FOURTH SESSION OF THE TWENTY-FIRST GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

Thursday, February 20, 1862.

THE House having, by several Proclamations hereto annexed, been prorogued until this day, then to meet for the dispatch of business ;

And being met—

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, by Henry Palmer, Esquire, Usher of the Black Rod.

Mr. Speaker ;

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor commands the immediate attendance of this Honorable House at the Bar of the Council Chamber.

Accordingly, Mr. Speaker and the House went up to attend His Excellency in the Council Chamber ;

And being returned—

Mr. Speaker reported that when the House did attend His Excellency this day in the Council Chamber, His Excellency was pleased to make a Speech to both Houses of the Legislature, of which Mr. Speaker said he had, to prevent mistakes, obtained a copy, and which was read by the Clerk, and is as follows :

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council ;

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly ;

I have summoned you for the Dispatch of your Legislative Duties ; and I have great satisfaction in meeting you at the Opening of another Session.

Since the close of the last Session, the Queen and the Nation have sustained an irreparable loss in the death of His Royal Highness the Prince Consort.

I feel sure that none of Her Majesty's subjects sympathize with their Sovereign in Her affliction more deeply than you do.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly ;

The Estimates for the Service of the ensuing Year will be laid before you—they have been framed with due regard to Economy.

The Public Accounts for the past Year will also be presented to you.

Notwithstanding the serious embarrassments, which the unhappy condition of a neighbouring People has occasioned to our Foreign Trade, I am glad to find that there has been no remarkable decrease in the Revenue of the past year. I regret, however, to say, that the Expenditure during the same period, though it shows a considerable decrease, as compared with the Expenditure of the preceding twelve-months, has not been covered by the Revenue.

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council;

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

Thirty-three of the Acts passed during the last Session have received the Royal allowance.

I presume that the Act for taking a Census has also been left to its operation.

The remaining three, viz:—the Elective Council Act; the Act for the organization of the Volunteer Force, and that for the Incorporation of the Roman Catholic Bishop, have not at yet, received the Royal Allowance. Despatches from Her Majesty's Colonial Minister, containing suggestions on the subject of the two last mentioned Acts, will be laid before you.

An Act passed in the Session of 1860, authorizing the issue of Fishery Licences to citizens of the United States, for vessels built in this Island, and owned by them, has lately been specially confirmed by Her Majesty. I trust that it will have a beneficial effect on the Trade of this Country.

The Commissioners appointed to enquire into the Land Question have completed their laborious task, and have forwarded their Report to His Grace the Duke of Newcastle.

I have not as yet received any communication from His Grace on this important subject; but I am confident that he will not allow this Session of the Colonial Legislature to pass, without communicating to me Her Majesty's Commands on a question in which the people of this Island are so generally interested, and in regard to which they are known to feel so much anxiety.

The Governor General of Canada has recently forwarded to me a proposal for the Establishment of a Reciprocal Free Trade among the British North American Provinces, and for an assimilation of their respective Tariffs. It is unnecessary for me to direct your special attention to a subject of such paramount importance. Papers relating to it will be laid before you.

I trust that your deliberations during the Session may, under the Divine blessing, tend to the Advancement and Prosperity of the People of this Colony.

Mr. Speaker informed the House that he had received a letter from the Sergeant-at-Arms, requesting the House to accept his resignation; and thereupon

The Hon. Mr. Macaulay moved that Mr. Albert H. Yates be appointed Sergeant-at-Arms, in place of Mr. Wellington Nelson, resigned.

The Hon. Mr. Coles moved, in amendment to the motion, that Robert Hyndman, Esq., be Sergeant-at-Arms.

The House divided on the motion of amendment.

The question being then put on the main motion, it was carried in the affirmative, and

Resolved, accordingly.

Resolved, That a Committee of Seven Members be appointed to prepare and report with all convenient speed, the draft of an Address in answer to the Speech of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, delivered this day, to both Houses of the Legislature.

Ordered, That Mr. Davies, Mr. John Yeo, Mr. Owen, Mr. Montgomery, Mr. Macneill, Mr. Howat and Mr. Holm do compose the said Committee.

Resolved, That a Committee of Seven Members be appointed to examine and report on the Public Accounts, with power to send for persons, papers and records.

Ordered, That Mr. Macneill, Mr. Davies, Mr. Beer, Mr. John Yeo, the Hon. Mr. Wightman, the Hon. Mr. Perry and the Hon. Mr. Thornton do compose the said Committee.

Resolved, That a Committee of three Members be appointed to provide Stationery for the use of the House.

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. Pope, Mr. Ramsay and the Hon. Mr. Perry do compose the said Committee.

Resolved, That a Committee of seven Members be appointed to keep up a good correspondence between the two branches of the

Legislature, and to report their proceedings from time to time, with power to send for persons, papers and records.

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. Longworth, Mr. Douse, the Hon. Mr. Yeo, Hon. Mr. Perry, Hon. Mr. Coles, Hon. Mr. Hensley and Mr. Howat do compose the said Committee.

Ordered, That the said Resolution be communicated by Message, to the Legislative Council.

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. Gray do carry the said Message to the Council.

Resolved, That a Committee of three Members be appointed to receive tenders for printing the Journals of this House for the present Session, and to report thereon to the House.

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. Haviland, Mr. Holm and the Hon. Mr. Wightman do compose the said Committee.

Resolved, That a Committee of five Members be appointed to examine Bills to be engrossed, or that have been engrossed.

Ordered, That Mr. John Yeo, Mr. Davies, Mr. Beer, Mr. Sinclair and the Hon. Mr. Perry do compose the said Committee.

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to join a Committee of the Legislative Council to prepare an Address of condolence with Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen, on the irreparable loss which Her Majesty and the Nation have sustained in the death of His Royal Highness the Prince Consort.

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. Gray, Hon. Mr. Coles, Hon. Mr. Longworth, Hon. Mr. Hensley, Hon. Mr. Pope and the Hon. Mr. Wightman be a Committee to prepare the said Address to Her Majesty.

Ordered, That the said Resolution be communicated, by Message, to the Legislative Council.

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. Gray do carry the said Message to the Council.

Resolved, That a Committee of three Members be appointed to examine what Laws have lately expired, or are near expiring, with leave to report from time to time, by Bills or otherwise.

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. Longworth, Mr. Davies and the Hon. Mr. Hensley do compose the said Committee.

Resolved, That a Committee of five Members be appointed, to whom shall be referred every Private Bill, to report thereon to the House.

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. Longworth, Mr. Ramsay, Mr. Montgomery, the Hon. Mr. Laird and the Hon. Mr. Thornton do compose the said Committee.

Resolved, That a copy of the Journal of this House be sent to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, each day, as soon as may be, after the adjournment.

Then the House adjourned until to-morrow, at ten o'clock.

THE Hon. Mr. *Pope*, from the Committee appointed to receive tenders for printing the debates of the House, for the present Session, presented to the House the Report of the said Committee ; which report was again read.

The Hon. Mr. *Haviland*, from the Committee appointed to receive tenders for printing the Journals of this House, for the present Session, presented to the House the report of the said Committee ; which report was again read.

Ordered, That the said report be now committed to a Committee of the whole House.

Ordered That the report of the Committee appointed to receive tenders for printing the debates of the House, for the present Session, be also referred to the said Committee.

And then the House resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. Macneill took the Chair of the Committee ; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair ;

And *Mr. Macneill* reported that the Committee had gone through the report of the Special Committee appointed to receive tenders for printing the debates of the House, without making any amendment thereto.

Mr. *Macneill* also reported that the Committee had gone through the report of the Special Committee appointed to receive tenders for printing the Journals of the House, had amended and then adopted the same; and the said reports being again severally read at the Clerk's table, were agreed to by the House, and are as follow:—

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PRINTING THE DEBATES.

Your Committee appointed to receive tenders for printing the debates of the House, for the present Session, have to report that they have received three tenders, viz:—

First—From John Ings, Esq., offering to perform the work at the following rates: printing each sheet of four pages, the sum of Thirty shillings and nine pence; binding, One shilling, each copy.

Second—From Mr. George T. Haszard, proposing to perform the work at the following rates: printing each sheet of four pages, the sum of Thirty shillings; binding, one shilling, each copy.

Third—From Mr. F. W. Hughes, undertaking to print the said debates at the rate of Twenty-four shillings per sheet of four pages; and ten pence each copy, for binding in the usual style.

The quality of the paper on which Mr. Hughes proposes to print the debates is much inferior to that shown by Mr. Ings and Mr. Haszard; but the tender of Mr. Hughes being so much lower than the others, your Committee beg to recommend that it be received. They also recommend that a contract be signed, requiring the Contractor to furnish to this House the printed debates, within twenty-four hours after sufficient manuscript to fill each sheet, be delivered to him by the Reporters.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PRINTING THE JOURNALS.

Your Committee appointed to receive tenders for printing the Journals of the House during the present Session, have to report that they have received five tenders, viz:—

First—From Mr. John S. Bremner, proposing to print the Journal of the House of Assembly, for the present Session, at the rates following: Thirty shillings per sheet of four pages, and half-bind the same in the usual style, at Four shillings and six pence per volume, and for the stitched

copies, One shilling and three pence each, agreeably to a specimen of paper hereunto annexed.

Haszard; but, inasmuch as the tender of Mr. Hughes is so much lower than that of either of the others, and as the specimen paper sent in by him is deemed sufficient for the purpose, this Committee recommend that the said tender of Mr. Hughes be accepted, it being understood that he is to bind and letter the work in the style of the published Journals of 1861.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY;

1. We Her Majesty's faithful subjects the House of Assembly of Prince Edward Island, respectfully offer our thanks for the Speech with which Your Excellency was pleased to open the present Session.

2. We deeply sympathize with our beloved Queen in the irreparable loss Her Majesty has sustained by the death of His Royal Highness the Prince Consort,—a loss which we, in common with all Her Majesty's subjects, most sincerely regret.

3. We thank your Excellency for having directed the Public Accounts for the past and the Estimates for the current year to be laid before us. It is satisfactory to learn that the latter have been framed with a due regard to economy.

4. Although the disturbed condition of a neighboring People has occasioned serious embarrassments to the Trade of this Colony, we are glad to find that there has been no remarkable decrease in the Revenue of the past year.

5. We regret to be informed that the Expenditure for the same period has exceeded the Revenue. In view of the large sums annually voted for Education,—with a due regard for the other branches of the Public Service—it is difficult to confine the expenditure within the receipts.

6. We are pleased to learn that so many of the Acts passed during the last Session have received the Royal allowance; and when the Despatches referred to by your Excellency, containing suggestions in reference to those which have not yet received the Royal assent, are laid before us, they shall receive our best consideration.

7. When the unhappy differences existing in the United States, which seriously disturb our Trade, shall have been adjusted, we trust the Act authorizing the issue of Fishery Licenses to citizens of that Country, for vessels built in this Island, will be acted upon, and tend to advance the trade of the Colony.

8. It is gratifying to hear that the Commissioners appointed to inquire into the land question, have completed their laborious task, and forwarded their report to His Grace the Duke of Newcastle.

9. We regret to learn that Your Excellency has not yet received any communication from His Grace on the subject of their Award, a matter in which the people of this Colony feel so deep an interest; but we are pleased to hear that Your Excellency is confident that Her Majesty's instructions on this most important question may be expected during the present Session of the Legislature.

10. When the proposal of the Governor General of Canada, for the establishment of Reciprocal Free Trade among the North American Colonies shall have been submitted to us, it shall receive all the consideration which a subject of such paramount importance demands.

11. We join Your Excellency in the hope that our deliberations may, under the Divine blessing, tend to the advancement and prosperity of the people of the Colony.

And the said report being again read,

The Hon. Mr. Coles moved to amend the said reported Address, by expunging the whole of the third, fourth and fifth paragraphs, and inserting the following in lieu thereof:

“We thank Your Excellency for having directed the Public Accounts for the past year, and the Estimates for the current one, to be laid before us. The Hon. Mr. *Longworth* moved that the said petition do lie on the table.

The Hon. Mr. *Coles* moved, in amendment to the motion, to leave out all after the word "that," and substitute the following: "the petition be referred to the Members for the District."

And the motion being seconded, and the question put thereon, it was carried in the affirmative.

The main motion, as amended, was then put and carried, and

Ordered accordingly.

The Hon. Mr. *Pope*, from the Committee to whom was referred the petition of Hugh Montgomery, Benjamin Cole and other Pew-holders and Members of the Presbyterian Church, Bedeque, praying for an Act of incorporation, to examine the same and report thereon, by Bill or otherwise, presented to the House a Bill— as prepared by the Committee—to incorporate the Minister and Trustees of the Presbyterian Church, Bedeque; and the same was read the first time.

Your Committee appointed during the last Session of the Legislature, to report on the draft of a Bill to amend the Act for regulating the sale by license of spirituous liquors, as also upon various petitions relating to the same subject, to them referred, during the present Session, have to report, that, in their opinion, the following amendments of the Act are required:—

First—No license for the City of Charlottetown should be issued until the certificate upon which such license is at present obtained, shall be approved of by a majority of the City Council.

Second—It should be necessary for all Tavern Keepers requiring renewal of their licenses, to procure a certificate from two neighboring Magistrates, to state that their Houses have been conducted in an orderly manner up to the time of applying for such renewal.

Your Committee are of opinion that the clause of the draft Bill to them submitted, proposing that confirmed drunkards whose intellects have become impaired by excessive drinking, should be treated as Lunatics, might, with some modifications, be adopted, and be productive of benefit to the families of the unfortunate parties referred to.

The above alterations are all which your Committee believe, after careful consideration of this important subject, can, with any prospect of practical utility, be at present adopted,

Mr. *Davies*, from the Special Committee appointed last Session, to report this Session, on the petition of W. W. Lord and others, Merchants and Ship Owners, complaining of the exaction of a tax on vessels passing through the Gut of Canso, presented to the House the report of the said Committee; which report being again read at the Clerk's table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth:—

Your Committee to whom was referred, in the last Session of the Legislature, the petition of W. W. Lord and others, Merchants and Ship-owners of this Island, complaining of an oppressive tax being exacted from their ships while passing through the Straits of Canso, on their passage to the Atlantic, whether anchoring there, or merely passing through—having given the petition and several matters therein referred to, their careful and attentive consideration, have to report,—

As regards the right of the Government of Nova Scotia to levy a rate or tax upon vessels of this Island passing through the Gut of Canso, your Committee have no doubt upon that point. It is clear that it cannot refuse a passage to such vessels, because the Straits in question serve for a communication between two seas; its navigation, by the established law of Nations, is common to all Nations; but as the Government of Nova Scotia defrays the expense attendant on the support of Light-houses, &c., it has, in the opinion of your Committee, a right to levy a moderate tax upon vessels which do pass through. Thus the King of Denmark requires, or did formerly—until a commutation was effected with foreign Nations—a custom or rate on Vessels at the Strait of the Sound.

Upon reference to the Revised Statutes of Nova Scotia, Cap. 21, your Committee find that new vessels leaving that Province, on their first voyage, and intended for sale, are exempted from duty unless they return again, and new vessels cleared on their first voyage after the first day of September, are exempted from further payment of duty until the first day of April following.

New vessels belonging to this Island, and built for sale, upon their passage through said Straits, are subject to an exorbitant tax of six pence, Nova Scotia currency, per ton, which, being looked upon by Merchants engaged in building ships for sale, as a partial and excessive tax, is evaded by all new vessels with crews strong enough to resist payment, and by others having the advantage of a strong and fair wind on their passage through.

Your Committee submit that the proper way of settling this vexed question would be for the Government of this Island to open a correspondence with the Government of Nova Scotia, with a view of commuting, by the payment of

a specific sum, annually, to that Government, as is already the case with respect to St. Paul's and Scattarie Lights, for the free passage of all vessels belonging to this Island, through said Straits, whether they have occasion to anchor therein or not, and report to this House in its next Session, the result of such negotiation.

Your Committee further submit that in the event of such an arrangement being made with the Government of Nova Scotia, all vessels clearing from any Port in this Island, to any Port to the eastward of the Straits of Canso, shall be subject to a charge for Canso light dues—such charge to be fixed by this House, and to be sufficient to defray the annual payment to be made to the Government of Nova Scotia.

Ordered, That a Committee be appointed to prepare an Address to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, requesting that His Excellency will be pleased to correspond with the Government of Nova Scotia, with a view to the attainment of the object recommended in the foregoing report.

Ordered, That the same Committee who prepared the report be a Committee to prepare the said Address to His Excellency.

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, by Henry Palmer, Esquire, Usher of the Black Rod:

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor commands the immediate attendance of this Honorable House, at the Bar of the Council Chamber.

Accordingly, Mr. Speaker and the House went up to attend His Excellency in the Council Chamber;

And being returned—

Mr. Speaker reported that when the House did attend His Excellency this day in the Council Chamber, His Excellency was pleased to give his assent to the Bill intituled

“An Act to amend the Act to provide for the organization of a Volunteer Force for the defence of this Island.”

A petition of divers inhabitants of Townships Nos. 30, 31 and 67, was presented to the House by the Hon. Mr. Longworth, and the same was received and read, praying for a grant requisite to complete the wharf at Macphee's point, West River.

Mr. Longworth, and the same was received and read, praying for payment of £12 7s. 6d., for her services as such, for a quarter ending 16th September, 1861—her salary having been withheld from her in consequence of a deficiency in the number of pupils required by the Act so far as relates to female schools in Charlottetown.

Ordered, That the said petition be referred to the Special Committee appointed to report on every petition relating to Schools and Education, to examine the same and report thereon.

The order of the day for taking into consideration the several petitions before the House, being read,

The House proceeded accordingly to take the same into consideration.

The petition of divers inhabitants of Township No. 66 and others, praying for a grant to

repair Brothers' road, was taken up and again read; and thereupon

Ordered, That the said petition be referred to the Members for the District, for consideration in the subdivision of the moneys appropriated for the service of roads, bridges and wharfs.

The residue of the petitions praying aid for the service of roads, bridges and wharfs were then severally taken up and again read; and thereupon

The petition of divers inhabitants of Cascumpec and its vicinity, praying that the section of the Acts relating to the recovery of Small Debts, restricting the imprisonment of debtors to sums of Ten Pounds may be repealed, was taken up and again read; and thereupon

Resolved, That the House do now resolve itself into a Committee of the whole House, to take into consideration the prayer of the said petition.

Ordered, That the several petitions on the table, praying for a similar object, be all referred to the said Committee.

And then the House resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. Conroy took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair;

And the Chairman reported that the Committee had made some progress, and had directed him to move for leave to sit again,—which the House agreed to,

Ordered, That the two preceding petitions be referred to the Committee of the whole House, on the consideration of the several petitions presented to the House, this Session, praying for the amendment or repeal of portions of the Act relating to the recovery of Small Debts, and to repeal certain Acts therein mentioned.

Resolved, That the House do now resolve itself into a Committee of the whole House, to take into consideration the several petitions presented to the House this Session, praying for an amendment of the Act relating to the recovery of Small Debts, and to repeal certain Acts therein mentioned.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. Conroy took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair;

And Mr. Conroy reported that the Committee had gone into the consideration of the petitions to them referred, and had come to three Resolutions thereon, which he was directed to report to the House.

The Hon. Mr. *Pope* moved that the report be referred back to the Committee of the whole House, for the purpose of amending the same, by adding thereto the following :—

Resolved, That the latter part of the Seventh clause of the said Act—which provides that where the accounts or dealings between parties shall exceed Twenty Pounds, no jurisdiction therein shall be allowed to said Courts, unless a settlement shall have taken place and a balance not exceeding Twenty Pounds, be signed by the party charged therewith—be amended.

Your Committee to whom were referred the several petitions praying for the opening of new lines of Roads have to report :—That your Committee recommend that inquisitions be held under the Act 14th Vic., Cap. 1, in consequence of the prayer of the following petitions, viz :—

1. The petition of certain inhabitants of Kildare, Lot 3, praying for the opening of a new line of road from the shore road to the Macneill road—the right of way being all given up by the parties through whose lands said intended road will pass, except two, namely, William Gillis and Ebenezer Beairs's.

2. The petition of certain inhabitants of Lots 36 and 37, north side of the Hillsborough, praying for the use of a road opened by Alexander Hayden through his own farm, for his own use, to the intended site of a wharf, for the erection of which a sum of money was voted last Session.

3. The petition of the inhabitants of Nail Pond, Lot 1, praying for the opening of a new road from Nail Pond to Sea Cow Pond,—one-half of said right of way is given up to the Road Commissioner, for the public, by the parties through whose lands the said intended road will pass ; but the other half, a distance of about sixty chains on the line between the

3. The petition of inhabitants of Johnston's road settlement, praying for the opening of a road through the farms of Mrs. Emily Campbell, James Macleod and Angus Campbell.

4. The petition of certain inhabitants of Lots 59 and 61, praying for the opening of a road from the St. Mary's road, Lot 61, to the Widow Ross's, cross roads, Whim road, Lot 59.

5. The petition of certain inhabitants of Lots 34 and 35, praying for the opening of a road from Mill Cove road to Black river.

6. The petition of Henry Fisher and others, praying for the opening of a road across the farms of Mrs. Mackenna and a part of Mrs. Stewart's farm.

10. Your Committee recommend the following petitions be referred to the Members for the several Districts, viz :—

The petition of John Roberts and others, Lot 63, praying for the opening of a road from Greek river to Peter's road, and also a line of road at the head of the Creek.

The petition of inhabitants of the Big Marsh settlement, Lot 42, praying for the opening of a road from the North shore to Georgetown, through the Big Marsh settlement, Lot 42, and Groshaut settlement, Lot. 56, by Dingwell's mills.

The petition of inhabitants of the Linkletter road settlement, Lot 17, praying for a sum to assist in completing said road.

The petition of the inhabitants of Melville road, Desable, for opening a new road from the Melville road to the road leading to Sandy Point road.

11. Your Committee again recommend, as done by previous Committees, that in future, all petitions praying for the opening of new lines of roads, ought to be accompanied by a certificate of recommendation from the Road Commissioners, and also a sketch or plan of the contemplated road.

12. Your Committee submit that the Government direct their recommendations to be published in the *Royal Gazette* for the information of the public.

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to prepare an Address to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying that His Excellency will be pleased to cause the recommendations contained in the foregoing report to be carried into effect.

Ordered, That the same Committee who prepared the report, be a Committee to prepare the said Address to His Excellency.

The Hon. Mr. *Longworth*, from the Special Committee appointed to report on every private Bill, and to whom was referred the Bill to incorporate Victoria Lodge, No. 383, R. S. of Free and accepted Masons, of Charlottetown, in Prince Edward Island, to examine the same and report thereon, presented to the House a report of the said Committee, which report being again read at the Clerk's table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth:—

Your Committee appointed to examine and report on private Bills, having under their consideration the Bill to incorporate Victoria Lodge, No. 383, R. S. of Free and accepted Masons, of Charlottetown, in Prince Edward Island, submit that the Bill is of a private nature; but, inasmuch as the fees upon Bills for the incorporation of Societies or Companies formed for the promotion of moral or charitable objects, have not, heretofore, been uniformly exacted by the House, they recommend that this Bill be exempt from said fees.

Jenkins, Health Officer, dated "Charlottetown, 17th March, 1862," on the cases of two patients, inmates of the City Hospital, enclosing a bill of articles of clothing procured for one of them; and also stating the situation of the present hospital to be inappropriate for the treatment of patients laboring under infectious diseases; and further remarking on the absence of means for carrying out proper quarantine regulations, if such exist, and the necessity of adopting measures for compulsory vaccination.

Mr. *Macneill* took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair;

The petition of the inhabitants of Dromore Settlement, Township No. 37, setting forth their grievances in consequence of their not being able to get their school registered. Your Committee having carefully inquired into the matter, find that the Board of Education directed J. W. Alleyne, Esquire, J.P., to lay off the District according to law, which was done as appears by Mr. Alleyne's letter (as annexed.) The Board of Education sanctioned the establishment of the School District; but, after such approval of the Board of Education, the petitioners were notified by the Government that there were no funds at its disposal for new schools; and therefore the petitioners are as yet without the great advantages which other portions of the Colony enjoy under the Education Act. (Copies of the sanction of the Board of Education and the information from the Government are also hereunto annexed.) Your Committee, after full consideration, recommend the prayer of the petition for the establishment of this School District.

Your Committee would recommend that, in future, no petition praying for an allowance to unlicensed teachers be entertained by the House unless it shall clearly appear that the inhabitants petitioning could not obtain a teacher qualified according to law; and every such unlicensed teacher shall, within twenty days, notify his engagement, and furnish a copy of his agreement with the inhabitants, to the Board of Education, or unless recommended by the Board of Education; and that the Government cause the same to be published in the Royal Gazette for the information of the public generally.

E. W. Alleyne, Esquire, J. P., to lay off the District according to law, which was done, as appears by Mr. Alleyne's letter, as annexed. The Board of Education sanctioned the establishment of the School District; but after such approval of the Board of Education, the petitioners were notified by the Government, that there were no funds at its disposal for new Schools; and therefore the petitioners are, as yet, without the great advantages which other portions of the Colony enjoy under the Education Act. (Copies of the sanction of the Board of Education and the information from the Government are also hereunto annexed.) Your Committee after full consideration, recommend the prayer of the petition for the establishment of this School District."

The House respectfully request that Your Excellency will be pleased to cause the recommendation contained in the foregoing extract of the Report, to be carried into effect, viz:—the establishment of a District School in the said Settlement of Dromore, Lot 37.

Ordered, That the said Address be engrossed.

Ordered, That the same Committee who prepared the Address, be a Committee to wait on His Excellency with the same.

On motion of the Hon. Mr. Perry,

Ordered, That the Committee appointed to report on the report and accounts of T. Stewart, Esquire, Indian Commissioner, and other references, be discharged.

A Message from the Council by Mr. Cooper;

Mr. Speaker;

The Legislative Council do agree to a further conference, as is desired by the House of Assembly, on the subject matter of the Bill intitled "An Act to consolidate and amend the Laws relating to Statute Labor, and the expenditure of public moneys on the Highways," and have appointed the same Committee who managed the former Conference thereon, a Committee to manage this further Conference, to meet in the Conference Room instanter.

And then he withdrew.

And the names of the managers being called over, they went to the Conference.

And being returned—

The Hon. Mr. Longworth reported that the Committee had been at the Conference, and complied with the instructions given them by this House.

2. RESOLVED further, That in the event of the Imperial French Government acceding to the prayer of the Address, this Legislature hereby pledges itself to reciprocate with the French Government, to the same extent as Canada has done.

And the first of the said reported Resolutions being again read, and the question put thereon, it was agreed to by the House.

The second of the said Resolutions being again read,

Mr. Speaker ;

The Legislative Council have passed the Bill intituled as follows, viz : “ An Act to repeal the Act made and passed in the Twenty-fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, Chapter Nine, and to further amend the Act for the transfer of the Inland Posts, within Prime Edward Island,” without any amendment.

Same folio, line 14,—After “ Councillors,” insert the following Sections :—

SECTION A.

“ Every Scrutiny to be demanded by any any Candidate or his agent, at any Election or Sheriff’s Court, held by virtue of this Act, for the purpose of ascertaining the validity of objected votes, shall be conducted before one of the Judges of the Supreme Court of Judicature ; and so much of the hereinbefore recited Act of Assembly as requires such Scrutinies to be conducted before the Sheriff of the County, shall not apply to any Scrutiny to be held in respect of any election authorized by virtue of this Act.

SECTION B.

If, previous to the final declaring of any election held by virtue of this Act, a Candidate or his agent shall publicly demand a scrutiny for the purpose aforesaid, and, along with two sufficient householders, shall thereupon sign an undertaking in the form to this Act annexed, marked Schedule A., engaging

to become bound to pay the expenses to be incurred in convening the Court for such scrutiny, the Sheriff, without declaring or proclaiming the candidate or candidates against whom the objected votes intended to be scrutinized are entered as duly elected, shall immediately give notice that on that day week next ensuing, a scrutiny will be held by a Judge of the Supreme Court of Judicature, at a central and convenient place and hour in the District, or Town, Common and Royalty, to be then named by the said Sheriff; and he shall, immediately thereafter, or with the least delay that the circumstances of the case will admit of, cause to be delivered to the Lieutenant Governor a letter under his hand informing him of the said scrutiny demanded as aforesaid, and of the time and place appointed for holding the same, and immediately on receipt of which letter the said Lieutenant Governor shall issue directions to a Judge of the said Supreme Court to proceed and conduct such Scrutiny.

SECTION C.

If the aforesaid candidate or candidates, or his or their agent or sureties, shall neglect or fail duly to sign the said undertaking, and there shall be no objections made and intended to be investigated with regard to votes polled in the wrong district or polling division, or votes polled more than once, then the said Sheriff shall proclaim the candidates having the majority of votes as duly elected members, and make return accordingly.

SECTION D.

If, from the circumstance of two or more scrutines being appointed to take place at or near about the same time, or from any other unavoidable cause, it may become impossible to proceed with a scrutiny on the day for that purpose first appointed by the said Sheriff, then it shall be the duty of the said Judge to postpone any one or more of such intended scrutines to some other convenient day and hour, as early thereafter as the circumstances of the case or cases will admit of; and the

said Sheriff being informed thereof, shall immediately post notices of such postponement, and on the day and hour first intended and appointed for the holding of said scrutiny, publicly declare such postponement to all parties then present.

SECTION E.

The Judge so to preside at every such scrutiny is hereby authorized to conduct every such scrutiny according to the meaning and intention of the said recited Act of Assembly and of this Act; and for such purpose is hereby invested with the same power and authority, in all matters connected with or necessary to the conducting of said scrutiny, as he might or could use if for the time being he were presiding in the Supreme Court of Judicature, and the said scrutiny were conducted therein.

SECTION F.

The presiding Judge shall appoint a Clerk and such other officer or officers for the conducting of the proceedings of the said Court and maintaining order therein as he shall in his discretion deem proper, and shall continue the said Court from day to day, or from one day over until any other day, so long and as often as by him shall be deemed necessary to finally complete such scrutiny or scrutines, as aforesaid.

SECTION G.

Subpœnas for witnesses to be offered on any such scrutiny, as aforesaid, shall be issued by the said Sheriff; and every person subpoenaed to attend any such scrutiny, and whose expenses shall have been first duly tendered to him, and shall afterwards neglect to attend thereon, shall be liable and subject to such punishment therefor as witnesses in like cases are now liable to when subpoenaed to the Supreme Court of Judicature.

SECTION H.

The decision of the said Judge, upon every such scrutiny, shall be final and binding on

all parties as to the validity or sufficiency, invalidity or insufficiency of all votes scrutinized at his Court; and no further scrutiny of any such votes shall be permitted by the said Council or otherwise.

SECTION I.

In all cases where any such scrutiny shall have been conducted, or where a Court for the same shall have been convened by any such Judge as aforesaid, and the candidate or candidates on whose behalf such Court shall have been convened shall decline further to proceed therein, the said Sheriff shall proceed to proclaim at such Court, after striking off all votes adjudged at such Court to be bad, the candidates having the majority of votes as duly elected members, and make return accordingly.

SECTION J.

The expenses of every Court convened for a scrutiny as aforesaid, and the expenses for summoning and remunerating all witnesses, shall be laid before and be examined by the said Council, and shall be apportioned against the candidates, or otherwise defrayed as the said Council shall order; and every person having a right to any such apportioned expenses, shall and may maintain an action for his or their portion thereof, against the party or parties ordered to pay the same; and the said order of the said Council shall be evidence of the amount thereof.

SECTION K.

Every Judge engaged in any scrutiny, as aforesaid, shall be paid the sum of per mile, for each mile travelled in going to the place of scrutiny, and the sum of shillings per day, for each day engaged thereat, for disbursements.

SECTION L.

The thirty-fourth section of the hereinbefore recited Act, of the Nineteenth year of Her present Majesty's Reign, Chapter Twenty-one, shall be and the same is hereby repealed.

Your Committee to whom were referred the petitions of Thomas Hickey and James Hickey, of Lot 39, praying payment of a balance of £16 2s. 11d., claimed by Thomas Hickey for surveys said to have been done by him on the Worrell Estate, from 1855 to 1859, and Two Pounds alleged to be due to James Hickey for work performed as chain-bearer on the said Estate, in the years 1856, 1857 and 1858,—have to report—

That Your Committee are not in possession of sufficient information, at present, to warrant them in recommending the payment of the amounts respectively claimed by the petitioners.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

The total receipts for and on account of Public Lands for the past year, amount to £4753 10s. 7½d., and for Crown Lands to £255 19s. 8d. The expenditure for the same period, including estimated loss of Land Tax and interest, is £3001 2s. 5d. Total Receipts over disbursements, £2008 7s. 10½d.

Your Committee have to report favorably of the Selkirk Estate, and Township No. 54. the receipts from the former amounting to £1845 9s. 10d., and the expenditure, including estimated loss of Land Tax, and interest and cost of opening 12 miles of road, £676 6s., shewing a surplus of £1169 3s. 10d. The receipts from Lot 54 amount to £763 9s. 8d., and the expenditure, including loss of Land Tax, to £292 2s. 8d., leaving a surplus of £471 7s.

The Worrell Estate and Lot 11 could not be expected to shew so favourable a result, having been purchased at higher rates. The receipts from these Estates amount to £2027 18s. 3d., and the expenditure, including cost of opening 8 miles of new road, and the estimated loss of Land Tax and interest to £1558 13s. 9d., leaving a surplus of £469 4s. 6d.

2178 acres of Land have been sold during the past year on the Worrell estate and Lot 11; 13,656 acres on the Sel-

kirk Estate; and 9100 acres on Lot 54, at an average price of 7s. 6d. per acre, for the two first named Estates, and at 8s. 7d. per acre for Township No. 54-

The balances due on lands sold, and on bonds on the Worrell Estate and Lot 11, amount to £15,692 12s.; on the Selkirk Estate to £14,285 19s. 3d.; on Lot 54 to £2944 17s. 6d. Total amount of balances due, £32,923 8s. 9d. 31,060½ acres remain unsold on the Worrell Estate and Lot 11; 12,826 acres on the Selkirk Estate; and 3900 acres on Lot 54.

The balances due on the Public Lands, added to 47,786½ acres of land unsold, and estimated at 5s. per acre, together amount to £44,870 2s. 6d.

Your Committee remark that the Despatch from the Governor General of Canada, relative to reciprocal free trade with the British North American Provinces, would, if practicable, tend to a closer union and intercourse, especially between this Island and Canada, from which latter country a large amount of manufactured goods would be imported, instead of, as at present, the money of this Colony going to a foreign power.

"RESOLVED, That a Committee be appointed to join a Committee of the House of Assembly to prepare an Address to Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen, praying that Her Majesty's Government will be pleased to communicate with the Government of His Imperial Majesty the Emperor of the French, by conveying the earnest desire of this Legislature that the like privileges which have been recently extended by the Government of His Imperial Majesty to Canadian-built ships in French ports, and other articles, the growth and production of that Province, may also be extended to this Island.

"Ordered, That Mr. Palmer and Mr. Anderson be a Committee on the part of this House to prepare the said Address to Her Majesty.

"Ordered, That the said Resolution be communicated, by message to the House of Assembly."

Also, Mr. Speaker ;

The Legislative Council have passed the Bill intituled "An Act for vesting all estates and property occupied by or for the Naval Service of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, in the Lord High Admiral, or the Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral, of the said United Kingdom for the time being," without any amendment.

The Legislative Council have passed the Bill intituled "An Act relating to Electric Telegraph communication with this Island,"—with an amendment, to which they desire the concurrence of the House of Assembly.

Mr. *Davies* from the Committee to whom was referred the petition of Samuel W. Mitchell, late keeper of the Lunatic Asylum, to examine the same and report thereon, presented to the House the report of the said Committee; which report being again read at the Clerk's table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth:—

Your Committee to whom was referred the petition of Mr. Samuel W. Mitchell, late Keeper of the Lunatic Asylum, setting forth that he has a claim against the Government for £43 19s. 10½d., for improvements made in and about the Lunatic Asylum for the last fifteen years and six months, and praying payment thereof,—have to report, that a Committee of the Trustees of the Asylum appointed to examine and report on the petitioner's accounts, from the 1st of February to 31st August, 1861, deem his accounts unsatisfactory, inasmuch as the highest prices were charged for everything purchased by him; that the quantities appeared excessive; and that large items charged, were not substantiated by vouchers, &c., &c. The committee, however, recommend that the balance claimed by the petitioner, amounting to Seventy-five Pounds, should be paid, provided it was received in full of all claims against the Institution, including improvements.

Theophilus Desbrisay, Esquire, one of the Trustees, stated that petitioner agreed to receive Seventy-five Pounds in full of all demands, and that Warrants for that amount were issued, and a discharge prepared by the Attorney General; such discharge and Warrants were lodged with the Clerk of the Executive Council, with instructions to hand the Warrants over to him upon signing the discharge. The Assistant Clerk of the Council handed said Warrants over to the petitioner without procuring his signature to the discharge,—he not being aware of the conditions on which the Warrants were to be given to him. The petitioner denies that he agreed to receive the sum of Seventy-five Pounds, in full of all demands.

As the Trustees of the Asylum have stopped payment of the Warrants at the Treasury, your Committee submit that the account is still in an unsettled state, and are of opinion that it might be settled by reference, or otherwise. They cannot recommend the House to entertain the prayer of the petition, at present.

The Bill to promote vaccination, was read a second time:

MOST GRACIOUS SOVEREIGN;

We Your Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Legislative Council and House of Assembly of Prince Edward Island, in General Assembly convened, most humbly submit for Your Majesty's gracious consideration—that the Imperial Government of France having recently extended to "Canadian-built ships" the same privileges in French ports which are enjoyed by "ships of British build," as well as advantages in respect of other articles, the growth and production of Canada,—are desirous that the same privileges may be extended to this Colony. The Legislative Council and Assembly most humbly pray that Your Majesty may be pleased to take the foregoing premises into consideration, with a view of obtaining from the Imperial Government of France, for this Island, the same privileges as that Government has extended to Canada.

And we humbly pray that Your Majesty will, at the same time assure Your Majesty's august ally, the Emperor of the

French, that the Government of this Island will be prepared to adopt such measures as may be necessary to extend the principles of reciprocity to the French Nation, in relation to other articles, the growth and production of this Island, in terms similar to those which regulate the commercial intercourse between France and Canada.

Ordered, That the said Address be engrossed.

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to join a Committee of the Council to prepare an Address to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying that His Excellency will be pleased to transmit the foregoing Address to Her Majesty.

Ordered, That the same Committee who prepared the Address to Her Majesty be a Committee to prepare the said Address to His Excellency.

Ordered, That the said Resolution be communicated by message to the Council.

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. Longworth do carry the said message.

Then the House adjourned for one hour;

And being met—

A motion being made that the engrossed Bill intituled "An Act to facilitate the operation in certain particulars, of the Award or Report made by certain Commissioners, to settle and adjust differences respecting some of the Township lands in this Colony," be now read the third time.

Mr. Speaker ;

The Legislative Council have passed the Bills intituled as follows, viz :—

"An Act to give effect to the Report of the Commissioners on the Land Question."

"An Act to facilitate the operation, in certain particulars, of the Award or Report made by certain Commissioners to settle and adjust differences respecting some of the Township Lands in this Island."

"An Act for raising a Revenue."

And then he withdrew.

The Hon. Mr. *Haviland* from the Committee appointed to draw up reasons to be offered to the Council, at a Conference, for disagreeing to certain of their amendments to the Bill intituled "An Act to change the constitution of the Legislative Council, by rendering the same Elective," reported to the House the following reasons :—

First :—Because it would be impolitic to authorize the Lieutenant Governor to suspend putting the Act in force for any period of time after it receives the Royal allowance.

Secondly :—Because it would be unconstitutional after the liberties of the people are established by the Elective Council Bill being assented to by Her Majesty, to allow the Council, as at present constituted, to meet or exercise any further legislative functions.

Thirdly :—Because constituting the Judges of the Supreme Court, Judges in cases of controverted Elections, would tend to lower the respect due to their office, in public estimation, by mixing them up in political struggles.

Fourthly :—Because it would be interfering with the privileges of Parliament to permit the decisions of the Judges of the Supreme Court, in cases of controverted elections, to be final and conclusive.

Ordered, That the report of the Committee be adopted.

Resolved, That a Conference be desired with the Council on the subject matter of their amendments to the said Bill, and that upon such Conference, the managers on the part of this House, do communicate to the Committee of the Council the above reasons for disagreeing to certain of their amendments.

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. *Haviland*, Hon. Mr. *Longworth*, Hon. Mr. *Gray* and Hon. Mr. *Hensley* be a Committee to manage the said Conference.

A Message from the Council by Mr. Cooper :

Ordered, That the same Committee who prepared the Address, be a Committee to wait on His Excellency with the same.

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. *Hensley* be appointed a member of the Committee appointed to wait on His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor with the Address, pursuant to the report of the Special Committee appointed to report on new lines of Roads, in lieu of the Hon. On behalf of Her Majesty's faithful Commons of Prince Edward Island, I have now to present the following Bills of Aid and Supply voted to Her Majesty during the present Session, to which I have humbly to request your Excellency's assent, viz:—

An Act to promote Vaccination.

An Act to alter and amend the Act relating to the recovery of Small Debts.

An Act to further alter and amend the Laws regulating the sale by License, of Spirituous Liquors.

An Act to consolidate and amend the Laws relating to Statute Labor, and the Expenditure of Public Moneys on the Highways.

An Act for raising a Revenue.

An Act for appropriating certain moneys therein mentioned for the service of the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-two.

To each of which His Excellency was pleased in Her Majesty's name to give his assent,

And then His Excellency was pleased to make the following Speech to both Houses:—

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council;

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

I have forwarded your Address of Condolence with Her Majesty on the Death of His Royal Highness the Prince Consort, to be laid at the foot of the Throne. In it, you have offered to your Sovereign the assurance of your heartfelt sympathy in Her sorrow, and of your estimation of the noble character of the Prince whose Death we so deeply lament.

During the Session, now brought to a close, you have bestowed a patient and careful attention on many measures both of general and of local interest.

A copy of the Report of the Land Commissioners has been forwarded to me by Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies, and has been laid before you. The two Acts passed by you, the one to confirm their Award, and the other to facilitate its operation, shall be duly transmitted for Her Majesty's confirmation.

You have adopted, with promptitude, the suggestions offered by the Colonial Minister on the subject of the Act which you passed last Session, to change the Constitution of the Legislative Council. I trust that the Act to which I have just given my assent, may be the means of establishing a popular and effective Upper Chamber.

I thank you for the grant which you have placed at my disposal, for the maintenance of the Volunteer Force. I observe with great satisfaction, a considerable increase in the strength of this Force, and its rapid progress in discipline and efficiency. It is my earnest desire to foster the spirit of self-reliance and patriotism which characterizes it.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

I thank you for the Supplies which you have granted for the Public Service.

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council;

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

I now release you from your Legislative duties, confident that you will continue to exert the influence which your

position gives you, to secure the prosperity and welfare of the people of this Island.

After which the Hon. the President of the Legislative Council said :

Gentlemen ;

It is the will and pleasure of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor that this General Assembly be prorogued until Tuesday the Twenty-seventh day of May next, and this General Assembly is accordingly prorogued until Tuesday the Twenty-seventh day of May next, to be here then holden.

Abstract of the Census of the Population, and other Statistical Returns of Prince Edward Island, taken in the year 1861.

To His Excellency GEORGE DUNDAS, Esquire, Lieutenant Governor of Prince Edward Island, &c., &c.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY;—

After a final and careful revision of the Census Returns of Prince Edward Island, taken in the summer of the present year, I have the honor now to transmit, for the information of your Excellency in Council, the results, as compiled in the accompanying Abstract in tabular form. Some interesting statistics never before collected in this Island are given in these tables.

The total population (including 350 Indians of the Micmac Tribe) is 80,857, being an increase of 9361 since the last Census in the year 1855, or 13 per cent. in six years. The males are in excess of females by 903.

The population of the City and Royalty of Charlottetown is 6706, shewing an increase in six years of 193 only, or scarcely 3 per cent.

The First Electoral District of Prince County gives the highest rate of increase, while in Townships Nineteen, Thirty-four and Forty-nine the population has apparently slightly diminished. The Indians number four less than in 1855. The number married on the Island during the past year was 586. The births have been 2320, and the deaths 938 in the same period. The number of children within the educational age—5 to 16—is 22,876. The number capable of bearing arms—16 to 60—is 19,800. Deaf and Dumb, 68. Blind, 43. Insane, 148. Not vaccinated, 37,386. Churches, 156; increase in these, 29. School-houses, 302; increase, 50.

The foregoing embraces but a few of the principal items of information. Under the heads of land tenures, products, manufactures, &c.,

will be found returns of more or less value. At the end is a summary of "general remarks," by certain of the enumerators; these, in most instances, possess only a local interest, treating, for the most part, of the state of the roads and bridges, water communication, and the facilities for reaching markets. The remarks made, descriptive of Lot 54—a portion of the public lands, as yet but partially settled,—are an exception to the general style and tenor of these "remarks," and will be found interesting to the immigrant or intending settler. For all other details, I beg to refer you to the annexed columns, completing the summary of Statistics which it was the object of the Legislature and the Government to obtain.

Nor is the interest in the information herein furnished confined alone to our selves as Colonists. Such information becomes national property, as a contribution—to the general fund—of a British Province, comparatively limited in extent, yet possessing elements of undeveloped wealth, material and moral, calculated—if duly fostered—to produce great results. In these figures, our Island adds *its* quota to swell the vast and accumulating mass of Statistics now in-gathering, under imperial auspices, from the remotest regions—Statistics which will be viewed as a monumental record—valuable, because authentic—of the might and resources of that extended Empire, in whose unity and prosperity we all feel a deep and an abiding interest.

ABSTRACT OF GENERAL REMARKS

APPENDED BY THE ENUMERATORS TO THE FOREGOING RETURNS.

LOT OR TOWNSHIP No. 1.

THE Cunard Estate on this Lot is a light soil, but when well cultivated, very productive in moist seasons. Palmers' part of this Township is a heavy clay bottom, good for grass and very productive; and a fishing sea board not surpassed in the Gulf. The great drawbacks on the trade of this Lot are—the want of a harbor—of a Lighthouse on North Cape—and the operation of the Alewives' Act, which Act prevents the fishermen from getting their bait, and benefits those only who have the ownership of ponds. The Alewives have regularly decreased since the Act was put in force. The markets most resorted to by the inhabitants are Tignish, Nail Pond and Seacow Pond. The roads are generally good; the bridges decidedly bad. The trade of this Township will not now appear, as the exports are represented at Cascumpec, as we have no Custom-house. Fish represented as exported from Cascumpec were cured at Township One, and cleared only from the former Custom-House.

LOT 2.

The land on Lot Two is poor, being mostly second and third quality. The roads on the East side of the Lot are good, but on the West side, bad. The markets mostly resorted to by the inhabitants of this Township are Cascumpec and Tignish,—Cascumpec being about ten miles distant; but the people are so poor that they have scarcely any surplus produce to take to market. The want of a harbor is very much felt by the inhabitants on this Township.

LOT 3.

The land on Lot Three is in general good; at the West end (Miminigash) the land is very good; but the people complain of the roads, for which I think they have good reason; they are almost impassable for a carriage at present.

The people of Miminigash are very anxious to have a road opened through the centre line of Lot Three, which would be very little more than half the distance to Cascumpec, which is the general market place. On the East end of the Lot the roads are pretty good. Both ends of the Lot possess water communications; and the Kildare River, which is navigable for small boats only, runs up into the middle of it. The mouth of the river is filled up by a muscle bed, the clearing out thereof, to permit small vessels to ascend, would be a great benefit to the inhabitants.

LOT 4.

The whole of this Township may be classed as second quality land, there being only a few small spots of first quality; there are about 1000 acres of barrens, and a small portion of swamp.

It being impossible in the space allowed in the columns to describe properly the tenures of lands in and about the Cascumpec Cross Roads, owing to the difference of size of lots; the front lots of one acre each being let for the sum of ten shillings sterling for the first ten years, and twenty shillings sterling for the residue of the term of 999 years; these lots are designated in the margin by †.

The thirteen acre lots are let for the term of 999 years, at ten shillings sterling for the first ten years, and sixty shillings sterling for the residue of the term, and marked in the margin O. There is one farm of 100 acres at 1s. British sterling per acre, designated *. Also a Mill site on the West shore at £5 for the first ten years; five years £10; next five years £15; and the residue of the term of 999 years £20. The whole of the rent on this Township (4) is sterling, except two farms.

It has also been impossible to give the exact dates at which full rent commences on several of the farms, in many cases owing to the farms changing occupiers,—the leases being held by

other parties as security ; there are also many persons who have not yet taken their leases.

The potato crop last year was a failure, compared with that of the previous year. Clover seed has also been a failure ; on account of the scarcity of hay, very little was saved,—last summer being very dry. With regard to the quantity of butter made, not one farmer knew the quantity consumed by his family, and could only give account of the sales ; the same remark will apply to the quantity of cheese made.

The road from the Western road to Campbellton, from the head of the New Langholm or Dock Settlement, which was formerly opened by the Proprietor, is now almost impassable, even for a person on foot ; having walked through that way to the back settlers, I can testify to this from actual experience. The Lot 7 Road by Campbell's Cross is in a bad state for wheeled carriages, being much cut up by frost, &c., &c. The road from Campbellton to the head of Dock Settlement would be a great convenience to the inhabitants of the West shore, including the rear of Lots 3, 4, 5, 7 and 8, as a short road to Cascumpec Harbor would consequently open a port to them for either sale or shipment ; at present they have to run the risk of shipping in the open straits with scows, &c., or take their produce, fish, &c., in open boats to Richibucto, N. B., which they barter for other necessaries.

LOT 7.

The land on this Township is, in general of the best quality ; there are about 500 acres, perhaps of what is called "barrens" on the whole Township ; but it is useful for pasture. The main road through this Township is good, but some bridges are falling fast into decay, although several sums of money have been laid out on them ; but the most important parts have not been replaced. Our markets are inconvenient, as we have no harbor, but an iron bound shore, which makes the shipping of produce always a risk, and very much lessens the value of our produce ; while oats were selling at harbors for 2s. 3d. to 2s. 6d. per bushel through the winter, the highest price we could get was 2s. per bushel. Richibucto is our nearest market, but it is always attended with risk

and expense, as the inhabitants generally go in small boats, and not unfrequently lose much time, notwithstanding I think it is the market most resorted to. Richibucto is about twenty-four miles distant from Cape Wolfe.

RICHARD LIDSTONE.

LOT 8.

Land Assessment is paid at present for about ten thousand acres of land on Lot Eight. Of this quantity, which is of the best or first quality, in general, there are but 2253 acres of arable land,—a small amount, when we consider that the inhabitants have been residents for ten to thirty years on it ; the reason of this is, that we have no harbor or safe place of landing, the nearest harbor being Cascumpec or Summerside, a distance of thirty to forty-five miles. The roads also are very inferior ; so much so, that the profits accruing from surplus produce taken to market is lost in the time spent and expense incurred in transportation. The markets to which the people of this lot resort are Cascumpec and Summerside ; and in the neighbouring Province, Shediac, Richibucto and Miramichi. A resort to these markets takes away, of course, the business that might be done among ourselves, stops the circulation of money, and of necessity makes us a poor people ; such, for example, is our state and condition, that when a merchant brings goods to sell, the common prices are as follows : when tea is selling at any of the above markets at 2s. 3d. to 2s. 9d., it is here 5s. per lb. ; when molasses is at 1s. 6d. to 2s., it is sold here at 4s. to 5s. per gallon ; cottons, prints, and other household things, all in the same proportion ; and on the other hand, when the above markets are giving high prices for grain, this advantage is here seldom to be obtained, for want of road and water communication.

The people of this and the adjoining Lots petitioned the Legislature for a grant to build a wharf at the West Point ; should it be built there, it would be a direct benefit not only to Lot 8, but to other Lots, such as Lots 4, 6, 7, 8, 9, and 10.

A steamer calling at Cascumpec is no direct benefit to the people of these Lots ; but were a wharf built here, it would be a direct benefit not only to the above Lots, but to Cascumpec. There are but three Schools on this Township,

—two of them but seldom in operation, teachers being disinclined to come to the place.

ROBERT MACDONALD.

LOT 9.

The quality of land in general on this Township is very bad. I would safely say that there are not, according to my knowledge, more than about 4000 acres of good land—that is, of first quality—on Lot 9 altogether, and a large quantity of it is nothing but barrens.

Secondly, with regard to advantages: the only advantage here is, that it is a good place for herring fishing in the spring; but there are many disadvantages on account of roads. There is no market within seventeen miles—at Cascumpec Cross Roads,—and then, I believe, but once a year, in October, when a man can scarcely travel these bad roads. Thirdly, there is no Post Office nearer than Mr James Kinlay's, Lot 7,—a distance of about eighteen miles from Lot 9, where letters may sometimes remain for four or five months, and perhaps be returned. I witnessed a case of this kind not many days since.

Lot 10.—No remarks.

LOT 11.

The quality of land on this Township is, in some parts very good, and in other parts very bad. A considerable quantity of it is not fit for cultivation; I think nearly half of the Township is bad land. With regard to its road communications, they are very good; when a bridge—which is now commenced—will be built over Lot 10 River, they will be much better.

The water communications are only middling. The water for the most part is shallow, and will not admit a vessel of any burthen up any of the rivers, except Foxley River, up which some vessels ascend, and take in produce at the Canadian River Bridge, on Lot 11. Port Hill and Cascumpec are the nearest markets, except when a vessel comes to the Canadian River Bridge on purpose to take in produce for a merchant doing business on the Lot. The land on this Lot is all Government land, excepting 100 acres of rented land.

Lot 12.—No remarks.

LOT 14.

Although no pains have been spared to render the returns intelligible, and duly fill up the columns containing the landed property, I regret to have to state that there are some heads of families who can give no information respecting their leaseholds, save that they pay rent to the Hon. James Yeo, but know nothing about their leases; others call themselves leaseholders but pay no rent. It will be seen that only the number of acres in farms of this description has been returned; being unable to ascertain the conditions upon which they are held.

The land on this Township, generally, is of second quality, but when well cultivated, yields good crops. Freeholders are mostly independent; but the inconvenience of obtaining a market for their surplus produce tends to retard their prosperity. Tenants complain loudly of the rental system; some few among them are independent; but too many are needy, particularly the French settlers located on the Western section of the Lot.

The wilderness land is of very inferior quality. Roads and bridges are generally kept in pretty fair order; but it is to be regretted that we have no wharfs for shipping purposes, as the Eastern section especially commands excellent water privileges. The markets most resorted to are St. Eleanor's and Summerside,—distant from twelve to eighteen miles.

LOT 15.

Land about second quality. Great disadvantages from the want of roads. Water extends the length of the Township. Summerside is the nearest market,—distant from 15 to 20 miles.

HUGH GAMBLE.

LOT 16.

The Eastern part of this Lot is about eight miles from Summerside, whither the inhabitants generally take their grain to market; the main road leads through the Lot to that place, and is generally in a good state for that purpose. The Western part of the Lot is twelve to fourteen miles from Summerside, and produce has to be carted by the main Western road. This Township is also bounded Easterly and North by Richmond Bay, where grain is occasionally shipped off. This bay extends some distance up, affording an opportunity of water communica-

tion occasionally. The land in general is low, swampy and barren ; the people generally poor.

JAMES LYLE.

LOT 17.

The land in general is of good quality. This Township is pretty well supplied with roads, and the Southern boundary fronts on water the whole length ; the Northern part also for several miles fronts on, and has communication with Richmond Bay. St. Eleanor's and Summerside are the principal markets ; extreme distance to the former place, eight and a half miles ; to the latter, eleven miles.

WILLIAM BEARISTO.

LOT 18.

The quality of land on this Township is generally good. The advantages in regard to roads and bridges and water communication are good. The markets resorted to are Summerside and Princetown.

STEPHEN MACLELLAN.

LOT 19.

Land on this Township may be considered a light loam of medium quality, which, if properly manured, would yield good returns to the farmer in the root crops, barley and oats ; but it is not good for wheat or hay. Farmers having shore fronts have the privilege of obtaining the necessary ingredients for manuring, with but little expense ; but those in the rear, in the absence of peat or bog mud,—of which this Lot has not much—have to pay dearly enough for it, if they get it at all. Neither is there much wood on the Lot ; scarcely enough for common fuel, building and fences, to say nothing of burning ashes to enrich the land.

The Township is pleasantly situated, well intersected by roads, which, if in good repair, would compete fairly with any on the Island. As to markets,—with the small exception of the produce exported from Margate,—all goes from Summerside, possessing as it does the best harbor for shipping on this end of the Island, and is within reach of all residing on the Lot ; the greatest distance being from two to ten miles.

ARCHIBALD TOWNSEND.

LOT 20.

The land on this Township would, on an average, come up to second quality ; the interior

being very stony and hard to cultivate, and requiring more manure than the occupants can procure, in order to raise anything like an average crop, particularly of hay ; and the portion fronting on the shore is of a light sandy nature, requiring heavy manuring to keep it in good heart.

The Township is pretty well intersected by roads ; and although the Southwest River runs across the Lot at near its centre, water communication is seldom resorted to. The markets generally resorted to by the inhabitants of this Township for the sale of surplus produce are, Summerside, New London Harbor and Graham's Wharf. Summerside is distant from twelve to fifteen miles ; New London Harbour from four to eight miles from those living on the North side of the Southwest River ; Graham's Wharf being the easiest of access, and the chief mart for the settlers on the south side of the Southwest River, is mostly resorted to, and a large amount of produce is annually shipped thereat. Long River Wharf, at the head of the Southwest River, is also of great convenience to the inhabitants in that vicinity, and of Irishtown,—one or two schooners generally loading there with grain in spring and fall.

ARCHIBALD MACKINNON.

LOT 21.

The quality of land on this Township, in most settlements will compare favorably with the soil of the Island in general ; while in some parts it is inferior, in some settlements particularly in and around Millvale road. Many of the settlers are in very destitute circumstances, living on rented farms, and being poor when they came here, having scarcely any clearance, and many of them no other way of subsistence than by planting a little with the hoe, they scarcely gain a livelihood, although the people seem industrious in general ; the land is also very hilly, &c.

This Lot is pretty well intersected with roads, and which are in a fair state of repair. The greatest inconvenience to the travelling public is the want of a bridge over the Southwest River, New London, at or near Coles' Ferry. The water communication is good ; the harbor well buoyed, with about ten feet of water on the bar at half tide. Markets most generally resorted to for the sale of produce are Miramichi, St. John, N. B., Newfoundland, New York, Boston, &c.

LOT 22.

The quality of the land on this Township, except about 1000 acres on the North end, which was originally a pine forest, and repeatedly burnt; some few hundred acres of stony land, and a few hundred acres in the hollows by the brooks, is of a good quality, and will compare favorably with any land in Queen's County; the surface is uneven, and towards the South, hilly.

The Township abounds with springs and brooks of excellent water; many of the streams are of sufficient magnitude to propel mills. Fyfe's Bridge, New London, is the principal shipping place for the North end of the Township, to which there is access by pretty good roads, and where considerable quantities of oats, and potatoes are annually shipped. The only market resorted to from the South end of the Township is Charlottetown, distant at the nearest point thirteen miles, by Anderson's Road, the Township roads leading to which are very hilly. The settlers on this part of the Township are mostly from the Island of Raasa, and do not appear to have agricultural skill; although they have been on the Lot twenty years, there are many who have not seed to plant their yet small farms, nor food for the coming summer. Very considerable numbers of cattle and sheep have likewise perished for want of sufficient food to sustain them through our long winter. Reference to the foregoing pages will shew the very small amount of hay grown, and without it, in the absence of turnips—which are not grown—no man can keep stock through our long winter without risk of losing them.

JEREMIAH SIMPSON.

LOT 23.

The North end of Lot 23, Cavendish and vicinity, ship their produce at Hope River, distant $2\frac{1}{2}$ to 4 miles; some is also shipped at Rustico and New Glasgow Wharf. New Glasgow and vicinity ship from Rustico harbor, sometimes, but there is a sand bar at the entrance, which does not admit vessels of heavy draft of water, there being seldom more than eight feet of water at flood tide. Charlottetown is the principal market for New Glasgow, and the only market for the South end and centre of the Lot, say—Johnston's and the Malpeque Road, distant from eleven to seventeen miles, and a hilly road. Sea manure is obtained by only a few;

no muscle mud or river mud on the Lot except in New Glasgow or Hunter River. Roads hilly, but generally pretty good. Fencing is chiefly done with fir and spruce poles, which are becoming very scarce. No cedar. Firewood scarce; worth about forty shillings per acre. By firewood, understand hardwood, such as beech, birch or maple.

LOT 24, AND PETER'S ISLAND.

The soil on Lot 24 will compare favorably with most of the land of the Island, with the exception of about 3000 acres fronting on Rustico Bay and the Gulf shore. The roads are numerous and generally good. Charlottetown is the principal market for produce,—distant from ten to twenty-five miles. A bridge across the Hunter River would shorten the distance six miles to about one fourth of the population.

LOT 25.

Summerside is the nearest market, at which most of the produce of this Township is sold and shipped; but as it is very inconvenient for many on the Lot to carry their produce so far, they require a wharf built on the North side of Bedeque harbor.

Lot 26.—No remarks.

LOT 30.

Argyle Shore.—The inhabitants of this district are all freeholders; the land, if not first rate, is fertile, level and well watered, and from its proximity to the sea-shore—where abundance of manure can be easily procured—it can be brought to yield luxuriant crops, wheat, barley, oats and potatoes; the inhabitants are, consequently, among the most thriving in the Colony. Surplus produce is shipped at McEwen's Wharf and Crapaud.

Bonshaw, Smelt Creek, and Argyle Rear.—With the exception of three or four families, the inhabitants of this district are all leaseholders, very poor, and utterly unable to pay back rent. The land is light and hilly. McEwen's Wharf and Crapaud are the places of shipment.

APPENDIX (A.)

Green Road.—The land in this settlement is level and fertile, and the inhabitants industrious; they are Irish leaseholders, very anxious to purchase the freehold interest of their farms. Crapaud is their usual shipping place.

Appin Road.—This settlement is quite new; the land beautifully sloping to the South. The settlers are all leaseholders, contending with numerous privations. A cart road from Hugh Currie's to Green Road is indispensable.

Settlements South side of Rhymery River, between Crosby's and Dollar's Mills.—The miserable inhabitants of this District, composed of Irish and Highlanders, are destitute of roads and bridges. The land is very hilly and steep, except near the border of the stream. The inhabitants are all under some obligation to pay rent; there is no road, bridge, or school in the whole District.

Road between Townships Nos. 30 and 65.—The land is generally second rate. The inhabitants are leaseholders and squatters, apparently very industrious; and although poor, extremely anxious to purchase the fee simple interest of their farms. Charlottetown is the nearest market.

Scotch Settlement back of Lot 30.—The land is so high, and the hills so steep in this district, as to preclude the possibility of its ever becoming a flourishing settlement. The farmers are all Scotch Highlanders, frugal, persevering and industrious, else they would never have been able to maintain themselves under so many privations. They are all leaseholders, extremely anxious to become freeholders. The trifling sum of eight pounds is the only item ever appropriated towards roads and bridges in this District. Charlottetown, about 20 miles distant is the nearest market.

Old Tryon Settlement Road.—The inhabitants are all squatters, natives of Ireland, and equally industrious and persevering with their Highland neighbours, and as anxious to become freeholders. The land is similar in every respect to that in the Scotch Settlement; the wretched state of the road is deeply felt by both. There are probably between six and seven hundred persons in the above three settlements, without a Magistrate or a Post Office; their quarrells are settled in Charlottetown or Crapaud entailing exorbitant expenses.

Lot 31.—No remarks.

LOT 32.

The lands on the South end of this Lot are light and fertile, and not subject to mildew or early frost; the farmers have access to muscle mud and other sea manure, are all freeholders, and in easy circumstances. Those on the middle part of the Township are poor, the lands being flat and swampy, and subject to early frosts. The North end of the Lot is light and poor, and the farmers are chiefly tenants, and poor, having no access to sea manure, and their farms are very small. The crops this year were partially a failure. I met with many who had no seed nor anything to support their families during the ensuing summer. This Lot is well provided with roads and bridges, and near to places for shipping produce. Upon the whole, I am of opinion that Lot 32 is very poor, and may be classed second or third quality.

JOHN MCPHER.

Lot 33.—No remarks.

LOT 34.

With respect to the general quality of land in this Township the Southern portion of it is superior to the other parts. Commencing at the Hillsborough, for three miles North, the land appears to be first and second quality; for two miles further North, it is very inferior; but on towards the Gulf shore the quality is much improved, with the exception of the Eastern portion of the Township, which cannot be considered better than third quality.

In regard to roads, there is a sufficiency for the convenience and accommodation of the inhabitants of the Township. As to water communication, there being no harbor on the North side of the Lot sufficient to admit trading vessels, the market resorted to for the disposal of surplus produce is chiefly Charlottetown; a few of the inhabitants of the Southern part of the Township ship off produce at Appletree Farm Wharf.

The extreme North part of this Township is distant about 14 miles from Charlottetown; the Southern part not more than 6 miles.

With respect to one name on the return—Robert S. Fellowes—that individual at first refused to answer all my questions, saying that he would give an account of his farm and stock, but that it was positively inquisitorial to pry into a man's domestic concerns; and then he added that he would give a return such as he could swear to. The number of bushels of pro-

duce returned by him from a farm of 130 acre; of arable land, is, I believe, far under the marks and his return, therefore, so far, in my opinion, is not reliable and correct.

DAVID LAWSON.

Under the head of "produce raised by each family during the past year," the following is the return above referred to: "5 bushels wheat; 5 bushels of barley; 5 bushels of oats; 5 bushels of buckwheat; 5 bushels potatoes; 5 bushels turnips; 5 tons of hay." Also, stock—"3 horses; 2 neat cattle; 1 hog."

Lot 35.—No remarks.

LOT 36.

The North of the Township along the Sand Hills, is very destitute, they say, from high rents and poor land, and disadvantages in respect of markets; the nearest shipping place is McConnel's Wharf. If the Afton road were made through, and a wharf at Hayden's, it would reduce the distance to between three and four miles to a shipping place, where it is now from nine to ten miles.

The South side of the Township is—part of it—better land, and the rents are lower; near the South boundary the land is very poor; the only place of shipping is Hickey's wharf, distant about six miles.

ALEXANDER STEWART.

LOT 37.

Farms on the sea shore of this Lot are partly ruined by drifting sand. Farmers, in general, not well off; rent too high for the quality of land. Scarcity of grain and potatoes for seed. Great loss of cattle and sheep on account of scarcity of fodder.

Light soil, in general, on the north side of the Hillsborough River, and very difficult to clear on account of so much wild tea and ferns; also farming not carried on as it should be. Mount Stewart a good shipping place, but very poor road and bridge; road from St. Peter's Road to Mount Stewart Bridge is impassable and the bridge unsafe.

BENJAMIN A. COFFIN.

LOT 38.

The land—from what I have seen of it—is good, and the greater part of it of first quality. The Southern part of the Township, being the best land is being fast settled; although the

settlement is new, they are fast reclaiming their forest. The Township is pretty well supplied with roads, there are about twelve different public roads, all in a very good state; the main post road being the worst I travelled on in the Township, excepting a new one lately cut out. If the bushes and trees allowed to grow close to the track on many of the roads, especially the main post road, were cut down the full width of the road—say sixty feet—the sun and wind would in the spring dry up the roads much earlier, if these obstructions were removed; and many heavy snow drifts in winter would also thus be prevented. The bridges are in a good state; I observed but two small ones, of about four logs each, bad, in the whole Township. The principal shipping place is Mount Stewart Bridge, at the head of the Hillsborough, distant about one mile from the nearest part of the Township, and about seven or eight from the farthest point.

WILLIAM STERNS.

LOT 39.

The land on this Township appears to be, about one-third first quality, and nearly two thirds second quality. The Township possesses the advantage of good roads, —with the exception of the new settlements. The markets mostly resorted to by the inhabitants are Charlottetown city, Mount Stewart Bridge, and country traders who export to Newfoundland, Nova Scotia and St. Pierre. The Township is upwards of twenty miles distant from Charlottetown, and six to twelve miles from Mount Stewart Bridge.

JOHN JARDINE.

LOT 40.

The settled land here is of good quality generally, but the unsettled wilderness land is mostly swamp, and of a bad quality.

The roads are generally in a very good state, except two or three back roads, viz: the road at Morell, called Milltown road, and the road leading to Macdonald's Saw Mill; the bridges are in a fair condition, except Morell Bridge—which requires to be built anew—as well as one or two other small bridges. The water communication would be good but for the bar at the mouth of St. Peter's harbor; this bar makes it unsafe for vessels to come in or go out, consequently vessels will not come here in the fall; so the market is but a very small one

on the bay. This compels farmers to take their surplus produce, some to Grand River and others to Mount Stewart Bridge—a distance of ten to sixteen miles. The people hope for a nearer market when the breakwater at the harbor of St Peter's is completed.

WILLIAM HAYDEN.

LOT 41.

The principal part of this Township consists of good land, pretty productive when under good tillage; notwithstanding, I would not class it among the first quality of land on the Island; and although it produces a tolerably fair return of cereal and green crops, it is too sandy and light, and being principally sloping land from ranging heights, much of its productive substratum is, in consequence, carried off—particularly in the spring seasons—to the bays and rivers, rendering it consequently but very indifferent for the production of hay or pasturage, as may be seen by the accompanying return; a considerable portion of it—probably one-sixth—is irreclaimable, being what is commonly called red spruce swamps.

The roads through the Township will compare favorably with the roads generally throughout the Island. In respect to water communication, the harbor of St. Peter's was never a good one, and is now become worse than ever; so much so, that the inhabitants have almost abandoned the shipment of their surplus produce, particularly in the fall of the year, by water, and have, therefore, no alternative for its disposal but to resort to a market in Charlottetown—a distance of over thirty miles—or to Georgetown, a distance of over twenty miles, and sometimes to Grand River harbor, about the same distance by the present route as to Georgetown. But a road in a straight line from the head of St. Peter's Bay to Grand River Bridge would bring the shippers of produce from this locality to within a distance of six miles, and often to—as it has proved of late years—a ready money market, and always to a safe place of shipment, by Grand River harbor. This object once accomplished would prove of vast benefit not only to the settlers of St. Peter's Bay, and those in its immediate vicinity, but the surrounding country on the North side of the Island, to a considerable extent, would be benefitted thereby.

PETER MCCALLUM.

LOT 42.

On this Township there is but one main post road, leading from the head of St. Peter's Bay to East Point. This being the only market road, it should be always in good condition, but which is a difficult matter, in consequence of the proximity of the road to the North shore, there being several bridges which are in danger of being (and often are) carried away by the action of the sea; therefore it is the desire of the inhabitants generally to have the main post road nearer the rear of their farms, by which it will more easily be made a good road.

As regards markets,—the head of St. Peter's Bay is the nearest, being ten miles to the Eastern boundary of Lot 42, on the North side or shore; and Souris is the next, being from 16 to 18 miles.

RODERICK MCINTYRE.

LOT 43.

The quality of land on this Township is in general good. The roads are mostly laid off to good advantage, with the exception of a back settlement in the interior, from Roderick McIntyre's Cow River, towards Naufrage Marsh, where there are several settlers without any road. The only harbors on this Township are Fortune and Rollo Bays, which are not much frequented on account of the difficulty of getting to them, there being at Rollo Bay no way of approaching the loading ground but by a sand flat of a mile in length, which is covered with water at half tide. The chief market is Souris, about 12 or 13 miles distant from some parts of the Township; and a few traders in the vicinity.

JAMES DAVIDSON.

LOT 44.

A good deal of the interior of this Township is low, swampy land. The principal market for surplus produce is at Souris, whence it is shipped by the merchants to the neighbouring ports of Halifax and St. John, and occasionally to Boston. Seldom a cash market is met with at Souris; and to obtain cash for their produce, the inhabitants have to convey it to Grand River, a distance of 15 to 20 miles, or to Georgetown, a distance of 30 miles, when it generally commands a fair cash price. Shipping of produce from the North side has almost ceased; the inhabitants prefer taking it to market, by land, rather than running the risk of the delay

and danger attendant on shipping it at the sea board.

JOHN MACGOWAN.

LOT 45.

The quality of land is generally good ; this Township is well supplied with roads. Souris is the principal place of business, and where most of the produce is sold. Sometimes fish and grain are shipped from the north side, in summer, to save the hauling to Colville Bay or Souris harbor for shipment. The distance from the North to the South side (Souris harbor) is about nine miles.

ROBERT BOSWALL.

LOT 46.

Although the East end of the Island is almost surrounded by water, yet very much inconvenience is felt from the want of harbors ; and the distance from any market causes a great deal of trouble to the inhabitants hauling their produce to market.

The Baltic Road settlement is principally very inferior land, with but an indifferent road only lately opened. Greenvale, in the interior of the Lot is very inconveniently situated, on account of the bad roads ; the nearest market is Souris. Glencorodale, which is a new settlement, with but middling land and very indifferent roads, is very much inconvenienced in regard to markets ; the inhabitants have to bring their produce through to the North side, and from thence to Souris.

JAMES McVEAN.

LOT 47.

The soil of Lot 47 is generally good ; scarcely any portion of it being unfit for cultivation, excepting about 1000 acres of barren sandhills, which being included in the area of the Lot, is levied on annually for arrears of land tax. Although this Township is nearly surrounded with water, yet being entirely destitute of harbors, and in an exposed position, Shipowners rarely venture to take freights off the coast after the middle of October ; and the road to Souris—the nearest place of shipment, and about 15 miles distant—being one of the most hilly on the Island, the inhabitants are in a great measure cut off from the advantages of an autumnal exportation of their surplus produce.

Owing to the foregoing geographical disadvantages, agricultural produce never commands

such a high price at the East Point as it does in most other parts of Prince Edward Island.

EMANUEL MACEACHEN.

LOT 48.

A great part of the land in this Township is of good quality, and capable of producing fair crops ; but there are other portions, especially those remote from the shores, which will never yield more than a scanty remuneration to the agriculturist, as the soil is generally composed of white sand, and swampy. These latter remarks refer chiefly to the lands at the upper end of the Lot, occupied principally by Irish Inhabitants from Monaghan. The roads through the settlement above referred to are bad, and likely to continue so for some time, owing to the swampy nature of the land ; those through the other parts of the settlement are fair. The principal markets for produce are Charlottetown, and the Ferry opposite that city.

ROBERT MUTCH.

LOT 49.

There are seven school-houses and two churches on this Township. Governor's Island has no inhabitants. It is owned and cultivated by Robert Gay ; the statistics of his produce, &c., are included in the returns of this Township.

JOSEPH SHEDOW.

LOT 50.

The general quality of land on this Township is good. The roads are passable. With respect to markets, there is no part of the Lot distant more than five or six miles from Vernon River Bridge—one of the best shipping places in the Township ; China Point Wharf is also a good shipping place, as vessels drawing twenty-two or twenty-three feet of water can load in the harbor.

THOMAS BEERS.

LOT 51.

1. *Quality of land.*—The land in general on this Township appears to be of an average quality ; about one-half of it is of the first, one-third is of the second, and the residue is of the third quality.

2. *Roads and water communications.*—The Township is pretty well intersected by roads, with the exception of that portion of it South of Montague River, the only road there being nothing better than a winter timber road. The

main post road leading from Charlottetown to Georgetown intersects the middle of the Lot East and West. Baldwin's Road runs Northward from the main post road, and connects it with the Pisquid road, leading from the head of Cardigan and crossing Lot 51 to Mount Stewart Bridge, affording communication between the Cardigan and Hillsborough Rivers. The Union road runs South from the main post road, and connects with Sparrow's road to the South, which crosses the Lot East and West, and leads to Montague Bridge.

3. *Markets.*—To the inhabitants of the South end of the Township, Montague Bridge offers the nearest and most advantageous market; from them it is distant about two and a half miles; from those in the central parts, about six miles; and from the Northern settlements, about nine miles; it is the chief market, and that most resorted to by the inhabitants of the Lot, and where the greater portion of the produce is shipped; much of the produce, however, finds its way to Georgetown, Cardigan, Brudenell and Hillsborough Rivers. Georgetown is distant, on an average, about ten miles, and Brudenell Wharf and the Hillsborough respectively about eight miles from the Northern settlements on the Township. The new bridge now in course of erection on Cardigan River, will afford—from its proximity to the Northern portions of the Lot—the most convenient place of exportation.

JAMES MACDONALD.

LOT 52.

The quality of land on this Township (as shewn by the returns) is, with few exceptions, "second." The enumerator is of opinion that it would bear a higher rating. The Southern half is a light soil, but easily cultivated. About the middle of the Township, and towards the North end, is a portion of swamp; but where the land is dry, it appears to be of excellent quality. The Township, generally, is level, possessing a good quality of firewood, rails and timber for building purposes. The Southern half is well situated as regards both roads and water communication; the furthest settlers, with the exception of a few at the North end, about Morell, being within eleven miles of Georgetown; nine of Montague Bridge; eight of Brudenell Wharf; and about eight of Cardigan Bridge. Should the road be opened, as

contemplated, to the latter place, the distance will be shortened about one and a half mile; but the majority of the inhabitants of the Township are two to five miles from shipping places. Of these, Georgetown and Montague Bridge are the most resorted to. Ten families in the back settlement about Morell, are very disadvantageously circumstanced, having neither roads nor water communications. If the Morell, crossing Peake's road, was bridged, it would be a great advantage to them, and it would soon become a large settlement; a great part of the land being taken up, but for want of roads people are tardy in settling there.

WILLIAM ALLEY.

LOT 53.

The soil of Lot 53 is light and sandy, with very little swamp south of Cardigan; on the north of Cardigan there is a large extent of swamp. I consider the Township second quality; nearly every settler has put his land down at that rating.

The Lot is well intersected with roads, in a very fair state for this time of year.

The advantages of the Lot as to water communication are equal to any in King's County, having a frontage on Montague River, with Brudenell and Cardigan Rivers crossing it, with a depth of water sufficient for vessels of a moderate size to load in. Most of the settlers on the Lot go to Georgetown, Brudenell Wharfs, and Montague Bridge, which are easy of access, with their surplus produce; those on the North of Cardigan have a long distance to go to Georgetown,—some twelve miles; when the new bridge on Cardigan River is finished, it will shorten the distance to Georgetown, and will be a first rate place at which to load vessels of a large draught of water.

GEORGE MOAR.

LOT 54.

This Township, with the exception of the portions thereof bounded by the Cardigan has been but recently settled; therefore, the quantity of agricultural produce stated in the annexed return cannot be fairly reckoned as testing the capabilities of the soil for agricultural purposes. The Township is of an undulating and uneven surface; in many places swampy, but interspersed with tracts of superior land, yielding all the variety of timber peculiar to King's County, excepting

hemlock. The quality of the soil is a fair average of the Colony, although the unevenness of the surface causes a material difference in the soil in the different localities.

Lot 54 is favorably situated for the purposes of commerce, having a good wharf on Cardigan Bay, and shipping accommodation on Grand River Bridge. It is bounded on the East, longitudinally, by a road leading from Cardigan Wharf to its rear, and intersected by two roads, transversely, respectively named Launching road and Grand River road, all of which are in good repair, except the road leading from Grand River road to the rear, or North boundary of the Lot.

The market to which the inhabitants of this Lot resort is Georgetown which by the winter route is three miles from the southern extremity of the Township; but by the summer route, along the main road, Georgetown is eleven miles distant from the nearest part of Lot 54, although that distance may be much shortened by crossing the Cardigan Ferry.

HECTOR JOHNSON.

LOT 55.

The principal market, and that nearest to Grand River is Georgetown, and Launching Wharf and Grand River Wharf; there are besides, three small wharfs, all private property, on Grand River,—one at the head of the river on the west side, and two on the east side, one of the latter two to three miles from the Grand River Bridge. The Bridge at the head of Grand River is in a very bad state of repair, and much decayed; a new bridge is much needed here.

The road from Enmans to Mathewson's across Hayden's Milldam, is not passable either in spring or fall; residents of the District estimate the cost of making it a sufficient road at one hundred pounds; sixty pounds have already been expended on it. Inhabitants speak of endeavouring, by the interference of Government, to get the road shifted on Alexander Hayden's and Mathewson's land, as they think that the one now in use over the dam, can never be made a good road without great expense to the country to keep it in repair.

The roads on the East side of Grand River travelled by me this spring are in better order, in general, than they have been for some years past; if the Commissioner had money enough to expend, the roads would soon be fair. On the

west side of Grand River I travelled a good deal along shore and across farms; but such parts of the road as were travelled on are in a very fair condition for this season of the year.

As regards the quality of the land on Lot 55, some is very poor,—I should say over one-third of it,—and a considerable part of it swampy; some of the land is second, and the remainder first quality, that is as far as I have travelled it.

JOHN WISE.

LOT 56.

The land in general is second quality. The advantages in regard to roads are good, if they were kept in repair. The markets most resorted to are Lower Grand River and Fortune harbor. The harbors are very inconvenient to a number of settlers on this Township.

WILLIAM CONAHAN.

LOT 57.

The land of Point Prim is very fine; that of the Portage is lighter, and not so good. The Orwell soil is excellent; that of Newtown is light and not so good. The Murray Harbor road settlement, and the different adjoining Districts possess very good soil, with the exception of Brown's Creek, which is light and stony.

At Pinette Wharf,—distant seven or eight miles from some of them,—the people of Point Prim ship their produce; the roads in general are very soft, spring and fall. The inhabitants are very anxious that a wharf be built at Angus McAulay's; the harbor from the entrance runs pretty straight, so far, and vessels of greater draft could load there, and get in and out much sooner and more easily, while the distance would be considerably shortened. I believe the people would subscribe handsomely towards that object. The inhabitants of the Portage and Lower Newtown load, in general at Pinette Wharf; those of Orwell and Upper Newtown generally at Orwell Point or Vernon River Bridge,—a distance of three to four miles. The people of Murray Harbor road, and of the different adjoining settlements, load either at Vernon River Bridge or at Montague River Bridge, distance in general about five miles; the greater quantity of the produce is carried to the latter place, on account of the number of Americans loading there, and the generally better prices obtained.

ALLAN MACDOUGALL.

APPENDIX (A.)

LOT 58.

St. John's Church, in connection with the established Church of Scotland, and St. Michael's Chapel of the Roman Catholic Church, and the Lighthouse on Point Prim, are erected on this Township. In the centre of this Lot is Pinette River—the nearest and usual market for surplus agricultural produce. Widow Lyance, widow Jessie Macdonald, and Murdoch Martin—one of the late immigrants—who have settled at the Surrey settlement, have got helpless families, and are not in a situation to pay for any part of their Land. I beg most respectfully to recommend them to the favorable consideration of his Excellency the Lieutenant Governor in Council. The settlers on Lot 58 who have complied with the Government terms, and paid the first instalment of the price of their lands, are returned as "freeholders."

ALEXANDER McLEAN.

LOT 59.

The land on this Township is inferior, not to be rated above second quality, the best of it being a poor sandy soil. The Lot is well supplied with roads, and these roads are in good repair for this time of year. The markets and chief places of shipment of surplus produce are Montague Bridge and St. Andrew's Point. At the former, there is always a ready market for produce, at the shipping season; it is about eight miles distant from the farthest part of the Lot. At the latter place a large quantity of produce is bought by the resident trader, and shipped to the different markets. A public wharf is in course of erection at Aitken's shore, which, when finished, will be a very convenient shipping place for surplus produce for a portion of the inhabitants of this Lot.

JOHNSTON AITKEN.

LOT 60.

The land generally is third quality. The inhabitants in general resort to Pinette market. The inhabitants of Culloden settlement, fronting on the Selkirk Estate, labour under much difficulty for want of water; there is none within two miles of some of them, in summer. They complain of being assessed to support Free Education, and cannot get a Schoolhouse erected, for want of means, although there are children enough in the settlement to make up the average required by the Act. The inhabitants of Rona, fronting on the Three Rivers

road, declare they are, in general, in poorer circumstances than when the last census was taken.

WILLIAM ROSS.

LOT 61, AND PANMURE ISLAND.

The land on Lot 61 is generally bad; that which is not swampy, is sand and flint; when looking at the new fields on the new settler's farms, I could see flint stones almost as thick as grass over the surface. I did not see more than four or five good farms on the whole Township.

There are about forty immigrant families on the west end of the Lot, without even a road to their miserable abodes; of this they complain very much, as they have to carry every thing they can get (not what they want) ten or fifteen miles on their backs.

Two lines of roads are intended to be opened through to the Wood Island road, which crosses the west end of the Lot, but from some cause this object has been neglected for the past three years, and the above people are suffered to undergo all the hardships which can be better imagined than described. I had to wade nearly knee-deep in swamp, and was in danger of losing my horse.

The west end of Lot 61 is well wooded, but the land bad, worth nothing, except for lumber; far from market, and the settlers are without a road or a school. It is the last place I would choose to make a living in. A road is very much required to enable the poor people to get a horse to their abodes.

DUNCAN FRASER.

LOT 62.

The soil of this Township, in general, is light, sandy. The roads require to be greatly improved. There is no stated water communication with other parts; the inhabitants suffer great inconvenience for want of a harbor. The nearest stated market is Charlottetown, about 35 miles distant. In the fall of the year surplus produce is generally shipped at Pinette and Murray Harbor,—distant respectively ten or twelve miles.

DUNCAN MUNN.

LOT 63.

So far as my acquaintance with the soil of the Island extends, I am of opinion that Lot 63 is among the poorest, for farming purposes; and all of it fit for cultivation is nearly occupied; there is a great extent of what is called barrens or swamp, and the crops on the farms near the swamps are often destroyed by the early frosts.

The inhabitants of this Township have, in a great measure, to deal with the merchants in Murray Harbor proper, and at St. Andrew's Point, and Georgetown. Sometimes American vessels call into St. Mary's Bay in the autumn, and pay for produce in cash. The roads are very good, except in the rear of the Township, and there they will never be good, on account of deep ravines, although mostly dry, rendering it very difficult for the poor settlers there to take their produce to market; some of them will have to cart it about thirteen miles to the shipping places on Lots sixty-three and sixty-four; but in my opinion it will be long before the poor settlers on the rear of Lot 63 will be able to ship much produce.

As regards leases, neither the time when they were executed, nor the time expired, could be correctly ascertained, because some not being able to pay for it, have not got a lease yet, and some have a number of leases, once held by others, and many or most of these have been executed at different times, and with different rents payable, &c. JOHN DALZIEL.

Lot 64:—No remarks.

LOT 65.

South Shore.—The land is generally high and stony, but the inhabitants, by industry, and the collection of sea manure, raise considerable crops of wheat, oats and potatoes, but very little hay. Charlottetown is their chief market, to which most of the surplus produce is hauled on the ice, on account of the want of a convenient shipping wharf.

Nine Mile Creek.—The land is more loamy and flat,—better adapted for hay and pasturage; but rent is a great hindrance, especially to those in arrears; their shipping place is the wharf at Deadman's Point.

Big Point.—The land is generally very gravelly and dry; but for the advantage of sea manure, some farmers could hardly subsist,—to say nothing of paying rent. Their shipping place is McEwen's Wharf.

Canoe Cove and Rear Settlement.—The rear settlement is very gravelly and dry land. The soil may be rated as third quality. The inhabitants are generally very poor; some of them hardly able to obtain seed.

Road between Lots 65 and 31, and also between 65 and 30, is very hilly land, and much subject to blast and mildew, about the creeks, by reason of which the wheat crop generally fails; some have abandoned sowing it altogether.

The general market is Charlottetown, distant about twelve miles. NEIL MACKINNON.

LOT 66.

The north end of this Lot is rather far from any market or shipping place—Montague Bridge being the nearest. There is but one school-house on the Lot. JOHN MACLEAN.

LOT 67.

Lot 67 is situated in the centre of the Island, and contains a good deal of hilly land, with a great quantity of stones, rendering it hard to cultivate, hence the land ranks as second quality; but the Township contains neither swamps nor barren land. The land marked first quality is easy of cultivation, producing good crops of hay and grain of all kinds, as also root crops. The agricultural produce of the Township; generally, and hay particularly, was below an average, considering the breadth under crop, owing to the drouth of the season.

Charlottetown is the principal market for the eastern part of the Lot—distant 14 to 20 miles. The nearest market, where a considerable quantity of produce is shipped, is New London, on the North side, five to nine miles distant. Summerside, on the west,—thirteen to eighteen miles distant,—commands a good deal of grain on account of the facility of getting goods or necessaries in return. Crapaud, on the south,—distant seven or ten miles, would be a good outlet for produce, in the shipping season, were the County line road sufficiently improved.

WILLIAM HASLAM.

Sir;

I have to acknowledge the receipt of your despatch, No. 7, of the 1st of February last, enclosing a report from the Attorney General of Prince Edward Island, on the subject of the Act intituled "An Act to authorize grants of the Shores of this Island."

I approve of your intention to amend the Act in such a way as to confine its operation, unambiguously, to land between high and low water mark.

As thus amended, its principle will be unobjectionable; but I think, however, that the powers granted to the Lieutenant Governor and Council, should be so exercised as not to inflict injury on owners of land on the sea-shore, by cutting them off from access to the sea, or by erecting any constructions which might be injurious to them, or a nuisance.

And while amending the Act in other respects, I think you would do well to insert a provision for the protection of the interests of Proprietors adjoining any sea-shore, which may be granted, or for assigning them compensation if the public interests should require that any portion of the sea-shore in front of their pro-

perty should be appropriated in a manner to cause them damage.

A PROCLAMATION.

VICTORIA R.

WHEREAS We are happily at Peace with all Sovereigns, Powers and States :

And whereas hostilities have unhappily commenced between the Government of the United States of America and certain States styling themselves the Confederate States of America :

And whereas we being at peace with the Government of the United States, have declared our Royal determination to maintain a strict and impartial neutrality in the contest between the said contending parties :

We, therefore, have thought fit, by and with the advice of our Privy Council, to issue this Our Royal Proclamation :

And We do hereby strictly charge and command all Our loving subjects to observe a strict Neutrality in and during the aforesaid Hostilities, and to abstain from violating or contravening either the Laws and Statutes of the Realm in this Behalf, or the Law of Nations in relation thereto, as they will answer to the contrary at their Peril :

And whereas in and by a certain Statute made and passed in the Fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to "prevent the enlisting or Engagement of His Majesty's Subjects to serve in "a Foreign Service, and the fitting out or equipping, in His Majesty's "Dominions, Vessels for Warlike Purposes, without His Majesty's Licence," it is amongst other things declared and enacted as follows :—

"That if any natural-born Subject of His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, without the Leave or Licence of His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, for that Purpose first had and obtained, under the Sign Manual of His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, or signified by Order in Council, or by Proclamation of His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, shall take or accept, or shall agree to take or accept, any Military Commission, or shall otherwise enter into the Military Service as a Commissioned or Non-commissioned Officer, or shall enlist or

enter himself to enlist, or shall agree to enlist or to enter himself to serve as a Soldier, or to be employed, or shall serve in any Warlike or Military Operation in the Service of or for or under or in aid of any Foreign Prince, State, Potentate, Colony, Province, or Part of any Province or People, or of any Person or Persons exercising or assuming to exercise the Powers of Government in or over any Foreign Country, Colony, Province, or Part of any Province or People, either as an Officer or Soldier, or in any other Military Capacity ; or if any natural-born Subject of His Majesty shall, without such Leave or Licence as aforesaid, accept, or agree to take or accept, any Commission, Warrant, or Appointment as an Officer, or shall enlist or enter himself, or shall agree to enlist or enter himself, to serve as a Sailor or Marine, or to be employed, or engaged, or shall serve in and on board any Ship or Vessel of War, or in and on board any Ship or Vessel used or fitted out, or equipped or intended to be used for any Warlike Purpose, in the Service of or for or under or in aid of any Foreign Power, Prince, State, Potentate, Colony, Province, or Part of any Province or People, or of any Person or Persons exercising or assuming to exercise the Powers of Government in or over any Foreign Country, Colony, Province, or Part of any Province or People ; or if any natural-born Subject of His Majesty shall, without such Leave and Licence as aforesaid, engage, contract, or agree to go, or shall go to any Foreign State, Country, Colony, Province, or Part of any Province, or to any place beyond the Seas, with an Intent or in order to enlist or enter himself to serve, or with Intent to serve in any Warlike or Military Operation whatever, whether by Land or by Sea, in the Service of or for or under or in aid of any Foreign Prince, State, Potentate, Colony, Province, or Part of any Province or People, or in the Service of or for or under or in aid of any Person or Persons exercising or assuming to exercise the Powers of Government in or over any Foreign Country, Colony, Province, or Part of any Province or People, either as an Officer or a Soldier, or in any other Military Capacity, or as an Officer or Sailor, or Marine in any such Ship or Vessel as aforesaid, although no Enlisting Money or Pay or Reward shall have been or shall be in any or either of the Cases aforesaid actually paid to

or received by him, or by any Person to or for his Use or Benefit; or if any Person whatever, within the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or in any part of His Majesty's Dominions elsewhere, or in any Country, Colony, Settlement, Island, or Place belonging to or subject to His Majesty, shall hire, retain, engage, or procure, or shall attempt or endeavor to hire, retain, engage, or procure, any Person or Persons whatever to enlist, or to enter or engage to enlist, or to serve or to be employed in any such Service or Employment as aforesaid, as an Officer, Soldier, Sailor, or Marine, either in Land or Sea Service, for or under or in aid of any Foreign Prince, State, Potentate, Colony, Province, or Part of any Province or People, or for or under or in aid of any Person or Persons exercising or assuming to exercise any Powers of Government as aforesaid, or to go or agree to go or embark from any Part of His Majesty's Dominions, for the Purpose or with Intent to be so enlisted, entered, engaged, or employed as aforesaid, whether any Enlisting Money, Pay, or Reward shall have been or shall be actually given or received, or not; in any or either of such Cases, every Person so offending shall be deemed guilty of a Misdemeanor, and upon being convicted thereof, upon any Information or Indictment, shall be punishable by Fine and Imprisonment, or either of them, at the Discretion of the Court before which such Offender shall be convicted."

exercising or assuming to exercise any Powers of Government in or over any Foreign State, Colony, Province, or Part of any Province or People, as a Transport or Store Ship, or with Intent to cruise or commit Hostilities against any Prince, State, or Potentate, or against the Subjects or Citizens of any Prince, State, or Potentate, or against the Persons exercising or assuming to exercise the Powers of Government in any Colony, Province, or Part of any Province or Country, or against the Inhabitants of any Foreign Colony, Province, or part of any Province or Country, with whom His Majesty shall not then be at War; or shall, within the United Kingdom, or any of His Majesty's Dominions, or in any Settlement, Colony, Territory, Island, or Place belonging or subject to His Majesty, issue or deliver any Commission for any Ship or Vessel, to the Intent that such Ship or Vessel shall be employed as aforesaid, every such Person so offending shall be deemed guilty of a Misdemeanor, and shall, upon Conviction thereof upon any Information or Indictment, be punished by Fine and Imprisonment, or either of them, at the Discretion of the Court in which such Offender shall be convicted; and every such Ship or Vessel, with the Tackle, Apparel, and Furniture, together with all the Materials, Arms, Ammunition, and Stores, which may belong to or be on board of any such Ship or Vessel, shall be forfeited; and it shall be lawful for any Officer of His Majesty's Customs or Excise, or any Officer of His Majesty's Navy, who is by Law empowered to make Seizures for any Forfeiture incurred under any of the Laws of Customs or Excise, or the Laws of Trade and Navigation, to seize such Ships and Vessels aforesaid, and in such Places and in such manner in which the Officers of His Majesty's Customs or Excise and the Officers of His Majesty's Navy are empowered respectively to make Seizures under the Laws of Customs and Excise, or under the Laws of Trade and Navigation; and that every such Ship and Vessel, with the Tackle, Apparel, and Furniture, together with all the Materials, Arms, Ammunition, and Stores which may belong to or be on board of such Ship or Vessel, may be prosecuted and condemned in the like manner."

And it is in and by the said Act further enacted,—

"That if any Person, within any Part of the United Kingdom, or in any Part of His Majesty's Dominions beyond the Seas, shall, without the Leave and Licence of His Majesty for that Purpose first had and obtained as aforesaid, equip, furnish, fit out, or arm, or attempt or endeavor to equip, furnish, fit out, or arm, or procure to be equipped, furnished, fitted out, or armed, or shall knowingly aid, assist, or be concerned in the equipping, furnishing, fitting out, or arming, of any Ship or Vessel, with Intent or in order that such Ship or Vessel shall be employed in the Service of any Foreign Prince, State, or Potentate, or of any Foreign Colony, Province, or Part of any Province or People, or of any Person or Persons

Sir ;

You are already aware that the Queen is desirous of observing the strictest neutrality in the contest which appears imminent between the United States and the so-styled Confederate States of North America. I have now to inform you that in order to give full effect to this principle, Her Majesty has been pleased to interdict the Armed Ships, and also the Privateers of both parties from carrying prizes made by them, into the ports, harbors, roadsteads or waters of the United Kingdom, or of any of Her Majesty's Colonies or Possessions abroad.

It is Her Majesty's desire that this prohibition should be forthwith notified to all proper authorities within Her Majesty's Dominions ; and I am to desire that you take measures to secure its effectual observance within the limits of your Government.

No. 80.—August 19, 1861.—Refusing to submit for Her Majesty's assent "An Act to incorporate the Roman Catholic Bishop of Prince Edward Island in his Diocese.

[COPY.]

No. 80. DOWNING STREET,
19th August, 1861.

Sir ;

I have had under my consideration an Act passed by the Legislature of Prince Edward Island, intituled

"An Act to incorporate the Roman Catholic Bishop of Charlottetown in his Diocese."

This Act is not to take effect till Her Majesty's assent thereto is signified.

I regret to say that this Act is drawn with such unusual carelessness, and might possibly have such extraordinary and unintended effects (if indeed it would have any at all) that I have been unable to advise that Her Majesty should assent to it.

The first clause provides that the Roman Catholic Bishop shall be incorporated by the name of "the Roman Catholic Episcopal Congregation" (meaning I presume Corporation) "for the Diocese of Charlottetown in Prince Edward Island,"—and enables him very properly to hold for the use of his Church Lands in Prince Edward Island not exceeding the value of Three Thousand Pounds per annum.

The second clause is, I suppose, intended to vest in the Bishop, in his corporate character, all property (including especially Churches, Chapels and Burial Grounds) already held by him, or by any other person as Trustees, for certain Diocesan purposes in Charlottetown.

But the clause is so worded as to raise a variety of most inconvenient doubts.

What is meant by putting in the words "the soil, and freehold, as well as the fee"? The Fee includes the soil and freehold.

What is meant by specifying particularly "all Burial Grounds and Churches and Chapels?"—they seem sufficiently included in the term "lands, tenements or hereditaments."

Is it by accident or design, that no express provision is made for lands now held otherwise than in fee, as e.g. on leases for lives or long terms of years?

Is the term "belonging to" intended to include such interests? If so, it should be more unequivocally expressed.

Further, what is the object of requiring that the Lands should not only "belong to" the Bishop or his Church, but also that it should be "used, held, occupied, possessed or enjoyed" by him, or the Church as a condition of its vesting in the Episcopal Corporation.

I need hardly point out that if it was intended to enact that land heretofore only "occupied" or possessed by him, without a strictly legal title, or right of property should, by force of this Act, become vested in him in fee, such a provision would be wholly inadmissible.

It would almost seem, however, as if the framers of the Act had entertained some floating idea of this kind.

What is the meaning of "his Church?" Neither the Roman Catholic Church generally, nor the Diocese of Charlottetown in particular, are at present capable of having lands in Prince Edward Island "belonging to" them *eo nomine*.

What is meant by providing that the fee of "all Churches and Chapels now being erected, or to be hereafter erected," in his ("the Bishop's) Diocese" should by virtue of this Act be vested in the proposed Corporation?

The provision being without any qualification, would extend to all Churches and Chapels of whatever denomination, and on whatever land, public or private, they may be built. Of course this was not the intention of those who framed the Act. But what was the intention? This should be clearly ascertained, and, if unobjectionable, the clause so worded as to express it.

Lastly, the 5th clause provides that "nothing herein contained shall affect or be construed to affect in any manner or way, the rights of any person or persons whomsoever."

What the effect of this comprehensive saving may be on the previous provisions of the Bill, I confess myself unable to conjecture, but it alone would, (I imagine) furnish sufficient reason why those who are interested in the Act should not wish it to be brought into operation in its present shape.

I have, therefore, been unable to advise that Her Majesty's assent should be given to this Bill. But I wish it to be understood that I have no objection whatever to its principle, and I shall readily recommend for the Royal sanction an amended Act calculated to effect what I suppose to be the very proper object of those who have promoted the Bill—the object of enabling the Bishop to act in the easiest and most convenient way as Trustee for his own Church in Prince Edward Island.

I have the honor to acquaint you that the Act (copy of which was enclosed in your despatch, No. 59, of the 8th July) passed by the Legislature of Prince Edward Island in April last, intituled, No. 1077, Cap. XI., "An Act to provide for the organization of a Volunteer Force for the defence of this Island," has been referred for the consideration of the Military authorities, and that H. R. H. the Commander-in-Chief, has expressed his opinion with reference to the 4th clause of the Act, that the Cavalry would require more drill than the Infantry, and ought therefore to be called out, at least as often, viz:—eight days.

With respect to the 10th Section of the Act, it is the rule in this country, that Field Officers of the Regular and Militia Forces should always

be senior to Field Officers of Volunteers, or in other words, that a Major of the Regular Army should command a Volunteer Lieut. Colonel. But the seniority involving the relative precedence of Officers of Her Majesty's Regular Army and others, should not be defined by an Act of the Colonial Legislature, but should be left to be determined by Her Majesty.

The 10th Section of this Act should therefore be repealed.

With reference to your letter of the 24th ultimo, enclosing copy of an Act of the Legislature of Prince Edward Island, passed in the month of April last, entitled No. 1070 "An Act to incorporate the Gulf Express and Telegraph Company," I am directed by the Lords Commissioners of H. M's Treasury to acquaint you for the information of the Duke of Newcastle, that this Act does not clearly express what is the extent or object of the proposed monopoly of Telegraphic communication.

It would appear, however to extend to the line between Charlottetown and Summerside, and to the communication between the latter place and any Submarine Telegraph which is in direct communication with New Brunswick ; but it is not clear whether as regards the last communication the monopoly applies only to stations within 10 miles of Summerside or to stations at a greater distance.

It does not appear, whether the monopoly is such as would affect the internal communication of Prince Edward Island only, or whether it would or might also affect those to or from the Colony, or passing through or over it.

In the absence of precise information on these points, My Lords can only express their objections to all monopolies of this description, and as they are unable to form a satisfactory opinion, as to the way in which the interests of Prince Edward Island, or of other parts of the Empire may be affected by this Act of the Legislature, they would suggest to the Secretary of State the propriety of suspending the decision of the Crown upon it until further and

satisfactory information on these points shall been obtained.

4. The sharers in this monopoly are engaged in an enterprize highly beneficial to the public, but one from which they can expect no immediate return. It could not, therefore, be expected, that persons would be willing to incur the expense of an enterprize of this nature without either an exclusive privilege for a limited period, or a subsidy from the Local Government, which, in the present case, it would not seem desirable to grant.

5. The Company incorporated by the Act in question have recently completed the Telegraphic communication between Charlottetown and Summerside, anticipating no further difficulty, after the passing of this Act by the Local Legislature.

I have perused the Despatch of His Grace the Duke of Newcastle, No. 83, of date the 30th September last, also the letter from the Lords Commissioners of H. M's Treasury, of the date of the 20th of the same month, with reference to the Act 24th Vic. Cap. 4, entitled "An Act to incorporate the Gulf Express and Telegraph Company."

For the information of the Lords Commissioners of H. M's Treasury, I beg to state, that the Act was passed for the purpose of furthering an enterprise highly beneficial to the Public generally, but which did not promise immediate remunerative returns for capital invested.

It was the intention of the Legislature, that the monopoly of the contemplated line should extend to all Telegraphic communication between Summerside and Charlottetown in direct communication with New Brunswick, by means of a Submarine Telegraph, and also between Summerside and any other Office also in communication with the said Province by the means above mentioned.

The monopoly conferred by the Act under consideration was not intended to apply to any line, where station or office was distant more than ten miles from Summerside.

It is conceived that the monopoly would affect the internal communication between Charlottetown and Summerside, although such communication be unconnected by Submarine Telegraph with New Brunswick, but it would not, in my opinion, affect Telegraphic wires merely passing through, or over any part of the country, within ten miles of Summerside, provided no station connected with such line be established, within the prohibited distance for the purpose of transmitting messages, &c.

I may remark, that where it has been thought conducive to the public interests, as it was in this case. Monopolies of a similar character to the one created by this Act, have been allowed, such as Acts to encourage the establishment of

Ferries, &c.,— such encouragement being in the nature of a subsidy.

I also enclose a copy of a further proclamation, issued by Her Majesty on the 4th December, instant, prohibiting Arms, Ammunition, and Military Stores, (including Percussion Caps and Tubes) and also Lead, from being exported from the United Kingdom, or from being carried coastwise, together with a copy of an order in Council of the same date, prohibiting the exportation of the like Articles from the Channel Islands, and the Isle of Man.

If in the Colony under your Government there shall be no law in force to the effect of the provision granted in H. M's Proclamation from the Customs Consolidation Act of 1853, Her Majesty's Government are desirous that you should submit to your Legislature the propriety of passing such a law, in order that you may be in a position to prevent with promptitude the exportation of Arms and Military Stores, in case circumstances should render such a measure necessary.

A PROCLAMATION.

VICTORIA R.

WHEREAS in and by a certain Statute made and passed in the Parliament in

the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Our reign, and intituled "The Customs Consolidation Act, 1853," it is, amongst other things, declared and enacted as follows, that is to say:—

"The following Goods may, by Proclamation or Order in Council, be prohibited either to be exported or carried coastwise: Arms, Ammunition and Gunpowder, Military and Naval Stores, and any Articles which Her Majesty shall judge capable of being converted into, or made useful in increasing the quantity of Military or Naval Stores, Provisions, or any sort of Victual, which may be used as food by man; and if any Goods so prohibited shall be exported from the United Kingdom, or carried coastwise, or be water-borne to be so exported or carried, they shall be forfeited."

And whereas we have thought fit, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, to prohibit either to be exported or carried coastwise, the Articles hereinafter mentioned, (being Articles which We judge capable of being converted into, or made useful in increasing the quantity of Military or Naval Stores:) We, therefore, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, and by this Our Royal Proclamation, do order and direct that from and after the date hereof, all Gunpowder, Saltpetre, Nitrate of Soda and Brimstone shall be and the same are hereby prohibited either to be exported from the United Kingdom or carried coastwise.

A PROCLAMATION.

VICTORIA R.

WHEREAS in and by a certain Statute made and passed in the Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Our reign, and intituled "The Customs Consolidation Act, 1853," it is, amongst other things, declared and enacted as follows; that is to say:

"The following Goods may, by Proclamation or Order in Council, be prohibited either to be

exported or carried coastwise: Arms, Ammunition and Gunpowder, Military and Naval Stores, and any articles which Her Majesty shall judge capable of being converted into or made useful in increasing the quantity of Military or Naval Stores, provisions, or any sort of victual which may be used as food by man, and if any Goods so prohibited shall be exported from the United Kingdom or carried coastwise, or be waterborne to be so exported or carried, they shall be forfeited."

And whereas We have thought fit, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, to prohibit either to be exported or carried coastwise, the articles hereinafter mentioned; that is to say: Arms, Ammunition, and Military Stores, (including Percussion Caps and Tubes,) and also Lead, (being an article which We judge capable of being converted into or made useful in increasing the quantity of Military or Naval Stores,) We, therefore, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, and by this Our Royal Proclamation, do order and direct that, from and after the date hereof, all Arms, Ammunition, and Military Stores, (including Percussion Caps and Tubes,) and also Lead, shall be, and the same are hereby prohibited either to be exported from the United Kingdom, or carried coastwise.

Given at Our Court, at Windsor, this fourth day of December, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, and in the twenty-fifth of Our reign.

I have the honor to enclose for the consideration of your Excellency, and of your Constitutional advisers, a minute of the Executive Council of this Province, 23rd November, 1859, which was approved of by my predecessor Sir E. Head.

Upon the transmission of this document to England, exception was taken by the Board of Trade to the course proposed to be pursued. This led to a correspondence which extended over several months, and has caused the delay in bringing the matter before your notice.

Your Excellency will perceive by the last Despatch, No. 2, November 5, 1861, from the Colonial Office, that Her Majesty's Government have withdrawn their objection to the plan for the establishment of Free Commercial Intercourse between the different Provinces of British North America, and I shall be very glad to hear from you whether you think pro-

posals for the purpose from the Government of this Province would be favorably received by your advisers.

That it would also be important to ascertain, how far it might be practicable to assimilate the Tariffs of the several Provinces, so as to permit entire Free Trade between them, and he recommends that your Excellency be requested to communicate with the Lieutenant Governors of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Newfoundland and Prince Edward Island, for the purpose of ascertaining whether the Governments of those Provinces are prepared to unite with Canada, in recommending Legislation for the purpose of establishing the reciprocal free interchange of all productions and manufactures of the respective Provinces, and further to enquire how far it might be practicable to assimilate the Tariffs of the several Provinces so as to permit entire Free Trade between them.

The Committee concur in the recommendation of the Minister of Finance, and submit the same for your Excellency's approval.

Despatch from the Secretary of State to Lieut. Governor Dundas, relative to the Bill to change the Constitution of the Legislative Council.

Sir ;

The Bill "to change the Constitution of the Legislative Council, by rendering the same elective," which was transmitted in your Despatch, No. 64, of the 22nd July last, is of so much constitutional importance that I have been desirous to give it a very careful consideration, and I think that the consequent delay will not have been disadvantageous if it cause the question to be reconsidered in some of its details without any of that temporary excitement, which usually accompanies the first agitation of a question of this kind. Before proceeding to notice these details, I will shortly remark upon the objections to the Bill which have reached me.

I do not think it necessary to examine whether the institution of an Elective Chamber, which has been already sanctioned by Her Majesty in Canada, Victoria, South Australia and Tasmania, is adapted to the circumstances of Prince Edward Island. On this point I accept without hesitation the opinion of the Legislature, representing, I am bound to assume, that of the Colonists.

Nor do I think it in any way objectionable, but the contrary, that the Council should (as in the above mentioned Colonies) be incapable of being dissolved by the Governor. An Upper Chamber is valuable as an element of stability,

and the principal value of an Elective Upper Chamber I conceive to be this,—that while, in virtue of its elective character, it may claim equally with the Assembly to speak the voice of the community, it may yet be so composed as to reflect their settled wishes and principles rather than their transitory impulses. But this advantage would be wholly lost, if the whole body were chosen or could be removed under the influence of such an impulse.

The first of these dangers is obviated (or intended to be so) by providing, that half only of the Council shall be elected at one time. The second, by giving to each Councillor a fixed tenure of office, independent of any popular or governmental influence.

This independence may no doubt produce inconvenience. But to avoid those inconveniences by making the whole body subject to dissolution by the Governor, acting of course under pressure from the Lower Chamber, would frustrate the whole plan.

I do not think it at all necessary that the present Councillors should be allowed to retain their places in the newly constituted body.

In calling these gentlemen to the places which they now occupy, the Crown must not be considered as having conferred upon them a property, but as having invested them with a trust, which the Legislature may properly call on them to transfer to other hands, if in their opinion the public interest shall require such a transfer.

But though I do not attach any weight to the objections which have been urged against the principle or fundamental enactments of the Bill, I find some provisions which in my opinion

the Prince Edward Island Legislature will do well to reconsider.

To the first, and second clauses I have no objection.

The just distribution of the Members between the Electoral Districts is a matter of purely local cognizance. I can therefore express no opinion upon the propriety of the 3rd, 4th, 5th and 6th clauses.

The seventh, ninth and tenth clauses, (the 8th being one of mere form,) are those which call in my judgment for reconsideration.

In a popular Assembly the numbers, and the practical energy, and (as I have said) the immediate desires of the community find a ready expression. But an Upper Chamber is generally intended to represent not only the settled principles, and what on a large scale is called the traditional policy of the country; but also, to a certain extent, its property, experience and education. With this view, the British Colonies are unanimous in requiring that an elective Councillor shall be 30 years of age, and in requiring a property qualification, either from the candidate or from the elector, or from both. In South Australia and Tasmania, a tolerably high qualification is required from electors, but none whatever from the elected.

By the Prince Edward Island Act, on the contrary, (copying that of Canada,) the elector's qualification is the same as that for the Assembly. But the qualification of a candidate is one which will materially limit the choice of the constituencies. He must have resided in the Colony for five years. He must possess six hundred pounds (£600) sterling worth of land, and (what is most unduly restrictive,) his residence or his property qualification must be within the district for which he is elected.

Moreover, he will lose his seat if he lose his Property Qualification, (Sect. 13) i.e., if he exchanges his farm from one electoral district to another.

I entertain a strong opinion that these provisions are most injudicious, and that, in order to make a Council what it ought to be, the property qualification should be applied not to the candidate but to the voter.

Speaking broadly, a well chosen constituency will choose a good representative, and any limitation upon its choice can only operate by

occasionally preventing them from choosing the best. An ill-chosen constituency, on the contrary, will tend to choose an indifferent representative. But this tendency will not be controlled by any property qualification, which can never be so stringent as to prevent their finding within the prescribed limits some such man as they may desire.

And in the same way, if it is desired that the two chambers shall somewhat differ in character from each other, the one supplying what the other may be supposed in some degree to want, this object (it appears to me) can only be effected by creating two somewhat different constituencies, and unreservedly trusting each of them to elect that person, whatever his property or station, whom they may deem the most able and trustworthy representative of their views.

In Prince Edward Island, I would enforce a tolerably high property qualification in the case of the electors, but of the candidates I would only require that he should be a British subject, resident in the Colony, and 30 years of age.

It might, however, very properly be enacted, that protracted absence from the Colony or non-attendance at meetings of the Council might vacate a seat.

I also think it worth while to point out that the rotation clauses are less precisely drawn than is desirable in so important an enactment.

I annex some draft clauses, which appear to me to embody the intentions of the Legislature, and to define certain points on which any ambiguity must prove inconvenient.

On the remaining provisions of the Act I have no observations to make. I do not doubt that they have been carefully framed.

I wish you to communicate this Despatch to your Government, and (if you think it expedient) to the Legislature. They will, I am sure, perceive that the observations which it contains are not made in any spirit of antagonism, still less in order to serve any imperial or party interest, but with the sincere desire to bring to their aid the experience of the Home Government in the construction of a Legislature which may be at once popular and effective.

DRAFT CLAUSES IN SUBSTITUTION FOR CLAUSES
15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20.

The periodical election of a Member of Council for the Electoral District of Charlottetown shall take place every 8th year, and the periodical election of one Member for each of the other Electoral Districts shall take place every fourth year, dating from the first Election of the Council; and every such Election shall be made within days of the anniversary of the day on which this Act shall have come into operation.

In order to such periodical Election, one of the Members for each Electoral District, except that of Charlottetown, to be determined by lot during the first Session of the Council, shall be deemed to have been elected for four years, more or less, and all other Members of Council (except as hereinafter mentioned) shall be deemed to have been elected for eight years, more or less, from the date of his Election; provided that every such Member shall retain his seat until the Election of his successor.

Any Legislative Councillor may resign his seat by writing under his hand and seal, addressed to the Governor of the Colony.

In case any seat in the Council shall from any cause become vacant, more than three months before the same would have become vacant by periodical retirement, the President and several Members of the Council shall have the same powers and duties, in respect to the election of a new Member to supply such accidental vacancy, as the Speaker and several Members of the House of Assembly in respect to any accidental vacancy in that House.

Provided that the Writs for such Election shall be made returnable within 50 days at furthest from the issue thereof.

Provided also, that every such new Member shall vacate his seat in the Council at the time when it would have been vacated in course of periodical retirement by the Member whose place he occupies.

Letter of Commander Hancock, Surveying Service, &c.

CHARLOTTETOWN,
PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND,
March 6, 1862.

SIR ;—I beg respectfully to place before you the accompanying extract from a letter addressed to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, in November 1860, by Captain Orlebar, in consequence of the Admiral having called his attention to the fact of the Flag ship having grounded in her endeavour to enter this harbor, which was caused by the ignorance of the Pilot, and the wrong position of the Fitzroy Buoy—he writes :—

“ CHARLOTTETOWN, Nov. 16, 1860. .

“ I have further to request of your Excellency that the buoys on the Spithead and Fitzroy shoals should be Beacon Buoys, such as are here represented [] and that the moorings should be sufficiently heavy to ride out a gale, and that a more competent person than the present Harbor Master be entrusted with the laying them down. This summer

“ both the buoys had drifted from their places.”

I regret to state that on proceeding to sea last May, I found the buoys still without Beacons, and that of the Fitzroy half a mile out of its place. In June, a man named Creamer was appointed to replace it, and an officer of this Survey was sent previously to point out the exact spot. A few days after the Surveying Steamer on going out, found it as much out as ever, and finally weighed and put it in its proper position.

Should Admiral Milne contemplate a visit to this port this year, I feel sure that before doing so, or permitting any of the ships of the squadron, he will require us to notify him that such arrangements have been made by the authorities here as will prevent a recurrence of the risk run by H. M. S. “ Nile ” in 1860 ; and further I fear that unless this can be done, we must expect that the port of Charlottetown will be handed down to his successor, as one of those places not safe for the ships of the North

American squadron to visit. The small demand for Pilots here renders it unlikely that we could ensure the services of one thoroughly qualified to take charge of heavy ships. Hence the more special need to ensure the right placing of the buoys so as to make them agree with the Admiralty chart, and thus enable the matter to detect the ignorance of the pilot and prevent him from running his ship into danger.

I would, therefore, respectfully suggest: 1st, That the small Barrels at present used be replaced by Bacon buoys; 2d, The necessity of their being moored with efficient anchors and cables instead of the stones used at present, which when immersed in water, are from their

small specific gravity worthless as moorings, and to which may be probably attributed their constant disturbance.

I need scarcely add that the efficiency of the mooring is the great essential to be ensured, because without it all expense incurred to make the buoys conspicuous and place them properly will have been thrown away.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY IN COUNCIL:

The several charges in the subjoined bill of costs,—which I beg to submit for the consideration of Your Excellency in Council—arose from the following circumstance, *i. e.*—On the night of the Twenty-ninth of April last, some persons, unknown, entered the Barn of Alexander Frazer, Esquire, of South Lake, and stole two Fishing Boats therefrom, the same having been left by their owner in Mr. Fraser's care at the close of the last year's fishing season.

Some time subsequently, Mr. Frazer's suspicion became excited to the effect that the stolen Boats were secreted either in the woods or in some out-house in the vicinity of the North River, (a tributary of the South Lake.) Consequently, he procured a Search Warrant, and, with the aid of a constable and two assistant constables, proceeded to search the suspected locality. They discovered the Boats about half a mile apart, in the woods. The day being too nearly spent, however, when one of them was found, to admit of her being removed that evening, they employed two young men to guard her during the night lest they might be taken away or destroyed before morning.

When the Boats were brought back, I proceeded—at Mr. Frazer's request—to examine several witnesses, as to their identity, as well as with the view of obtaining some clue to the discovery of the offenders, but failed in the latter endeavor.

The Board of Health, for Georgetown, see no reason to alter or reduce any of the accounts furnished to the Government in the late Small Pox case as they have very carefully revised the accounts and charges placed before the Board, and also reduced them very materially from the amount furnished to them, viz : the Messengers and Nurses accounts.

The charge of 20s was to enable the person to leave this part of the Island and was advanced by Dr. Kaye for that purpose at the desire of the Board. The person having been absent from this some days returned again, and finding no person willing to admit him, the Board considered it prudent to pay his passage to Pictou.

The second Doctor's charges, the Board considers necessary as Doctor Kaye was absent at the time the case made its appearance.

The charge in favor of the Secretary for *old* services, as considered by the Government, was not the case, as it included a period of 12 years besides the present troublesome case to him.

The Board trusts the explanations now given are satisfactory to the Government.

I have also to state that the two children before alluded to, have quite recovered; and in obedience to the order of the Committee, all the bed and other clothes in the house have been washed, the whole interior of the house has been scrubbed, cleaned, fumigated and washed with lime and disinfecting fluid, the privy removed and the vault filled up.

I am therefore of opinion that there need not be any further restriction on Mr. Wheatley or his family going at large.

They have taken more trouble to detect smugglers than any others in this district, either salaried or otherwise, and certainly deserves some remuneration. It was not their fault that more seizures had not been made as they furnished a great deal of information. It was through them we made the seizure upon the American I mentioned to you some time ago; he had been selling round the coast and as he had carried a very large crew and kept a good look out we did not consider ourselves able to seize the Schr., Cantwell and Conway went on board, overhauled the vessel, and made a purchase which they landed at place agreed on and was seized before they had time to pay for the liquor.

Since then they have been engaged in trying to find out where a quantity of Liquor is concealed that was landed lately from two vessels from St. Pierre, Miquelon, between here and the East Point.

REPORT OF A ROAD, 9TH DISTRICT, PRINCE COUNTY.

I received instructions from your Excellency and Council, dated 13th June, 1861, requesting me to report the petition of Thomas Craige, John Waddle and others, praying for the opening a new Road on Township Nos. 27 and 28. And in conformity to my instructions, I proceeded forthwith to the aforesaid place, and have to report as follows:—

1st, That there has been a Line of Road opened across the East end of Patrick Quigley's Farm, the distance of 28 chains, and then along the North Line West about 6 chains; and about 25 chains of that distance is a very bad swamp which will have to be bridged or causewayed; probable cost not less than 30s. per chain. And further, it will be very expensive keeping such a Road in repairs. I find about 20 chains more cleared out along the edge of such swamp running North. The only difficulty I find in the way of having a Road on good dry land, and very easy made, as the most is cleared or burnt is Patrick Quigley's, who refuses to give a right of way across his farm, without he gets £20. All the other parties offer to give the road, and willing to contribute something to a new Road, as they have no way to get in or out but through this swamp.

I would, therefore, recommend that the Road be made on the Division Line between James Waddle's and Patrick Quigley's 28 chains, and thence on the angle 16 chains, and across all the farms marked on the annexed plan.* Such long angles in a Road is not desirable; but as it will not be much more than a private Road it might answer; and as it will save a good deal of expense to the Government is another consideration. And as regards the expense of opening the Line Road I have recommended will not be very great, as it might nearly all be made in two years with the Statute Labor. With the exception of about 20 chains of green woods on the North end, probably will cost about £12. And if you should send a Commission, I cannot see how they can allow Quigley more than £5; and unless the others do pay him for a right of way. And as regards the road commenced through the swamp, I certainly must say the £8 laid out on it has been misapplied, and the Statute Labor also; as I consider it will cost from £35 to £40 to make a good Road in such a place. Further, I omitted to state that, from the information of Wood's son, I understand he will give half of the Road along the distance of his land without compensation. All of which is respectfully submitted with plan annexed.*

SIR ;

I have the honor to enclose herewith an extract from a charge delivered to the Grand Jury at the recent term of the Supreme Court, in relation to the rapid increase of the crime of Larceny in Queen's County, within the last year, and to the urgent necessity for the inauguration of an effectual system of secondary punishments in this Colony, together with a copy of a reply from the Grand Jury, expressing the concurrence of that body in the observations made to them, and recommending the subject to the notice of the Government.

In transmitting these documents to your Excellency, I venture to express a hope that your Excellency's Government may be induced to give this most important matter its best and earliest consideration, with the view of giving practical efficacy to the suggestions and recommendations contained in them.

I take this opportunity also to enclose to your Excellency a copy of a presentment made by the Grand Jury, on the subject of nuisance in the City of Charlottetown ; and also, a copy of a presentment made by them relative to a construction put upon the License Act by the City authorities, which they believe to be contrary to the intention of the Legislature.

"The Criminal Calendar for this Term affords no other cause of congratulation than the fact that it contains no offence of greater magnitude than larceny.

"In the number of offences it very much exceeds the usual average of past years. It is made up of eleven cases of Larceny, and one for an assault upon a constable in the execution of his duty, twelve in all. And looking to the return sent up to this Court pursuant to the Statute, from the Police Court of this City, which shews that twenty-five convictions for Larceny took place in that Court during the past year, we have an aggregate of thirty-six Larcenies occurring in this county within twelve months.

"This change for the worse in so short a period is deeply to be lamented. Most of them are the first offences of the parties. An article of small value has been stolen, a first step taken in the path of crime ; and it now becomes matter for grave consideration whether viewing this state of things and the probability of the further increase of offences of this nature, consequent upon increasing population, the time has not arrived when effectual measures should be adopted as well for the classification of offenders of this description, as for affording means whereby a judicious system of secondary punishment may be established and carried out for the laudable end of reclaiming the youthful and least hardened, and restoring them again to that society from which possibly only one false step has degraded them.

"The classification and secondary punishment system has been adopted in the mother country, and in most of her colonies, experience having taught Governments and Legislatures that the indiscriminate association of felons is sure to result in the deeper contamination of the younger and least hardened, and has the effect of turning them loose upon society at the expiration of their sentences more hardened in vice, and criminal offenders for life.

"It is only just to the Legislature of this Colony to observe that this important subject has not been overlooked by it.

"There is an Act upon our Statute Book, (Cap. 12 Vict, 1849), which in itself may embody provisions sufficient to initiate and carry out the system more effectually than hitherto attempted. If not, it would be useful as a nucleus upon which to graft a more effectual system as well as a judiciously considered code of secondary punishments for all petty felonies and misdemeanours.

"Extended prison accommodation is undoubtedly what is most required. It must be apparent to the most casual observer that the County Jails in which debtors and criminals are now incarcerated are entirely inadequate for the purpose. Whether an enlargement of these Jails, or providing a building in some central situation, to be conducted in the nature of a Penitentiary, to which criminals from each county could be sent to undergo their punishment, would be the most advantageous, must—if these suggestions be at all entertained—remain for the consideration of those who possess

the power of remedying the evil. The latter plan seems to recommend itself not only as probably the most efficacious, but the one which, so long as our laws permit Imprisonment for Debt, every benevolent mind would prefer, in order to shield the unfortunate debtor from contact in the remotest degree with the criminal offender."

Said committee would further respectfully report that from the causes hereinbefore referred to, four of the inside abutments of the Princetown wharf have been moved from their foundation and will require to be rebuilt, and will probably require some new lumber and additional ballast, which is estimated to cost the sum of forty pounds if immediately sold, which we would earnestly recommend as the said Wharf will be wholly useless until such repairs are made. All of which is respectfully submitted.

Sir ;

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your Despatch, No. 3, of the 10th of January, requesting that you may be furnished with a copy of the Report of the Commissioners appointed to enquire into the Land Tenures of Prince Edward Island.

I have much pleasure in being able to comply with your request, and I forward to you a copy of the Report, with this Despatch. I am desirous, at the same time, to express my appreciation of the painstaking, able and impartial Report which the Commissioners have furnished,—a Report which must derive additional weight from its unanimity, and which is the result of an investigation so complete, that it has exhausted the materials for inquiry into the facts of the case. The difficulties that remain are those which are inherent in the subject, and which have for a long course of years, baffled every attempt at solution.

I fear that I cannot hold out to you the prospect of an Imperial guarantee to a loan of (£100,000) one hundred thousand pounds in order to buy up the Estates of Prince Edward Island from their present owners ; and on the other hand, there appear to me to be insuperable objections to that multiplicity of separate local arbitrations which would be the effect of the alternative measure alluded to in the Commissioners' Report. I shall be very glad if I shall find it possible, at a future opportunity, to offer any fresh suggestions for meeting the difficulties of the case ; but, in the meanwhile, I forward the Report, accompanied by the few foregoing general remarks, which are all that it is, at present, in my power to make, in order that you may be able to lay the document before the Legislature as soon as possible after its meeting.

REPORT

OF THE

COMMISSIONERS APPOINTED BY THE QUEEN

TO INQUIRE INTO

The Differences prevailing in PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND
relative to the RIGHTS of LANDOWNERS and TENANTS, with a view to
a Settlement of the same on fair and equitable Principles.

TO THE QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY,

YOUR MAJESTY, by Royal Commission, having appointed the undersigned to inquire into the differences prevailing in the Island of Prince Edward relative to the rights of landowners and tenants, with a view to a settlement of the same on fair and equitable principles, they have discharged the duties with which they were honored, and have unanimously agreed to submit to Your Majesty the following Report:—

In 1767 Prince Edward Island was divided into 67 Lots or townships, of about 20,000 acres each, and with the exception of three small reservations, intended for three county towns, and the two lots or townships, numbers 40 and 59, were disposed of in one day by lottery in London, before the Board of Trade and Plantations. In August 1767 grants were issued to the several allottees, and contained certain terms and conditions, which may be thus briefly classified:—

1st. The payment of a certain quitrent, varying according to the several lots, from 6s. to 2s. sterling per 100 acres, payable annually on one-half the grant, at the expiration of five years, on the whole at the expiration of ten years from the dates of the grants.

2ndly. A reservation of such parts of each lot as might afterwards be found necessary for fortifications or public purposes; and of 100 acres for a church and glebe, and 30 acres for a schoolmaster.

3rdly. A reservation in the grants of certain townships abutting upon the sea shore, of 500 feet from high-water mark, for the purposes of a free fishery. (A distinction in the terms of this reservation will be afterwards pointed out.)

4thly. A reservation of all mines of gold, silver and coals.

5thly. That the grantee of each township should settle the same within ten years from the date of the grant, in the proportion of one person for every 200 acres. That such settlers should be European foreign Protestants, or such persons as had resided in British America for two years previous to the date of the grant.

6thly. That if one-third of the land was not so settled within four years from the date of the grant, the whole should be forfeited.

On these terms the original proprietors accepted their grants, the Island at this time being within the Government of Nova Scotia. In the year following, 1768, the proprietors petitioned that the Island might be erected into a separate government, and proposed, in order to defray the expense thereof, that that half of the quitrents which would not be payable until five years after the date of the grant (namely in 1772), should become payable from 1st May 1769, and

the payment of the remaining half postponed for 20 years. This application was acceded to by His Majesty's Government, and, in 1770, the Local Government was organized accordingly. One of the first acts of the Legislature was the taking into consideration the nonperformance of the terms and stipulations of the grants.

During the ensuing five years the quitrents were not paid as stipulated.

During the first ten years the terms of settlement, with reference to population, were complied with only in ten townships (lots 18, 21, 28, 31, 34, 36, 52, 57, 58, and 59); nine others were partially settled, and 48 neglected; but in no case do the settlers appear to have been foreign Protestants. In 1776, it having become evident that a fund dependent upon the payment of the quitrents was entirely too precarious to maintain the local Government, His Majesty's Government, on the application of the proprietors, provided for the same in the Annual Estimates, commencing on the 1st January 1777. But the Lords of the Treasury at the same time directed that all proper means should be taken to enforce the payment of the arrears and the accruing quitrents.

The extent of compliance with the terms of settlement in the respective grants may be gathered from the following resolutions passed in the Assembly in 1797, 30 years after the grants were issued :—

“ 1st. Resolved, That it appears to this House, after having fully investigated with the strictest attention, the state of the lands in this Island, that lots or townships Nos. 1, 2, 3, 7, 8, 9, 10, 12, 15, 22, 29, 44, 45, 46, 51, 52, 53, 57, 58, 60, 62, 66, and 67, containing in the whole 458,580 acres, have not one settler resident thereon.”

“ 2ndly. Resolved, That lots or townships Nos. 4, 5, 6, 11, 23, 30, 31, 55, 61, 63, 64, and 65, containing together 243,000 acres, have only between them 36 families, which, upon an average of six persons to a family, amount to 216 persons residing thereon, and that these lots, together with those above enumerated, comprehend upwards of one-half of this Island.”

“ 3rdly. Resolved, That lots or townships Nos. 13, 14, 20, 25, 27, and 42, comprehending 120,000 acres, are settled respectively as follows; viz., No. 13 nine families, No. 14 eight families, No. 20 nine families, No. 25 nine families, No. 27 seven families, and No. 42 eight families, calculated at the foregoing average to consist of 300 persons.”

“ 4thly. Resolved, That the following townships are settled agreeably to the terms of the grants; viz., Nos 16, 17, 18, 19, 21, 24, 26, 28, 32, 33, 34, 35, 36, 37, 38, 39, 40, 41, 43, 47, 48, 49, 50, 54, 56, and 59.”

“ 5thly. Resolved, That it appears to this House that although the townships No. 7, half No. 12, No. 30, and No. 51 are not settled according to the terms and conditions of the grants, the proprietor, the Right Honourable James Montgomery, Lord Chief Baron of His Majesty's Court of Exchequer in Scotland, has been ever active in his exertions, and has expended large sums of money in the settlement of other lands in this Island. Also that the following persons, Mr. Edward Lewis and Mr. John Hill, proprietors of township No. 5, and the late partnership of John Cambridge and Company, proprietors of townships No. 63 and 64, have made different attempts to settle them, besides expending considerable sums of money thereon.”

These resolutions were, with others condemnatory of the indulgences extended to the proprietors for the nonperformance of the conditions in their grants, forwarded to His Majesty's Government, with a petition, praying that measures might be taken to compel the proprietors to fulfil the terms and conditions of the grants, or that the same might be escheated, and the lands regranted in small tracts to actual settlers.”

In 1802, (five years after), the subject of this petition was taken into consideration by the Committee of the Privy Council for Trade and Foreign Plantations, the quitrents at that time due amounted to 59,162*l.* sterling, and on some of the Townships, to more than their supposed value. His Majesty's Government, desirous of encouraging the further settlement of the Colony, determined to accept of a moderate commutation; and discriminating between the proprietors

who had exerted themselves to carry out the terms of their grants, and those who had not, divided the commutation into four classes.

1st. From such lots as appeared to have the full complement of settlers required by the grant, four years quitrent was only demanded, instead of 32 years (namely, from 1769 to 1801).

2nd. From such townships as appeared to have one-half the required population, five years arrears, in lieu of all dues up to May 1801 (32 years).

3rd. From such townships as had between one-fourth and one-half the stipulated population, nine years quitrents, in lieu of all to May 1801 (32 years).

4th. From those not appearing to have one-fourth the required population, 12 years quitrents, in lieu of all to May 1801 (32 years).

5th. From those that appeared waste and uninhabited, 15 years, in lieu of all arrears up to May 1801 (32 years.)

It does not appear that the commuted arrears were paid, and in 1803 the Legislature passed an Act for establishing a Court of Escheat. It was long supposed, and even before the Commission, it was contended that this Act contained no suspending clause; but an examination of the original records of the Colony, and of the correspondence of the Colonial Agent in England, shows that it did, and it also appears that the Royal assent was never forwarded to the Island.

In 1805, several resolutions were passed by the Assembly, of a very strong character, respecting the circumstances attending the Act; and a similar Act was introduced, and passed the Legislature, also containing a suspending clause. An Act was also passed for enforcing the due and regular payment of the quitrents. These two Acts do not appear to have received the Royal assent; and proceedings at law, which were commenced under them, were subsequently suspended.

The agitation on the subject of quitrents and escheat, for conditions broken in the original grants, appear to have been unceasing from that time to 1833, and the Journals are filled with resolutions, extracts from despatches, and reports of various kinds on the subject.

In 1831, the quitrents had been commuted in the provinces of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, and all arrears to that date given up. In 1830, an Act for imposing a tax on lands, and suspending the collection of quitrents during its continuance, was passed by the Island Legislature and received the Royal assent. That Act or one of a similar character, has been continued by various re-enactments down to the present time, a period of 30 years. In 1833, Lord Goderich, then Colonial Secretary, addressed a despatch to the Island, referring to the above-named Land Tax Act, and the stipulations as to quitrents therein contained, and extended to Prince Edward Island the same measure, with such adaptations as existing arrangements might require, which had been lately adopted in New Brunswick.

In July 1838, Lord Glenelg, in transmitting certain correspondence that had passed between Mr. George R. Young and his department, on the subject of the Land Tax Act, the commutation therein referred to, and the quitrents, enclosed the decision of the Lords of the Treasury, expressed in a communication from Mr. Spearman to Mr. Stephen, as a rule of guidance for the Lieutenant Governor in this matter.

No return of the amount of quitrents paid, appears ever to have been regularly kept in the Island; and the total sum shown to have been paid up to 1833 is not quite 6,000*l*. Whereas the amount payable by the term of the grants up to that time, irrespective of any intermediate commutation, would have been about 145,000*l*.

By arrangements made, early in the settlement of the Colony, the proprietors resident in England were at liberty to pay their quitrents in England. Of such payments no returns have been made, and on application of the Local Government, it was alleged that no record of such payments could be found in England.

In 1839, the question of "Fishery Reserves" began to assume importance, and became a prominent subject of discussion in the Local Legislature. In the Order in Council under which the original grants were issued, is the following provision:—

“ That in order to promote and encourage the fishery, for which many parts of this Island are conveniently situated, there be a clause in the grant of each township that abuts upon the sea shore, containing, a reservation of liberty to all His Majesty’s subjects in general, of carrying on a free fishery on the coasts of the said township, and of erecting stages and other necessary buildings for the said fishery within the distance of 500 feet from high-water mark.”

The reservation here contemplated was carried out strictly in the grants of 12 townships only, in the following words :—

“ Saving and reserving a free liberty to all His Majesty’s subjects of carrying on a free fishery or fisheries on any part or parts of the coast of said township, and of erecting stages and other necessary buildings for the said fishery or fisheries within the distance of 500 feet from high-water mark.”

In these 12 townships it would appear the Crown reserved an easement only.

In 32 townships the reservation is as follows :—

“ And further saving and reserving, for the disposal of His Majesty, his heirs and successors, 500 feet from high-water mark on the coast of the tract of land hereby granted to erect stages and other necessary buildings for carrying on the fishery.”

In these 32 townships, therefore, it would appear that the fee in the reserves never passed out of the Crown, and consequently never became vested in the grantees, or at their disposal.

Of the remaining 23 townships, 18 contain no “ fishery reservation,” and of five no grants whatever are on record.

In the Appendix to this Report will be found a return of the townships and grants, showing the reservations, taken from the Journals of the Assembly for 1839.

No practical exercise of the rights so reserved in the Crown is known to have been made, and the proprietors, or acting owners of the adjoining lands appear to have exercised the same ownership over the 500 feet reservations as they did over their undoubted property, building, clearing and improving, leasing to tenants, receiving rents, and paying upon the 500 feet reservation, and the granted land, taxes and quitrents without distinction.

Previous to 1814 it does not appear that any licence to carry on the fisheries on these reserves had been issued by the Government; but between 1814 and 1837 five were issued. Of any occupation or enjoyment or prosecution of the fisheries under these licences there is no evidence. In 1853 it appears that the Government again issued some few licences, but their right to do so was disputed by the parties in occupation of the reserves; and informations for intrusion, filed by the Attorney General to test the question, were allowed to languish some five or six years, and are still languishing without any final decision having been made.

The opinions of several of the most eminent law officers of the Crown, in England, have been at different times taken by the Legislature of the Island, declaring that the fee of the 500 feet reservation in the second class of the grants, and the right of the easement in the first class were in the Crown, and that in the Island there was no Statute of Limitations as against the Crown. The opinions of equally eminent counsel in England have also been given to some of the proprietors, and placed before the Commissioners, declaring on the other hand, that by the proper construction of the grants, even in those cases where the 500 feet are reserved for the disposal of His Majesty, the fee in the 500 feet nevertheless vested in the proprietors, subject only to a right of user by the Crown for the particular purposes specified.

In March 1834 the Assembly passed an address to His Majesty, referring to similar addresses transmitted in 1830 and 1832, praying that the lands reserved in the several grants for church and glebe purposes, and for schoolmasters, might be sold, and the proceeds appropriated exclusively for the purposes of education. To this address His Majesty’s assent was conveyed in the month of October, and in the following session of 1835, an Act was passed, “ to authorize the sale of Lands in the Island, reserved as “ Sites for Churches and for Glebe and School Lands.”

This Act recited the reservation in the original grants and His Majesty’s assent directing the

sales, and then proceeded to declare the mode in which such sales should be conducted, and the titles given. In October and November 1836, sales of these reserves were made under this Act, and due returns thereof laid before the Assembly by the Lieutenant Governor in February 1838. It does not appear that any objections to these proceedings were ever raised by the proprietors, or any person claiming under them; no preliminary steps by escheat or otherwise were deemed necessary, nor was any doubt raised by any party that the fee in such reservations had not remained in the Crown.

In 1783 a number of the proprietors signed and delivered to Lord North, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, the following paper, viz:—

“ We the undersigned proprietors of lands in the Colony of St. John, being informed that
 “ many of the Loyalists at New York prefer a settlement in that Island to one in Nova Scotia,
 “ and being very desirous of encouraging such a preference, and of affording an asylum to those
 “ deserving fellow-subjects, do engage for ourselves, or as attorneys for others, to grant as we
 “ hold of the Crown, and in the same proportions to each family as the other loyal emigrants
 “ receive in Nova Scotia, one-fourth of the quantity of lands placed opposite to our names,
 “ which they shall receive upon their arrival at Charlottetown, by application to the Governor
 “ and Council; and that they may receive the said lands in the fairest and most impartial
 “ manner, we will direct that the whole be divided by the Surveyor General into parcels of not
 “ less than 1,000 acres each, and drawn for by ballot before the Governor and Council. In
 “ consideration of the preference expressed by these loyal emigrants, and of the conditions
 “ offered by us, we have the fullest confidence that your Lordship will give instructions to the
 “ Commander-in-Chief of His Majesty's forces at New York, to furnish such loyalists as prefer
 “ a settlement in Saint John; with provisions and transports to carry them to Charlottetown,
 “ and every other necessary such as is given to those who go to Nova Scotia; and that your
 “ Lordship will also give such instructions to the Governor of Saint John as will place such
 “ emigrants in every respect on a similar footing with their brethren who settle in Nova Scotia.
 “ The undersigned are the more zealous in promoting this measure, as they are persuaded it
 “ will greatly advance the prosperity of an infant Colony, which, from its natural and relative
 “ situations is peculiarly adapted to become a permanent and valuable possession to Great
 “ Britain. And they confide in your Lordship's wisdom and equity that you will obtain for
 “ them such an abatement of quitrent as will place them on an equality with the neighboring
 “ colonies, and by that means remove a cause which may prevent many faithful subjects to this
 “ country from emigrating to that Island from the American States, and which has hitherto
 “ obstructed the settlement and prosperity of this Colony.”

viewed the question, and declared the final decision of Her Majesty's Government, that the lapse of time, being then over half a century, would prevent the Crown interfering to disturb the proprietors, or affect the presumptive titles acquired thereby. Subsequently to that despatch there does not appear to have been any action by the Legislature on the subject.

In 1851, Her Majesty, on the establishment of Responsible Government in the Island, and the passing of a Civil List Act, upon the terms and conditions pointed out by Her Majesty's Government, transferred to the Colony the revenues and territorial rights of the Crown. Whatever rights, therefore, the Crown at that time possessed over the proceeds of the casual and territorial revenues,—the quitrents, the Crown land funds, the Crown lands, and permanent revenues which had before accrued, or should thereafter accrue, became clearly vested in the Local Government, remaining, however, in the Queen's name as the constitutional head of the Empire.

Between 1851 and 1860 the Local Government purchased out the estates of two of the proprietors, under an Act passed by the Legislature, and are now owners of the Worrell and Selkirk estates, amounting to 140,000 acres, or thereabouts, as public or Crown lands.

The agitation upon the question of the land tenures still continuing, to the admitted disadvantage of the Island, and it having been deemed advisable by the Legislature that the different questions which had hitherto formed the subject of that agitation should be finally put at rest, and that a system should be devised by which the leasehold tenure of lands in the Island might be converted into freeholds, certain resolutions were passed by the Assembly, and subsequently embodied in an address to Her Majesty, which is as follows:—

“To the Queen's most Excellent Majesty.

“Most Gracious Sovereign;

“We, Your Majesty's loyal and devoted subjects, the House of Assembly of Prince Edward Island, in Parliament assembled, beg to approach Your Majesty, and most humbly submit for Your Royal consideration the following premises:—

“In certain despatches from one of Your Majesty's ministers, the Right Honourable Sir Edward Bulwer Lytton, Baronet, Secretary of State for the Colonies, dated Downing Street, 20th October and 3rd December, 1858, the Right Honourable Baronet therein states, that the whole question of the land tenures in this Island is engaging his most anxious attention, and that it would give him unfeigned pleasure to receive such suggestions for their amicable settlement as could be accepted by Your Majesty's Government.

“Having taken these despatches into consideration, after mature deliberation, and with an earnest design to terminate the disputes which have so long disturbed the peace and harmony of the Colony, the House have adopted the following resolutions:—

“Whereas certain questions arising out of the original grants of the lands in this Island, severally called the Escheat question, the Fishery reserve question, and the Quitrent question, have for many years caused much discussion, and difference of opinion amongst the people of this Island, and many delusive projects and impracticable measures have been and are from time to time enunciated respecting such questions, whereby the tenantry have been and are greatly imposed upon and induced to support the propounders of such measures, under the delusive hope that by doing so they will be relieved of the payment of rent; and the attention both of the people and Legislature being occupied with such deceptive schemes, measures intended to develop the resources of the Colony are not only neglected, but a state of society equally opposed to the moral, social, and political welfare of the people, and their true interests, is produced:— And whereas various despatches have for a great number of years declared that Her Majesty's Government will not consent to any compulsory interference with the laws and rights of the proprietors, and which has been strongly reiterated in the despatch of Sir Edward Bulwer Lytton, now Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for

“ the Colonies, dated 20th October 1858, and 3rd December 1858, from which it is clear that
“ any measures for the benefit of the tenantry must result from an amicable arrangement with
“ the proprietors : And whereas the agitation of hostile measures, such as escheat, fishery
“ reserves, and quitrents, must not only result as they always have done in leading the tenantry
“ into costs and trouble, without in any way ameliorating their condition, but will also engender
“ a feeling in the proprietors, rendering them disinclined to listen to proposals, which if such
“ agitation were at an end they would be likely to entertain : And whereas Sir Edward Bulwer
“ Lytton in his despatches above referred to, while refusing to sanction measures which in
“ England are considered inconsistent with the rights of property, has expressed the readiness
“ of Her Majesty’s Government to co-operate with the Legislature in furthering measures
“ for the settlement of the land tenures, if conceived in a spirit of fairness and conciliation to
“ all parties :

“ Therefore Resolved, 1st. That an humble address be presented to Her Majesty, praying that
“ Her Majesty will be pleased to direct a Commission to some discreet and impartial person
“ not connected with the Island or its affairs, to inquire into the existing relations between
“ landlord and tenant, and to negotiate with the proprietors for such abatement of present liabi-
“ lities, and for such terms for enabling the tenantry to convert their leaseholds into freeholds,
“ as, without infringing on the rights of the landlords, may be fairly and reasonably asked for
“ to ameliorate the condition of the tenantry.

“ 2nd. Resolved, That in the opinion of this House the basis of any such arrangement should
“ be a large remission of arrears of rents now due ; and secondly, the giving every tenant
“ holding under a long lease an option of purchasing his land at a certain rate, at any time he
“ might find it convenient to do so.

“ 3rd Resolved, That a remission of arrears of rent may be reasonably asked, inasmuch as
“ the existence of these arrears, although it is due partly to an unwillingness of the tenants to
“ pay rent, under the idea that escheat or some other delusive scheme would enable them to
“ evade ; yet it is also due in part to the laches and remissness of the landlords and their agents
“ in not enforcing it ; and because, in many cases, the arrears, however incurred, amount to so
“ large a sum that the exacting them would prove ruinous to a large number of loyal and
“ industrious people, and would further entirely put it out of their power to avail themselves
“ of the plan suggested in subsequent resolutions for purchasing their farms.

“ 4th. Resolved, That as the circumstances of the tenantry would not in general enable them
“ to pay down any large portion of the purchase money, the best and only means for converting
“ the tenures into freeholds lies in the adoption of the plan which would practically constitute
“ every farm a savings bank for its owner, in which he could from time to time invest his
“ savings at interest, towards the purchase of his farm, an arrangement which could be effected
“ by the following means, viz. : that the landlords should agree to permit the tenants to pur-
“ chase their farms for such sum per acre as shall be fixed upon ; and providing further, that
“ when any tenant (whose rent was paid up) should be desirous of paying any sum not being
“ less than ten pounds towards the purchase of his land, he should have the option of doing so,
“ and that the interest on the ten pounds, or other amount so paid, should thenceforth go in re-
“ duction of his yearly rent, and so on for every payment on account of purchase until the
“ whole was paid, when he should receive his deed, and that similar covenants should be in-
“ serted in all future leases for terms over 40 years ; such an arrangement would not only give
“ the tenant the advantage of paying an instalment of his purchase money, and at the same
“ time reducing his rent whenever he chose, without subjecting himself to the vexation and
“ costs incident to cases of inability to meet instalments agreed to be paid at a particular day,
“ but would in the opinion of this House gradually but certainly change the tenures into free-
“ holds, without the aid of loans and the expensive subsistence of public offices, by which heavy
“ liabilities have already been, and would, if persevered in to a much greater extent, be im-
“ posed on the public finances.

“ We do therefore humbly pray that Your Majesty will be pleased to take the foregoing
“ matters into Your Royal consideration, and to appoint some fit and proper person or persons
“ Commissioner or Commissioners, to inquire into the relations of landlord and tenant in this
“ Island, and negotiate with the proprietors of township lands for the fixing some certain rate
“ of price at which every tenant may at any time have the option of purchasing his land, or of
“ paying instalments of such purchase, and thereby gradually reducing the yearly rent until the

“ arrears of rent in such cases, and on such townships as the said Commissioner or Commis-

“ I HAVE to acknowledge Sir D. Daly's despatch, No. 29, of the 13th May last, addressed to
“ Sir E. B. Lytton, transmitting an address to Her Majesty from the House of Assembly, in
“ pursuance of certain resolutions of the House, praying that Her Majesty would direct a Com-
“ mission to inquire into the existing relations of landlord and tenant in the Island, with a view
“ to the passing of remedial measures. The House of Assembly also propose that this Com-
“ mission should direct its attention to the Fishery Reserve question.

“ The resignation of Her Majesty's late Government has prevented an earlier answer to your
“ despatch.

“ The Assembly, in their address, not only pray for the appointment of a Commission, but
“ they likewise indicate, in detail, the measures which, in their opinion, should form the basis
“ of that arrangement between landlord and tenant which the Commission should endeavor to
“ bring about. Now, without expressing any opinion adverse to the appointment of such a
“ Commission, I am convinced that any prospect of a beneficial result from its labours would be
“ nullified if its action were fettered by such conditions as the Assembly would thus impose.

“ I cannot advise Her Majesty to entertain the question, unless it is fully understood
“ that the Commission are at liberty to propose any measure which they may themselves deem
“ desirable.

“ which has been addressed to me by Sir Samuel Cunard, and several other proprietors of land

“ tions in dispute. It is further suggested that the expense of the Commission should be divided
“ equally between the Crown, the tenants, and the proprietors.

“ If the consent of all the parties can be obtained to this proposal, I believe that it may offer
“ the means of bringing these long-pending disputes to a determination. But it will be
“ necessary, before going further into the matter, to be assured that the tenants will accept, as
“ binding, the decision of the Commissioners, or the majority of them; and, as far as possible,
“ that the Legislature of the Colony would concur in any measures which might be required to
“ give validity to that decision. It would be very desirable also that any Commissioner who

“ WE have been furnished with a copy of a memorial, addressed to Her Majesty by the

“ We observe that the House of Assembly have suggested that Her Majesty should appoint

“ As large proprietors of land in this Island, we beg to state that we shall readily acquiesce

“ in any arrangement that may be practicable, for the purpose of settling the various questions
“ alluded to in the Memorial from the House of Assembly, but we do not think that the ap-
“ pointment of Commissioners in the manner proposed by them would be the most desirable
“ mode of procedure, as the labors of such Commission would only terminate in a report, which
“ would not be binding on any of the parties interested.

“ We therefore, beg to suggest, that instead of the mode proposed by the House of Assembly,
“ three Commissioners or Referees be appointed,—one to be named by Her Majesty, one by
“ the House of Assembly, and one by the proprietors of land,—and that these Commissioners
“ should have power to enter into all the inquiries that may be necessary, and to decide upon
“ the different questions which may be brought before them, giving, of course, to the parties
“ interested, an opportunity of being heard.

“ We should propose that the expense of the Commission should be borne by the three
“ parties to the reference, that is to say, in equal thirds; and we feel assured that there
“ will be no difficulty in securing the adhesion of all the landed proprietors to a settlement on

“ Island, this House do hereby name the Honourable Joseph Howe, of Nova Scotia, as referee

“ An Act to give effect to the Report of the Commissioners to be appointed on the Land
“ Question.

“ Passed 2nd May, 1860.

“ Whereas the lands of this Colony, shortly after it was ceded to Great Britain, were granted
“ by His late Majesty King George the Third, in large tracts generally containing twenty
“ thousand acres each, to divers British subjects and their heirs and assigns respectively in fee
“ simple ; and in the grants or patents by which the said tracts of land were so conveyed, there
“ were contained certain clauses and conditions respecting the time and manner of settling the
“ said lands, and also respecting certain quitrents therein reserved to His said Majesty and his
“ heirs, as well as certain reservations and rights intended for the benefit and encouragement
“ of persons engaged in carrying on the fisheries of this Island : And whereas at different
“ times since the issuing of the said grants, and often during the last thirty years the legal in-
“ terpretation and construction of the conditions and reservations contained in the said grants
“ respecting the settlement of the said lands, the right of enjoyment of the said fishery reserves,
“ and the payment of the said quitrents, have been much questioned, and have greatly occupied
“ and agitated the minds of large numbers of the inhabitants of this Colony : And whereas the
“ final settlement and adjustment of these questions, with a due regard to the rights of all
“ persons whomsoever interested therein, will conduce much towards the peace and contentment
“ of the inhabitants of this Island : And whereas on the 9th day of May in the year of our
“ Lord One thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, the House of Assembly of this Island agreed
“ to an Address to Her most Gracious Majesty the Queen, wherein it was prayed that Her
“ Majesty would be pleased to appoint some fit and proper person or persons as Commissioner
“ or Commissioners to inquire into the relations of landlord and tenant in this Island, and
“ negotiate with the proprietors of township lands for the fixing of some certain rate of price
“ at which every tenant might at any time have the option of purchasing his land, or of paying
“ instalments of such purchase, and thereby gradually reducing the yearly rent until the whole
“ price thereof be paid ; and also to negotiate with the respective proprietors for a remission of
“ the arrears of rent, in such cases and on such townships as the said Commissioner or Com-
“ missioners, from the circumstances of the tenantry or otherwise, might deem reasonable and
“ expedient ; and also to make such report respecting the Fishery Reserve question, and other
“ questions relating to the township lands of this Island, as the House of Assembly confidently
“ hoped would effect a final settlement thereof, and prevent all agitation regarding the same in
“ future ; which said address was duly forwarded to England and laid at the foot of the Throne :
“ And whereas by a despatch from his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, Her Majesty's Principal
“ Secretary of State for the Colonial Department, bearing date the 21st day of March last, and
“ addressed to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor of this Island, a copy of which has been
“ laid before the House of Assembly, his Grace, after referring to the prayer of the said ad-
“ dress of the House of Assembly, and also to a communication received by him from certain
“ proprietors of the herein-before mentioned lands on the subject of the said address, was
“ pleased to state as follows, namely :—They (the said proprietors) therefore, instead, suggest
“ that three Commissioners or Referees should be appointed, one by Her Majesty, one by the
“ House of Assembly, and the third by the proprietors, and that they should be invested with
“ power to hear and determine all the questions in dispute. It is further suggested, that the
“ expense of the Commission should be divided equally between the Crown, the tenants, and
“ the proprietors. If the consent of all the parties can be obtained to this proposal, I believe
“ that it may offer the means of bringing these long-pending disputes to a determination. But
“ it will be necessary, before going further into the matter, to be assured that the tenants will
“ accept as binding the decision of the Commissioners, or the majority of them ; and as far as

“ possible that the Legislature of the Colony would concur in any measures which might be
“ required to give validity to that : And whereas, in pursuance of the suggestions contained in
“ the said recited despatch, the House of Assembly, on the 30th day of April instant, passed
“ the following resolution, namely : Resolved, That this House deem it expedient to concur in
“ the suggestions offered for the consideration of the House of Assembly as set forth in the
“ despatch from his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, dated Downing Street, 21st day of March,
“ in the year of our Lord 1860, on the subject of the proposed appointment of a Commission of
“ inquiry for the arrangement of the long pending disputes between landlords and tenants of this
“ Island ; the House of Assembly therefore agree to the appointment of three Commissioners,
“ one by Her Majesty, one by the House of Assembly, and the third by the proprietors, the
“ expense of the Commission to be equally divided between the Imperial Government, the
“ general revenue of the Colony, and the proprietors ; the House of Assembly also agree, on
“ the part of the tenantry, to abide by the decision of the Commissioners, or the majority of

“ to that decision : And whereas, in order to maintain good faith with Her Majesty’s Imperial
“ Government, as well as with the herein-before mentioned proprietors of the said lands, and
“ all other persons interested therein, and for the purpose of rendering the report or award to
“ be made by the said Commissioners, or by the majority of them, final and conclusive upon all
“ parties to be affected thereby, and to bring to a final end and determination all and singular
“ the various differences, disputes and uncertainties which have heretofore arisen between Her
“ Majesty’s Government, the proprietors of the aforesaid township lands and the tenants thereon,
“ and all other persons interested in the settlement of the said lands, the right to and the use
“ of the said fishery reserves, and the exaction of the said quitrents, it is necessary that the
“ award or report to be made by the said Commissioners, or by any two of them, should have
“ an authoritative and binding force and operation.

“ 1. Be it therefore enacted by the Lieutenant Governor, Council and Assembly, that the
“ report or award, or one part thereof, to be made by the three Commissioners or Arbitrators,
“ or any two of them, to be nominated and appointed by the several parties respectively, and to
“ be authorized and empowered by Her Majesty, agreeably to or in conformity with the sugges-
“ tions contained in the herein-before recited despatch of his Grace the Duke of Newcastle,
“ when in all respects signed and completed by the said Commissioners, or any two of them,
“ shall be delivered to the Lieutenant Governor of this Island, who shall endorse thereon, under
“ his own hand and signature, a note of the day and year when received, and it shall thereafter
“ be registered at full length in the Office for the Registry of Deeds in this Island ; and the
“ original part thereof, after being duly registered, shall be filed and kept in the Office of the
“ Colonial Secretary of this Island.

“ 2. That the said award, when so completed and delivered to His Excellency the Lieutenant
“ Governor, shall be and be deemed and taken to be final and conclusive ; and the rights, in-
“ terests and estates of Her most Gracious Majesty the Queen, of, in, and to all the aforesaid
“ township lands, tenements, hereditaments, in so far as Her Majesty stands seised therein or
“ vested therewith on behalf of the Government or inhabitants of this Island, and so far as the
“ said rights, interests, and estates shall be submitted to the consideration and determination of
“ the said Commissioners ; and the rights, estates, rents, issues, and profits of such estates,
“ liberties, franchises, and interests of all and every person and persons whomsoever of, in, to,
“ out of, or concerning the said township lands, tenements and hereditaments, whether acquired
“ before or after the making of the said award or report, shall be and become subject to, charged
“ and chargeable with, and bound by the award or report of the said Commissioners, or any two
“ of them, in such manner, and to such extent, and for such time, as shall in the said award
“ or report be awarded, ordered, or required.

“ 3. Every person whomsoever, whose estate, property, or interest shall in any manner be or
“ become affected by the said award or report, shall and may be at liberty to plead the same
“ in any Court of law or equity in this Island ; and every such Court shall admit and allow to

“every such person the full force and effect of the said award or report according to the true intent, meaning, and operation thereof.

“4. In case of the death, resignation, or incapacity of all or any of the said Commissioners so to be appointed, before the final making of such award, a new Commissioner or Commissioners shall be nominated and appointed by the same party or parties respectively who had appointed the Commissioner or Commissioners so dying, resigning, or becoming incapacitated.

“5. In case of any new appointment being required to be made under the above section in lieu of the Commissioner appointed by the House of Assembly, at any time when the Legislature shall not be in session, such appointment shall be made by the Lieutenant Governor in Council; and in case of any new appointment being required to be made thereunder in lieu of the Commissioner to be nominated by the said proprietors of the said lands, and such new appointment shall not be made, accepted, and duly notified in writing to the Government of this Island within four months next after a requisition for that purpose, made in writing, and signed by the Lieutenant Governor of this Island in Council, shall be published in the Royal Gazette of this Island, then it shall be lawful for the said Lieutenant Governor in Council, or the House of Assembly of this Island, if then in session, to nominate and appoint some fit and proper person as a new Commissioner on behalf of the said proprietors of the said lands.

“6. Every new Commissioner so appointed shall be invested with and may exercise the like powers as shall have been or were intended to be exercised by his predecessor.

“7. It shall be lawful for his Excellency the Lieutenant Governor in Council, by warrant under his hand and seal, to order to be paid out of the Public Treasury of this Island one-third of what shall be deemed a reasonable remuneration for the services of the said Commissioners, with one third part of the necessary expenses attending the said Commission; the said third part of the said remuneration to be paid to the Commissioner appointed by the House of Assembly, on behalf of the tenantry of this Island.

“Nothing in this Act contained shall have any force or effect until Her Majesty's pleasure therein shall be known.”

These resolutions and notice of the Act having been transmitted by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor to his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, the following despatch was sent to the Lieutenant Governor:—

“ No. 23.

“ SIR,

“ Downing Street, 16th June, 1860.

“I have had under my consideration your despatches, No. 15, of the 16th of April, and No. 22, of the 30th April. In the former despatch you enclose a resolution, in which the Assembly agrees to the proposed appointment of Commissioners on the subject of tenures of lands, binds itself to abide by the decision of those Commissioners, or the majority of them, and pledges itself to concur in whatever measures may be required to give validity to that decision. In the second despatch you inform me, that a short Act has since passed through both Houses, giving effect to the foregoing resolution.

“I cannot do otherwise than express my sense of the promptitude and completeness with which the House of Assembly has thus given its support to the plan devised, in the hope of putting an end to the differences which have prevailed in Prince Edward Island.

“In Mr. Howe, the Assembly acting on behalf of the tenantry, have selected a Commissioner whose known ability and prominent public position must well qualify him for the proposed inquiry.

“From Sir Samuel Cunard I have received a letter, of which a copy is enclosed, naming as the Commissioner selected by the proprietors, Mr. John William Ritchie, of Halifax, who I doubt not, will honorably discharge his functions.

“I have written, in exercise of the choice belonging to Her Majesty's Government, to request

“ Mr. John Hamilton Gray, of New Brunswick, to undertake the remaining office of Commissioner. Mr. Gray has recently conducted another public inquiry, with a degree of ability, carefulness, and justice, which fully entitles him to the confidence of all concerned in the intended investigation.

“ Although the privilege of selecting each Commissioner has been conferred on a separate authority, so as the better to ensure satisfaction with the composition of the Commission, yet it is my view, and I doubt not will be that of the Commissioners themselves, that none of them ought to be regarded as the special advocate of one interest, but rather that the whole should devote their efforts to framing such recommendations as shall be demanded by the equity of the case, and be conducive to the general good of all classes of the community. Their conclusions, whatever they may be, will possess double weight, if happily they should be unanimous.

“ The time of meeting in Prince Edward Island will be best determined by the Commissioners themselves, who will be able to communicate with you upon any points which they may wish to ascertain, as bearing on the subject of the most convenient period for the purpose.

“ It will be desirable that previous arrangements should be made, as far as practicable, for having at hand all the witnesses and all documentary evidence which the Commission is likely to require, so that the time needed for their actual sitting in the Island, may be reduced within the most moderate compass consistent with the due and complete accomplishment of the inquiry.

“ I shall take an early opportunity of forwarding to you a Commission under the Royal Sign Manual, containing the appointment of the several gentlemen named to serve on the Commission.

On the 25th of June Her Majesty was pleased to issue the following Commission:—

(L. S.) “ VICTORIA R.

“ VICTORIA, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith. To all to whom these Presents shall come, greeting.

“ Whereas We have been moved by the Assembly of Our Island of Prince Edward, to appoint Commissioners to inquire into the differences now prevailing in Our said Island, relating to the rights of landowners and tenants in Our said Island, with a view to the settlement of the same on just and equitable principles: “ And whereas the said Assembly has further, by a resolution dated the 14th day of April last, set forth its agreement to abide by the decision of any such Commissioners, or the majority of them, and to concur in whatever measures may be requisite for giving validity to their decision: And whereas it is highly desirable that the said differences should be adjusted:

“ Now know ye, that We, taking the premises into Our Royal consideration, are graciously pleased to nominate and appoint, and do by these presents nominate and appoint, Our trusty and well-beloved John Hamilton Gray, Esquire, Our trusty and well-beloved Joseph Howe, Esquire, and Our trusty and well-beloved John William Ritchie, Esquire, to be Our Commissioners for inquiring into the said differences, and for adjusting the same on fair and equitable principles.

“ Given at Our Court at Buckingham Palace, this 25th day of June, 1860, in the 24th year of Our Reign.

“ By Her Majesty’s command,

“(Signed) NEWCASTLE.”

By virtue of this Commission, the undersigned Commissioners proceeded to the Island in the month of August, and after some preliminary investigation and examination of public documents, opened a Public Court of Inquiry, in Charlottetown, on the 5th September, pursuant

APPENDIX (O.)

to Proclamation in the Royal Gazette. This Court was held in the hall of the General Assembly, and was opened to the public.

The members of the Local Parliament, and persons of permanent public standing, were invited to attend by special circular, and all others in any other way interested in the questions submitted for consideration, or in the general welfare of the Island, were also invited by notification in the public newspapers.

This Court was held with continuous sittings from the 5th of September to the 1st of October, either in Charlottetown or the two other shire towns of the counties into which the Island is divided.

The Local Government and tenantry of the Island, and the proprietors whose names are subjoined to the memorandum forwarded by the Duke of Newcastle to the Lieutenant Governor, were ably represented by counsel of eminence and distinction. The members of Government and of Parliament, and public men of all shades of politics, attended and were heard. Numerous delegations, presenting memorials from the various districts which they were selected at public meetings to represent, tenants, proprietors, and agents also attended, made their statements, were heard, examined and cross-examined in open Court, by the counsel, and all means of exhausting the sources of information were adopted. On the 1st of October the Commissioners adjourned their sittings to Halifax in the month of December following, whither in the mean time the Journals of the House of Assembly and copies of other public documents were to be sent.

On the 29th of December the undersigned met at Halifax, and continued their investigations until the 12th of January, when they were compelled to adjourn on account of other important public business requiring their attention.

During the sitting of the Court in Charlottetown protests against being affected by the proceedings of the Commission were made by Mr. Charles Wright and Mr. Robert Bruce Stewart, representing themselves as proprietors of townships or parts of townships, and at Halifax a similar protest was received from the Honourable Lady Cicely Jane Georgiana Fane.

In the month of February (1861) the following despatch was transmitted by his Grace the Duke of Newcastle to the Lieutenant Governor of the Island, and laid before the Legislature :—

“ No. 45.

“ SIR,

“ Downing Street, 2nd January, 1861.

“ I have had under my consideration the two Acts passed by the Legislature of Prince Edward Island, and enclosed in your despatch No. 56, of the 1st of October last, entitled No. 1025, ‘ An Act to authorize Grants of the Shores of this Island,’ and No. 1026, ‘ An Act to give effect to the Report of the Commissioners to be appointed on the Land Question.’

“ I feel some doubt as to the object with which the first of these Acts was passed ; I do not see what lands it will affect, at least above high-water mark, unless it was to operate on the fishery reserves.

“ At the same time as the treatment of those reserves was a question on which Her Majesty’s Government have expressed a decided opinion, and which at the instance of the Prince Edward Island Legislature, is now under reference to the recently appointed Commission, I can hardly imagine that the Legislature would have passed an Act calculated to anticipate the judgment of their own referees, or that you would have submitted it for Her Majesty’s confirmation without any notice of its intended effect.

“ I have therefore to request that you will furnish me with information on the following points :—

“ 1. Whether there is in the Island any land above high-water mark upon which the Act would operate, except the fishery reserves ; and if so, what, in general terms, may be supposed to be its extent.

“ 2. Whether it is intended or supposed that the operation of the Act would be confined to

“ those lands, if any, and to the land below high-water mark, or whether the Act was intended
“ to apply to some or all of the fishery reserves.

“ 3. What are understood to be the present powers of the Crown respecting shore lands, not
“ comprised in those reserves, and what the additional powers which it is intended to confer in
“ respect of those lands by the proposed law.

“ 4. What effect, if any, the Act is intended to have upon the fishery reserves.

“ 5. And lastly, whether there is in the present circumstances of the Island any ground for
“ expecting that ‘ commercial enterprize ’ will be much encouraged (as stated in the preamble
“ of the Act) by making such grants on the sea-shore as would be authorized by the proposed
“ Act, and would not be authorized without it.

“ I must add, however, that whatever answer may be furnished to these questions, I cannot
“ advise the Queen to assent to the Act while the subject on which it legislates is under the
“ consideration of the Commissioners.”

“ With regard to the Act for giving effect to the award of the Commissioners, I gladly
“ acknowledge the promptitude with which the Provincial Legislature has hastened to give
“ effect to what they supposed to be the desire of Her Majesty’s Government, conveyed in my
“ despatch of the 21st of March last, and I very much regret that an apparent misconception of
“ my meaning has led the Legislature to pass a law which appears to be premature.

“ My object was not to require immediate legislation for the purpose of giving prospective
“ effect to the award of the Commissioners, but only to obtain from the House of Assembly as;
“ representing the whole body of the tenants, an unequivocal acceptance of the proposed re-
“ ference, and from the Legislature a pledge that the laws necessary to give effect to the Com-
“ missioners’ award should be passed when it appeared what legislation would be necessary for
“ that purpose.

“ But the present Act, or any other Act which could be passed at the present moment, might
“ in the event, prove either too sweeping or too limited for that object. It would be too sweep-
“ ing if it were found that the referees promulgated decisions respecting lands belonging to
“ persons who have not consented to the reference, or if they made awards respecting questions
“ (like that of escheat) which did not fall within the scope of their inquiry.

“ It would be too limited, or at least inadequate for its purpose, if it failed to make such
“ provisions of detail as were necessary to give practical effect to the general principles laid
“ down by the Commissioners.

“ For these reasons it appears to me impossible to advise Her Majesty to assent, at the
“ present moment, to any such general law as that which has now been forwarded ; nor do I
“ see that any present legislation could be valuable, except such as may be based upon sug-
“ gestions to be made by the Commission, with a view of defining the persons and questions to
“ which their inquiry was to extend, or of conferring on them the powers (like those of com-
“ pelling the attendance of witnesses and of examining on oath) which are requisite to enable
“ them to carry on their inquiries to the satisfaction of all concerned.

“ I trust you will impress upon the Commissioners (if requisite) the necessity of avoiding as
“ far as possible any steps calculated to excite unreasonable expectations, or to stimulate
“ agitation ; on the other hand, while assuring the proprietors that the award of the Commis-
“ sioners will not be enforced by Her Majesty’s Government against any persons who have not,
“ either personally or by their representatives, consented to refer their claims to arbitration, I should
“ wish you also to observe to them, that their refusal to concur frankly in a measure which was
“ intended to compose existing differences, and which, so far as it has yet proceeded, has been
“ assented to by a large portion of their body, may materially influence the conduct of Her
“ Majesty’s Government, if called upon hereafter to support them in any future disputes with
“ their tenants.

“ I have, &c.,

On the 14th of June following, the undersigned Commissioners again met by appointment at Rothsay, in the Province of New Brunswick.

They trust that they entered upon the discharge of the duties assigned to them not only with a high appreciation of the honour conferred by their appointment, but with a due sense of the grave responsibilities which they assumed. When they commenced their labours, there was a general impression that the Act of the Provincial Legislature, which made their award binding on all parties concerned, would receive the Royal assent; and although the decision of his Grace the Colonial Secretary, not to submit that Act for Her Majesty's approval, somewhat relieved them from the weight of responsibility necessarily involved in the preparation and delivery of a judgment beyond appeal, they still felt that as their award was to affect the titles of a million of acres, and the rights and interests of 80,000 people, a hasty decision would not be a wise one, and that the materials for a judgment ought to be exhausted before their report was made.

By traversing the Island, and mixing freely with its people, the undersigned have become familiar with its great interests and general aspects. By holding an open Court, in all the shire towns, they have given to every man on the Island, however poor, an opportunity to explain his grievances, if he had any. By bringing the proprietors and tenants face to face before an independent tribunal, mutual misunderstandings and exaggerated statements have been tested and explained; and the real condition of society and the evils of the leasehold system have been carefully contemplated from points of view not often reached by those whose interests were involved in the controversy. The evidence collected, though not under oath (the Commissioners not being clothed with power to administer oaths), was most valuable in aiding them to form a correct estimate of the evils of which the people complained.

The documentary history of the questions submitted is too voluminous to append to this report; it covers nearly a century of time, and is to be found in the journals of the Legislature, in the newspaper files of the Colony, and in pamphlets more or less numerous, which the animation of party spirit invests with a certain degree of interest, and which it was necessary to read, in order that the points on which from time to time the controversy turned, should be understood.

From the issuing of the grants in 1767 down to the present time, every Secretary of State for the Colonies, and every Governor, has been perplexed by the questions arising out of that ill-advised exercise of the Royal prerogative.

The amount of money and time wasted in public controversy, no man can estimate; and the extent to which a vicious system of colonization has entered into the daily life of this people, and embittered their industrial and social relations, it is painful to contemplate and record.

The past is beyond remedy; but the undersigned have felt that if tranquility and mutual cooperation among its people could be hereafter secured to the Island, such a consummation could only result from a searching review of all the questions which there touch the tenures of the land.

The undersigned have also felt that as the case of Prince Edward Island was exceptional, so must be the treatment. The application of the Local Government for a Commission, and the large powers given to it by the Queen's authority, presupposed the necessity of a departure from the ordinary legal modes of settling disputes between landlords and tenants, which the experience of half a century had proved to be inadequate.

Finding, therefore, that it was impossible to shut out of their inquiry while on the Island, the questions of escheat, quitrents, the fishery reserves, the claims of the descendants of the original French inhabitants, Indians, and loyalists, they have thought it quite within the range of their obligations to express their opinions freely upon those branches of the general subject.

The question of escheat, though apparently withdrawn from the scope of their inquiry by the despatch of his Grace the Colonial Minister, received long after the opening of the Commission, the undersigned could not put aside. The discussion of this question was forced upon them

from the day the Court opened until it closed. Many public men referred to it, and either as a remedy or a source of apprehension, escheat has been urged or resisted in a very large proportion of the documents laid before them.

To pass over escheat was as impossible as it would seem to be impolitic. Upon no branch of the general subject has more gross ignorance and misapprehension prevailed; and were it omitted, controversy would spring up with increased virulence in all quarters. The silence of the Commissioners upon this all engrossing topic would be regarded with suspicion, and might render nugatory their efforts to balance the interests involved, and to calm the public mind.

The undersigned have therefore thought it to comport with the duty they owed to all parties, to express the conclusions at which they arrived even upon this question.

For simplicity of arrangement it is desirable to consider the different subjects under separate heads.

LANDLORD AND TENANT.

The best mode of quieting the Disputes between the Proprietors and their Tenants, and of converting the Leasehold into Freehold Tenures.

IN approaching this, the most important branch of the subject referred to them, the undersigned feel the grave responsibility of the task imposed. Perhaps no three men in British America were ever called to arbitrate upon interests of the same magnitude, or questions of greater delicacy affecting the welfare of large numbers of people. If a judge or a juror about to decide the title to a single estate, feels the responsibility of his position, the undersigned may be pardoned for admitting that with hundreds of estates, and the interests of many thousands of persons, dependent upon their adjudication, they have only been sustained by a very sincere desire to restore peace to a disturbed province, and by the conviction that the high duties imposed by Her Majesty's Government, and by their fellow subjects, could not honourably be put aside.

The impatience with which their award has been looked for, if not demanded, has been a source of anxiety. Her Majesty's Government, in appointing the Commission, evidently undervalued the difficulties of the task imposed. His Grace the Colonial Secretary had been led to believe that the evidence had been collected at Charlottetown, and that the case was ripe for decision. He had been misinformed. No case had been prepared, no evidence had been collected upon which any arbitrator could have fairly decided the value of an acre of land, or on the interests of the poorest man in the Empire. It was apparent, on the arrival of the Commissioners, that the materials for a judgment must be extracted, first, from the people themselves, examined and cross examined in presence of each other, in each important section of the Island; and next, from the public documents, to be sought for as their importance became apparent. Of these not even a list had been prepared, and they had to be gathered and collated, often with much difficulty and no little loss of time. Besides the conflicting statements made by landlords and tenants, as to the value of lands in all parts of the Island, the existence of barren tracts of large extent, the smallness of the timber, the difficulty of raising grass even on the best lands, the causes of emigration, and of the poverty and squalid appearance of the people, too apparent on some of the estates, rendered it very desirable, if not imperative upon the Commissioners, to test these conflicting statements, through the independent agency of a person of large experience, having no connexions in the Island, and whose mission would hardly be suspected till his work was done. In this service a competent person has been employed for several months, and has, acting under instructions from the Commissioners, prepared a series

of statements and comparative tables, without which they should scarcely have felt that the subject had been exhausted, or that the elements of a just decision were in their hands.

The opposition of some of the proprietors who had not become parties to the arbitration, and who seemed to regard the Commissioners as intruders upon their property, and willing violators of their rights, was apparent. These persons appeared to forget that the Commissioners did not seek the duties imposed upon them, that they had no personal interests in the inquiry, that the grievances of Prince Edward Island grew out of no neglect of theirs. These persons appeared also to forget, that, though the rights of property have ever been sacredly guarded by the law, whenever the possession or abuse of property becomes prejudicial to the public interests, the rights and prejudices of individuals can be constitutionally controlled for the public good. The protesting proprietors of Prince Edward Island have no better titles to their properties than had the Seigneurs of Canada, the owners of the encumbered estates in Ireland, or the slave-holders in the West Indies. They have none so good, because every acre they own is held by the generous forbearance of the British Government, after breach of conditions over and over again. Were these people, in view of the distracted condition of the Colony, dealt with by specific legislation, or were they now compelled to accept the conditions of this award, they would only be treated as large classes of their fellow subjects have been, under the pressure of similar exigencies, and, for the reasons stated, would have but little right to complain.

Looking back at the origin of these unhappy disputes, it is apparent that the granting of a whole Colony in a single day, in huge blocks of 20,000 acres each, was an improvident and unwise exercise of the prerogative of the Crown. Had the proprietors, however, formed themselves into an Emigration Society, and commenced the colonization of the Island, on a rational plan for their mutual advantage, there is every reason to believe that with the surplus population of the British Islands to draw upon, they might have fully peopled Prince Edward Island in a few years. But there was no plan, and no co-operative movement among the grantees. Some of them early entered upon the duties of colonization in a spirit of judicious enterprize, and with a liberal expenditure; but others did little, and that little often unwisely, while the majority did nothing. The emigrants sent out by the few were disheartened by the surrounding wilderness owned by the many, who made no effort to reclaim it, or were tempted to roam about or disregard the terms of settlement, by the quantity of wild land with no visible owner to guard it from intrusion. By mutual co-operation and a common policy, the proprietors might have redeemed the grants of the Imperial Government from the charge of improvidence. The want of these indispensable elements of success laid the foundation of all the grievances which subsequently afflicted the Colony.

The separation of the Island from the Government of Nova Scotia, on the pledge of the proprietors to provide by the payment of their quitrents for the expenses of its civil government, was another grave Imperial mistake. Had the Island been permitted to remain part of the larger Colony; its interests would have been controlled by independent legislation, and the impolicy of the grants would have long since been corrected by the Court of Escheat which has always been effective in that province. This error entailed upon the British Government a heavy annual expenditure, and deprived the Island of the remedies which would have been applied to its grievances in the ordinary course of events. When a separate government was established, a Court of Escheat was the simple corrective, and the proprietors could not have complained had the forfeiture of their grants followed upon the flagrant breach of the conditions, and their utter failure to provide for the expenses of the civil government.

It is apparent, then, that the proprietors, down to the present hour, have been treated by the Crown with an excessive indulgence, which warrants the exercise of the prerogative in the application of remedial measures, after a century's experience of a vicious system, and it is equally apparent that all the proprietors ought cheerfully to acquiesce in any rational plan for quieting titles, restoring harmony, and promoting the future prosperity of the Island.

The most simple remedy for the evils which actually exist at the present time, would seem

to be suggested by the operation of the Land Purchase Act, so far as the Commissioners have been able to estimate the results of its operation. Under that Act the Worrell and Selkirk estates have been purchased, covering 140,000 acres. No injustice has been done to the proprietors, who have cheerfully accepted the sums offered by the Government. They have been promptly paid, and at once relieved from all uncertainty as to the future, from the risk of unpaid rents and the heavy expenses of management and collection. The estates thus purchased *en bloc*, have been bought at prices so low, that the Government has been enabled to re-sell the lands in fee, at such an advance as not only meets the outlay, but all the expenses of management and distribution. By this system, it is apparent that three signal advantages are secured, that are not presented by any other.

1st. The proprietors are dispossessed by their own consent.

2ndly. The tenants are enabled to purchase their holdings and improvements, not necessarily at a price so high as to represent the rents stipulated to be paid, but at the lowest price which the expenses of management, added to the aggregate cost of the estate, will warrant.

3rdly. The wild lands are at once rescued from the operation of the leasehold system and are subjected to the wholesome control of the Local Government, to be hereafter disposed of in fee simple, at moderate prices, as they are in all the other North American provinces.

After mature consideration of the subject, in all its bearings, the undersigned have unanimously agreed to recommend the application to the whole Island of the principles embodied in the Land Purchase Act, under certain guards and modifications which would appear to be essential to their more extended adoption.

It is clear that the local Government cannot generally apply the principles of the Land Purchase Act, without the assistance of the Imperial Parliament. To complete the purchases already made their resources have been strained; and even if the money paid could be at once collected, the Government could only purchase two other estates at one time, so that many years must elapse before any large measure of relief could be given to the great body of the tenantry, whose complaints have led to this inquiry.

But if the Imperial Parliament would guarantee a loan of £100,000 sterling the money could be borrowed at a very low rate of interest. The Imperial Government would run no risk, because the annual interest, and such a sinking fund as would extinguish the debt in 21 years, could be secured by a permanent Act, and made a first charge upon the general revenues of the Island, and upon the fund arising from the sale of the estates purchased with the money borrowed. The security would be ample, and a slight re-adjustment of the tariff would enable the Local Government to meet the expenditure with ease. The capitalists and people of the Island should be encouraged to purchase the debentures, that as small a portion as possible of the interest might be remitted abroad. With the command of such a fund as this, the Government would be in a condition to enter the market, and to purchase from time to time such estates as could be obtained at reasonable prices. There is no doubt that many of the proprietors would be glad to sell, and the competition for the funds at the disposal of the Government would so adjust the prices, that judicious purchases could be made, without any arbitrary proceedings or compulsory interference with private rights.

Taking the prices paid for the Worrell and Selkirk estates as the basis of a calculation, (and though one of them was of an inferior description, the other was confessedly one of the best in the Island), it is apparent that £100,000 would purchase, at 2s. 6d. an acre, 800,000 acres. By the census of 1855, 308,013 acres were then held in freehold; if we add the area of the estate since purchased by the Government, and make a reasonable allowance for purchases by individuals, we may assume that 400,000 acres are already relieved from the leasehold tenure. If 800,000 more could also be freed by the loan suggested, there would remain but 165,400 acres to be dealt with hereafter.

This residue could in a short time be liberated as the estates were repurchased by the tenantry, and the obligations of the Government reduced.

The advantages of this mode of converting the tenures are so obvious, the objections to it so few and so trivial, that the undersigned beg to submit to Her Majesty's Government the propriety of guaranteeing a loan, which they have no doubt would be gladly accepted by the Island authorities.

The Commissioners feel that it may be going beyond their duty to make such a suggestion, but they hope that Her Majesty's Government will regard the case of Prince Edward Island as exceptional, its grievances having sprung from the injudicious mode in which its lands were originally given away.

Assuming that the Crown will grant and the Colony accept this guarantee, there remains to be considered the security which ought to be defined, for the faithful application and repayment of the money borrowed. These funds ought not to be mixed up with the General Revenues of the Colony, but ought to be sacredly guarded from misappropriation, from suspicion of party bias, or political indirection. This could be effected by such guards as Her Majesty's Ministers would approve. A measure of this character was suggested by Mr. Labouchere, the Colonial Minister in 1855, and a loan, to the extent of £100,000, was warmly advocated in 1858 by Lord Stanley, then Colonial Secretary, on introducing a Bill in Parliament to the same effect. That Bill was subsequently withdrawn, for reasons which do not very distinctly appear from any papers submitted to the undersigned.

Although it is not improbable that doubts may have arisen as to the ability of the Colony to repay so large an amount, a glance at its present financial condition will show that this relief may be given without any risk to the mother country.

The revenue of Prince Edward Island increased from £17,011 14s. 2d. in 1839 to £41,106 3s. 10d. in 1859, so that it more than doubled in 20 years, the annual increase, in round numbers, being £1,200. It is apparent, then, that without disturbing the tariff, or reducing the ordinary appropriations, in five years the natural increase of population, trade and consumption, would give £6,000 a year, or a sum sufficient to pay the interest, on £100,000, at £6 per cent.; as it is not improbable that five years would be required to purchase up the estates, and expend the loan to advantage, it might happen that the revenue would increase as fast as the interest was required, without any increase in the tariff or diminution of the appropriations. But, assuming that a more rapid conversion of the tenures was practicable, and that in three years the whole loan was expended, by that time £3,600 of additional revenue would be flowing into the treasury under the old tariff, and there would be but £2,400 to provide for by increased taxation, and that only for the short period of two years.

But, it may reasonably be assumed, when a new spirit is breathed into the Island, and its population turn to the business of life with new hopes and entire confidence in the future, that trade will be more active, and the condition of the people will improve. The very operation of the Loan Act may therefore supply all the revenue required to meet the difference; but, if it should not, an addition of two and a half per cent. upon the imports of the Island, or a reduction of the road vote for two or three years, would yield the balance that might be required.

In preparing this Estimate, no reference has been made to the fund which would be at once available from the payment of their instalments by the tenants who purchased. £2,450 was paid in by the tenants on the Selkirk estate (bought for £10,000) in the first year after it was purchased. Guided by the experience thus gained, of the disposition and of the resources of the tenantry, it is fair to conclude that if such a sum could be promptly realized from sales of lands admitted to be among the poorest in the Island, the local Government might fairly count upon the command of such an income from the resale of the estates they purchase, as would enable them to keep faith with the public creditor without any risk of embarrassment.

Should the Imperial Parliament refuse to guarantee a loan, or the Government of Prince Edward Island decline to tender the securities, some other mode of adjusting the disputes between landlord and tenant must be devised, or the discontent, which has hitherto prevailed,

will continue to disturb the peace of the Island, and exercise a pernicious influence upon its politics for many years to come.

The Commissioners are expected to propose a remedy, and discharge themselves of that duty, entirely conscious that the slightest modification or compromise of his legal rights will be regarded as spoliation by the landlord, while anything short of confiscation will scarcely satisfy the tenant. Their duty is not to satisfy either; but with all the elements of a sound judgment before them, to do substantial justice to both.

It is difficult for an European to understand why almost every man in America considers it a personal degradation to pay rent. In the British Islands leasehold tenure is the general rule, and freehold the exception. A wealthy man pays rent with no more sense of inferiority than he feels when he pays his taxes. A poor man lives and dies without any hope of owning land, often without any desire to become a freeholder. On this side of the Atlantic a very different sentiment grew out of the discovery and settlement of a boundless continent, where the best land could be seized upon, or bought for a trifle, in the early stages of colonization; and where even now, after two centuries of occupation, land is so easily obtained, at prices so low that almost every industrious man may own a freehold; if he does not, in the agricultural districts, something discreditable to his character or his capacity is assumed; and even in the towns a man prefers to own the house he lives in, though the amount of interest he would pay upon a mortgage may be quite equal to his rent. So strong was this feeling all over the Continent, that even the French inhabitants of Lower Canada, to whom *lods et ventes* and seigniorial dues were no burdens, while old world impressions lasted; no sooner became surrounded by a British population, who were freeholders, than they could not endure what they felt to be a degradation, and the Legislature was compelled to step in and commute their tenures. The tenantry of Prince Edward Island share the common sentiment of the continent which surrounds them. The prejudice in favour of a freehold tenure, if it is one, is beyond the power of reason. The proprietors cannot change the sentiment, the local Government have no power to resist it; and the Imperial Government, having become weary of collecting rents and supporting evictions in Ireland, can hardly be expected to do for the landlords in Prince Edward Island what has ceased to be popular or practicable at home.

It is, therefore, imperative upon all the parties concerned to convert this tenure. Agrarian questions now occupy the public mind incessantly in this fine Colony, to the exclusion of all sound politics. A public man is valued in proportion as he is subservient to the proprietors, or friendly to the tenants, not for the measures of internal improvement or intercolonial policy he may propound; and the intellectual and social life of this people is exhausted and frittered away by disputes and contentions detrimental to the interests of all parties.

In addressing themselves to the remedies, the Commissioners freely admit,—

1st. That the original grants were improvident, and ought never to have passed.

2dly. That all the grants were liable to forfeiture for breach of the conditions with respect to settlement, and might have been escheated.

3rdly. That all the grants might have been practically annulled by the enforcement of quit rent, and that the lands could have been seized and sold by the Crown at various times, without the slightest impeachment of its honour.

While these admissions are made in clear and specific language, the undersigned are bound to acknowledge that the Crown was the judge in all these cases; and even though it were admitted that the Sovereign was ill-advised, and that the policy adopted from time to time was too lenient and injudicious, still the Sovereign having not only overlooked the laches of the subject, but, in express language, having repeatedly confirmed the original grants, it is impossible to encourage any delusion upon a point so important, or to treat the grantees in any other manner than as the lawful possessors of their lands.

The undersigned do not mean to assert that every proprietor who now claims land in Prince Edward Island has a legal title, or that those who have compelled the people to attorn were or

are, in all cases, the rightful heirs or owners of the estates. But what they mean is, that the original grants must be respected; that never having been escheated, but often confirmed, they cannot now be disturbed, and must be taken as the basis of any equitable adjustment.

As little power have they to disturb leases actually executed; they may not doubt that parties with questionable titles, or no titles at all, may have sometimes claimed and exercised ownership over portions of these lands, may have harassed the tenantry and compelled them to attorn; but even where this has been the case, the undersigned can apply no remedy, because the tenant has himself acknowledged the title he asks them to dispute. Such cases are, they trust, and have reason to believe, exceptions to the general rule. In most cases it may be fairly assumed that the titles, whether claimed by purchase or descent, are valid and sufficient, although on this point much misconception prevails in the Island.

Assuming, then, the sufficiency of the original grants, and the binding authority of the leases, the Commissioners are clearly of opinion that the leasehold tenure should be converted into freehold. It is equally the interest of the Imperial and Local Governments that this should be done, that agrarian questions may be swept from the field of controversy, that Her Majesty's Ministers may be no longer assailed by remonstrance and complaint, and that the public men in the Island may turn their attention to the development of its resources. It is equally the interest of the landlord and the tenant, because, as matters stand, the future of both is clouded, and incessant warfare involves a fearful waste of time. The question arises, therefore, upon what terms can a compromise, which is forced upon both, be arranged, should the Provincial Government, for want of the Imperial guarantee, not find itself in a position to purchase up the estates?

It is assumed, at the outset, that the proprietors will be willing to convert the tenures, and will be coerced by legislation, should fair terms be offered and they refuse to comply.

But they ought not to refuse,—

1st. Because a valuable island, won by the valor and enterprise of British soldiers, maintained by the taxes of the whole people, was improvidently parcelled out to a few individuals, either for no equivalent, or for services that it is exceedingly difficult at this period to estimate.

2. Because the British Government, deceived by the representations of the original grantees, has paid an amount of money to maintain its Civil Government, the capital of which the entire rental of the Island, would scarcely represent.

3. Because, when liable to forfeiture, their grants have been generously confirmed.

4. Because the arrears of quitrent, justly due, and never exacted, far exceed any amount that they will be asked to forego in order to restore peace to the Colony, and to carry out the policy of the Imperial Government, to which they are under such deep obligations.

5. Because if they reject a liberal compromise, they must hereafter collect their rents, not only with the public opinion of the Island, but of the Empire, against them, with no power to control the Local Government, and with but slender hopes of any arbitrary interference from home.

That the tenantry will cheerfully purchase their farms from the Government should a general measure result from this Report, is proved by the promptness with which they have paid their instalments for the farms included in the Worrell and Selkirk estates. That they will purchase from their landlords, even at higher prices, and on terms adjusted by this Commission, if no general measure is practicable, is confidently hoped and believed.

1. Because, with this Report in their hands, they can hardly place much confidence in those who may tell them of the forfeiture of the grants and the invalidity of their leases.

2. Because escheat can only be enforced, even if the public men of the Colony were as much in favour of, as they are evidently against it, by a long and doubtful conflict with the Imperial Government.

3. Because their minds will be distracted, and their resources exhausted by perpetual agitation and litigation, until there is a fair adjustment.

4. Because every year's delay makes their condition worse, as their young men will emigrate, and their produce decrease if their farms are not improved; and if their young men stay at home and increase the value of their lands, the price will ultimately rise with the lapse of time.

Assuming, therefore, that a compulsory compromise is inevitable, the question arises, upon what terms should the proprietors be compelled to sell, and the tenants be at liberty to purchase?

For a long time the undersigned cherished the belief that by taking the rent actually stipulated to be paid as a basis of the calculation, they could, estimating the quality of the land and produce yielded, and deducting bad debts, expense of management, and other charges on the estates, fix a general rate per acre that would be fair to all parties, and determine the price of leased land all over the Island. Acting on this belief, they have prosecuted inquiries, and prepared tables drawn from the census returns, and from a careful examination of each township; but after a laborious investigation into the whole subject, with these returns, the statements of the tenantry, the rent rolls, and accounts current of the landlords in their hands, they have reluctantly been driven to the conclusion that no general rate can be fixed, to operate over the whole Island, or even over the whole of a single estate, without working manifest injustice.

Taking the whole Island it is apparent that many causes may affect the value of land. A sand cove on the coast to which fish resort, or the bend of a river full of mussel mud, may be more valuable than an inland farm, however highly cultivated. It would not be fair to compel a proprietor to sell a mill site, which rents for £40, at an average that might be equitably applied to a line of farms renting for £5; nor would it be fair to deduct from the skilful proprietor of an estate, who had taken care to get only good tenants, and to collect his rents regularly, the same per centage for loss and collection, that would be equitable in cases where the tenants were indifferent, or the agents careless.

A general rate that would apply fairly to townships fronting on the sea coast, or on the beds of navigable streams, would not suit a less accessible estate. The proximity to a market, or the establishment of a steamboat line, may vary to the extent of 25 or 50 per cent., the value of the land. The presence or absence of ship timber, of swampy or white sandy soil, may so affect an average that the injustice that would outrage the feelings of a landlord on one side of a road would be as deeply resented by a tenant on the other. Industry or idleness, good health, or a sick family, a barren bed, or many children, affect the productiveness of farms; and it is quite impossible to apply any rule that will meet all classes, or to cut through difficulties that are presented on every side.

But there is another reason why the adoption of a general rate, as a mode of conversion, cannot be entertained. If put low, all a proprietor's best farms would be readily bought up by the occupants, and all the worst, with the expenses of agency, taxation, and litigation, would be left upon his hands. If the average was raised high enough to cover these contingencies, and protect the landlord, the poorer class of tenants could not purchase at all; the evils of the present system would be perpetuated, and the appointment of this Commission would have been followed by no practical results.

Political agitations may also affect the value of land, and a rate that would appear fair at one period, might operate most injuriously at another; this may be illustrated by the rent rolls of some of the best managed estates on the Island.

Driven, after mature reflection, to abandon all hope of a solution of their difficulties in this direction, the Commissioners have finally decided to adopt two simple principles.

1st. To give to every tenant of township lands not coming within the fourth and fifth provisions herein-after made, the right to purchase the land on which he lives.

2d. To give to landlord and tenant the security of a fair valuation of the land in case of difference.

To secure a just valuation presents many difficulties. The Commissioners were at first disposed to recommend that the system which had been found to work well, in the sale of the

Worrell and Selkirk estates, should be adopted, and that the duty of valuation should be assigned to three Commissioners to be appointed by the Government of the Island.

But this mode is open to serious objection.

Where the estates are purchased by the Colony, the claims of the proprietors are extinguished; and they have no longer any interest in the valuation. The Government have only the general interest which naturally arises out of a desire that their policy should be successful, and that the operation should be self sustaining. Political considerations may operate in the selection of the valuers, but once appointed, it is hardly reasonable to suspect that they act upon party principles in arranging the classifications. If, however, the estates were not purchased by the Government, and proprietary interest, or popular influence, were brought to bear upon their decisions, they could hardly, if selected by any administration, or from any class within the Island, be regarded as independent and above suspicion.

Another mode is the ordinary one of permitting the landlord and tenant to select each an arbitrator, with power to the two, in case of difference, to choose a third.

The objections to this course are, that no application of general principles, no uniformity would govern the decisions. The men selected would be as various as the localities; many of them, it is but reasonable to assume, would hardly possess the necessary qualifications for an enlightened judgment, some of them might be zealous partizans; and, even if an umpire could in all cases be selected who was not, the decisions would be as eccentric as the views and tempers of the parties engaged were diverse and irreconcilable, or their skill in argument or negotiation was fairly balanced.

The particular knowledge of those circumstances of each separate tenancy which affect the interests held by both the landlord and the tenant, could only be obtained by the selection of a competent person who would devote his time exclusively to the business, and make a distinct valuation of every separate holding in the Island. The selection, appointment, or remuneration of such a person, however desirable, is not within the power of this Commission. The knowledge which would enable the Commissioners to make such a valuation themselves, is manifestly not attainable within any period which can be allowed them for making their award.

Notwithstanding the objections above stated, arbitration therefore under certain circumstances, appears the only feasible and expeditious mode by which the conversion can be effected, and the fact that each party interested will have a voice in the constitution of the tribunal which is immediately to pass upon his rights, may, in the opinion of both landlords and tenants, outweigh the objections to this mode of adjustment which the undersigned have no desire to conceal.

In the business of life, a speedy and final settlement, even if it be not exactly what is wished for, is better than one that is protracted and uncertain. In the case of the tenants of Prince Edward Island, it is not more the price at which they may obtain their holdings, than it is the *compulsory power of purchase at some price*, that is wanted. The tenant who has this power has a marketable commodity; if he has not means, he can sell to those who have; sickness or accident will not deprive him of the fruits of his industry. The harshness of a landlord, who claims the right of re-entry, and the determination of the tenant's estate, for rent in arrear, becomes unimportant when the tenant by raising the comparatively small sum which represents the landlord's interest, can put an end to the landlord's estate itself. It is the power which the landlord at present has of lying by to take advantage of sickness, distress, or accident, which to the tenant constitutes the bitterness of his position. The landlord, who has leased for 999 years, can reasonably claim nothing beyond the capital, of which the rent would represent the interest. The tenant's improvements in such case ought to be the heritage of his family; they may amount in value to many hundreds, but they are insecure to that family, when the right to refuse *upon any terms* the removal of the risk of forfeiture, which hangs over those improvements, still exist in the landlord. It being then admitted that there shall be a compulsory power of purchase, at some price, that difficulties exist in the way of determining that price by a specific valuer, that it is desirable to avoid the delay and uncertainty of arbitration as much as possible, and that a general rate per acre, throughout the Island, would be unjust, some other mode must

be adopted, a mode which, while it maintains the rights of property, and the validity of contracts as far as can be consistent with a compulsory transfer, will afford to the tenant an opportunity of redeeming his estate in a short period, and on reasonable terms. The basis of this compromise must be the amount of rent stipulated to be paid; it is the only clue which will safely guide all parties through the perplexities by which they are surrounded.

The Commissioners therefore report and award—

1st. That tenants who tender 20 years purchase to their landlords, *in cash*, shall be entitled to a discount of 10 per cent., and a deed conveying the fee simple of their farms. Where the tenant prefers to pay by instalments, he shall have the privilege, but the landlord shall not be bound to accept a less sum than £10 at any one time; nor shall the tenant have a longer term than 10 years to liquidate the debt.

2nd. That tenants whose lands are not worth 20 years purchase, and who therefore decline to pay that amount, may tender to their landlords what they consider the value of their farms. If the landlord declines to accept the amount offered, the value shall be adjusted by arbitration. If the sum tendered is increased by the award, the tenant shall pay the expenses, if it is not, they shall be paid by the landlord. If the sum awarded is tendered in cash, a discount of five per cent to be allowed; if not, payment to be made by yearly instalments of not less than £10; the term of payment in no case to exceed 10 years.

3rdly. That the rent shall be reduced in proportion to the instalments paid; but no credit shall be allowed for any such instalments, until the three years arrears allowed by this award have been paid, nor while any rent accruing after the adjustment of the value of the farm remains due.

4thly. That proprietors who hold not more than 1,500 acres, or those who desire to retain particular lands to that extent, shall not be compelled to part with such under this award.

5thly. That leases under a term of less than 40 years shall not be affected by this award.

The Commissioners cannot close this branch of their report, without again expressing their conviction, that the purchase of the estates, by the negotiation of a loan through the Imperial Government, presents advantages so manifest that they cannot too strongly recommend its adoption, in preference to all other plans for the settlement of these unhappy disputes. Assuming that their alternative remedy is preferred, then they desire to place on record their regret that they could not have prepared the way for a uniform and equitable adjustment, by the appointment of a valuator perfectly independent of any bias, whose decisions would have been governed by general principles, capable of explanation and legitimate defence.

ARREARS OF RENT.

The Remission of Arrears of Rent due by the Tenants.

Assuming the tenants able to pay the arrears of rent due, it may be thought unreasonable to require the landlords to relinquish their rights to them, but not altogether so, if, from the poverty of the tenants, or the remissness of the landlords, so large an amount has been allowed to accumulate as to render its collection in most cases hopeless; and while they duly estimate the delicacy of the task, the Commissioners feel that they are justified in recommending a remission of a portion of the large accumulation of arrears. This would confer a great boon upon the tenants, and would, it is conceived, occasion little or no loss to the landlords. In effecting this, no greater violation of the rights of property would take place than a creditor is subjected to by the laws which relieve his bankrupt debtor from his liability. Although the undersigned are convinced that the arrears in most instances have accumulated from poverty of the soil, from unavoidable sickness or misfortune, or from the rate at which land has been taken being too high, yet they cannot resist the conviction that in some cases, persons have withheld payment of rent who were not unable to pay it.

To adjust the question of arrears by any sliding scale which would meet the peculiarities and equities of each case, has appeared to them, after much reflection, to be impossible. But, as some specific remission is absolutely necessary, they are of opinion that a release of all arrears beyond those which have accrued during the three years preceding the 1st of May last, would, under the circumstances of Prince Edward Island, be for the benefit of both landlords and tenants. They therefore report and award, that all arrears of rent due by the tenants previous to the 1st of May, 1858, be remitted.

FISHERY RESERVES.

The Rights of the Crown at the time of the transfer of the Casual and Territorial Revenues to the Local Government in the Fishery Reserves, contained in the original Grants, and the best policy to be adopted for their future disposal.

The reservation in 1767 of a belt of 500 feet in width, round the shores of Prince Edward Island, for the use of the fisheries, though quite in accordance with the policy of the period, has been found by experience to have been an impolitic reservation.

In Nova Scotia, where no such reservation existed, and where lands have been granted down to high-water mark, an invaluable resident fishery has sprung up, which is self-sustaining, supplies a profitable export, and lies at the basis of the extraordinary commercial development of that Province. Of New Brunswick, to some extent, a similar observation may be made.

In Prince Edward Island, during the last three or four years, there appears a most promising increase in the export of fish, as compared with former years. Yet fishermen, as a class, can hardly be said to exist, although the Island is surrounded by the best fishery in the world,—so profitable, in fact, that hundreds of schooners are annually attracted to the Gulf of Saint Lawrence from the southern coast of Nova Scotia, and from the more distant seaports of Maine and Massachusetts.

In view of these facts, and of the comparisons which they establish, and of the still more prominent fact that the prosecution of the fisheries in the Island, limited as it is, compared to the immense advantages possessed, has been in no way promoted by the reservation, the undersigned are clearly of opinion that the Fishery Reserves of Prince Edward Island should be abandoned, and that the territory, thus nominally dedicated to a branch of industry which will more surely grow from the operation of natural causes than from adventitious aids, should be left to the unrestricted use which the necessities or intelligence of the people may suggest, or the interest of commerce require.

Practically, as already shewn, these reserves have never been respected. The reclamation by the Crown, or of persons claiming under the Crown, in case of licence issued, of those parts of the reserves which have been actually reduced into possession, and improved and cultivated (if possible at all), could only be accomplished by means of expensive and harassing litigation, rendered still more embittered by a sense of injustice. It is difficult to get over an acquiescence of nearly a century in the enjoyment of property untrammelled by the exercise of a dormant easement reserved in the grant, even though there be no Statute of Limitations in the Island against the Crown. It would be equally difficult, after a lapse of 90 years, territorially to define where that reservation commenced and where it ended. The sea coast has changed, in many parts materially receded. From the north point to the east point, in the great curve which constitutes the bight of Prince Edward Island, and which is the principal resort of American fishermen, there is, and has been, as correctly as can be gathered from observation, and the statements of those who have longest lived on that coast, a receding of the mainland at the rate of two feet a year. On one of the islands in Richmond Bay, there was formerly a French burying ground, which, it must be assumed, was originally some distance above the water level; 15 or 20 years ago coffins were washed out by the sea.

From the north point to the west point, where the coast is bolder and more rugged, the receding has been at the rate of one foot a year, and from the west point to the east point, on the south and convex side of the Island, at the rate of one foot and a half a year.

At one point, near Cape Egmont, within the memory of living men, the mainland has receded 300 feet. Thus it may fairly be assumed, that at least 200 of the 500 feet have gone since the date of the grants.

The enforcement of the legal right to the easement, at the present day, even in the parts of the reservations which have not been actually cultivated or improved, if resisted by the legal owner of the adjoining land as representative of the original grantee, would from such cause alone, be most difficult. In some of the grants the Crown gave the fee simple in the 500 feet over which the easement was to extend; in others the 500 feet was reserved to the Crown, but only for the same purpose for which the easement in the first case was intended; therefore the Crown itself would be stopped from granting the reserve, in the later case, for any other purpose than that of the fishery.

To settle complications which have sprung, and might hereafter spring from the perpetuation of these reserves, the undersigned are clearly of opinion, that in those cases where the original grants passed the entire fee of the lot or township, reserving over the 500 feet the easement only, the land constituting such reserve should henceforth be held by the legal owners thereof, and those claiming under them, free from such easement or any claim thereto.

The policy of breaking up the reserves being assumed, it is with reference to the class of grants, where the fee remained in the Crown, that in carrying out such policy the principal difficulties will arise.

It is to be borne in mind that in the Island there is no Statute of Limitations against the Crown. No title by possession to these reserves can, therefore, have been acquired as against the Crown; some steps must now be taken to give title. To whom is it to be given? By the surrender of the casual and territorial revenues to the Island, on the establishment of responsible Government, these reserves became the property of the Local Government, and if juries could be found to carry out the law, possession could, or ought to be recoverable in the ordinary way, by which the Crown expels intruders from the public domain. Such a course, however, in the present case, would lead to great confusion, and in many instances to gross injustice. In the cases of the grants last mentioned, though the fee remained and still is in the Crown, yet the possession since the issuing of the grants has been in the grantees of the lands of which the reserves form the sea front, or their representatives. The lessees of such persons have held, improved, and occupied under them as owners. To give to the original grantees, or their representatives, an unconditional fee at the present time, would be gross injustice to the lessees. To give to the lessees would be equally unjust to the owners in fee, as placing a clear belt of freehold between their lands and the sea, and virtually putting them at the mercy of their tenant.

The equitable rights of both parties ought to be respected. The restriction of the Crown to grant for any but fishing purposes ought to be abolished. The only mode by which justice can be effectually done, is to put an end to such reserves, and let the land be held in fee, as if the same had absolutely passed at the time of the original grants, and that the grantees, their representatives or tenants, shall be bound by all contracts which may affect the same as if the reserves had been included in such grants, but no title acquired by adverse possession to be affected.

The reserves being entirely abolished, it remains to be considered in what way fishing stations can be secured. In the opinion of the undersigned, commerce and self-interest will, as a general rule, regulate such matters, and as the fisheries cannot be carried on in a continuous belt round the whole Island, such reservations are, as they have proved, comparatively valueless.

The harbours are open and available to all persons; what is required is the right to secure, at a reasonable rate, in parts where fishing stations can be judiciously selected, so much ground

as will answer the purpose. The right to permit the erection of wharves, buildings, and the enjoyment of exclusive privileges below high-water mark belongs to the Government. Provision should be made that parties embarking in the fisheries, who may have obtained a grant from the government, of any portion of the land below high-water mark, and shall require to make erections on the adjoining shore for the purpose of prosecuting the business with effect, and shall not be able to obtain, by purchase from the owner, a suitable lot on reasonable terms, may be authorized to appoint an appraiser, and require the owner to do the same, who, with an umpire, to be selected by the two appraisers, should proceed to lay off a portion of land, not exceeding one acre, in a locality on the shore most suitable for the purpose of carrying on the fisheries, and in such a way as to occasion as little injury as possible to the owner, and to make a valuation thereof; the party applying for such land, on payment of the amount of such valuation to the owner, to become entitled to a deed thereof in fee simple.

The Commissioners therefore report and award, that the reservations for fishery purposes, contained in the original grants of the townships of Prince Edward Island, abutting on the seashore, be abandoned, and the policy, with reference thereto, suggested by this report, be adopted.

ESCHEAT.

The Escheat, at the present time, of the original Grants for non-performance of Conditions as to Settlement.

Previous to the cession by Her Majesty in 1851 of the Crown and Territorial Revenues in the Island to the Local Government, the Crown had, by repeated declarations, denuded itself of the power of escheating the original grants, and declared any measure of that character impracticable: This is clearly expressed in Lord Grey's despatch to Sir Alexander Bannerman, of the 12th of July, 1851.

“ Repeated applications have been made at different times to Her Majesty's Government to consent to measures to deprive the proprietors under the original grants, of their estates, on account of their having escheated to the Crown, by reason of the non-fulfilment of conditions. The applications have been resisted on grounds with which the correspondence between successive Secretaries of State and Lieutenant Governors of Prince Edward Island, especially since the year 1832, will render you sufficiently familiar. It is only my purpose now to state, that Her Majesty's Government feel themselves bound to adhere to the decision, so repeatedly adopted by my predecessors in this matter, and to state that both on the grounds of justice to the landed proprietors, and of the permanent interests of the community of Prince Edward Island, they regard such a measure as impracticable.”

It could hardly be conceived that, with such views as these, Her Majesty could ever have intended to transfer to the Local Government a power, the exercise of which would be in derogation of the faith and honour of the Crown. But apart from this, the exercise of such power at the present time would be directly at variance with the interests of the Island.

Ninety-four years ago the grants were issued; 84 years ago the conditions of the settlement by foreign Protestants, on which they were issued, were broken; 84 years have passed and no forfeiture for such breach has been exacted. In the meantime the character and value of the lands have altered; improved, cultivated, and paid for, acquired by purchase, or passed by inheritance, in some instances no taint of the original ownership remains.

If it were possible that any country could be found, where, after a century the possession of property could be disturbed for non-performance of an absurd condition in the original grant, the authority having the power to enforce the forfeiture during all that period, not only being fully cognizant of the omission to perform, but actually declaring that performance should not be required, and acquiescing in the expenditures, improvements, and transmissions that were

made on the faith of such declaration, that country would cease to be regarded among the civilized communities of the world.

If it were believed that such a principle existed in Prince Edward Island, or could be enforced, it would be utterly ruinous to its prosperity.

The insecurity of the tenure would prevent any person purchasing land. Titles would be insecure, because, with few exceptions, the forfeiture would apply to every township, and every subdivision of a township in the Island. No particular lot, no particular proprietor could be selected; the law would be general in its application, and must fall on all alike; not solely on the representative of the original grantee of 1767, if any such there be, but on the purchaser of yesterday, or the orphan whose inheritance fell to him the day before. The destruction of the primary title would carry with it the titles of the small freeholders who hold under it, as well as the improvements of the tenants. If courts and juries could be found to work out such a principle, no free people would endure it long.

But if the escheat could be carried out, and these lands became vested in the Local Government, how could they be disposed of, and who would become the owners? If put up at public auction, it does not follow that the man whose labor had made a farm valuable, or whose money had purchased it before the escheat, would be certain of securing his improvements. If disposed of at private sale, the practice would lead to the grossest favouritism and corruption,

There is no light in which the present escheat of the titles, on the ground of the conditions of the original grants having been broken, can be viewed, which would not exhibit consequences most disastrous to the Island. That such, practically, has been the opinion of every Government for the last 40 years, is apparent to any one acquainted with its history. Constitutionally, a Court of Escheat has always existed. Escheat is incident to the power of the Crown in the administration of the public domain. It required no particular legislation to put the machinery of escheat in operation; none is required now. Yet no Government, whatever party may have been in power within that period (and opposing administrations have constantly succeeded each other), has ever attempted to enforce a forfeiture.

The Commissioners therefore report and award, that at the present time there should be no escheat of the original grants for non-performance of conditions as to settlement.

QUITRENTS.

The Relinquishment by the Crown of the Arrears of Quitrents previous to the transfer of the Crown Revenues to the Local Government.

The action of the Imperial Government on this question has not been so decided as on the question of escheat. Up to the time of passing the Land Tax Act, 11 Geo. 4, c. 17, (1830), it is clear that the right to the arrears had never been wholly abandoned. The liberality of the British Government, in the commutations offered to the proprietors in 1802, was an evidence of its desire for the advancement of the Island; and, had the commutations at that time been exacted from the proprietors, and expended in local improvements, some atonement would have been made for the prejudice of its prosperity resulting from the mode in which the lands had been originally parcelled out. The expenses of a separate Civil List had been incurred by the British Government, on the representations of the proprietors, and on the faith that the accruing quitrents should constitute the fund upon which those expenses were to be borne.

The Imperial Government showed great forbearance; it sustained the Civil List for many years, and did not exact the quitrents. The proprietors, or those claiming under them, held their lands without performance of the stipulations and conditions on which they were granted.

In 1830, at the time of the passing of the Land Tax Act, the Imperial Government evidently contemplated not only the collection of a portion of the arrears of quitrent, but the revival of those rents at the period when that Act would expire. Since that Statute came into operation,

and during its continuance, or the continuance of those Acts passed in lieu of it, the tax collected has largely exceeded the quitrent chargeable. That this would be so was apparent at the time the first Act was passed.

In 1838 the Imperial Government removed all doubt as to the arrears, prior to the 11 Geo. 4, c. 17, by stating, through the then Colonial Secretary, Lord Glenelg—

“ That all rents in arrear at the period when the Provincial Act 11 Geo. 4, c. 17, was confirmed and came into operation, must be considered to have been remitted by the authority of the despatch of 27th January, 1833, but that no further remission could have been contemplated by that despatch, nor ought to be allowed, with the exception already stated of the rent of the year in which commutation may be effected, whether the same be payable as in the year 1837-8, under the provision of the Act, or as will subsequently be the case, under the original grants and tenures of the land.”

The commutation, in the latter part of the foregoing passage referred to, was in view of an extinguishment, by so many years purchase of the quitrents, which would commence to accrue after the expiration of 11 Geo. 4, c. 17.

But as that Act has since, in principle, been constantly renewed, and the tax continued, the commutation contemplated has become a dead letter, and must so remain until the Local Legislature ceases to renew the Act, or to make other provisions in lieu thereof, the whole matter, for future regulation, being now under its control. But all arrears, up to the time of the passing of 11 Geo. 4, c. 17, the Imperial Government clearly remitted, and however little the proprietors or their representatives were entitled to such an act of grace, yet those arrears having been once remitted, it is impossible to suppose Her Majesty Government handed over in 1851 to the Local Government, on the surrender of the casual and territorial revenue, the debts which in 1833 had been cancelled by the Crown.

The Commissioners therefore report and award, that previous to the transfer in 1851 to the Local Government of the casual and territorial rights and revenues, the Crown had remitted all arrears of quitrent due up to the period when the Act 11 Geo. 4, c. 17, was confirmed and came into operation; but that the right of the Local Government to the revival of future quitrents, on the expiration of the Acts imposing a land tax in lieu thereof, is clear and undoubted.

CLAIMS OF THE DESCENDANTS OF THE LOYALISTS.

That the Loyalists, who sought homes in Prince Edward Island after the confiscation of their properties in the old revolted colonies, had strong claims upon the British Government, will be universally admitted. That His Majesty's Government, in 1783, felt the full force of those claims, and was sincere in its desire to make a liberal provision for the loyalists, there is no reason to doubt.

That some of the proprietors of Prince Edward Island, who, with apparent willingness came forward and offered to relinquish portions of the improvident grants they had received, for the benefit of these sufferers, were sincere, it is charitable to assume. But there is too much reason to believe that some of them were not sincere, and made the offers but to cover the non-fulfilment of the conditions of their grants. That the rights which the loyalists then acquired were not enforced, is deeply to be regretted; yet it is impossible, for the reasons stated by Lord John Russell, after the lapse of three-fourths of a century, to revive them to the prejudice of the present owners of the lands. But, even at this distance of time, the sense of harsh neglect and injustice, which still exists, ought, if possible, to be effaced from the minds of many deserving people, who proudly trace their descent from men, the confiscation of whose properties in the revolted colonies was accepted as an inevitable necessity, but who still resent what they regard as injustice and deception practised upon their ancestors upon British soil, and under the flag which they had fought or suffered to maintain.

APPENDIX (O.)

The British Government, having for so many years provided for the Civil List of the Colony, the Commissioners would respectfully suggest that the Provincial Government might, at a small sacrifice, dispose of this old vexed question.

Since 1839 no action on this subject has been taken by the Legislature or inhabitants of the Island. From 1851 the Local Government has had the disposal of the Crown lands; but, even since that period, no application has been made to the Legislature for compensation or redress. It would, however, be in the power of the Local Government, out of the lands ceded to them in 1851, or since purchased, or that may hereafter be purchased, to give to any descendant of a loyalist who could prove his descent, and that his ancestor had not participated in the distribution of land which some of the proprietors fairly and honourably appropriated (the burden of proof in both respects being upon the applicant) a free grant equivalent in quantity to the proportion he would be entitled to as such descendant, had his ancestor gone into possession and died seised.

This remedy is now so entirely in the power of the Local Legislature, that the undersigned feel they would be exceeding their duty were they more than respectfully to suggest it.

CLAIMS OF THE DESCENDANTS OF THE ORIGINAL FRENCH INHABITANTS.

The claims of certain descendants of the French inhabitants of the Island were earnestly pressed upon the Commission.

It was alleged that the French settlers, who were in the Island prior to the treaty of 1763, were by that treaty confirmed in the rightful occupancy of their lands, which were subsequently granted away in 1767; and that those grants of the whole Island must have been made in ignorance of the occupancy, or in violation of the rights of the French. Though this subject was not specially referred to the Commissioners, yet it appeared very desirable that it should be disposed of, as it seemed to interest a large class of the inhabitants whose forefathers had been driven from lands they thought their own, and who had themselves suffered a good deal, either from ignorance of their rights, or, assuming that they had any, from their practical invasion.

Having examined this subject in all its bearings, the undersigned deem it their duty to report, that, assuming the statements made by the French to be true, and that their rights were not compromised by the facts of history, they would seem to have been harshly treated. But upon the proprietors who have been in undisturbed possession of their lands for nearly a century, no legal claim can now be established, and it is clear that the Island Government, which was not organized till long after the wrong complained of was done, cannot be expected to make atonement.

An appeal to the British Government can hardly be sustained, if it is judged by the light of our early Colonial history.

The British attempts at colonization in all the maritime provinces were, as was very natural, opposed and rendered hazardous by the French, who occupied the alluvial lands around the Bay of Fundy and Basin of Minas; who had built forts at Annapolis and Chignecto, and who, when the neighbouring provinces were rescued from them by conquest and by treaty, still occupied Cape Breton and fortified Louisburg with great skill and at an enormous expense. Prince Edward Island (then the Island of St. John) was the granary of Cape Breton, which was but little cultivated, its inhabitants being chiefly occupied with the fur trade and the fishery. It is fair to assume that in all the measures and policy of that period, which led to the expulsion of the French Acadians from Nova Scotia, and to the confiscation of their lands, the French inhabitants of the Island of St. John participated; if they did, their descendants have no reason to complain. The expulsion of the Acadians occurred in 1755. The grants to the proprietors of Prince Edward Island were issued in 1767, twelve years after the lands of the Acadians

were confiscated. Were the French of Prince Edward Island equally guilty, or were there any peculiar circumstances which gave them a claim to the favour and merciful consideration of the British Government, which could not be pleaded on behalf of the Acadians of Minas and Beau Sejour? The undersigned fear not. At a later period, when the British Government had become firmly established in all the Colonies, the French, who had fled to the woods of Nova Scotia, or who had sought refuge on the unoccupied and remote portions of its sea-coast, were suffered to purchase lands, or acquire title by peaceful occupation. But there is no instance, in the history of that province, where lands once confiscated and granted to British settlers were ever again restored. With every desire, therefore, to take a generous view of the claims and sufferings of persons whose only crime was adherence to the weaker side, in a great national struggle, yet the Commissioners do not see how they can, after the lapse of a century, rescue them from the ordinary penalties which are incident to a state of war.

INDIAN CLAIMS.

The Indian claims are limited to Lennox Island, and to grass lands around it, and as it appears by evidence that the Indians have been in uninterrupted occupancy of this property for more than half a century, and have built a chapel and several houses upon the same, the undersigned are of opinion that their title should be confirmed, and that this very small portion of the wide territory their forefathers formerly owned, should be left in the undisturbed possession of this last remnant of the race.

Should the general principles, propounded in this report, be accepted in the spirit which animates the Commissioners, and be followed by practical legislation, the Colony will start forward with renewed energy, dating a new era from 1861. The British Government will have nobly atoned for any errors in its past policy. The Legislature will no longer be distracted with efforts to close the Courts upon proprietors, or to tamper with the currency of the Island. The cry of "tenant right" will cease to disguise the want of practical statesmanship, or to overawe the local administration. Men who have hated and distrusted each other will be reconciled, and pursue their common interests by mutual co-operation. Roads will be levelled, breakwaters built, the river beds will be dredged, and new fertilizers applied to a soil, now annually drained of its vitality. Emigration will cease, and population attracted to the wild lands will enter upon their cultivation unembarrassed by the causes which perplexed the early settlers. Weighed down by the burden of this investigation, the undersigned have sometimes felt doubtful of any beneficial results. But they now at the close of their labours, indulge the hope that if their suggestions are adopted, enfranchised and disenthralled from the poisoned garments that enfold her, Prince Edward Island will yet become, what she ought to be, the Barbadoes of the St. Lawrence.

I have the honor to refer you to the Resolution of the House of Assembly, dated the 16th of April, 1860, contained in your Despatch, No. 15, of the 16th of April. In that Resolution the Assembly agreed that the expenses of the Commission of Inquiry into the Land Question should be defrayed in three equal shares, by Her Majesty's Government, by the Colony, and by the Proprietors of Land, who had concurred in the proposed investigation. In my subsequent Despatch, No 24, of the 16th of June, 1860, I informed you that a payment of £200 to each Commissioner was contemplated as an indemnity for his labours.

The Inquiry proved so much longer, and more laborious than was expected, that Her Majesty's Government have doubled the amount of the Commissioners' remuneration, besides which, a variety of miscellaneous expenses occurred in the investigation. Her Majesty's Government, however, do not propose to call on the other parties to the Inquiry for the unforeseen and surplus expenditure.

This will be undertaken by the Imperial Treasury, which will also issue the required amounts to all the Commissioners, and other persons having claims in respect of this service. But I have to request, that you will cause the sum of £200, originally named, to be paid without delay into the Treasury Chest, in order to reimburse Her Majesty's Government to that extent, for the issues which they will have made to liquidate the accounts of the Commission of Inquiry.

Report of the Superintendent of the Lunatic Asylum.

CHARLOTTETOWN,
January 31, 1862.

Gentlemen ;

The Medical Superintendent of the Asylum for the Insane, in compliance with the requirements of his prescribed duties, has the honor to present to your Board the accompanying Report, as the result of the annual operations of the Institution for the year ending January 31, 1862.

The number of patients remaining at last Report was 15 males and 10 females, amounting to 25. There have been admitted during the year 2 males and 5 females, making a total of 32. The number discharged has been 10, viz., 4 males and 6 females.

During the past year 3 deaths have occurred—one from general atrophy and exhaustion ; another from chronic disease of the bowels, and a third from bronchial consumption.

The unimproved cases amount to 6 ; 5 have improved ; 13 much improved ; 7 have regained their reason ; and 22 yet remain under treatment, as shown by the accompanying statistical chart.

Of 11 cases admitted during the last fourteen months, 7 have recovered,—furnishing a powerful motive for early admission to treatment.

The Institution having lately undergone a thorough repair in the various details of furnishing, painting, warming, clothing and bedding, with improved regimenal and disciplinary appliances, it is with much satisfaction that I am

now enabled to report to your Board the greatly improved appearance of the interior of the building, the general comfort of the patients with respect to clothing, bedding and mitigated means of restraint on the unruly, by which we have been enabled to discard the strait-jacket and adopt the simple belt and wrist-bands. This contrivance allows the patients to take exercise within or out of doors, and prevents any injury they may be disposed to inflict on themselves or others.

We only adopt seclusion as a means of restraint with patients during a paroxysm, and the constant presence and watchfulness of the attendants maintain a uniform harmony in the common halls.

At no remote period, an application must be made to our Representatives for a moderate sum to enlarge the present building according to a plan I have to propose, to raise its elevation to 2 storeys throughout. By this alteration 18 new bed-rooms can be obtained in addition to the present 6, the patients removed from the cellar, more conveniently classified, and the great original blunder of associating an Alms-house with a Lunatic Hospital partially obviated.

We have long felt the want of a small Library, to instruct, amuse and occupy the attention of the patients. By the united efforts of two benevolent ladies, who kindly undertook to solicit subscriptions to found a small Library, we have been presented with a number of well-selected volumes, Solitaire and Draught-boards, &c., to the amount of upwards of £7 currency.

APPENDIX (T.)

The proprietors of the "Islander" and "Protestant" have also gratuitously furnished us with their Journals; and a lady interested in the welfare of the inmates, with two papers, for which we here beg to tender our grateful acknowledgments.

It is remarkable with what interest and avidity the news of the day is sought after by the patients; and even our most hopeless maniac is now seldom seen in the halls without some book in his hand.

The paupers are 8 in number, chiefly old men, whose united ages amount to 517 years. They continue to enjoy a fair proportion of health, and no deaths have diminished their number during the past year.

The attendants on the patients are kind, strict and attentive to their duties, and the Institution, I am thankful to state, is in thorough good working order.

I herewith respectfully submit to the consideration of your Board this my "Twelfth Annual Report."

Report of Dr. J. T. Jenkins, Health Officer, Charlotte- town, on cases of two patients in City Hospital, and on other matters in relation to said Hospital.

CHARLOTTETOWN,
17th March, 1862.

Sir ;

I have the honor to report, for the information of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor in Council, the cases of Matilda Myer and Patrick Cody, inmates of the Hospital,—the former suffering from Gelatis, which necessitates the amputation of both feet; the latter was laid up by frost-bite, which required amputation of the toes of one foot. I have performed the requisite operations in both cases, and the patients are progressing favorably.

The man Cody, when admitted, was almost destitute of clothing, and, consequently, not in a condition to observe proper cleanliness; with the sanction of the Hon. Col. Gray, I procured for him a shirt and pair of trowsers, a bill of which is enclosed.

In connection with the fact that Small Pox of a virulent kind is raging at Ports between which and this Island there will soon be frequent communication, I beg to bring to the

notice of His Excellency in Council the situation of the present Hospital, which, for the treatment of patients laboring under infectious diseases, I consider in many respects inappropriate.

I would also beg to direct the attention of His Excellency to the absence of means for carrying out proper quarantine regulations—if such exist—and to the necessity of adopting measures to compel the inhabitants of at least the three most important seaports to make use of the protecting influence of vaccination.

Any information which His Excellency may require in connection with the foregoing subjects, I shall be at all times most happy to afford.

Extract from Despatch marked *Confidential*, dated 1st February, 1862, from the Duke of Newcastle to Lieut. Governor Dundas, enclosing copies of provisions extracted from the Laws of Nova Scotia and Newfoundland, respectively, relating to the organization of Volunteer Militia forces.

“After once the money for the organization and maintenance of the Force is granted by the Legislature, it is very desirable that the remaining power over funds thus granted for military purposes should be concentrated in the hands of the Lieut. Governor.

“I enclose for the information of your Government, copies of provisions which already exist to the above effect in the neighboring Provinces of Nova Scotia and Newfoundland, and I trust that the Legislature of Prince Edward Island will be willing to follow those precedents, and thus to uphold the undivided authority, which is so essential to the prompt and satisfactory working of all military arrangements.”

NOVA SCOTIA.

CHAPTER II.

An Act to provide for the organization of a Volunteer Militia Force for the defence of this Province.

[*Passed 12th May, 1862.*]

I. The Governor may, during the continuance of this Act, draw from the Treasury of this Province a sum not exceeding eight thou-

sand dollars per annum, and may expend the same in the payment of Staff officers and drill sergeants who have been trained in the British Army, in the purchase of ammunition and accoutrements, and in the storeage and preservation of the Arms furnished by H. M's Government, and generally in such other services as may from time to time appear to him to be necessary for the efficient organization and maintenance of such Volunteer Force.

NEWFOUNDLAND.

CAP. II.

An Act to provide for the organization of a Volunteer Force for the protection of Newfoundland.

I. The Governor and Commander-in-Chief may, during the continuation of this Act, draw from the Receiver General of this Province, a sum not exceeding One hundred and fifty Pounds, sterling, and may expend the same in the payment of Drill Sergeants who have been trained in the British Army; of ammunition for practice and drill; the storeage and preservation of the Arms furnished by H. M's Government; and generally in such other services as may from time to time appear to him to be necessary for the efficient organization and maintenance of such Volunteer Force.

Report enclosing a statement of the amount of Postage collected in the Post Offices in Prince Edward Island, in the year 1861.

GENERAL POST OFFICE,

Charlottetown, March 8, 1862.

SIR ;

I have the honour to enclose you a statement shewing the amount of postage collected in the Post Offices of this Island during the year ended 31st December, 1861,—also the amount of Postage Stamps sold during the same time. The amount collected in Charlottetown is £700-16s. 8d., and in the offices in the country, £465 17s., and the amount of Postage Stamps sold in Charlottetown is £215 11s. 3d., and in the country offices £403 5s. 11d., making the total sum received on account of Postage £1785 10s. 10. This is a small increase in the sum collected in the year 1860, but since the 1st February, 1861, all correspondence from the offices of the Colonial Secretary, Treasurer, Collector of Excise, Commissioner of Public Lands, Clerk of the Executive Council, and Secretary to the Board of Education, when addressed to persons in this Island, and also all Letters addressed to those officers on public service, when posted in any Post Office in this Island, have been sent and delivered free of any charge. This has caused, although no real loss to the Island, a deficiency of at least ninety pounds that this department should have received.

On the 11th June last, I called the attention of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor in Council to an Act passed by the Legislature of this Island while in Session last year, intituled "An Act to further the Act for the transfer of the Inland Posts within this Island," enacting that all Letters and Packets for the colonies of Canada, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, shall be prepaid.

Clause first of this Act states, that if any Letter or Packet should be posted in any Post Office in this Island, and addressed to any of the before mentioned colonies, the postage on which shall not be fully prepaid, such Letters or Packets shall be forwarded to its destination, subject to the rate of Postage chargeable thereon, and also with a fine of two pence sterling, over and above the legal rate, the monies arising from said fine to be equally divided between the colony to which the said Letter is addressed and this Island.

In the colonies of Canada, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, and this Island, the arrangement is, that the Post Office department in each colony retain for the use of their respective Governments the amount of Postage collected by them on Letters posted in one of their colonies for delivery in another, and one colony does not account to another for any portion of the Postage collected.

But on all Letters sent by any of these colonies to, or received by them from, Newfoundland, Bermuda, all the other British possessions, the British Islands, and all foreign countries (except the United States), a portion of the Postage collected must be remitted to the General Post Office, London.

APPENDIX (W.)

It was suggested in the year 1860, that in the colonies of Canada, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, and this Island, the Post Office department in each, should *collect* and *retain* the Postage on all Letters posted in the Post Offices under its control for delivery in another of these colonies, and when Letters so addressed are posted unpaid, that the Letter or Packet should be forwarded to its destination, and there be subject to a fine in addition to the legal rate chargeable thereon, and it was understood that the sum collected in this case would belong to the colony which collected it.

By the Act referred to, the fine is to be divided between the colony in which the Letter originated, and that to which it is addressed, this would give a great deal of unnecessary trouble to the different departments and the colonies mentioned would not agree to it.

The system of prepayment by stamps, has been adopted in the Provinces of Canada, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, on all Letters posted in for delivery within their respective Provinces; in the two former the fine is two cents, and in the latter five cents is charged, and I have observed in one or two instances that on Letters from this Island returned as dead Letters from Canada and New Brunswick, a tax of seven cents has been imposed,—the legal rate and fine. I consider that as the neighbouring Provinces have adopted this system, the Government of this Island will have, in self defence, to act in the same manner, and I would recommend that the Postage on all Letters and packets posted in any Post Office in this Island for delivery within the same be *prepaid* by stamps, and if any such Letter or packet be posted unpaid that it be forwarded as addressed, and be delivered on payment of a fine of two pence currency in addition to the legal rate chargeable thereon; and also, that as soon as an arrangement can be made on this subject with the Provinces of Canada, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, this department be allowed to charge and collect a fine of pence in addition to the legal rate of Postage on all unpaid Letters received in any Post Office in this Island, from its corresponding office in any of the before mentioned colonies, the whole amount arising from such fine and Postage to be retained for the use of the Government of this Island. I have arranged that the mail boats cross from Cape Tormentine to Cape Traverse and *vice versa* three times in each week, instead of semi-weekly, and since that time (the loads being lighter) the trips have been performed with greater regularity.

I have received during last summer two Mails in each week from Boston, by Colonel Favor's Express Steamers from Boston to Saint John, in many instances, these Mails have been in this office two days earlier than those forwarded by the overland route *via* Calais, and I consider that Colonel Favor is intitled to the grant of forty pounds for last year.

I consider that another office should be fitted up, to be used for a delivery office for Charlottetown and vicinity, and for sale of Postage Stamps; at present all the business of the General Post Office in receiving and distributing mails, making up and forwarding, keeping the accounts and correspondence of the department, and also, receiving and delivering Letters from Charlottetown, is all performed in one apartment.

Prince Edward Island.

DOWNING STREET,

20th March, 1862.

SIR ;

It appears to have been the case in many of Her Majesty's Colonies, that property conveyed for the purpose of being made available for Naval services of the United Kingdom, has been conveyed, not to the Lords of the Admiralty as such, but to individuals, on whose death or abandonment of office a fresh conveyance would become necessary. This inconvenience has been represented to me by the Lords of the Admiralty, who have requested that I would communicate the enclosed Draft

Bill to the Governors of Her Majesty's Colonies, in order that it may be submitted to the different Legislatures. I should wish you, in accordance with their Lordships' desire, to take such steps as may appear to you best calculated to procure the enactment by the Legislature of the Colony under your Government of a law to the effect, and if possible in the terms suggested by their Lordships.

Report on Indian affairs.

CHARLOTTETOWN, February 10th, 1862.

SIR;—In now addressing Your Excellency on the subject of the native Indian population, I beg leave to state that failing in obtaining a specific grant from the Legislature, in its last Session, for that purpose, I resorted to the expedient of a private subscription to carry out the object of purchasing a pair of Oxen for the use of the Lennox Island Indians, and by the 3rd of June had collected the sum of £10 4s 3d; the then advanced state of the season precluded my seeking to extend the subscription; with this sum, and the balance of the grant for the year, in my hands, of £16 19s 6d, I left Town, and reached Lennox Island on the 5th June where I found about eleven families, all of whom being desirous of receiving such assistance as could be given to enable each to plant a few bushels of Potatoes, I purchased 46 bushels of this article and a few bushels of Oats, and procured such necessaries as they required to facilitate their planting operations. I then purchased a Plough, and subsequently a pair of Oxen, my expenditure reaching the sum of £27 4s. It will doubtless be considered a gratifying circumstance to have to record that a native Indian was present competent to guide the Plough, while a younger brother was able to guide the Oxen. Under their joint direction and management the Oxen commenced work on the ground of Peter Francis, who has by far the largest clearances amongst them. The Oxen were found quite tractable and manageable, and on different occasions, between that date and the month of October, ten other families had their respective clearances turned up with a view to the sowing of Wheat the coming Spring, of which grain some 12 or 15 bushels will probably be required. I may here be permitted to observe that, until it became necessary to make provision for the future care and safe keeping of the Oxen, I had not realized anything of the perplexity and responsibility attached to their possession, under the peculiar circumstances of the case; and, finally, on the 15th of June, on leaving for Town, made a provisional arrangement with Francis Francis, a son of Peter Francis, for their safe keeping; a memorandum to that effect will be found among other papers herewith transmitted.

In anticipation of the requirements of the Fall and Winter seasons, I held out the expectation of my returning in time to make suitable arrangements for the Oxen; in this I was delayed until the 26th December, when I again reached the Island and found the Oxen to have been well taken care of and greatly improved in condition; the keeper, Francis Francis, had partially erected or constructed a small building as a temporary stable, and had been able to secure a small quantity of Marsh Hay, not sufficient however for the Winter; that some straw, about half a ton, would be required, in addition to the Hay, to carry the oxen over to the Spring. Four families have remained on the Island for the Winter, two of whom have Dwelling Houses, the others are in Camps. The interest manifested and taken in the welfare of the Oxen, by every member of the Francis' family, naturally suggests the idea whether it would not

be advisable to extend, to them especially, such extra or additional facilities as will enable them to carry out an intelligent system of farming, by way of attracting the rest of the Tribe to endeavor to emulate the example. "It being quite certain," says M. H. Perley, Commissioner for New Brunswick Indian affairs, in his report dated 11th Dec., 1841, "that an example of industry and consequent increase of property in a member of their own Tribe affords a more effectual lesson to an Indian than a score of similar instances among the white settlers."

As an act of justice to those gentlemen by whose liberal aid I have been able to accomplish so much, a meeting of the subscribers was recently convened to receive an explanation of the mode of application of the money received from them; on that occasion they were pleased to pass a resolution recommending an application being made to the Legislature at its next Session in promotion of the great object of Indian civilization. A copy of the report of the resolution referred to I beg leave also to forward herewith with my own account of receipts and disbursements.

Commending the cause of this interesting portion of the general population to the continued sympathy and favourable consideration of Your Excellency and the other branches of the Legislature,

DEAR SIR,—

As Mr. T. Stewart is making application for a further grant for the Indians, I take the liberty of enclosing you a copy of his account of the manner in which he is expending the Indians money, as I do not believe a copy of the account has been laid before the Committee. Mr. Stewart has received upwards of £40 during the past year, over half of that amount has, in my opinion, been quite thrown away!

I should be glad if the Legislature would pay Mr. B. Stewart the annual rent he receives for the Hay on the Island, until the Award is finally settled. And if two or three cows could be provided for them in addition, I consider it would be a great advantage; but that is all I would recommend, for I clearly see the more you attempt to support the Indians by furnishing either provisions or clothing, the worse they are.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

WE the Commissioners appointed by Your Excellency under the Act of the Twenty-third Victoria, Cap. ten, intituled "An Act to provide for the revising and reprinting of the Laws of this Island," deem it necessary, in consequence of the amending Act passed in the last Session of the General Assembly of this Island upon the same subject, requiring at our hands further and additional duties, to report to Your Excellency, for the information of the several branches of the Legislature, our proceedings thereunder.

The said amending Act (the Twenty-fourth Victoria, cap. three) having imposed upon us the duty of separating the Public General Statutes of this Island from the Private and Local Acts, we decided, under the powers given to us under the said amending Act, to adopt the style of the revised Statutes of Nova Scotia and the Private or Local Statutes of that Province, severally printed at Halifax, in the year One thousand Eight hundred and Fifty-one, as the style and specimen according to which our Laws should be printed. We, therefore, caused an advertisement, a copy of which marked (A) is hereunto annexed, to be inserted in the Royal Gazette, newspaper, on the Twenty-first day of May last, calling for separate Tenders for the Printing and separate Tenders for the Binding of Nine hundred copies of the Public General Statutes of this Island and One hundred and fifty copies of the Private or Local Acts thereof, being the respective numbers of copies specified in the Act in question, agreeably to a specification in the said Advertisement referred to, and requiring the said Tenders to be delivered to one of your Commissioners on or before the Nineteenth day of June last, which Advertisement was continued weekly from the time of its first publication until the last mentioned day, being for a period of upwards of three weeks, agreeably to the provisions of the said amending Act. That under the said Advertisement we received two Tenders only for the printing of the Laws, one from Mr. John Ings and the other from Mr. George T. Haszard; and two Tenders only for the Binding of the same, one from Mr. John S. Bremner, and the other from Mr. Daniel Bethune; copies of which said respective Tenders marked (B) are hereunto annexed. The Tender of Mr. Ings for the Printing, being the best and lowest, has been accepted by us; but, as regards the Binding, the Tender of Mr. Daniel Bethune not having been accompanied by a letter signed by two securities in accordance with the terms of our Advertisement, we felt ourselves bound to accept the Tender of Mr. Bremner which we did. And Contracts have been severally entered into by us with Mr. Ings and Mr. Bremner, and Bonds for the faithful performance of the same, on the part of the said Contractors, have been executed by the respective Contractors, together with their sureties. See copies hereunto annexed marked (C) and (D.)

APPENDIX (Z.)

We beg further to report that, agreeably to the directions of the said amending Act, we have carefully separated the Public General Statutes of the Colony from the Private and Local Statutes, retaining only the Titles of the Private Acts in the volumes of the General Laws; and have appended necessary and suitable explanatory notes to both works, a duty demanding no small amount of care, responsibility and labour; as independent of the necessity imposed upon us (owing to the repeal of and amendments made to various Laws in the last Session of the Legislature) of re-examining a large number of the Acts and correcting the notes previously made thereto, we have been obliged to examine every Act in force on our present Statute Book, preparatory to assigning its proper place in one or other of the respective codes of our Law.

The Public General Statutes will comprise two volumes, royal octavo, containing about Nine hundred pages each, and that work being the most required, we deemed it our duty to place the original matter for it first in the hands of the Printer, and we have much satisfaction in being enabled to state that the Contractor has made good progress in the printing of the first volume, and we may look for the completion of Nine hundred copies of that volume in about two months time; a delay of a few weeks must then necessarily occur in the preparation of the Index to the volume before it can be finally completed in readiness for Binding; and within a month from the time of the delivery of the sheets to the Binder, if no unforeseen accident occurs, part of the work will be ready for delivery to the Government. The printing of the second volume of the Public Statutes, under the terms of the Contract, will occupy from four to five months, and including the preparation and printing of the Index thereto, one month more; so that we may reasonably conclude that the second volume will be in print, and bound ready for delivery, about the close of the present year.

The Private Statutes will be comprised in one royal octavo volume of about three hundred pages, and will, no doubt, be bound and completed within a very short space of time after the publication of the second volume of the General Statutes.

In accordance with the suggestion contained in our former report, we beg to state that we have only required Mr. Bremner to bind up Six hundred and fifty copies of each volume of the General or Public Statutes, in the first instance, that number being as many, in all probability, as will be required for some few years to come; the remaining Two hundred and fifty copies or Five hundred volumes, to remain in their unbound state in the hands of the Contractor in readiness for binding, when required at any time by the Government.

Our opinion of the advantage of having Law works half instead of whole bound, as expressed in our former report, being very decided, we have adopted the half-bound style for both works, and as will more clearly appear on reference to Mr. Bremner's contract.

We cannot here avoid calling the attention of the Legislature to the advantage that will result to the public service from the adoption of the style we have selected, both as regards type and size of page, for the new edition of our Laws. The style of type employed (pica, solid) being peculiarly suited to Law works, and the size of page being so much larger than that of any former editions of our local Statutes, a much larger amount of reading matter will be compressed within a page of the new work, than was the case in any former copy of our Laws; and the consequence will be, instead of extending over some Two thousand six hundred and fifty pages, as would have been the result if the old style had been continued, the aggregate number of pages in both works, in our opinion, including the Laws of the present Session of the Legislature, will not exceed Two thousand one hundred pages. The present Tender of Mr. Ings is also considerably lower per sheet than was the lowest Tender formerly received by us, and that, too, for the printing according to the style of the last edition of our Laws.

Bremner, of Charlottetown aforesaid, Bookbinder and Stationer, of the one part, and the Honorables Edward Palmer and John Longworth and William Henry Pope, of the same place, Esquire, of the other part; Whereas the said Edward Palmer, John Longworth and William Henry Pope have been duly appointed Commissioners, on the part of Her Majesty's Government for this Island, to contract for the reprinting of the Laws thereof, and also for the Binding of the same, by virtue of and in conformity with an Act of the General Assembly of said Island, passed in the Twenty-third year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to provide for the revising and reprinting of the Laws of this Island," as the same is amended by the Act passed in the Twenty-fourth year of the same reign, intituled "An Act to amend the Act to provide for the revising and reprinting of the Laws of this Island;" and the above named Commissioners having, pursuant to the said Acts, lately contracted with John Ings, Printer, for the printing of Nine hundred copies of the Public General Statutes of this Island, comprising Eighteen hundred volumes, and one hundred and fifty copies of the Private or Local Statutes of this Island, comprising One hundred and fifty volumes, the said two works amounting in the aggregate to Nineteen hundred and fifty volumes, and the said Commissioners have agreed with the above named John S. Bremner for the binding of the said Laws. Now, it is hereby witnessed, that for the consideration hereinafter mentioned to be paid by the said Edward Palmer, John Longworth and William Henry Pope, or the Commissioners under the said Act for the time being, out of the funds for that purpose provided by the said Acts of Assembly, to the said John S. Bremner, as is hereinafter mentioned, he the said John S. Bremner doth hereby for himself, his heirs, executors and administrators, covenant, promise and agree with and to the said Edward Palmer, John Longworth and William Henry Pope, as such Commissioners as aforesaid, and the Commissioners under the said Acts for the time being, that he the said John S. Bremner, his executors or administrators, shall and will, with all materials to be found and provided by and at the cost and charges of him the said John S. Bremner, his executors and administrators, well and faithfully Bind the said Laws so contracted for to be printed, or any other or further Laws that may be contracted for to be printed under the direction or superintendance of the said Commissioners, or the Commissioners for the time being, not exceeding in the whole Nine hundred copies or Eighteen hundred volumes of the said Public General Statutes, and One hundred and fifty copies or volumes of the said Private Statutes, a proportion of the said Public General Statutes, as hereinafter set forth, to be half bound in Law calf, similar and equal to the style in which the revised Statutes of Nova Scotia and the Private Statutes of Nova Scotia, severally printed at Halifax, in the year One thousand Eight hundred and fifty one, are bound; a specimen volume of each of which said Nova Scotia Statutes is herewith submitted; and a proportion of the same, as hereinafter mentioned, and the whole of the said Private Statutes to be half bound in sheep, similar in style to the binding of the said Nova Scotia Laws, except as to the difference of Leather; the said works to be proceeded with and executed in manner following, that is to say: when and so soon as the whole of the printed sheets of the first volume of the said Public General Statutes shall be delivered to the said John S. Bremner, his executors or administrators, he, the said John S. Bremner, shall proceed to Bind the same to the extent of Six hundred and fifty copies of the said first volume of the said Public General Statutes, one half of the said copies, namely, Three hundred and twenty-five volumes, to be half bound in calf, and the other half, or Three hundred and twenty-five volumes, thereof half bound in sheep, in the style and manner aforesaid; each sheet of the work being by the said John S. Bremner, his executors or administrators, well and sufficiently pressed in glazed wrappers, previously to being bound, and each volume being lettered in Roan or coloured Sheep Labels, one for Title and the other for Number of volume; and when and so soon as the whole of the printed sheets of the second volume of the said Public General Statutes shall be delivered to the said John S. Bremner, his executors or administrators, he or they, each sheet

being first properly pressed in glazed wrappers as aforesaid, shall proceed to Bind the same to the like extent of Six hundred and fifty copies thereof, one half, namely, Three hundred and twenty-five volumes, to be half bound in calf, and the other Three hundred and twenty-five volumes, half bound in sheep, and the whole lettered and executed in the style and manner aforesaid; the said John S. Bremner hereby binding himself, his executors and administrators, to deliver to the said Commissioners for the time being, executed and finished in a substantial and workmanlike manner, One hundred volumes at least per month from the time such printed sheets of the said several volumes respectively shall be delivered to the said contractor, and the remaining Two hundred and fifty copies, or Five hundred volumes of the said Public General Statutes, which shall remain in the hands of the said John S. Bremner, his executors or administrators, unbound, shall be pressed, folded, gathered and tied up by him or them in bundles so as to be ready for binding by the said John S. Bremner, his executors or administrators, at any time, or from time to time afterwards, as the same may be required by the Commissioners for the time being, or by Her Majesty's Government, such remaining Two hundred and fifty copies to be half bound in either of the above styles, or partly in each, as may hereafter be specified or required by the said Commissioners for the time being, or by Her Majesty's Government; and so soon as the printed sheets of the said Private or Local Statutes shall be delivered to the said John S. Bremner, his executors or administrators, he or they shall forthwith proceed to bind and execute the same as follows, that is say: the whole One hundred and fifty volumes to be half bound in sheep, each sheet being previously pressed in glazed wrappers in manner aforesaid, and shall deliver the said volumes properly executed, finished and lettered to the said Commissioners for the time being, or the Government, the whole to be delivered within two months from the time of such delivery of the sheets to him or them. And the said John S. Bremner for himself, his executors and administrators, doth hereby further covenant and agree to and with the said Commissioners, and the Commissioners for the time being, that the whole of the said respective works and contract, as hereinbefore specified, shall be done, completed and executed in a good, faithful and workmanlike manner.

In consideration whereof the said Edward Palmer, John Longworth and William Henry Pope, in pursuance of the power and under the authority contained in the said Acts of Assembly, for themselves as such Commissioners as aforesaid, and for the Commissioners under the said Acts for the time being, hereby promise and agree to and with the said John S. Bremner, his executors and administrators, that he or they well and faithfully performing the aforesaid contract in the way and manner hereinbefore mentioned, shall be paid therefor at the rate of Three shillings and ninepence per volume, currency, for each and every volume of the said Public General Statutes and Private Statutes which shall be half bound in sheep; and at the rate of Three shillings and fourpence per volume, currency, for each and every volume of the said respective works which shall be half bound in sheep, and executed and delivered by the said John S. Bremner, his executors or administrators, to the said Commissioners in manner aforesaid; such payment to be made by Warrants on the Treasury of the said Island for the time being, in the usual way and in amounts or instalments as the work shall proceed, the delivery complete of not less than One hundred volumes of said Public General Statutes, from time to time, to entitle the said contractor to payment therefor until the whole be completed, and payment for the binding of the said Private Statutes to be made when the whole One hundred and fifty volumes thereof shall be delivered complete to the said Commissioners; and for the true performance of all and every the covenants, clauses and agreements herein contained on the part and behalf of the said John S. Bremner, his executors and administrators to be done, observed and performed, he the said John S. Bremner doth hereby bind himself, his heirs, executors and administrators, unto the said Edward Palmer, John Longworth and William Henry Pope, and to the Commissioners for the time being, by virtue of the said Acts, in the sum of Four hundred pounds, of the now current money of the said Island, as and by way of special and liquidated damages now by these presents mutually fixed, assessed and agreed upon by and between the said parties to be paid by the said John S. Bremner, his executors and administrators, to the said Commissioners, or the Commissioners for the time being, acting

School Visitor's Report.—1861-2.

CHARLOTTETOWN, 9th April, 1862.

At a Special Meeting of the Board of Education, held this day, the Report of the Visitor of Schools for the past year was submitted, which having been read—the following suggestions, offered in the Report, were entertained by the Board, and ordered to be submitted for the consideration of the Legislature :—

1. The necessity of having the City Schools graded.

2dly. The propriety of raising the Normal School to the condition of a High School, in addition to its own peculiar functions.

With reference to the first head, the Board approve of the principle, and as the change proposed would increase the efficiency without adding to the number of Schools, it was accordingly recommended that three of the City Schools taught by females be classed as *Primary*, in which both sexes up to a certain age or standard of attainment shall be taught, and that three other schools taught by males, be classed as *Intermediate*, in which both sexes of an age beyond that limited to the Primary Schools shall receive instruction—the Teachers of the Intermediate Schools should be able to teach the rudiments of Latin and Greek, Mathematics, Book-keeping and History.

To secure suitable premises for the carrying out of this arrangement, the Board depute three of their number—the Rev. D. Fitzgerald, H. Daniel, and G. Sutherland, to wait upon the Government and City Council to obtain their approval and solicit their co-operation.

The Board further approve of the Normal School having associated with it a high department, rendering it a training establishment for the Prince of Wales' College; and recommend that a suitable apartment for this purpose be provided, and a qualified Teacher procured. It is submitted that the same principle be extended to the country, and by the union of several Districts, High or Grammar Schools, in which the classics would be taught, would spring up in different sections of each County.

To secure a more thorough and efficient inspection of Schools, the Board deem an alteration in the existing system advisable. Believing that no individual can adequately fulfil the duty of visiting and examining twice in each year, every public School in the Island, the Board suggest the propriety of providing for the appointment of a School Visitor for each County—the Visitor for Queen's County to be Superintendent of the others;—the salaries to be in proportion to the responsibility and the amount of labour devolving upon each of these Officers.

All which is respectfully submitted.

TO THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

MR. PRESIDENT AND GENTLEMEN ;

As I am informed by your Secretary that he has been ordered by you to notify me to prepare for your consideration, the annual Report and Statistics of Schools, I respectfully submit this communication in reply to your injunctions.

Permit me, *in limine*, to remind you of the time I had to devote in carrying out the orders of the Board with regard to disputes that could not be settled without convening meetings of all interested, and also preparing reports detailing the information thus ascertained for your guidance. Consequently, as such distractions of my attention from the chief duty of my department to vexatious emergencies caused embarrassing interruptions, and exposed me to the imputation of negligence. I think, therefore, that, in self defence, I ought to revert on this occasion to the difficulties in which I have been entangled.

The disputes in Upper Westmoreland and the Johnson Road Districts are notorious cases. I may also mention Cumberland, Lot 65, and Campbellton, Lot 21. In each of these places, consultations with trustees and people occupied time that would otherwise have been applied to more pleasant and less perplexing duties in other Districts. The number of Schools to be inspected, irregular vacancies, and the limited time within which the real condition of all of them, with few exceptions, can be fairly estimated, ought to be duly considered.

Allow me also to remind you that the weather has been for months back, with short intermissions, remarkably unfavourable to travellers ; so much so that the public roads were for days impassable. In fact, for weeks in succession few schools had the average attendance; many had fewer than half that complement, and in several cases a supply of firewood—indispensable in cold stormy days to the comfort of the children able to travel to school—could not be procured. These untoward contingencies not only decreased the attendance of scholars, but likewise interrupted my visitations. Notwithstanding, I embraced opportunities to accomplish investigations ordered by the Board.

The Secretary received since your last session an application for the inspection of a new School-house, McLean's Road, Lot 66, and at his recommendation I visited that locality. In my opinion the building is suitable and sufficient, and the exigencies existing justify the urgency with which the inhabitants of that populous, flourishing settlement apply for the immediate organization of their school. In view of the large expenditure for schools I proposed to Mr. Ployer, the chairman of the trustees, the expediency of engaging a female teacher, which arrangement would suit them and save an unnecessary outlay of the public funds. Thence I proceeded to the Albion, the Sturgeon, and the Gaspereaux Districts as they were thinly attended when I formerly visited that section of the country during my summer circuit.

Although I did not reply to the strictures on my last Report by an anonymous critic, yet I resolved if I had in future similar duty to perform, that, to avoid any reasonable pretext for imputing blame to the Board for my deficiencies, I would furnish first for your inspection, a short summary of the principal suggestive remarks I deem it advisable to offer, anxious to ascertain your views before I would complete my Report, for which purpose I now submit the subsequent synopsis.

1. In consequence of the changes and improvements needed to develop and diffuse the benefits of the free system, there has been an urgent necessity for the advancement of the qualifications of teachers, the augmentation of their salaries, and also the organization of additional schools ; and as there is not yet a "connecting link" between the Prince of Wales College and the common seminaries, how and where are students to prepare themselves for the curriculum of that Institution ?

2. To remedy, to some extent, this defect in our educational machinery, I suggest that the City Schools would be graded, and the higher branches taught in the Normal School, together with the professional training of Teachers.

The present mode of management should be altered, and the discipline merge into one Board of "Regents," which would result in a concurrent uniformity of System, and render these schools available, as suitable models subservient to the Normal School.

3. Modifications of the gradation plan are adapted to the circumstances of the people in several sections of the country; some districts may be advantageously united to maintain a Grammar School, with one or more primary schools, conducted by competent females, who would teach the elementary branches on the methods practised in the high School.

4. Prospects of permanent employment in a useful department of the public service would encourage young women to study for the profession; and as the Grammar Schools would be open only in winter and spring, many of the masters would attend the summer session of the Prince of Wales College.

5. Facilities and inducements for the attainment of the higher branches should be devised, and I think arrangements may be adopted to remedy existing defects and deficiencies in our system, without incurring any increase of expense.

6. Our youth should enjoy the opportunities of studying the rudiments of commercial transactions in one of the high schools in the city; and perhaps a female academy will be, ere long, established for the special benefit of our fair sex.

This sketch of suggestions is expressly given for the purpose enunciated, viz: to ascertain if you approve of my views as a whole or in part.

I have endeavored to collect from various sources, improvements adopted by eminent men, and to condense them for your inspection, in a supplementary series; but I do not by any means expect that all my suggestions will receive your unqualified assent. This has been the practice of distinguished educators in Europe and America, on the catholic principle that "to borrow and appropriate what has been proved good, is no reproach;" and I aim to keep pace with the spirit of the age, by collecting information and documents from other countries. Our Free System and the Normal School have been instituted on this policy; and as that system has been introduced, it must be perfected by modifications assimilated to "the ways and means" found by experience, in similar circumstances, to be indispensable. The advantages of the system are as yet prospective in their development.

EVIL OF SMALL SCHOOL DISTRICTS.

The dividing of a Township or Lot into small school districts, is an insuperable obstacle to the establishment and maintenance of efficient schools. The ordinary pretext for the division and sub-division of Districts, is the greater proximity afforded to a portion of the inhabitants to the school house. To this single fancied benefit, considerations of much greater importance are often sacrificed.

The idea seems to be entertained by many, that it is a great hardship for children to travel a mile, or even half a mile to school, and that those individuals are most favored who find the school house nearest their houses. It is true there are a few stormy days in the year when the nearness of the school house may be deemed a convenience. But all children of school-age exercise and fatigue themselves daily to a much greater extent than is produced by one, or even two miles' travel. The most experienced teachers testify, that, as a general rule, those children who live farthest from the school house are the most punctual in their daily attendance, and make the greatest progress in their studies.

The formation and alteration of school districts, and determining the sites of school houses have often been attended with serious inconvenience, and have given rise to many disputes.

A disagreement about the location of a school house, or the employment of a particular teacher, and sometimes a less important occurrence has led to the division of a school district, and thus inflicted a paralyzing impotency upon each of its parts. Such a dismemberment of a school district into hostile parties, and family factions, though it may leave the body, drains out its life blood. In all free communities, where the elective principle prevails in local affairs, the minority must submit to the majority, in affairs included within the legitimate provisions of the social compact. Trustees are legally elected administrators of the school affairs of each school district. If they do badly, they may and should be superseded by others; but while they are in office, they are, in the school affairs of the district, the powers that be,—made so by choice of their neighbours, and should therefore be submitted to by the minority as well as the majority of their constituency.

ATTENDANCE ON THE SCHOOLS AND THEIR SUPPORT.

Teachers in general complain of the irregular attendance of their scholars—which is certainly a great hindrance to the success of our system, and the prolific source of the evils that must be eradicated in the work of improving our schools.

Absence necessarily checks the progress of the absentees, and retards, more or less, the advancement of such as attend regularly. This serious grievance, so detrimental to the efficiency of schools—is in many cases imputed to carelessness and indifference on the part of parents. In the amendment of the School Act, Sec. 32, designed to promote regular attendance, when it falls below the standard average of 18—proportionably decreases the government allowance to teachers. For any deficiency occurring, the people are *liable*, but the assessment for that purpose raises disputes. Such as have no children being educated, consider the tax an oppression; and those whose children have punctually attended, reasonably resist any additional assessment. So that, to avoid unpleasant feuds—there is a strong temptation to evade the requirements of this amendment, consequently that section of the existing law does not in all cases of irregularity, secure the desired result.

It is to be regretted that any children should be thus deprived of the benefits which our education scheme is designed to secure and diffuse, and especially so since the legislative provision for the moral and intellectual improvement of youth, involves an enormous expenditure of the revenue; as it seems that this boon is not fully appreciated, many of our political economists argue that it is comparatively valueless, and therefore object to the system of free schools, alleging that it begets apathy or an abatement of public interest which is so essential to its efficiency. But by way of partial vindication of the accused, it may be remarked that the mere appropriation of money for educational purposes, could not be expected to impart immediately, to people who had no just idea of the importance of education, or of the means by which it could be acquired, the qualifications indispensable to exercise judiciously the privileges in their option. Yet the indifference and lethargy in many localities, may, perhaps, justify the objection urged, which is especially entitled to deliberate consideration, as it derives some force from the experience of other countries in which the subject of self-taxation on a limited scale, is advocated—on the principle “that when the means of education are furnished by a fund or obtained from a general tax assessed by the government,” a public system of education, sustained in either way will never be vigorous and progressive.

The cardinal idea of the free school system is to make property, whether it represents children or not, chargeable with their support. The Honorable Henry Barnard recommends that the duty of education and of the support of schools should devolve,

Firstly.—On the parents of children;

Secondly.—On the neighbourhood where they live; and

Thirdly.—On the State.

He suggests : that the appropriation on the part of government should be so applied as to quicken parental duty, and ensure the zeal and liberality of communities.

In some districts there are some who entertain the prejudices of the "olden times," that "any person will do for a teacher—any place for a school house, and absolutely nothing for apparatus."

But it is gratifying to observe the beneficial effects of the recent impulse towards the improvement of common schools, although all the benefits resulting may not and cannot yet be seen. Many school houses have been built, and a greater number repaired, after approved models ; in fact, much more has been accomplished in this respect, within the last five years than during the previous twenty.

The advantages naturally arising from the facilities and inducements that have been recently provided for such as wish to qualify themselves to become teachers, or increase their previous attainments by an appropriate course of study, and by a practical acquaintance with the duties of the profession, are successfully exemplified in many districts in each County.

Notwithstanding these auspicious prospects of progressive improvement, dissatisfaction prevails, as the proceeds of the special tax levied for maintaining the free system, do not cover the expense accruing and accumulating ; and further, as defects visible in the early stages of its development, and which still, to a certain extent, exist, have elicited objections of a counteracting tendency, there are many who, under the combined influence of these adverse impressions, are desirous of abolishing the system. However, opposition is gradually disappearing as the deficiencies are remedied : and it is to be hoped, that the enlightened and liberal in every community repudiate the idea of abolishing it. Without doubt, agitation for a measure having that deplorable tendency, would be a backward movement and a suicidal policy.

Probably modifications of our school system and its agencies, at the present crisis, may both rectify defects, and reduce the expenditure.

The distinguishing characteristic of free education recognizes the principle that every person is born with the right of instruction ; that if parents or guardians fail to fulfil their duty in relation to the natural claim of their children to instruction, they shall be educated directly by the State ; and since we have adopted this educational polity, can it, with consistency, and due regard for the claims of the rising generation, be abandoned ?

In this connection I advert to some erroneous opinions entertained in relation to the Normal School. It is alleged,

Firstly.—That no direct benefit is derived from it in the least degree commensurate with the outlay incurred to institute and sustain it ; that it does not afford any advantages superior to those obtained in many common schools. Such objections evidently show that those who make them have no idea of what a Normal School should be. A common school is intended for general education, but the Normal is designed to train candidates for a special profession.

If the Model department attached to the Normal School had convenient apartments, suitably furnished with the essential equipments for visible illustrations, in that case, it might and ought to be an efficient practising school, in which children would be instructed in the rudimentary English branches, and pupil-teachers could be exercised in practical discipline, and their aptitude for the profession would, in the routine of training be thus ascertained. On the supposition that the instrumentalities needed for these important purposes are actually provided and accessible in the Normal School and its auxiliary, even then, graduates, when they become schoolmasters, can merely exemplify the improved methods they studied and practised in the Normal School—on a very imperfect, limited scale, for as yet few, if any, district school houses are adapted for such an important arrangement. Appropriate appointments must be first secured, before "this consummation devoutly to be wished" happens. Above all, irregular attendance of scholars nullifies efforts made for systematic management.

Secondly.—The time required to complete the course—five months—is supposed too long ; but all acquainted with the needs of those who attend the Normal School believe that the session

is—too short. Yet, the fact that many of the pupil-teachers have to defray their expenses from a small or borrowed capital, has been considered in defining the time required for the completion of the course.

Thirdly.—The standard of admission and attainment is reckoned too low by some, and by others too high; undoubtedly, applicants have been admitted who were unprepared to commence professional training; and in these cases the time and attention were given to the acquisition of a sufficient knowledge of the elementary branches, which should have been devoted to the study of the theory and practice of the art of teaching. No Normal School works up to its theory, any more than does any other school where the aim is high.

Fourthly.—Several complain that many of the graduates are too young to undertake the responsible work of teaching; admitting this objection to be well founded, there is now ample scope for the selection of suitable teachers, and the separation of the chaff from the wheat.

These remarks on complaints preferred against the Normal School are intended for such as are really ignorant of its principles, and of the embarrassments that all engaged in its administration, have hitherto had to encounter. It is much easier to see mistakes than the way to rectify or prevent them.

The directors and teachers of this preparatory seminary desire to make it what it should be; they are ready to consider objections and suggestions; but they may reasonably claim that those objections and suggestions shall be intelligent; that they shall come from those who understand the duties and difficulties of their position.

On this subject, Professor Lemuel Stephens remarks: "In the establishment of teachers' seminaries, their utility and success will depend entirely upon their appropriate organization. In the experiment of introducing such institutions into any country, ample provision should be made for employing a sufficient number of teachers to conduct them. Seminaries conducted by one or two teachers cannot be otherwise than imperfect; and while but little good would come from them, there is great danger that their failure would serve to bring the cause into disrepute."

SCHOLARSHIPS.

The selection of the complement of candidates for the Scholarships from the applicants in each County, in accordance with the 13 Sec., cap. 17, 23 Vic., is a very perplexing duty.

Several parents are of opinion that this endowment is intended to induce and encourage young men to qualify themselves for masterships in the country schools; that the competitive examination should be restricted to candidates immediately from district schools; therefore, they affirm that no youth who attended an Academy or College should enjoy the privilege of competing, as otherwise such candidates as have not had the preparatory advantages of an academic education cannot have a fair chance of success. Again, others give a different interpretation of the spirit of the enactment, and maintain that it does not intend the boon for the exclusive benefit of young men direct from the common schools, and argue in confirmation of their opinion that a pupil for some time in the Central Academy, was a successful competitor at the last examination. Such conflicting opinions complicate the proper choice of candidates.

In my humble opinion, the limitation to six candidates from each County is an impolitic provision, for I believe that the removal of this restriction would tend to excite a more general emulation, as in that case the chance of enjoying the advantages of the endowment would be open and free to all eligible to offer.

These differences in public sentiment are the aim and end of the endowment for scholarships, have evoked discussion on the policy of establishing "Grammar" or "High Schools" in the rural district; the master thereof being able to instruct youth so far as they may be fitted for the College.

Many persons familiar with the Scottish Parish School system, propose that we should have in each county, several schools established on that model, in which a sound education in Eng-

lish, and also the rudiments of Latin, may be obtained, so that a pupil from the country could have such an elementary knowledge as to admit of his joining with advantage the primary classes in College. By thus connecting our common schools with our higher institutions, the union could not fail to contribute essentially to their elevation, and bring the means of a thorough and complete education within the reach of all. Amidst the general efforts to arouse public attention to the education of youth, no better argument has been found, or more frequently employed than the good conduct of the poorer classes in Scotland; but the renown of her parish school system is not owing solely to its aim to secure general education, in the rudiments of learning; it is no less celebrated for its full conception of the gradation scheme. This ancient theory recognised the Grammar School and College as no less essential than the Primary Schools. Any theory of common school education which excludes the principle of an intimate and vital relation of dependence upon the higher seminaries, should not be sanctioned.

It is sometimes said that Grammar Schools and Colleges exist for the benefit of a favored class, and have therefore an aristocratic tendency, and that in reality the common school is "the people's college."

Dr. Arnold, of Rugby, says "the study of Latin and Greek is important as a school exercise, mainly, because it enables us to understand and employ well that language in which we commonly think, speak and write." This testimony in favor of a classical education, even in the study of English Grammar and composition, is quoted with a view of adopting its spirit on a modified scale. Although many eminent men argue that the study of the classics should be dispensed with as part of a liberal education, and something more practical substituted; yet while the course of instruction in our district schools must be confined to the rudiments of an English education under existing circumstances, the advantages of instruction in the classics, should be accessible to as many of the youth in rural districts as possible, with a special view to the essential attainments of a Schoolmaster, and thus provide competent teachers for the districts.

If the mutual relations of the higher and lower schools be looked at historically, it will be clearly seen that progressive movements have always begun in the former.

The elevation of the standard of admission to Colleges has been followed by a corresponding advancement in the course of instruction in Academies and Grammar Schools.

In addition to the facilities which a college affords to aspirants to the learned professions, it also furnishes suitable advantages for training teachers, imparts a quickening activity to all the lower grades of schools in succession, and thus raises a generous spirit in favor of improvement and progress, in every department of the the general system, so that no more certain plan of elevating the district schools could be devised than the establishment of a college.

This topic is more minutely discussed under the impulse of a conviction, that as opinions disparaging to our college have been propounded and propagated, having a tendency to conflict with the great ends of popular education, some remarks on the misconception of the true idea of a college should be included in my official suggestions to the Board.

THE RE-EXAMINATION OF TEACHERS.

Among the several subjects calling for special observation in this department, are the results of the re-examination of teachers. Various opinions have been expressed with respect to the intention and extent of this examination; and at first, a feeling was exhibited by anonymous correspondents in newspapers, signifying that the examiners had adopted a scale of attainments too high for the office of district schoolmasters.

In consequence of a malignant perversion of facts, caricaturing the mode of conducting the examination, and published by a party evidently designing to raise prejudices against the Board, some reference to the beneficial results which this inquest has already produced, may probably be desirable. However, sufficient experience has now been had, to satisfy the intelligent and

unbiased, that no member of the Board had any desire to overstep the path of duty, or to aim at the attainment of any other object than that of imparting such a salutary and elevating influence to the district schools in the three counties, as must necessarily harmonize with and be subservient to the wishes and ends indicated in the statute.

As misconceptions of the nature of this examination are still entertained by some communities, is it not, therefore, advisable that all under the influence of erroneous impressions would become acquainted with the truth in this important matter; especially as there are some individuals who think that a much lower criterion would be sufficient to determine the competency of teachers in charge of inferior or juvenile schools. This supposition implies that the conditions on which licenses are granted should be relaxed, and regulated according to the exigencies of schools. Certainly, practical skill, far more than profound knowledge, is the essential desideratum in school masters for all sorts of schools; but still if a man is to be a teacher, the first requisite is that he should have something to teach: there are, however, in the profession, men who have a peculiar gift, not exactly of teaching, but of making children learn. In schools conducted by such men, strange results are seen: the scholars know more than their masters! and yet they owe all their knowledge to their guidance. But such cases are exceptions, and rare exceptions, and doubtless to lower the present minimum standard of attainments, would result in incalculable mischief to the cause of education.

The large proportion of teachers to whom an augmentation of salary has been awarded, certainly affords a strong presumption that the examination has not been unreasonably high in its requirements. An examination cannot be effective or beneficial which arranges its standard in order to accommodate itself to the capabilities of the examined; but there is unquestionably a limit which should not be exceeded; the scale adopted is unexceptionable; not so low as to raise disdain, and minister to inaction, nor yet so high as to be beyond the reach of ordinary attainments.

The recent alteration in the routine of examination has given a salutary impulse to teachers in the prosecution of their studies. Many of the successful competitors bear a strong testimony to the advantages to be derived from the scheme: the inducements to perseverance on the part of the unsuccessful in the revisal and enlargement of their acquisitions have produced gratifying results. Several have in this respect shewn an admirable spirit; the number of reappearances has been gradually increasing; some have attended a third, and a few even a fourth examination; and all by praiseworthy persistency in complying with the exhortations and directions of the Board, have attained the object of their ambition.

Although it may be presumed that in many instances, candidates have been stimulated and influenced by incentives, chiefly personal, in preparing themselves for the ordeal; yet the mental labor to which they have been necessarily subjected in their efforts to acquire an amount of knowledge, which otherwise, in all probability, would never have been attempted, must have produced intellectual improvement and elicited literary taste, so that in the discipline to attain professional efficiency, the interests of the individuals and the country coincide.

A standard once assumed, cannot, unless entirely erroneous, be afterwards altered summarily, without great risk of mischief; and even if it should prove somewhat objectionable, it can be modified only with extreme caution. Notwithstanding, I am induced to suggest that the regimen of examination would, by a gradual approximation, be assimilated to the plans now adopted in other countries. This modification would embrace the essential element of aptitude to teach. The exercises would be as far as practicable, performed in writing; together with the usual *viva voce* examination.

Perhaps it would be expedient to prepare a detailed syllabus of subjects and questions. In selecting a model, due caution would be of course observed, as from the dissimilarity in the conditions and circumstances of different countries, there must be different standards of attainment and a call for a variety in the methods of teaching.

In this connection it may be irrelevant to propose whether it would not be advisable to offer suitable inducements in encouraging district teachers to study Latin to the extent of being able to translate and construe, at least, a chapter in *Cæsar*. This is not much, and might be readily acquired by ordinary diligence. Moreover, the immediate benefit of applying this attainment in determining the exact meaning of English derivatives, is obvious. In my former Reports the advantages to be obtained from this exercise were exemplified, and recent observations have confirmed me in my belief in the great aid thus furnished to pupils who do not receive a classical education, and induce me to recur to this topic.

CONDITION OF PREMISES AND FURNITURE.

The Act now in force is, on this subject, so meagre, that if a school house is *standing* and *water-tight*, it is, I believe, not clear that the existing law contains further obligations respecting it, excepting its area in square feet, and the height of post between floor and ceiling. A new era in school architecture has commenced; several neat buildings have been erected within the last two or three years. The inhabitants of Mount Melick, Mount Albion, and Cherry Valley districts, claim special reference, where the Trustees, regarding the Act as antiquated, have liberally provided premises in accordance with the wants of the population, and the spirit of the age. Notwithstanding such recent praiseworthy efforts in school improvement, as the Act affords so imperfect a standard to liberal trustees, and offers so convenient a shelter to those who may be illiberal or indifferent, it is time it were amended to provide in specific and well defined terms for the sufficiency of district school premises, fittings and furnishings.

APPARATUS.

The large number of deficiencies refer to maps and black-boards; other appliances may be desirable; these are essential. There can be no effectual teaching of Geography without a set of good maps, especially a map of the World, of America, and of each of the lower Provinces.

It is to be regretted that few schools have as yet been furnished with a map of the Island; but it is expected that the publication of Sutherland's Geography will induce trustees who have hitherto neglected, to comply with the order of the Board, to supply immediately this deficiency, so that the geography and natural and civil history of our own Island may be effectually taught in all our schools. And if every teacher would procure for his own use, as a text book, Lovell's General Geography, which is also recommended by the Board, then the study of this important branch could be made an instructive and interesting exercise.

The deficiency is very much greater in black-boards. A small square patch of darkish wood—dangling on the wall—betraying few traces of recent chalk, or perhaps none, with no chalk to make them, cannot be accepted to fill the office of school black-board. That instrument, to be handy and useful, needs to be of ample size, four times as large as many of its present representatives. It should be on an easel, or better still, in a standard frame, on its own legs, and clear of all obstruction.

ORGANIZATION.

The obstacles to the classification of scholars, and their continued employment are not few. Irregularity of attendance is a general hindrance in this respect in every school. The difficulties frequently alleged are deficiency of room, of desks and benches and of books; old scholars for winter term; objections of parents to some branches; inequality of ability.

In comparatively few schools, arithmetic can scarcely be said to be organized, being learned from the book individually.

APPENDIX (DD.)

To provide continued employment for scholars, old and young, in their seats, is no easy task, but it is an essential part of good organization, and one of the best means for preserving good discipline. Skilful teachers have invariably a time table for their guidance, but in fact the working of every school must conform to the circumstances of the scholars who compose it, and there are few teachers of district schools who can satisfactorily pursue a systematic course of instruction from the prevalence of the embarrassments already referred to.

ARITHMETIC.

There is imperfection in the method of teaching arithmetic in many schools. The cause seems to be generally in taking for granted what needs to be carefully explained and illustrated on the black-board.

Numeration, notation, and the fundamental principles of the four simple rules, cannot be safely left to the chance of individual discovery.

The deficiencies that are found in more advanced rules, may generally be traced to the imperfect comprehension of these elementary ones.

WRITING.

Ability to write large and middle text, at least fairly, should precede the beginning of small hand, which should not be very small or very angular, and large text should form a frequent exercise even at the most advanced stages of school-writing.

WRITING ON SLATES.

No modern method is more valuable than this one, and none which, with the aid of a good black-board, can be turned to a greater variety of school uses.

Considerable success has attended endeavours to spread slate writing in schools, and the effects of its practice are very satisfactory, both on attainments and discipline.

GRAMMAR.

In teaching grammar great improvement is going on. Reason is superseding rote-work. Parsing is now seldom attempted without an effort to associate the grammatical connexion of the words with the sense of the passage. In many schools the study is necessarily elementary, but in most it is now pursued on right principles.

Reading and Geography are not included in the preceding summary, as my remarks in former reports indicate such suggestions as I would, in the meantime, submit respecting these branches; but in confirmation of my views on the advantages to be derived from Etymological exercises, I beg leave to introduce a paragraph from a recent publication by G. G. Vasey, Esquire, Canada: "We are far removed from the wisdom of the Greeks when we consider Etymology as a frivolous kind of knowledge; we confound the theory with the abuse of it."

"The grand object of all our studies relative to language is to attain a correct use of it, and thus be able to communicate our ideas to others clearly, precisely, and comprehensively. To facilitate the accomplishment of this object, no exercises are of so much advantage to the juvenile student as those which are occupied in analysing words and in tracing their derivation. By such exercises he gains a more accurate knowledge of Orthography, and a more extensive knowledge of words than could possibly be obtained by any other means."

MANUAL OF METHOD AND DISCIPLINE.

Certainly nothing can be taught efficiently and satisfactorily as an art, the theoretical principles of which are not established and defined. The young teacher at present, as may be readily inferred from Mr. Webster's remarks, attached to the statistics of the Normal School, is obliged, notwithstanding so much has been done for his special preparation and training, to depend upon his own ingenuity and enterprise for the principal means of practical success.

Placed in a school-room with very little but the elementary knowledge of what is to be done, the how to do it is the perplexing difficulty. The success of our common school system can be augmented only by increasing the efficiency, and elevating the accomplishments of teachers.

Such being the case, this desideratum should be supplied by publishing a suitable manual of instruction and discipline, so that the principles of the science of teaching, and its processes, may be made the subject of instruction to pupils in the Normal School; and inexperienced teachers would then have a guide to follow in classifying, instructing and governing a school.

SCHOOLMASTERS' ASSOCIATIONS.

I believe that the organization of such institutions would tend to introduce uniformity in the operations and modes of instruction and discipline throughout the schools. I therefore renew my suggestions that the establishment of societies composed of Schoolmasters and mistresses, living within convenient limits, should be sanctioned by the Board, in order to stimulate them in their efforts to advance in knowledge and skill. Dr. Ryerson, in one of his reports, says, "Another important agency are the meetings or conferences of teachers. They were established in Germany in 1837, where they now constitute a prominent feature and means of both educational development and improvement. The first scholars and educators in that country attend them; anything new in the history of education is warranted; discoveries, improvements, or suggestions as to the method of teaching, are stated and discussed, and all matters relating to the instruction and education of the people are proposed and considered. Such conferences are now common in France, Switzerland, and the United States of America, where they are attended with the happiest results."

If our clergymen could be induced to interest themselves in the advancement of popular education and to present the subject, in some of its aspects, at appropriate times to their people, the necessary local arrangements could be made, and the services of experienced friends secured, for the purpose of facilitating the holding in sections of each county, in the Spring and Autumn a Teachers' Institute, where the inexperienced might witness the practice of approved methods of Education, and hear lectures and discussions on important topics relating to the organization and administration of a district school.

TRUSTEES' REPORTS.

As it is essential that the administration of schools should be under the continued stimulus of local interest, I suggest that the trustees would be required to prepare an annual detailed report of the condition of their school, with a synopsis of improvements desirable; which report should be first submitted to the inhabitants of the district, and afterwards an authentic copy of it should be submitted—within thirty days—to the Secretary of the Board.

This measure provides material for judicious action in reference to future improvement, as it leads to enquiries on the principles of education, and the routine of school government; and as the duties that would thus devolve on trustees are numerous and important, requiring sacrifices of time few can afford to make without remuneration, perhaps reasonable compensation would induce competent persons to undertake the responsibility.

Ministers of the gospel resident in the neighbourhood of a school, if invited, would willingly exert their influence and use their endeavours to enlighten the people, and direct aright efforts made to introduce and promote educational reform.

Permit me to cite on this topic a quotation from the last named authority—see Ryerson's report, page 185—"I can hardly conceive a more powerful auxiliary to the cause of elementary education than the frequent visits to the schools, of the various clergy of the land, and the corresponding exercise of their influence, in other respects, in favor of public instruction. Such visits would prompt and encourage the teachers, would gratify and animate the pupils, would tend to impress and excite additional interest among parents, and would afford the opportunity of making useful observations and suggestions; it would also doubtless be suggestive and promotive of many valuable hints and exertions in a work common to every form of religion and every variety of interest." These remarks are suggestive of a collateral subject, to which I invite the special attention of the Board.

INSPECTION.

It is the decided opinion of all eminent educationists that efficient inspection is more essential to the proper organization of schools, and more indispensable to their advancement, than all other agencies combined. In the consideration of this topic, the first question suggested is this: is it necessary for the Board of Education to have additional and more comprehensive means of communication with the districts? and secondly, if so, what shall the additional means be?

The duties devolving on this department, under the present system, are exceedingly complex and multifarious; continuous applications are made for the establishment of new districts; contentions about the boundaries of school sections are often occurring; appeals to adjust disputes about the erection, repairing or removing school houses, and controversies on other matters, derange and interrupt the routine of inspection; and further, the schools are opening and closing at irregular periods in all seasons. These vexatious issues submitted to the Board almost always lead to protracted conferences and correspondence with the parties interested; and in many instances public meetings must be called to obtain satisfactory information for the guidance of the Board. Such drawbacks are embarrassing, and cause cursory, irregular inspection; but notwithstanding the deficiencies arising from unavoidable difficulties and hindrance, the partial inspections have been beneficial.

The attention of the Board is also called to the special report lately submitted, relating to the condition of the school houses in Canoe Cove, Nine Mile Creek, Long River and Bryan's Cross. These buildings are old, dilapidated and inconvenient. In this connection, I remark that creditable efforts have lately been made in Tignish district to erect commodious, comfortable edifices. Praiseworthy harmony prevails among the patrons of the English School. The teacher's salary has been liberally supplemented, and he appreciates the encouragement given him.

It is reported that the arrangements made for the consolidation of the Seacowhead districts are intended to secure the services of two teachers, and that one of the departments will probably be entrusted to Mrs. Droillet, who is said to have qualified in a Canadian Training College, for teaching English, French and other branches.

This Report embraces the schools now in operation, and the general attendance of scholars in the counties. The accompanying formula of queries has been compiled for the special purpose of preparing a digest of the methods of discipline and teaching pursued in the schools; in order to disseminate information and to discover and recommend plans of improvements. Such a document is desired by several teachers whose proceedings are embraced in this report, and if the proposal is sanctioned by the Board, it will be ready for publication as an appendix to the report.

REMARKS.

Though the position of this School is on one of the noisy thoroughfares of the city, it is so far back from the street and so arranged that the situation is good. The house is commodious, the desks and seats are neat; globes, maps, a blackboard, and other apparatus are provided. There are accommodations for the teachers on a large platform. The building has been lately repaired; it has six large windows, a good cellar, and other conveniences in the yard. The scholars exhibit great activity, and the order was satisfactory. Great attention appears to be paid to Grammar, Arithmetic and Geography. A searching examination of a class on the meaning of words, and the analysis of sentences in prose and verse, shewed the process of instruction to advantage. Sufficient room for drilling classes in each department is also available. The assistant teacher has a natural aptitude to teach. I think that his status in the profession, and zeal and skill in discharging his duties in this school, should induce the Trustees to supplement his salary from Government.

REMARKS.

The people residing in this district are chiefly in connection with the Roman Catholic Church, and prefer either to send their children to Mr. Roche, or to embrace the privilege of elementary instruction in St. Dunstan's College—a vehicle daily conveys children from the city to that institution. Owing to peculiar predilections or personal interests, the attendance at this school has been so precarious and fluctuating, that its appearance has, of course, been less satisfactory than it would otherwise be. The room is, however, very small and inconvenient. As the teacher's friends in other sections of the city now patronize him he says his prospects of having a flourishing school are favourable. The conflicting opinions arising from differing interests and other circumstances in relation to the condition of this school, viewed in connection with the educational exigencies of citizens in King's Square and neighbourhood, have been often represented to the Board by persons supporting an adventure school, paying high fees, and who wish to organize a Union School in a central situation, having teachers and class rooms suitable for the male and female departments. The Trustees who submitted their memorial to the Board, again

urge me to interfere, and recommend the immediate adjustment of the vexatious deficiency in school accommodation, of which they bitterly complain. The public are not aware of the annoyance resulting from local controversies. The insuperable difficulties that prevent the final settlement of such grievances have more than tripled the demands on the time and attention of the Board, and caused interruptions in the discharge of the principal duties of the Secretary and Visitor. I annex to the statistics of the city schools, some remarks suggestive of improvements, which would, in my opinion, increase their efficiency, and diminish the evils to which they are now subject.

REMARKS.

When the efforts made to reopen the Orphan School failed, and as Miss Scantlebury had not the average attendance in the Grafton Street district, she proposed to remove to Trowan's Hall. and as the Board sanctioned this experiment, she commenced there on the 26th Oct., last, with a few of her former pupils; but some time elapsed before the complement the law requires was enrolled. She has scarcely had time to classify her pupils, so that the present condition of her school would not be a fair criterion to determine her probable prospects of success. She is sanguine in her expectations, and has a good chance of establishing a good school, as intended by the Board when the privilege was granted to her.

REMARKS.

Considering the variety of the ages and studies of the pupils, their general proficiency is satisfactory. The school when visited was always neat and orderly, and the result of the examination in Grammar and Arithmetic shewed that the mode of instruction is judicious. Exercises in dictation were performed accurately, and neatly written.

REMARKS.

At the examination of this school, the scholars shewed a spirit of promptness and animation, creditable to themselves and their teacher. Attention is successfully paid to the mechanical part of reading—the enunciation distinct—the pronunciation correct, and answers to the questions on the meaning of passages satisfactory. Questions in mental arithmetic were solved with surprising alacrity. I believe that the master has far more from without the school than within to contend with.

CITY SCHOOLS.

The same reasons which justify the incorporation of cities and towns for the more efficient management of their local affairs, require a like incorporation of their public school system, for the best interests of the rising generation. The practical knowledge and vigilance of a local corporation are, if possible, even more needful for the interests of common schools, than for the other interests of towns and cities.

The peculiar circumstances and wants of cities and towns demand the establishment of schools of different grades. In rural districts the population is sparse, in cities and towns it is dense: in the former a school section embraces the estimated distance which children can travel daily to and from school; but the case is widely different in a city where the proximity of the inhabitants to each other supersedes the necessity of its division into small districts, except to a limited extent, in regard to schools for very young children.

The expense necessary to support schools, classified according to the gradation scheme, would not be greater than incurred under the present arrangement.

The union thus authorised would obviate many of the difficulties and evils of common schools as they are, and secure a much higher degree of improvement with the same means. The plan of placing the younger children together would cut down the variety of ages, classes and studies, and enable the teacher, by adopting improved methods of instruction and government, to accomplish much more, in a shorter time, while the scholars would receive a much larger share his of attention.

There are several localities in each of the three counties in which the arrangement recommended to be introduced into Charlottetown, might be carried out with the most decided advantages, both on the score of economy, and the better education of the children.

The advantages of this arrangement will be seen in the improvements with which teachers could conduct schools, when relieved from the difficulties that make their duties so irksome and embarrassing.

The inhabitants of Seacowpond, Tignish have taken preparatory steps, I presume at the suggestion of the Hon. S. Perry to organise and maintain a union school.

NORMAL SCHOOL, February 17, 1862.

SIR;

In presenting you with an abstract from the registers of the Normal School for the past year, I beg to offer a few observations on the condition and progress of that institution.

An additional master was appointed at the commencement of the year, but no apartment having been provided for his accommodation, both his department and that of the female assistant have necessarily occupied one room. It is obvious that the inconvenience and confusion arising from two schools in the same apartment would, under any circumstances, be great; but in our case, the evils of this arrangement have been aggravated from another cause. The gentleman who was appointed to the office of second master is, I believe, possessed of literary qualifications sufficient for the situation. He also displays considerable aptitude in imparting instruction, together with great willingness and anxiety to discharge his duties. But, unfortunately, his extreme youthfulness, and his want of those qualities necessary to inspire his pupils with respect and affection, render him incapable of maintaining the order and discipline so necessary for a Model School. These two circumstances, the conducting of two schools in one room, and the incapability of the second master to preserve order in his department, have operated upon the school during the year, as serious drawbacks, which, I trust, will not be allowed to become permanent.

On account of this unsatisfactory state of the model departments, I have been compelled to take a considerable number of the more advanced into my own room, and instruct them with students. Much of that portion of my time which should be devoted to imparting to the students a knowledge of the theory and practice of teaching, is therefore spent in work which should be performed by the second master. I endeavor, however, to find a few minutes every day, during a part of the term, for giving instruction in school management, and half an hour is usually spent by the students practising in the Model School, under my own superintendance. An oral lesson is also delivered every day by a student in my own department, converted into a model practising class for the occasion. Besides, the students practise daily, in rotation in the model school, under the master and mistress.

But you are aware that the greater part of my time is taken up in imparting to the students a thorough knowledge of the different branches they are required to teach. Of our faithfulness and success I think no better proof can be adduced than the fact, of the thirty-seven who completed their terms during the year, every one was found qualified by the Board, and obtained a license, notwithstanding the high standard lately adopted by that body. This fact, together with the growing confidence in the school, evinced by the large and steady increase of numbers in attendance, affords ample ground for encouragement. The number of students in attendance at the close of the year 1860, was only six; at the end of 1861 twenty-eight; and we have just commenced a new term with forty-five, a number unprecedented in any country containing a population so small as that of Prince Edward Island.

Contract for Conveyance of Mails between Charlottetown, Shediac, Pictou, &c, between the Lieut. Governor of P. E. Island, and Christopher Boultenhouse, Esqr.

ARTICLES OF AGREEMENT, made the fifteenth day of April, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, between Christopher Boultenhouse, of Sackville, in New Brunswick, Esquire, of the one part, and His Excellency George Dundas, Lieutenant Governor of Prince Edward Island, for and on behalf of Her Majesty's Government thereof, of the other part: WHEREAS the said Christopher Boultenhouse has tendered to convey the Mails of and for this Island between Charlottetown and Pictou or Harbour Brule (if required), and between Charlottetown and Shediac, in the Province of New Brunswick, for the certain period and under the conditions hereinafter contained; and the said Lieutenant Governor has accepted such tender: NOW THESE PRESENTS WITNESS that in consideration of the payment hereinafter agreed to be made to the said Christopher Boultenhouse, his executors and administrators, he, the said Christopher Boultenhouse, his heirs, executors and administrators, doth hereby contract and undertake, covenant, promise, and agree to and with the said Lieutenant Governor, and with the Administrator of the Government of the said Island, for the time being, in office in manner and form following, that is to say:— That the said Christopher Boultenhouse, his executors and administrators, shall and will, at all times during the period hereinafter mentioned, (and hereinafter designated the continuance of this contract), that is to say, on and from the opening of the navigation, and until the closing of the Navigation in the present year, and also for the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty three (1863), that is, commencing in the spring of the said year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, so soon as the said navigation is open, and from thence until the closing of the navigation in the same year, at his and their own proper costs and charges provided, and keep, for the purposes set forth in this Agreement, tight, staunch, sea-worthy, and in complete repair, a good, substantial and sufficient steamship or vessel called the Westmorland, or one equally good, substantial and sufficient, and shall keep the said steam vessel supplied and furnished with engines of not less than one hundred horses power, having good accommodation for passengers and properly equipped and manned, and at the like costs and charges, well and sufficiently provide and supply such steam vessel, while employed in the performance of this contract, with all necessary and proper tackle, stores, life buoys, oil, tallow, fuel, apparatus, provisions, and capacious and sea-worthy boats, and particularly at Shediac, aforesaid, with good, sufficient and capacious and comfortable boats for landing and taking off passengers and luggage, or goods, from and to the said steam vessel, and with all necessary and proper apparatus, furniture, engineers, boatmen, mariners, and all other persons and things necessary and proper and sufficient for

working such a vessel and her boats, and for rendering her and them constantly efficient and sufficient for the services required hereunder : That the said Christopher Boultenhouse shall and will, during the continuance of this contract, diligently, faithfully, and to the satisfaction of the said Lieutenant Governor and of the Administrator of the Government of this Island for the time being, and the Postmaster General of the said Island, and with all possible speed, take up from the Post Office or Post Offices, convey and deliver Her Majesty's Mails (under which designation all despatches and bags of letters, and such pamphlets, books, and things as pass through the Post Office are hereby agreed to be comprehended) which shall at any time or times and from time to time by the said Lieutenant Governor or other administrator of the Government of the said Island for the time being, or Her Majesty's Postmaster General, or the Postmaster General of Prince Edward Island, or of Nova Scotia, or of New Brunswick, or by any of the officers or agents of either of them be required to be taken up, conveyed and delivered from, between or to Charlottetown and Pictou or Harbor Brule (if Harbor Brule should at any time be substituted by the Lieutenant Governor for and instead of Pictou), and Charlottetown and Shediac as herein after mentioned by means and on board of such vessels, so to be provided as aforesaid ; that the said steam vessel Westmorland or other steam vessel equally good, suitable and sufficient as aforesaid, so equipped and manned as aforesaid, and with Her Majesty's Mails on board, as aforesaid, shall thenceforth during the continuance of this contract, that is to say, from the opening of the navigation until the closing of the navigation in and during the present year and from the opening to the closing of the navigation in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, proceed twice in each week from the Port of Shediac, in New Brunswick, with all possible speed to the Port of Charlottetown, aforesaid, on such day of each week and at such hour of such day as may from time to time be appointed for that purpose by the said Lieutenant Governor or other administrator of the Government of the said Island for the time being, or the Postmaster General of the said Island, and that the master or other officer in command shall and will, on her arriving at Charlottetown aforesaid, deliver at the

Post Office to the Postmaster there all mails for the said Island which may have been taken up at Shediac, or elsewhere for Charlottetown, and that the said steamer with Her Majesty's Mails on board will also, twice in each week, proceed from the Port of Charlottetown with all possible speed to the Port of Shediac aforesaid, on such day of each week and at such hour thereof as may from time to time be appointed as aforesaid for that purpose, and that the master or officer in command shall and will on her arriving at Shediac aforesaid, deliver at the Post Office to the Postmaster there, all mails which may have been taken up at Charlottetown, Pictou, Harbor Brule or elsewhere for delivery at Shediac aforesaid, and that the said steamer with Her Majesty's Mails on board, will, in like manner, twice in each week, proceed from the Port of Charlottetown with all possible speed to the Port of Pictou, in Nova Scotia, (or Brule Harbour instead of Pictou if required by the said Lieutenant Governor, or the administrator of the Government of the said Island for the time being), and twice in each week from the Port of Pictou, aforesaid, (or Brule Harbor if required, as aforesaid), with all possible speed to the Port of Charlottetown on such days in each week, and at such hours of such days as may from time to time be appointed, as aforesaid, for the said purposes respectively, and that the master or officer in command shall and will on her arriving in Charlottetown on her voyage from Pictou (or Harbor Brule, as the case may be,) or at Pictou (or Brule Harbor) on her voyage from Charlottetown, deliver at the respective Post Offices, to the Postmaster there, all mails which may have been taken up at the Port from whence she arrives or elsewhere for delivery at Pictou, or Harbor Brule, or Charlottetown, as the case may be—all such mails to be delivered safely at their ports of destination without injury or diminution in any respect; and it is also hereby further agreed that during the continuance of this contract the said steam vessel and any other steamer or other vessel that may be employed, for the time being, in the performance of this contract, shall, during each trip, as she proceeds from Charlottetown to Shediac, and from Shediac to Charlottetown, touch at or run to Summerside in this Island, where the said Christopher Boultenhouse, his executors and administrators will then take up all mails which he may be required as aforesaid,

to convey to Shediac, Charlottetown, Pictou, or Harbor Brule, as the case may be, and also deliver there to the Postmaster all mails which he may have received for delivery at Summerside, aforesaid, at Pictou, Brule Harbour, Shediac or Charlottetown; and it is also further agreed that if the said steam vessel, having Her Majesty's Mails on board shall not start at the exact time required and appointed as aforesaid, from any of the ports aforesaid (without leave to the contrary of the said Lieutenant Governor or the administrator of the Government of this Island for the time being, or of the Postmaster General of the said Island) or shall unnecessarily put back into port after starting, or after having put back shall not again start and proceed direct in the performance of the service hereby contracted for when and so soon as required by the Lieutenant Governor or administrator of the Government for the time being, or the Postmaster General or keeper of the Post Office at such port to which it shall put back, then, and in each of such cases, and as often as the same shall happen, the said Christopher Boultenhouse, his executors and administrators, shall and will pay unto the said Lieutenant Governor, or the administrator of the Government for the time being, for and on behalf of Her Majesty's Government of the said Island, the sum of Twenty Pounds, and in each case the further sum of Ten Pounds for every successive period of two hours, calculated from the time appointed for starting, which shall elapse until such vessel shall proceed on her voyage in the performance of this contract, unless prevented by extraordinary stress of weather or unavoidable accident, and that if at any time during the continuance of this contract, from any accident to such steam vessel or her machinery it shall become necessary that the same should be repaired, then, and in such case, the said Christopher Boultenhouse, his executors and administrators shall and will have the same repaired in as short a time as possible, and in the mean time that the like costs and charges cause Her Majesty's Mails, intended hereby to be transmitted by the said steamer to be conveyed on such days and hours as aforesaid to, from and between the said several ports of Charlottetown, Pictou and Shediac (or Harbour Brule as the case may be), in the most expeditious manner that can be done, but always by a vessel propelled by steam if the same can conveniently

be had, but if not, then by such other vessel to be accepted by the said Lieutenant Governor, or administrator of the Government for the time being, for that purpose, as may be by the said Christopher Boultenhouse, his executors and administrators provided: And the said Christopher Boultenhouse doth further covenant with the said Lieutenant Governor, and with the administrator of the Government, for the time being in manner and form following, that is to say, that he, the said Christopher Boultenhouse, his executors and administrators and all commanding and other officers of such steam vessel to be employed in the performance of this contract, and all agents, seamen and servants of the said Christopher Boultenhouse, his executors and administrators shall at all times during the continuance of this contract, punctually attend to the orders and directions of the said Lieutenant Governor, and the administrator of the Government for the time being, and of the Postmaster General of this Island as to the landing, delivering, and receiving Her Majesty's Mails at or from any of the ports aforesaid, and shall and will send for and receive from the Post Offices at the several ports aforesaid such Her Majesty's Mails, and safely keep the same when entrusted to his or their charge under this contract, and deliver the same at the Post Offices at their several ports of destination, without delay, immediately upon the arrival of the said mail vessel thereat, respectively, unopened and uninjured, without fraud or diminution, and will not take on board such mail vessel or knowingly permit to be taken on board same for conveyance any sealed letters other those delivered for that purpose by any officer of the Post Office or the said Lieutenant Governor, or the administrator of the Government for the time being, and further that all and every the sums of money hereby stipulated to be paid by the said Christopher Boultenhouse, his executors and administrators, unto the said Lieutenant Governor, or the administrator of the Government for the time being, shall be considered as stipulated or ascertained damages, and should the same or any of them become payable and not be discharged forthwith on the application of the said Lieutenant Governor, or the administrator of the Government for the time being, his or their agents, each and every of such sums of money may be deducted and retained by the said Lieutenant Governor or the

administrator of the Government for the time being, his or their agents, out of the moneys to be paid to the said Christopher Boultenhouse hereunder, and the said George Dundas, in consideration of the premises and of the said Christopher Boultenhouse his executors and administrators and his and their officers, servants and agents at all times during the continuance of this contract strictly and punctually performing the services hereinbefore contracted to be performed, and the covenants and agreements hereby entered into by the said Christopher Boultenhouse doth hereby, for and on behalf of Her Majesty's Government of Prince Edward Island, agree with the said Christopher Boultenhouse, his executors and administrators, that the said George Dundas, and the administrator of the Government for the time being, on behalf of the Government of the said Island will pay, or cause to be paid, to the said Christopher Boultenhouse, his executors and administrators, by Warrants on the Treasurer of this Island, drawn in the usual manner, the sums following, that is to say, the sum of Eighteen hundred pounds of the lawful money of the said Island, annually, payable in eight equal payments, monthly from the first day in each year when the said steam vessel shall commence running in that year under this contract, it being understood and agreed that the said Christopher Boultenhouse, his executors, administrators and assigns, are to be entitled to receive any grant which may be given to him of them for service hereunder by the Government of New Brunswick; but that any grants given for the same by the Government of Nova Scotia are to be paid to or received by the Government of Prince Edward Island, or if during the continuance of this contract the said Christopher Boultenhouse, his executors, administrators, or assigns, shall receive any sum of money or grant from the Government of Nova Scotia for any such services, as aforesaid, then the said Lieutenant Governor, or the administrator of the Government of this Island for the time being, shall be entitled and at liberty to deduct and keep back such amount out of the sums hereby agreed to be paid to the said Christopher Boultenhouse, his executors, administrators, or assigns; and it is also understood and agreed by and between the parties hereto that in the event of an extra trip for an English mail being at any time during this contract made from Charlottetown to Pictou or Harbor

Brule and back at the request of the said George Dundas, or of the administrator of the Government for the time being, then the sum of Twenty Pounds, Island currency for every such extra trip will be paid; and it is hereby also agreed that if, after the said steamer shall have commenced running under this contract, she shall be lost, and another competent and sufficient steamer to the satisfaction of the said Lieutenant Governor or the administrator of the Government for the time being, shall not, within two calendar months from the time of such loss, be supplied, and perform this contract in her place, or if at any time during the continuance of this contract; the said steamer shall be taken off for repairs and a period of two calendar months shall elapse without her being again put on the route in the regular performance of this contract, or some other competent and efficient steam vessel, as aforesaid, in her place, the said Lieutenant Governor or the administrator of the Government for the time being, shall be at liberty, if he deem it necessary and advisable, to terminate this contract by a declaration to that effect in writing under his hand, and addressed to the said Christopher Boultenhouse, his executors or administrators; and it is also understood that the steam vessel or vessels from time to time to be employed under this contract shall be entitled, free from charge, to make use of such one of the public wharfs in Charlottetown as the Lieutenant Governor or other administrator of the Government for the time being may appoint for the purpose of landing or taking off the mails, passengers, coal or freight; and further, that the said Christopher Boultenhouse, his executors or administrators do at any time during the continuance of this contract withdraw the said steamer from the aforesaid route under this contract, and thereby fails in the performance thereof, he and they will, on demand, pay to the said Lieutenant Governor or the administrator of the Government, for the time being, the sum of Five Hundred Pounds as stipulated damages; and it is further understood and agreed that the said Christopher Boultenhouse, his executors and administrators, shall not underlet, assign, or otherwise dispose of this contract or any part thereof without the consent thereto, in writing, of the said Lieutenant Governor, or the administrator of the Government, for that purpose, first had and obtained, and that in case of the same, or any part thereof, being assigned, un-

derlet or otherwise disposed of without such consent in writing, as aforesaid, or of any breach or this contract on the part of the said Christopher Boultenhouse, his executors and administrators, it shall be lawful for the said Lieutenant Governor and the administrator of the Government, for the time being, (if he or they shall think fit, and notwithstanding there may or may not have been any former breach of this contract) by writing, under his or their hands, for the time being, to determine this contract without any previous notice to the said Christopher Boultenhouse, his executors or administrators or their agents, nor shall the said Christopher Boultenhouse, his executors or administrators be entitled to any compensation by reason of such determination; and it is also agreed that any notices or directions which under the terms of this contract the said Lieutenant Governor, or the administrator of the Government, for the time being, or other officer or person is authorised, empowered or required to give to the said Christopher Boultenhouse, his executors or administrators, officers, servants or agents, may be delivered either to the master or commander or other officer, agent or servant of the said Christopher Boultenhouse, his executors or administrators, in the charge or management of such steam vessel or mail vessel to be, while employed in the performance of this contract, or to be left at the last known place of business or abode in Prince Edward Island, or New Brunswick, of the said Christopher Boultenhouse, his executors or administrators, and any notice or directions so given or left shall be

as binding on the said Christopher Boultenhouse, his executors and administrators, as if personally served on him or them; and lastly, that the said steamer Westmorland and any other steamer or vessel to be used or employed by the said Christopher Boultenhouse, his executors or administrators, under these presents, shall at all times be open to the inspection of Commissioners to be appointed by the Government of the said Island from time to time to inspect the said steamer or other vessel, as aforesaid, and examine into her state and condition and cleanliness, and the state and condition of her machinery and other fittings, boats and furniture.
