BY-LAW
To raise by way of Loan the sum of
Twenty Thousand Dollars for the
purpose therein mentioned.

WHEREAS the Corporation of the United
Counties of Huron & Bruce, has resolved
to grade, gravel and improve certain roads
and highways, with the necessary Bridges for
the same, within the said County of Huron,
and whereas the said improvements are en-
tirely within the County of Huron, and the
expense of making the same to be defrayed
by the said County, respectively, the County
of Huron, and the rate hereinafter men-
tioned will be levied solely upon the
rateable property within the said County of
Huron.

And whereas it will require the sum of
Twenty thousand dollars to be raised by
loan, and by special assessment, for the
purpose of the said loan or debt, and interest
also hereinafter mentioned.

And whereas the amount of the whole
rateable property of the said Municipality respec-
tively of any future increase of the same, and
irrespective of any income to be derived
from the temporary investment of the said
fund hereinafter mentioned, or any part
thereof, according to the last revised assess-
ment rolls, being for the year one thousand
eight hundred and sixty-three, was eight
million, three hundred and ninety-five thou-
sand three hundred and forty-five dollars.

And whereas paying the interest and
creating an equal annual sinking fund for
paying the said sum of Twenty thousand dol-
lars, and the interest thereon, will require
an equal annual sinking fund, in addition
to all other rates and taxes to be levied in
each year.

Be it therefore enacted by the Corporation
of the United Counties of Huron and Bruce:
I. That it shall be lawful for the Wardens,
for the time being of the said last men-
tioned Corporation, to raise by way of loan, from
any person or persons, body or bodies corporate,
who may be willing to advance the same
upon the credit of the Debentures hereinafter
mentioned, a sum of money not exceeding
Twenty thousand Dollars, and to cause the same to be
paid into the hands of the Treasurer of the
said County of Huron, for the purposes
and with the object above recited.

II. That it shall be lawful for the said
Wardens to cause any number of Debentures
to be made for such sum of money as may
be required, not less than one hundred dol-
lars each, and that the said Debentures shall
be secured with the seal of the said Corpora-
tion, and signed by the said Wardens.

III. That the said Debentures shall be
made payable in ten years at farthest from
the date hereof, and interest thereon shall be
paid at the rate of four per cent. per annum
in the County of Huron, during the term of
the said Debentures, and shall have the
priority of payment over all other claims
against the said Corporation.

IV. That the said Debentures and com-
pounds shall be made out in either Sterling
money or Provincial currency of the Pro-
vince, at the option of the said Wardens,
and the amount of said Debentures shall
not exceed the before mentioned sum of
Twenty thousand Dollars, and they shall
bear interest at the rate of six per cent.
per annum, and the said interest shall be
payable on the first day of January and
first day of July in each and every year during
the continuance of the said Debentures, at
the place where the Debentures are made
payable.
