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
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

A sweet biscuit may be made with ordinary biscuit dough, with the addiion of chopped dates. Roll the dough suite thin, spread with plenty of soft outter, and then put on a thick layer of chopped dates. On top place anther layer of dough, and cut out with small cutter. Bake in a hot oven. A delicious dessert is made of French chestnuts that have been peeled, boiled tender and mashed until they are smooth, and then season ed with a little vanilla or other extract and sugar, heaped around the sides of a glass dish and filled in the center

The latest way of serving oyster or clam cocktails is to use a new double glass, quite similar. The outer reice. The oysters are placed directly on the ice, while the dressing is put in the glass. Each oyster, as it is picke up, is dipped in the sauce.

To make whole wheat bread, take four cupfuls of whole wheat flour wo of white flour, half a cupful of sugar, one teaspoonful of salt, one east cake, dissolved in enough warm vater to make a stiff batter. Let rise intil light, mold in two loaves, let rise igain and bake in a moderate oven. A teaspoonful of shortening soda adds to the richness.

Left-over cereal may be used in either of two ways. Mixed with some chopped meat, seasoned well, it is always tasty in croquettes. An excellent dessert may be made of the cooked cereal, sweetened seasoned with spice, and then mixed with chopned raisins. Then it should be molded into cones and browned in the oven Serve with syrup or thick cream.

A delicious and simple fruit punch is made of canned nineapple shreded. Take a pint of this fruit and to it add the juice of three good-sized lemons, the juice of four oranges, two sliced bananas and one and a half cupfuls of sugar. Put the mixture in a bowl with a good-sized lump of ice. Let it stand for an hour or so and then add a pint of carbonated water.

Beeswax and turpentine is a capital polish for furniture which is not French polished. To make it, shred half an ounce of beeswax very fine, and add to it a quarter of a pint of spirits of turpentine. Stir well and put aside until the next day. Then stir again and let it stand for another

stir again and let it stand for another day, when it will be ready for use. Never melt beeswax and turpentine over a hot fire, as it is highly inflammable.





Ireland will receive for fifteen years an annual Imperial subsidy of ten million. after which she will make contributions to Imperial expenditures based on the percentage of her revenue The Dublin Parliament will consist of two houses. The Legislative Council will have about 50 members, the Legislation Assembly 103 members The Council will have a suspensory veto on legislation. In the event of disagreement between the houses after the second rejection of a bill by the Council, it will be submitted t the two houses, deliberating and vot ing together, and adopted or rejected according to the decision of the ma jority. ,Ireland will continue to be represented in the Imperial Parlia ment, but by greatly diminished numbers. The Irish Parliament will hav no control with respect to the navy army, militia, foreign policy, coinage military camps, coast lighting, and will be forbidden to establish or en dow any religion or deal with religi ous matters. #### Nuggets in Turkey's Crop

Leads, to Big Gold Discovery. Winnipeg, Jan. 12,- Reports from nas in the Swan River Valley give details of the new gold strike which is said to be phenomenally rich. Just before Christmas a farmer named Murphy, living some nine miles from Minitonas, sold some turkeys. Several flakes of gold were noticed in their crops and when the ontents were properly examined a umber of nuggests ranging in weight no to three ounces were found. No one seemed to know where the turkeys had come from, but Murphy heard f it and staked claims along a ridge of black sand where the turkeys had un during the summer and Fall. Other claims have been staked in the icinity, and in all some hundred and twenty locations have been filed. There is too much snow for much prospecting, but a nugget weighing ust over an ounce has been found and several smaller ones. When the snow goes there will be an active mining camp, for preliminary prospects show that a rich gold field has been located, with possibilities of finding the mother lode. Geological formations are similar to those of other rich gold mining regions, and two Klondyke miners now at Minitonas predict a wild gold rush in the Spring as soon as the value of the deposit becomes known



Nearly half the children who come to us in an early stage of pulmonary tuberculosis have come from families which give no previous history of the disease. In these cases some other cause must be assigned, and it is my belief that if this cause could be definitely determined it would be found in many of them to be due to careless spitting about the streets; the infection may occur from the sputum dry ing and becoming powdered and carried by the winds, the germs being in from the street carries mud or dust on his shoes or her skirts, some of it being bacillus laden. Once this is deposited upon the carpet or floor it is a simple matter for the young child playing upon that floor to carry the infection to its lips."


