## PREFACE.

S. ADAMS

The design of the following Work is to furnish young persons with an easy Guide to Spelling, and to combine utility with cheapness.

As an additional help to ascertain the proper pronunciation of particular words, the equivocal sounds of the letters *c*, *s*, and *g*, are carefully distinguished, in an easy and compendious method. Thus the learner will observe that the letter *s*, with this mark annexed to it, always bears a soft sound like the letter *s*, as in *cell*, (*sell*) ; and if marked thus, *'c*, it is sounded like *k*, as in 'chief' (*chif*) ; and denotes the sound of *z*, as in *wise* (*wize*) : *'g* represents the sound of *i*, as in *'gem* (*jem*) ; and *'g* has a similar sound.

When such marks are not affixed to these letters, they must be understood to retain their natural and more general sound, as in the words *call*, *house*, *get*. It must be observed likewise, that in words where *h* is printed in the Italic character, it is not aspirated; and wherever any other letter occurs in that character, its sound is dropped. A circumflex (^) over a vowel denotes a long sound, as in *edit*. Where difficulties of irregularities arise, which cannot be thus easily obviated, the scholar is referred to the bottom of the page for a correct pronunciation. The plan itself is doubtless extremely simple. But when the circumstances of those for whom it is professedly designed are considered, this simplicity itself will probably be esteemed a recommendation.

The soft sound of *g* is here distinguished by a small *f* before the letter, thus *fg*, and the capital letters by a small *f* (*rG*), which obviates the necessity of any directions in the way of notes; and when pointed out properly, to the young learners, will be equally intelligible. Without these distinctions the *g* may be considered as having a hard

A Quotation " signifies the words so marked are transcribed from the writings of another in his own words. The end of a Quotation is marked thus, " and shows that the usage quoted is finished.

Single Accent denotes the stress to be laid upon a particular syllable in a word.

Double Accent serves to mark a short sound in a syllable.

Crochets inclose short sentences or references, that have connection with the subject treated of.

Asterisk, \* Are all used as references to the bottom of Index, the page or margin of a book. Figures, also, Obelisk, &c., as, 1, 2, 3, &c. are used in like manner, and Parallel, ||, have, in general, the same signification.

Note: A Paragraph and Section are not always used like the other marks, reference to the margin or bottom of a page. They are chiefly used to mark divisions and separate heads of a discourse. The former character is to be seen in many parts of the Old and New Testament; and in Locke's *Essay* mark § is prefixed to the Sections of the discourse.
