Not a pound of coal is being taken out of the two principal mines in Nanaimo. SAN FRANCISCO, May 11. James V. Truscott, Vicar of St. Catherine's, Hatcham, destroyed by fire, recently, held services in a public hall on Sunday and spoke lengthily regarding the fire. He said: "There is no use to talk fire. He said: "There is no use to talk to me about flashes of lightning or gas. Some persons did this with malicious ntent." 

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
