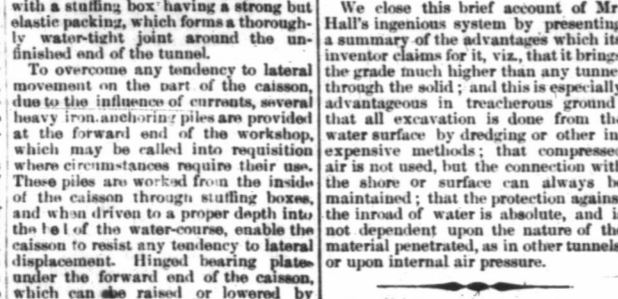


FIG. 1. MOVABLE CARRIAGE.

The biggest turnip yet is one grown by Mr. Henry Chasen, Malpasque Road, which weighs 27 lbs., and is 43 inches in circumference.

The barque George Peck arrived here on Sunday, 21 days from Liverpool, with general cargo to the owners, Peake Brothers & Co.

The S.S. Colon sailed from this port for St. John's, Nfld., last week with the following cargo: 426 bales hay, 83 bags barley, 15 bbls-oysters, 28 bbls. parsnips, 30 sheep, 2 head cattle, 16 quarters and 2 crates meat.

The brig W. E. Warner, Doncaster master, from Boston, arrived at Summerside on Friday evening with goods and to land there for the winter. The veteran pilot, Capt. Turnbull, now in his 85th year, had her in charge up the Gulf.—P.M.

The Patriot says: "Mr. Neil McKenzie, of Gaspeaux, grew 100 cartloads of potatoes on his farm this year, which averaged 25 bushels to the load, making a total of 2,500 bushels, while Mr. McKenzie, who lives near him, had 150 cartloads, making in all 3,750 bushels.

MAJOR JOHN HERRIS, General Agent in Montreal for the Mutual Reserve Fund Association of New York, is one of the latest exiles to the adjoining Kingdom. The Major is a man of great style, his furniture costing \$8,000. He has left morners behind him to the tune of \$18,000. The Major was well known in Charlottetown. He has turned out a good hopper.

A correspondent of the Examiner writes: "Mr. Herman McDonald, of Hermantown, again comes to the front, this time with turnips. Mr. McDonald succeeded in growing this year's valuable crop to an enormous size. The turnips filled a barrel, which weighed 168 pounds, an average of 169 pounds apiece. One single turnip weighed 19 pounds.

A detachment of the Gospel Army which, by the way, has taken up permanent residence in Charlottetown, opened fire in Summerside on Saturday night, with immense houses.
