eral ranks who may advance claims for cabinet preferment by reason of for-mer services or prominence in other ways, who, as far as point of view and policy go, would be more properly classed as Conservatives than as Lib-

If Mr. King chooses to take as colleagues any considerable number of these men he may have an efficient cabinet, but it would be a misnomer to describe it as a Liberal administration He can only secure a truly Liberal government by a resolute elimination as cabinet possibilities of certain war-riors. The general impression is that Mr. King's personal inclinations bend in this direction. He wants a truly progressive administration, and will do his best to secure it.

Afflance With Progressives.
There are indications that he hopes to win the alliance of the Progressive group. But the basis of the Progressive campaign has been the bold thesis that both the historic parties of Can-ada are cesspools of corruption and faithful buttresses of the big business





WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 13.— Within the next ten years India will speak as a co-equal partner with Canada and Australia in the British Em-pire, the Right Hon. V. S. Srinwass Sastri, India's representative in the British delegation to the armament conference, predicted today, in an ad-dress before the City Ciub. The speaker also predicted that possibly re-cent Irish developments would "quicken his estimate of ten years," adding that

"Britain will be wise it she gives do-minion status to India more easily than she has given it to Ireland."

Mr. Sastri impressed upon his au-dience that the voice of India at the arms conference, "is not that of a Brit-ish dependency peopled by a subject-nation," and that "no British officer is watching over me to keep me in or-

der.
"In fact," he added, "I have exactly
the same status at this conference as
Sir Robert Borden of Canada and Senator Pearce of Australia.
Claims Ghandi Will Fall.

Claims Ghandi Will Fall. "It is true that India has griev-ances," he continued, "but what peo-ple have not? If I am to believe your newspapers, you have the rottenest government in the world here. Yet you all look contented and well fed. You are not going to rise in violent revolution. It is true, of course, that British rule rests in the last resort on force, but Britain does not hold India by terrorism. Therefore, Ghandi's movement will fail."

The board, Mr. Carvell assured him, would secure all possible information from the Bell Company. He thought Mr. Reid was hardly justified in throwing out aspersions against the bona fides of the company.

Never until the present hearing, said Mr. Carvell, during his two and a half years as chairman of the board, had the relations between it and the witnesses or between the witnesses and counsel been other than entirely courteous.
