Birth Rate Decreases.

PARIS, Sept. 14.—France is again intensely alarmed over its rapidly-decreasing birth rate. The Journal Official has just announced that during 1919 the deaths exceeded the births by 292,000. If this continues, the French race will cease to exist in a few generations. It was a better showing, however, than in 1918, when the deaths exceeded the births by nearly 390,000. This exceptionally low birth rate was caused by the high cost of living and the loss of young men in the war. In the same period England showed an excess of births over deaths of 277,000. and Germany had an excess of 59,000. This proves that England is now increasing in population at—a faster rate than Germany, whose population is practically stationary. France finds some comfort in this. Brittany, Alsace-Lorraine, and one of the provinces in the Pyrences shows that the loss has been especially heavy in those provinces.





PEKIN, China, Sept. 11. - Reports om Shantung, Honan and South Chili give details of a most serious food situation. Last year's bad harvest, followed this spring by a drought and then a plague of locusts. has brought 20,000,000 people to the verge of famine. Thousands are already starving and conditions will be still worse when winter begins. Inhabitants of whole districts are living on weeds and leaves.

Eye witnesses say that whole families have committed suicide rather than face starvation. Mothers are selling their children for a few iollars and thousands of horses and exen are being killed or sold at ridculous prices on account of the lack of fodder. Experienced foreigners sider the situation almost unpreedented and predict the worst amine in forty years.


