn to know the evil and choose the good, to shake the ignorance of those who think there is no music worth doing but that with which they happen to be familiar, and to shake still more the shameful conception of church music as merely an attraction, a sort of prestry rattle to lure the congregational baby to church. Here is our task.

When people are given the opportunity of hearing good music on the organ they gradually learn to appreciate music for music's sake, and become more critical as to its performance. Of course, neither the organ nor any other instrument is in itself artistic. It is simply the medium through which is expressed the mind of the composer and the performer. If the organ is ever to become an acknowledged, artistic instrument, it is for those who love the instrument, it is for those who love the instrument and realize its possibilities to make it such. The day of the organ transcription is here to stay. The more the organist studies orchestral music, the more will he help to advance artistic organ-playing. Such study will broaden his conceptions of interpretation and will create a striving for the perhaps unattainable—so far as the organ is concerned. He will no longer be content to look on the organ as a machine on which to play voluntaries and hymns, but he will demand freedom to do as he wishes. He will realize that he must be unhampered in everything. Instead of copying another man's drawing, he will paint his own picture. He will no longer be content to do the best he can with a few left-footed pedal notes. Let him begin with humbles efforts, and let him not think of orchestral organ-playing until he has thoroughly mastered his Bach and Mendelssohn. A strict schooling in such music is essential before the player can venture into new fields. And then how great his reward when he finds opening up before him a new world of music, full of unbounded possibilities! bounded possibilities! CLARENCE E. GILMOUR.

Mayor Says Municipal Controlled Sales Not Yet Interfered With.

Sir George Gibbon's Announces That Response Is Generous.

"WE MUST NOT FAIL, MEN"

Ten Teams Assured for Thursday's Canvass--Committee's Enthusiastic Meeting.

"The citizens of London, in spite of all the calls upon them, are again loyally responding to the appeal for the British Red Cross," said Sir George

ally responding to the appeal for the British Red Cross," said Sir George Gibbons, chairman of the central committee, at yesterday's meeting to complete plans for next Thursday's canwas. Sir George stated that he had sent out a letter to a limited number of citizens, who, he expected, would contribute generously, and so far the response had been very good. He had met a renewal of the kindness of London citizens, and he was confident that the city would not cheapen itself at this juncture, for it would be intolerable that at this time of crisis the people of Canada should fail the men in the trenches in need of every assistance of the Red Cross.

Large Attendance.

The meeting was held in the grillroom of the Tecumseh House, and was attended by almost every member of the committee. Team captains reported on the progress they had made, and in ten cases there was assurance that the teams would be complete. It was decided to appoint the same committee of men who acted in the patroctic fund campaign, in co-operation with the ladies, Col. Smith, and Messrs. Allan McLean, George S. Gibbons, C. Hunt, George Gunn and Magistrate Graydon. Rev. Dr. Waller reported that the appeal would haye the support of the city clergy, who have promised to make announncemets tomorrow.

Will Be Divided.

A. E. Silverwood, chairman of the canvass committee, outlined the plan that had been devised by Gordon Philip. There are 1,600 cards representing the persons the committee judged would be in a position to contribute substantial amounts, and these are to be divided among the teams. This time the arrangement is for the division of down-town cards, according to estimated donations, the remainder to be divided according to territories so as to prevent overlapping. The names of team members are to be in the secretary's hands by Monday noon, when the cards will all be ready. That afternoon the first list of subscribers will be published. Wednesday night the teams will meet for the final planning, and on Thursday morning the canvass will commen

Many Problems Will Be Solved by New Organization.

girls' work and leadership conference was manifested at the opening session ast evening for leaders by a good attendance and the spirit with which discussion of various phases of organized work for girls was taken up. The meeting was held in the Y. M. C. A. auditorium, the conference headquarters, Miss Georgina M. Newbury of the local committee presiding.

Miss Una Saunders of the national advisory committee for co-operation in girls' work, under the auspices of which the conference is being held, addressed the gathering, telling of the aims of the "teen age girl" movement, and explaining the program which has been prepared to meet the four-fold needs of girls, physical, intellectual, religious and social or service at the formative period

social or service at the formative period in their lives.

Will Supplement.

One point emphasized was that the new program is not intended to multiply organizations or careful to the control of the con new program is not intended to multiply organizations or overlap those all ready in existence; but rather to supplement them. The idea is to give a broader program and scope for activities to girls' clubs and other sociates already formed, and to help them in planning programs. Referring to the history of the national advisory committee for co-operation in girls' work, she stated that it had come into existence in recognition of the urgent need of some such development work in the right direction for girls, as already was being covered for boys by the Canadian standard efficiency tests program. At the present, however, the charting system for girls is not being advocated.
