Our Streets.

We are glad to see that our citizens are awakening to the urgent need of some action with regard to the immediate improvement of our streets.

Report of the School Board.

In presenting a report of the transactions of the past calendar year, your Board has to record a year of continued progress in school affairs.

At the close of the school year our Principal, Mr. C. E. Seaman, after two years of faithful and painstaking service, resigned his position in order that he might go abroad to pursue further studies.

The number of pupils now in attendance in the public schools is 240. These are distributed as follows:

Grades I, II, Miss Burgess teacher, 76. Grades III, IV, V, Miss Godfrey teacher, 44. Grades V, VI, Miss West teacher, 50. Grades VII, VIII, Miss Scott teacher, 36.

Grades IX, X, Mr. Godfrey teacher, 34. During the year 1893 the number was 221, distributed as follows:

Grades I, II, Miss Burgess teacher, 83. Grades III, IV, V, Miss West teacher, 65. Grades VI, VII, Miss Scott teacher, 33. Grades VIII, IX, Mr. Seaman teacher, 35.

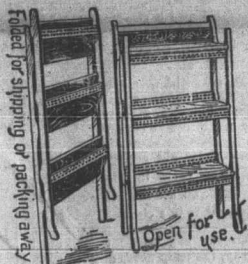

A committee was appointed to frame a constitution and by-laws as well as to name the society.

The next meeting is called for Thursday, 23rd inst., at the laboratory of the Greenhouse.

The object of the society is to discuss scientific and kindred subjects bearing on Horticulture and Agriculture. "The winter pruning of fruit trees," will be discussed at the next meeting. W. S. 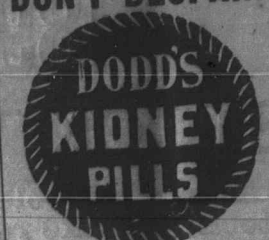
