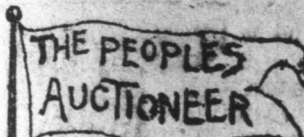

## SOLIGNUM.

A Remarkable Test! Locally made by Messrs. W. & G. RENDELL.

To test Solignum as a preservative for Wood against the attacks of Worms, we tried a piece of 2 x 4 Spruce, about two feet in length, by painting one-third with Solignum, leaving the balance clear wood, this we suspended by a wire through the centre, in the water about one foot from the bottom, immediately over a pile of stones the remains of a sunken wharf (which is the place where our Wharf Shores are eaten off first) for Three Months. On taking it up at the end of that time we found some half-dozen small holes only a very short distance in the clear part of the wood, which shows the liquid had penetrated through the whole piece and the worms had hardly begun boring before coming in contact with it.

Last year as a test of some brands of Copper Paint we handle, we had a similar piece of wood treated at both ends, leaving the centre third clear; this was in exactly the same place as the piece for the Solignum test for Three Months and Three Days, when taken up the painted ends were perfect but the centre was riddled with worm holes.

Both these pieces of wood are to be seen at our Office by those interested in the preservation of Wharf Piles or any other wood work.

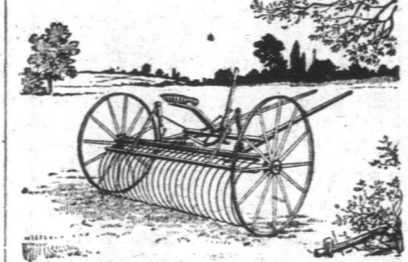

"Ah, you have seen de Montalt again," said Dessie, seeing the evidence of this in his words. He winced a little.

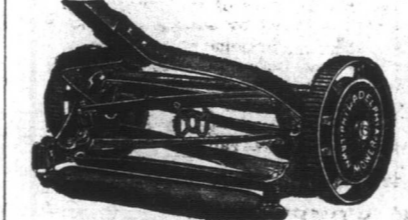

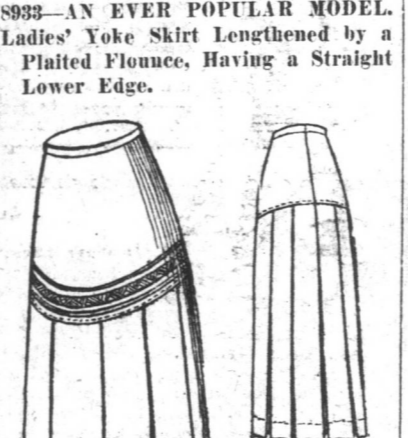

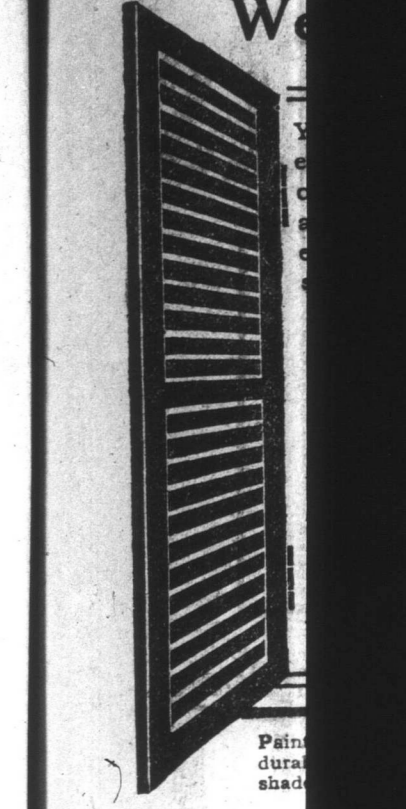

### Household Notes.

An easy way to mend torn lace is to place a piece of paper under the place to be sewed and then to stitch on the machine until this hole is filled. Use very fine thread and pick out the paper afterward.

Clean matting with bran instead of washing it with soap and water. Tie the bran in a cheesecloth bag, dip the bag into clean, warm water, rub the floor briskly with it and rinse with a cloth wrung from warm salt water.

To brighten your carpet add a tablespoonful of turpentine to two gallons of water and after the carpet is swept, dip a cloth in the turpentine water and go over the carpet thoroughly. The cloth must be wrung quite dry.

A rusty grate can be cleaned with little trouble if it be black-leaded and then left for 24 hours, or even for a couple of days. The black lead will absorb the rust and the steel can then be polished in the ordinary way.

Soak a piece of string in turpentine and tie it around the glass just where you wish the break to come. Then fill the glass or bottle up to the point with cold water, and set fire to the string. The glass will snap all along the heated line.

When washing blouses, fine handkerchiefs, lace veils, ties, etc., put a small lump of orris root in the rinsing water. This imparts a delicate violet scent to them, much more permanent than any that can be achieved by a sachet.

The following mixture is excellent for staining boards: Take a quart of a pint of black japan, three-quarters of a pint of turpentine, and if a lump of burnt sienna ground in turpentine is added, it will make the stain a nice rich oak color.

Black goods, especially when they become aged, take on a grayish hue. This defect can be remedied by cleansing the piece thoroughly with alcohol.

The fluid does not injure black crepe and is especially good when used on black hats.

Potatoes boiled in their skins make a nicer salad than those pared raw. Cold baked potatoes likewise make better fried potatoes than when cooked raw or boiled.

A fillet of beef requires a longer time for roasting than any other cut or kind of meat. Usually half an hour to the pound is none too long a time. Pork comes next; the average time allowed for a roast of pork is twenty minutes to the pound.

If water be of little use when cleaning lamp chimneys which have become very much blackened with smoke, the experiment should be tried of mixing a little spirits of wine with the water. This will remove the grease which is contained in the lampblack.

If for any reason, either poor eyesight or lack of light at machine, one has difficulty in threading the machine needle, try holding a piece of white cloth or paper on the opposite of the needle eye, which will then be so prominent that threading will be easy.

In sewing trimmings on a hat it is hard for the home milliner to fasten the ends of the threads, but if you will leave one end loose, instead of drawing the knot close to the hat, and after securing the trimming, tie the two ends together, the effect will be better.

Great difficulty is often experienced when trying to remove glass stoppers, but this method will help to loosen them. Pour a little olive oil round the stopper with a wooden instrument. The heat will cause the oil to work round the stopper and it should be easily removed.

It is a difficult matter to cut away the material under lace without severing a wrong thread occasionally, unless means of overcoming the trouble are employed. Use a piece of cardboard four inches long, rounded at one end, and cut wide enough to slip along between the lace and material.

There was a clean docket in the police court to-day. Some civil business was transacted in the C. D. Court.

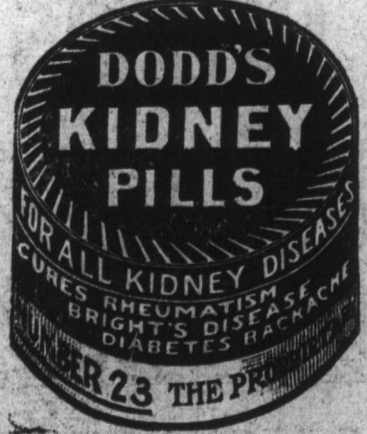
William Krefe who fell of the roof of St. Patrick's church last week, will have an operation performed on his shoulder. He is still confined to his bed.

### Sudbury Tannery a Thriving Industry.

Those who so strongly protested against the erection of a tannery by Mr. Arthur Thomson, Water Street, West, would be ashamed that they ever did so were they now to go there and inspect the building and see the good work that is being carried on in the manufacture of leather.

Mr. Thomson had a hard fight to get permission to put the building there. He has shown those who opposed it that he was right and they were wrong because from a sanitary standpoint even the most fastidious could not now make any reasonable objection. The place is scrupulously clean and wholesome and there is not the slightest odor of an offensive kind.

The undertaking was a gigantic one but it has become accomplished in a most successful manner. The problem of getting a water supply was solved in a way that would do credit to experienced engineers. Mr. Thomson constructed a dam a quarter of a mile distant on the South Side Hill where a natural river runs down, and by laying a four inch main down the slope and across the bed of the Waterford River he brought the water right into his building. Six hundred feet of pipe were laid in order to accomplish this. The supply gives a pressure of 50 lbs. and is ample for all requirements. The South Side residents have benefited by this also, as they have now a purer water supply from his main near their houses, and have also a hydrant for fire protection. Formerly they were dependent on the open brook for their water, which being exposed was often times unfit to drink.

The Tannery Buildings (all connected) extend from the margin of the River to Water Street, a distance of 250 feet. We begin the description with No. 4 building which is nearest the River. Through the entrance here the raw hides are taken in and piled up in stacks as high as the loft so that at one time one may see ten thousand dollars worth of them in a pile. After being stored they go through the first process, viz., salting to take the hair off them preparatory to tanning. No. 4 building is 100 x 50 feet, and 50 h.p. engine there runs all the machinery in No. 4 and No. 3 buildings. The tan pits which are in No. 4 are six feet deep and cover an area of 100 x 50 feet. After the hides are fleshed and washed they are put into the lime pits to take the hair out of them. They are then put into the wash mills which revolve on the principle of paddle wheels. This is known as the deliming process, and after having gone through it every particle of lime is removed, and after being greased the skins are ready for tanning. At the time of our visit to the Tannery last week the pile of raw hides in No. 4 building ready to be handled was estimated to be worth \$15,000.

In No. 2 and No. 3 buildings are the tanyards, dyeing lots, and scouring house where all hides for sole leather and upper leather are handled. The tan pit floor space is 104 x 109 feet and at the time of our visit there were 5,200 hides suspended in the tan pits, viz., 3,800 for sole leather and 1,400 for upper leather. The sole leather hides are kept here three months, but

### The Fight in the Lords

LONDON, To-Day.

Lansdowne's bill for the reconstruction of the House of Lords passed the second reading in that House without a division after Viscount Haldane, the Secretary for War, had announced that the Government would not divide against it. The Secretary said that he welcomed the evidence that the bill afforded, that Conservatives were convinced of the need of reforming the House of Lords, but the Government held that the passage of the Veto Bill was essential before any steps could be taken in that direction. The second reading of the Veto Bill will be moved in the House of Lords to-day. Liberals confidently predict that the Lords will ultimately capitulate and pass the Veto Bill, but they expect it will be repealed when the Unionists return to power.

are shifted from weak solution pots to strong solution pots according as they become fit for the process. The hides for upper leather are kept in the tan pits about six weeks. The hides are handled and moved from one pit to another three times a week. After being in three months the sole leather hides are taken to the scour house where they are washed thoroughly in revolving mills and then hung up to dry in the loft over No. 3 building. After having been dried the hides are made sufficiently damp to roll under a big pressure. They are then put by to dry and are ready for market. As to the upper leather hides when they are taken from the tan pits they are run through a press then skived and stowed on the stoning machine. They are then carefully sorted for splitting which is one of the most interesting processes witnessed in the Tannery. The hide edge is put in under the roller and in a few seconds two hides you would think fall out on the other side, but is only one hide split clean and exact in two. By adjusting the machine the half hide can be split again, and the quarter also so that you can have the leather as fine as a kid glove. The split skin is then taken and "sammied" or retanned after being milled with grease or fat liquor. The leather is then set on marble tables dried out and refurbished.

No. 1 building fronts on Water Street. All the machinery is located in the basement where it is driven by a 70 h.p. engine. In this basement is the plant for colouring and chrome tanning. The mills are gigantic receptacles spherical in shape and revolving as easy as a child's toy, so perfectly is the machinery adjusted here also is the stoning jack and several other machines used in the process of leather making. On the east side and adjoining this flat is the boiler house with its 125 h.p. boiler that furnishes the steam to drive the whole plant as well as for heating the building and boiling the colouring liquors. After the leather has come from the drying room it goes to the finishing room on the Water Street flat on the elevator. The finishing process of the upper leather here is done with the very latest inventions and improvements in machinery. Mr. Thomson's office is on this floor and here he directs the whole business with clock like precision. There are 40 hands employed and the wage bill is \$300 a week.

The new building fronting on Water Street is really an ornament to the locality. It is two stories above the ground and runs 112 feet along the street. It is constructed of concrete and is clean, light and wholesome and as sweet smelling as a perfumer's shop. The whole undertaking is highly creditable to Mr. A. Thomson and his father, Mr. C. R. Thomson, Manager of the Mill, Boot and Shoe Factory. The work is a splendid triumph over prejudice and opposition.

The quality of the leather turned out at Sudbury can now defy foreign competition. We congratulate Mr. C. R. Thomson and his son, Mr. Arthur Thomson, on the fruit of their ability and enterprise and for having succeeded in the face of so many discouragements.

### Actor Lost His Life Trying to Save Horse and Dog.

Eight Bodies in Edinburgh Fire Ruins.  
Edinburg, May 10.—Eight bodies have been recovered this morning from the ruins of the Empire Music Hall, which was burned last night. The bodies so far identified are those of "Lafayette, the great" and two members of his company, Alice Dale, who impersonated the Teddy Bear, midget and Joe Coster. Two bodies are those of members of the orchestra, and three members have not been identified. Miss Dale and Coster were natives of England. Lafayette was a German. He played for twenty years in America. During the past two years he has been in Great Britain presenting at music-halls a spectacular turn which introduced a horse and dog. An attempt to rescue these two pets cost the performer his life. Lafayette had escaped in the first panic, when the stage was in a mass of flames. All the performers and stage hands were rushing out of the place when he was seen to re-enter the stage-door, saying as he did so, "I am going to try to get my horse and dog." When the ruins were examined to-day, the actor's charred body was found beside the body of his horse and a heavy burned timber lay across both man and beast.

Most of the members of Royalty in London, Premier Asquith and the chief officials of the Colonial Office were also present. The Conference opens for business to-day and Mr. Asquith will deliver an address of welcome and then outline the Government's programme. Premier Asquith gave a banquet last night to the Colonial Premiers and Ministers, followed by a reception at the Foreign Office, attended by 2,000 guests, representing the official and social life of the capital and every phase of politics.

### Items From Montreal.

Monday, the 15th, saw the opening of "Freeman's Hotel." This hotel is built on the site of the old Carsley Building, and has fronts on both St. James and Notre Dame Streets. It is six storeys high, contains one hundred and fifty private rooms, each room having a bathroom adjoining, and numerous other rooms. This hotel has also up-to-date dining and grill rooms in which no less than six hundred can be seated at once. The City Inspector reports the hotel as the best fire equipped in Montreal.

Chief Tremblay has finished the inspection of apartment houses, and yesterday reported to the Board of Control. He states that "in nine cases out of ten the houses are not provided with sufficient protective apparatus against fire and in many instances there are no fire escapes at all." Many of the houses are built in direct violation of the city by-laws. He recommends better and more numerous fire escapes, hose and hand extinguishers and automatic fire alarms. The Board are deliberating on the matter with the intention of taking action at an early date.

This has been a week of fatalities. On Saturday last one of a number of little children playing on Des Erables Street was run over and killed by an express wagon. The driver picked the child up, placed her on the sidewalk with her friends and drove on. The jury brought in a verdict of excusable homicide as it was proved that the child fell between the fore and hind wheels. In excuse of his driving on he said he did not know that the child was injured so much.

Following this a shooting accident occurred on Monday in which Rosina Charrand was very seriously wounded. Her sister, Louise, became possessed of a revolver and pointing it at Rosina, she said, "I will shoot you." The other replied, "You can not," and immediately Louise pulled the trigger. The shot entered the right lung causing a very critical wound. The child was taken to Notre Dame Hospital, where she is at present. The doctors hold out very little hope of recovery.

A third tragedy was that of suicide. The unfortunate was a Mr. L. Daly, a one time insurance broker. Monday afternoon he engaged rooms in a house on St. Denis Street. On retiring that night he asked the landlady to call him next morning. When she went to do this she found the door locked and got no response to her call. Calling help, she had the door broken in and discovered Daly on the floor with a razor near him and his throat cut. In one hand he held a newspaper with which, apparently, he tried to staunch the blood after the deed was done.

### Rehearsing the Coronation.

It is a matter of history that Queen Victoria's Coronation was one of the biggest muddles on record. Nobody seemed to know what to do or how to do it, least of all the child-Queen, and the perplexity probably made her determine to have no repetition of such a fiasco upon the occasion of any other public function. This determination has now become a tradition, and the visit of King George and Queen Mary to the Abbey a short time ago to inspect the arrangements and talk over future plans was only an indication of the extreme care which is exercised by the chief actors in this drama of Empire.

There must be no hitch, such as King George IV. experienced when his particularly smart-looking Coronation clothes would not fit. How mad that Royal dandy must have been! Everything is rehearsed down to the minutest detail; and before the great day every soldier, sailor, policeman, doorkeeper, scullery-maid, and stable-boy will know what his or her place is, equally with the Lord Chamberlain, the Archbishop of Canterbury, and the King's Champion.

Even the cream ponies will know their duty, and probably do it well. An amusing sight may be seen by the privileged visitor any morning if he enters the courtyard of the Royal Mews. He will be amazed to see the "sacred" steeds probably drawing a furniture-van loaded with all sorts of make-weight, and a horde of laughing, capering children wagging flags in their faces and kicking up a preposterous din with kettle-drums, whilst the grooms who herd them as pastillons are probably beating drums at the same time in imitation of booming cannon.

Even cream horses can stand any kind of noise after a day rehearsed like this. Nothing short of an earthquake, a water-spout, or an avalanche would upset their equanimity, and these things are not common in Whitehall and the Mall.

But this is only preliminary to going daily over the actual route. This is like the "Varsities" coming to the Thames at Putney a week or two before the boat-race. Harnessed to a van, they go in early morning half-a-dozen times over the actual route of the Coronation procession, and are specially tried and tested at the corners. It is very unlikely, therefore, that they will "bolt" with the King and Queen on Coronation Day.

Later his grandson, Levi, in coming from school and passing there, took in the situation and called his uncle, Mr. Murphy's son, William, from Edens' store, where he works. In the meantime Mr. W. Ryan, son of Engineer John Ryan, had arrived. He mounted the roof and after great difficulty the stricken man was taken down. He was driven to his home where he was attended by Rev. Dr. Greene and Dr. Mitchell. He was in a dangerous condition last night and it is feared cannot live.

#### One Marriage Law Only.

ANGELICAN CHURCH SPEAKS.

Mixed Marriages Are Ever To Be Depreciated—Annulment of Marriages.

One marriage law for the Dominion of Canada is advocated by a decision of the House of Bishops of the Anglican Church in Canada. A letter is being sent each Anglican clergyman in Canada.

"We, the archbishops and bishops of that branch of the Catholic church, known as the Church of England in Canada, to the faithful in Christ Jesus: Greeting:

"Whereas, the minds of many have been greatly disturbed by a decision in the courts of the Province of Quebec annulling a marriage between two members of the Roman Church, solemnized by one authorized by the state to officiate at marriages and by enforcement of the decree known as the 'ne temere' decree by the Bishop of Rome; and

"Whereas we believe the said decision to be contrary to the Christian ideal of marriage, to involve grave civil injustice and to be in its consequence destructive to the home life of the people;

"We deem it our duty to address you on this subject.

We desire to remind you that the Anglican Church in Canada has ever taken the strictest view regarding the sanctity of marriage. It is a holy ordinance, instituted by God, and is the foundation of our social and family life. The Church and State must unite to guard the marriage bond and to preserve its indissolubility. To this end our General Synod has decreed that no clergyman of our church shall officiate at the marriage of any divorced person during the lifetime of the former partner in the marriage.

Deplore Lowering Ideals.

"It is most desirable that those who enter the holy estate of matrimony should realize its solemnity, and have due regard to its blessings and mutual responsibilities. We greatly deplore the lowering of the ideals and purposes of marriages which is so common in many quarters. It is of the greatest moment that those who en-

ter into the estate should be married by a clergyman of the church before proper witnesses, and wherever possible, in the church building, and that they should be in agreement concerning their religious convictions. Mixed marriages are ever to be deprecated, as they deprive husband and wife of that mutual help which the one should be to the other in life, and make the religious training of the children in the home most difficult.

"Nevertheless, we emphatically assert the validity of such marriages when duly solemnized, and we maintain that once consummated they are indissoluble.

Annulment of Marriages.

"No marriage should be annulled because of the divergent religious convictions of the parties; nor because of the ecclesiastical connection of the one solemnizing the marriage.

"The Church and State, though separated by law, must unite in protecting those who have been married by a duly competent officer, authorized by the State for the solemnization of marriages, and in upholding their civil status and rights. Nor should the State permit marriage to be annulled for an ecclesiastical offence, or because it is contrary to the Canon law of the Church of Rome, or contrary to the laws, rules and regulations of any religious organization whatsoever.

The Civil Law.

"We do not desire to express any opinion upon the civil law. We leave that to our final court of justice. But we would remind you that decisions of various judges have differed upon this question in the Province of Quebec. It is in the interest of all our citizens to have the law clearly defined.

"Whatever may be the proper interpretation of the existing law, it is of the greatest importance that there should be one uniform marriage law for the whole Dominion.

"In conclusion, we urge upon all the duty of safeguarding in every way the sanctity of marriage, and we deplore and deplore all interferences with legally sanctioned family life—fraught, not only with injustice, humiliation and suffering to the parties concerned, but as imperilling the fundamental basis of our social system."

We commend you to the grace of God, and pray that His Holy Spirit may in all things direct and rule your hearts.

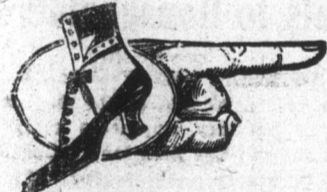

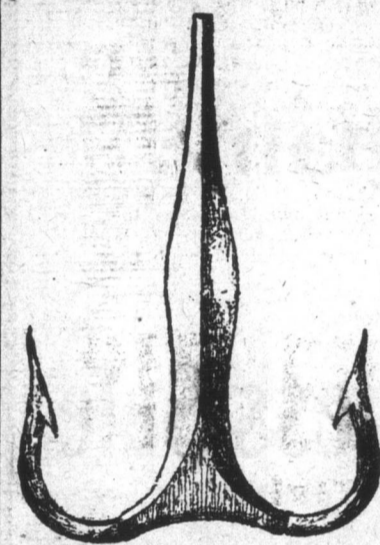
