# SUPREME COUNCIL DISCUSSES RUSSIAN SITUATION AT TUUAY'S

French Ambassador To Russia Addresses Plenipotentiaries On the Subject-Next Meeting of Council Will Be Addressed by Danish Minister in Petrograd.

Paris, Jan. 20.—The situation in Russia was taken up by the supreme council of the peace conference at its session today. Jos, Noulets, the French ambassador to Russia, was present at the meeting and addressed it on the Russian question. This announcement was made in the official statement given out regarding the proceedings of the plenipotentiaries. The next meeting of the council will be held tomorrow at 10:30 o'clock.



Berlin, Jan. 19.—If the league of nations is to be a success, it must be positive as well as negative, according to a pamphlet issued by Major Waidorf Astor, parliamentary secretary of the ministry of food, today. ### G. W. V. A. REQUESTS **GREAT EXTENSION IN GRATUITIES PROGRAM**

Wants More For Those Who Served Here.

"That all men having seen service in France or other belligerent fronts be entitled to full gratuity, this to refer to those who enlisted under the volunteer

"That volunteers who were accepted for service and went to England only. be awarded the gratuity the same as men having served on a belligerent front.
"That volunteers who honorably served in Canada be granted war ser-vice gratuity regardless of date of dis-

The above resolutions were passed at The above resolutions were passed at a well-attended meeting of the Great War Veterans' Association held in the Masonic Temple on Saturday night, and a copy of them will be sent to Toronto. The dates affecting the granting of the gratuity are yet to be adjusted. Lieut.-Col. W. G. Coles (chairman) pointed out that to keep fighting forces in France it is necessary to have men behind them in both England and Canada. This was his remark in reference to the war clause in the gratuity orders, says that men discharged prior to November 11, 1918, and who were not in the actual theatre of war are not entitled to its allowance.

There was a question asked as to why a man who was able to use a pick and shovel in the camps of England was not fit to go to France. The questioner declared that there were many such cases. 





#### DECLINE IN PRICE OF LINENS UNLIKELY

in Spite of the Cessation of Hostilities.

TORONTO, Jan. 11 .- In spite of the cessation of hostilities, and consequently a curtallment in the demand on war account, there appears to be no likelihood of a decline in the price of linen goods for some time to come. Importers are having this fact brought home to them just now, this being the time when they begin to negotiate orders for linen goods for Christmas, 1919, trade.

"We are finding," remarked one importer today, "that the goods will cost us fully one-third more than a year ago, and manufacturers in Belfast are ago, and manufacturers in Belfast are not at all pressing us to book orders. You see," he explained, "the demand for linen for war purposes has been so heavy during the last three or four years that but a limited amount has been manufactured for ordinary commercial purposes. It will, therefore, be some time before conditions in the linen goods trade will again be back to normal. Until that period has been reached we cannot expect normal conreached we cannot expect normal conditions to obtain-in respect to prices.
