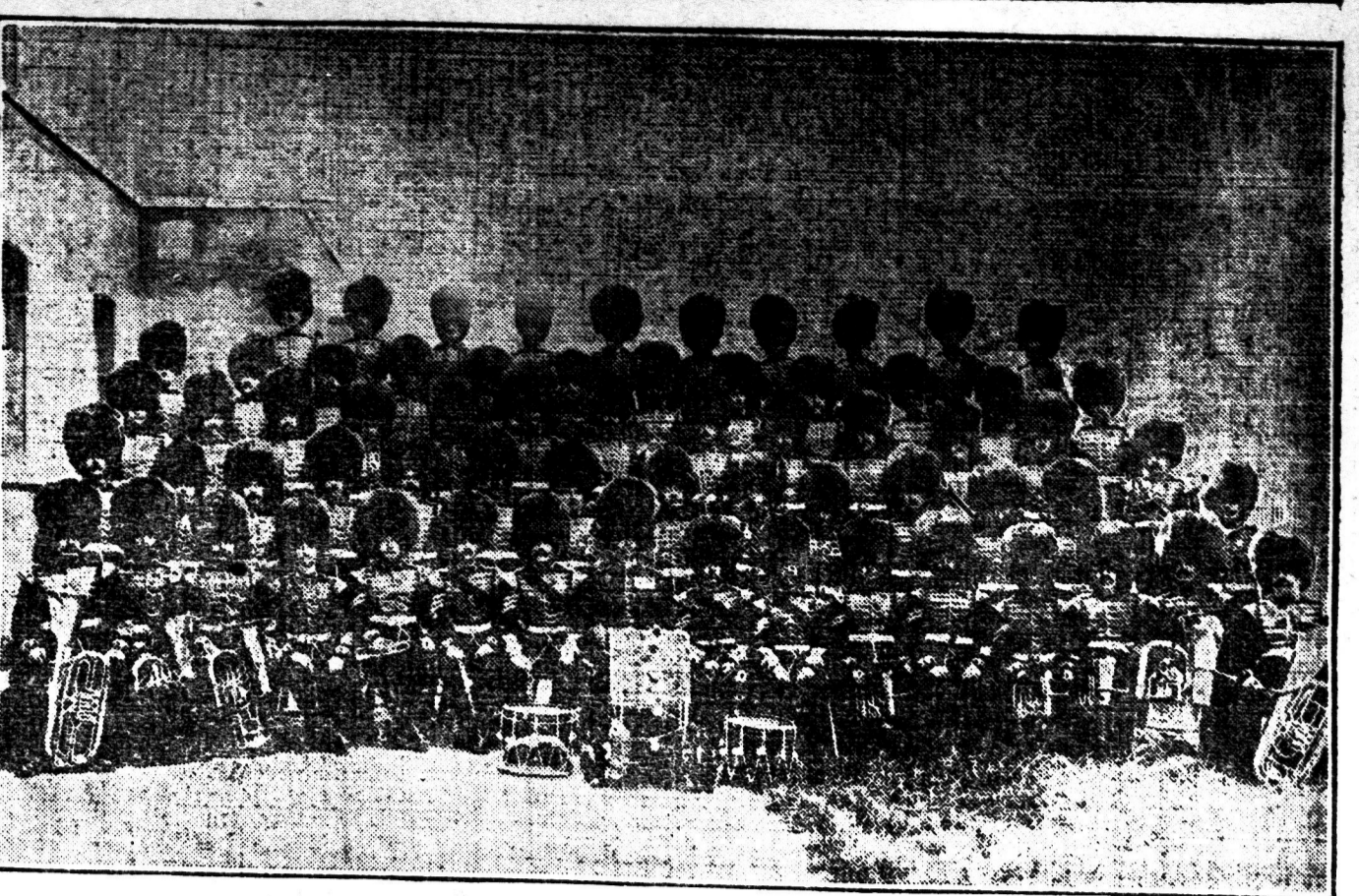
eggs of medium strength. Cook in a double boiler for several minutes until thick, stirring constantly; add a tablespoon of butter, stir until blended and cool, then mix in lightly one cup of thick sour cream either whipped or plain. Chop a medium-sized head of cabbage, add a cup of celery cut into dice and a teaspoon of salt, then mix with the salad dressing and chill.

Corn Bread. Mix and sift together one and one-half cups of cornmeal, one-half cup of flour, one teaspoon of salt, one tablespoon of sugar and one-half teaspoon of soda. Beat an egg, add a cup of thick, sour cream and pour gradually into the dry ingredients. Beat thoroughly, add cold water or a little more cream, if necessary, making the mixture slightly. Pour into a hot, well-buttered pan and bake from twenty to thirty minutes in a moderate oven. Bake in gem pans for muffins.

Cookies. These keep indefinitely without growing stale. Cream a cup of butter, add two cups of sugar, three eggs and alternately with three cups of flour, one cup of thick, sour cream and one egg, one teaspoon of soda. Flavor as preferred with vanilla, cinnamon or nutmeg, or divide the batter into three parts, flavoring each differently, then add more flour, making the mixture stiff enough to roll. Leave it as soft as can be handled and roll out only a small portion at a time. Sift granulated sugar over the top and gently roll it in before cutting into rounds. Watch closely while baking.

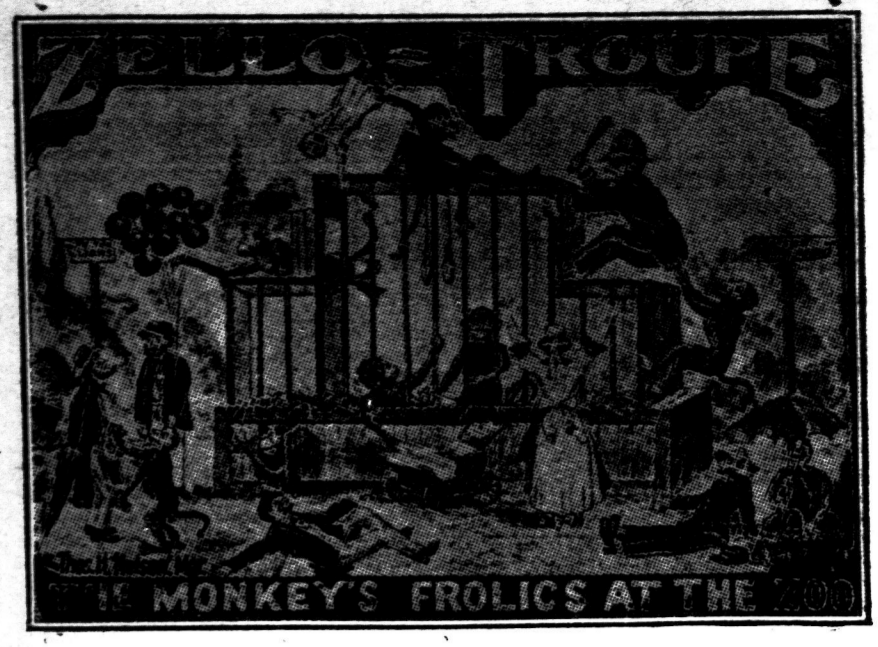

A \$300 BONUS FOR MR. ROBERTS. CITY PRESENTS BILL TO RAILWAY.

Expert, Who Goes to British Columbia, Is Remembered by Water Commissioners. London Wants \$746.99 For the Damage Done to Water Pipes By Electrolysis.

HAS LEFT CITY'S EMPLOY WILL SUE IF NECESSARY. Company Is Given Two Weeks in Which to Pay Up—If Not a Legal Fight Will Follow at Once.

Engineer Roberts, who is leaving the employ of the city today as electrical engineer, was given a bonus by the city of \$300 for extra work done in connection with the Niagara power plant since the resignation of Engineer Sifton.

Incidentally all the members of the board expressed their appreciation of Mr. Roberts' services. "We always intended doing the thing by him, I regret that he is leaving the city, and I move that a bonus of \$300 be given him for the extra services rendered the city during the past six months."
