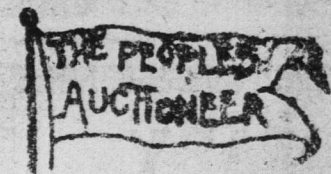

Silk sweaters with straight lines, patch pockets and glass buttons are one of the imported novelties of the season.

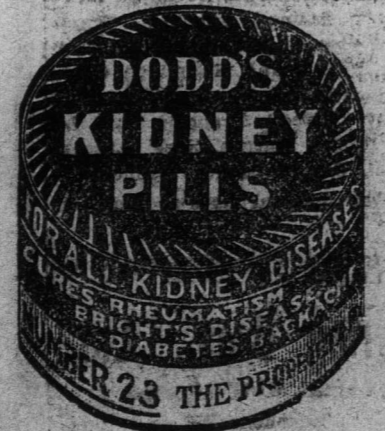
There is a world of charm in the snash when properly draped and tied, and the variety of such drapings is endless.

The Spit Ball.

The spit ball is a popular form of murder in the second degree which descends in a straight line from the Roman catapult and the Grecian meat axe. It is thrown with one hand and the tongue, and it is hard to tell which is the more effective.

The spit ball is a comparatively recent invention, but is now used in all parts of the country whenever it becomes necessary to whip a chesty pluck hitter who is standing in the breach in a pigeon-toed calm. 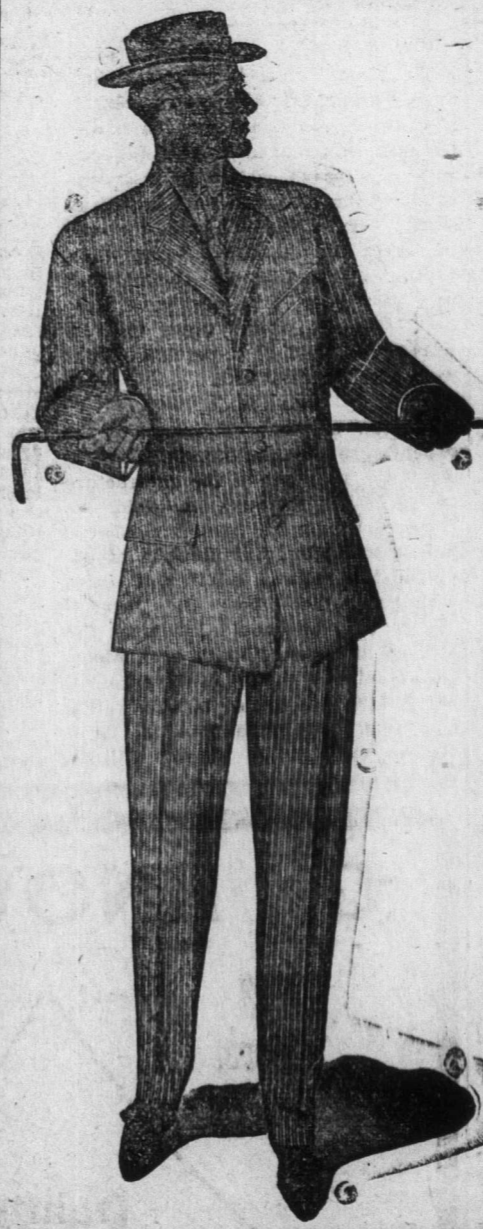

Notes and Comments.

"Sir Edward is criticized for referring to the free entry of Newfoundland fish into the United States, and we are told that he had nothing to do with it. Directly, the assertion is justified." So says the Daily News this morning in answer to our comments of Saturday.

The Daily News, however, evades the real issue we raised. We pointed out that Sir Edward Morris, according to its own message, had referred to the free entry of our fish in the United States as an accomplished fact. We pointed out that the case was being misrepresented, and that Sir Edward Morris, according to the Daily News report, had stated that our fish was already entering the United States free of duty. This is not correct, our fish is not entering there free. Fish has not yet been placed on the Free List. The law has not yet been changed, and no change is expected until July next. This charge the Daily News completely ignores in its reply.

We pointed out that Sir Edward Morris, according to the Daily News report, declared that not only was our fish entering the United States entry had been to raise prices; and free, but that the effect of the free indeed he went further and gave price quotations with the object of buttressing up his avowals.

At Fogo, however, on Saturday, Sir Edward withdrew from the untenable position he had seized upon the night before at Seldom-Come-By, and spoke of "how to-day we were in sight of a free market for our fish in the great neighbouring Republic of the United States, with its one hundred million inhabitants."

We ask our readers to mark the contrast between the two reports:—

(Special to the Daily News)
Seldom-Come-By, March 9.—He (Sir Edward Morris) showed the effect on the price of fish by the capturing of the American markets, and pointed out that already the free entry of our fish and herring into the United States is making itself felt. Herring that sold last year at \$2.50, \$2.50 and \$3.00, now bring \$3.90, \$3.20 and \$4.00."

Fogo, May 10th.—He (Sir Edward Morris) pointed out that as a fishing district the men were more interest-

ed in fish, probably, and the price of fish than any other district in the country, being purely a fishing district; he also showed how the policy of the Government had been to open up new markets without paying too high a price for the same, and how to-day we were in sight of a free market for our fish in the great neighbouring Republic of the United States, with its one hundred million inhabitants."

How could it come about if the United States market was already captured, if our fish was already entering there free, and if the effect had already been to enhance the price of fish, and if the enhanced price of herring had resulted as a consequence of these matters as accomplished facts when he was speaking at Seldom Come By on Friday, they were not accomplished facts when he was speaking at Fogo on Saturday, a day later. How did it come about that he related these matters as historic facts to one concourse of voters on Friday, and on Saturday told a different set of people they were not historic facts, but matters in the air, conditions of affairs which might come about later, prospects which were in sight.

With Sir Edward Morris so unreliable about matters which so intimately affect the welfare of the fishermen, what confidence can be placed in these campaign messages? We have seen a message which gives an account of the reception he met with at Fogo, very different from the one published in the Daily News. This account states that the demonstration was very poor, that few guns were fired, that the cheers given for him were weak, and that roaring cheers were given against him.

In view of the recklessness of the expenditure of the Morris Government, the payment of the contractors of the branch railways in gold instead of bonds, his serious miscalculations and misrepresentations of the cost of this railway building, it comes with poor grace from Sir Edward Morris that he should resurrect the horrors of Black Monday as a nightmare against a change of Government, particularly when his administration has hung round the neck of Terra Nova a millstone of Seven Million

Harnessing Tides At Hand.

British Expert Wonders Why It Has Been Delayed so Long.

London April 30.—C. A. Battiscombe is to read at the meeting of the Institution of Electrical Engineers next week a paper in which he will assert that the harnessing of the tides is about to be realized at last. Mr. Battiscombe says:

"After a close study of the subject for years I am of the opinion that all sorts may now be placed on a strictly commercial basis by the Board of Trade. An electrical unit may be obtained by this means at the cost of only about one-eighth of a penny (quarter of a cent), including everything, as compared with from three and a half pence to two-pence (7 to 4 cents) under the other power systems now in use.
"The tidal proposal is not so revolutionary after all. I wonder how many people realize the use to which this tidal power is put every day of the year in propelling ships, and, in the case of tidal basins, in raising vessels to the surface.
"The installation would not be complicated, and would follow the lines of three practical patents, taken out by Germans, for combined reservoirs and supply channels. The main difficulty to-day turns on the question of embankment walls—whether they can be built with sufficient economy to make such installations a practical success. The use of a ferro-concrete skin on the inner part, which is formed of cheap materials, solves this difficulty, in my opinion."

Fancies Herself a Girl.

Mr. Ireland said nothing, but, heart-broken, went outside and told one of the physicians that his wife did not seem to recognize either him or her sons and daughters.

"We feared that," the doctor said.

"When she recovered consciousness, she began to talk about events of years ago. She fancied herself a young girl, unmarried and not long out of school. We hoped that your presence and that of the children might restore her memory."

Doctors Hold Out No Hope.

Incidents of her own children's youth, little things that any mother should know, Mrs. Ireland had not the slightest memory of. And even when her husband talked to her alone and tried to recall the most important happenings of their courtship and honeymoon, she did not remember.

Within a month or so, the doctors say, she will be able to leave the hospital and return to her home. But they hold forth no hope of her memory coming back.

STOCKHOLM, May 11.
A smallpox epidemic has broken out here. There are 35 cases in hospital. Vaccination is being hurriedly resorted to.

OTTAWA, May 11.
On Saturday the Conservative members of the House of Commons presented Mrs. Borden, wife of the Premier, with a \$5,000 automobile.

LONDON, May 11.
The King and Queen yesterday witnessed aeronautic manoeuvres under conditions of actual warfare. The airship Gama dropped a real bomb, setting the bushes alight.

LONDON, May 11.
Hon. Sidney Tudor, Australian Minister of Trade and Customs, and Hon. Geo. E. Foster, Canadian Minister of Trade and Commerce, have reached a reciprocity agreement, details of which will be discussed on Mr. Foster's return from Tasmania.

CHATHAM, Ont., May 11.
Two men were burned to death and three others had narrow escapes when the Chatham Plant office was completely destroyed by fire on Saturday. Alexander McDougall, foreman of the composing room, and Robert Birch, linotype operator, were the victims. Loss \$75,000; Insurance \$50,000.

VANCOUVER, May 11.
Two thousand coal miners have been idle since May 1st; 800 have been on strike at Cumberland and Ladysmith for the past seven months. The mine managers declare the men have violated existing agreements, and will remain locked out until a new agreement is concluded by an exclusively Canadian Miners' Union. Not a pound of coal is being taken out of the two principal mines in Nanaimo. Bunkers at Departure Bay have about 3,500 tons, which will last the shipping demands for about two weeks after which there will be an absolute famine, so far as Nanaimo is concerned.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 11.
James V. Martin, who holds a pilot's license for the air, and a master's license for the sea, has announced his arrival from the Hawaiian Islands, with the object of attempting a flight across the Atlantic from Newfoundland to Ireland in August next in the competition for Lord Northcliffe's \$50,000 prize, for the first aviator who will make the passage inside of 70 hours. With him will be his wife, formerly Miss Irvine, who says she was the first English woman to fly. Martin expects to make a non-stop flight in a specially built French biplane.

LONDON, May 11.
Bombs were discovered in the passengers' waiting room at Lime Street the busy Liverpool Station, and at the sorting room of the Reading Post Office. The one at Lime Street was lighted, but had died out before reaching the gun-powder. At Reading the bomb was wrapped in a bulky parcel, and was discovered by the employees, through the ticking sound. It contained an electric battery and was addressed to a municipal official now on his holiday. It was timed to explode in his residence during his absence. The usual suffragette literature. Life of Roman Farmer.

Excavations Disclose Dwellings, Coins and Bones of Animals.
A Roman farm has been unearthed at Rockbourne Down, Dorset. The excavations, which were made by permission of Lord Shaftesbury, disclose the remains of a small Roman farm or "villa" inside a low earthen enclosure. The farm was 96 acres in extent, and the buildings were enclosed with a ditch, which surrounded a quadrangle 150 feet by 80 feet. The buildings found include the dwelling house, bakehouse, and a granary with hypocaust (a system of hot air flues under the floor).

The remains of a good deal of corn were also found, as well as quantities of bones of horses and cattle. A large number of fragments of New Forest, Samium, and other ware, including a perfect Jug, pots, and Purbeck marble vessels, were discovered, as well as knife blades, spindle whorls and coins from Gallienus of Constantine, during the excavations. Inside the ditch is a burial mound belonging to the bronze age, and here was found an arrow head and a cinerary urn in its stay.

Whit Sunday Services.

Yesterday being Whit Sunday, the services in the R. C. Cathedral were of a very solemn order. At 11 a.m. High Mass was sung, the celebrant being Rev. Dr. Greene, Rev. D. O'Callaghan officiating as Deacon and Rev. A. Nolan as Sub-Deacon. His Grace Archbishop Howley occupied the throne and a large and devout congregation was present. Pontifical Vespers were chanted at 7 p.m. His Grace the Archbishop pontificating. The High Altar was beautifully decorated for the occasion.

Pitch Lake in Trinidad

On the beautiful island of Trinidad, chief source of the world's supply of pitch, the article has been put to every possible use by the natives. Formerly the streets of the Port of Spain were lighted by torches of pitch but the people objected to the odor. Nothing, however was done to develop the pitch and oil industry until recent years. The indifference to its value has been credited to the fact that the Trinidadians had so many other resources, such as their cocoa, coffee, and sugar, from which to gain an abundant living, that they were content to leave Pitch Lake alone. Americans now control its output.

Buoy Recovered.

The s.s. Balaire returned from Cape St. Mary's, Saturday evening, having recovered the drifting buoy that was reported by the revenue cruiser Fiona. The Balaire left here on Tuesday last, the weather being foggy continuously which hampered the ship in her mission. On Thursday morning the buoy, which was fast to the bottom, was sighted. The moorings were removed from the buoy and it was taken in tow, a steel cable of 300 fathoms being placed around it. The buoy is a submarine bell, 7 feet across the top, which is circular, and has fittings for a light. The buoy contains the name of the maker Mathieson, of New Glasgow, N.S. The moorings are new and it is evident that the buoy is not an old one. It was found two miles W. by N. of Cape St. Mary's and it is believed drifted from the Nova Scotian coast.

LONDON, To-day.
 Another suffrage riot occurred in Hyde Park on Sunday. The Men's League for Women's Suffrage had been given permission to hold a meeting. Several prominent workers addressed the crowd of several thousands from a truck, but the crowds kept up a running fire of interruption, shouting, "Go home, make bombs," and making remarks about burning churches. The attempt to blow up St. Paul's. After half hour's endeavour to get a hearing the League gave up and the speakers were about to withdraw when the crowd broke through the ranks of the police, the wagon was overturned and partly wrecked. The police had difficulty in protecting the speakers and eventually had to escort them to the station for protection. Meantime the Suffragettes planted flags in Park Lane and at the side of the Park where fashionable people promenade and started speaking. The men destroyed the flags and jostled a woman until the police rescued her. Rev. Truscott, Vicar of St. Catherine's, Hatching, destroyed by fire, recently held services in a public hall on Sunday and spoke lengthily regarding the fire. He said: "There is no use to talk to me about flashes of lightning or gas. Some persons did this with malicious intent." He said he had received hundreds of letters, some of them from suffragettes, who repudiated such dastardly acts. A fire at a large unoccupied house in Stockham, outside of London, last evening, was extinguished after three hours. The fire is attributed to the Suffragettes. The firemen were alarmed at finding a bulky parcel in one of the burning rooms. They thought it contained a bomb, but the examination revealed it was merely a cylinder.

WASHINGTON, To-day.
 Britain and the States begin to clean the diplomatic slate to-morrow when the international tribunal of arbitration of outstanding pecuniary claims between the two nations holds its first meeting under the Presidency of Henry Fromaxool, of France. The Tribunal will judicially settle claims of private persons of the two nations, some of them dating back to the war of 1812. The settlement of accumulated cases will relieve the American State Department and the British Foreign Office of the necessity of presenting demands which constantly have been urged to press upon the other. In behalf of its national claims listed for hearing at the opening session are chiefly those in favor of or against Canada. American claims aggregate \$4,330,000. British, \$2,968,000.

LONDON, To-day.
 The Turkish delegates have arrived in London for the Peace Conference. Despatches from Sofia indicate that the Greek Government is trying to delay the conclusion of peace by refusing to accept the terms of a draft treaty drawn up by the Ambassadorial Conference. The Bulgarian Government, however, has notified Greece of its determination to permit no further delay in signing the Peace Treaty. Friction between Bulgaria and Greece still menaces the situation. The mixed commission, appointed by the two governments with the object of reconciling the rival claims over disputed towns and territories in Macedonia but failed to reach an agreement. Two sets of representatives have arrived absolutely at opposite and irreconcilable conclusions.

MADRID, To-day.
 The Spanish people are proud of King Alfonso's personal popularity in France and greeted the Sovereign on his return from Paris with unusual enthusiasm. Women strewed flowers in the King's path between the station and the palace. All the government and diplomatic dignitaries gathered at the station, and the Queen and Queen mother were there to welcome the King on his safe return.

MONTREAL, To-day.
 A collision with an iceberg in a dense fog was the experience of the Chiltern Range while on a voyage from Hull to Montreal. Her bow plates were badly dented by the glancing blow. She struck the berg striking away eastward. The escape of the vessel, comparatively uninjured, seems to have been nothing short of miraculous.

ROME, To-day.
 At an explosion at the Marazzi fire works factory, one man, three women and a child were burned in the ruins. Mayor Nathan and Cardinal Merry Del Val, Papal Secretary of State, who happened to be passing, ran to the scene of the explosion and gave what assistance they could.

A Risky Voyage.

Skipper Thomas Cull, with 6 men, arrived here Saturday in an ordinary fishing skiff from Bay de Verde voyaging a distance of over 36 miles. The proceeding was a most risky one, and the boat had a storm of N. W. wind and heavy sea all the way along. The men were constantly kept bailing water out of her, as sprays came on board the whole time. The boat was picked up by the Ingraham four miles from the Narrows. Several times on the run the daring voyagers were in great peril and were in danger of being swamped.

PORT WILLIAM, To-day.
 At six o'clock last evening a car operated by strike breakers ran off the track at McLavis and Simpson Streets. The windows were broken and the car was seriously damaged. About two hours later a mob of foreigners rushed the police station and attempted to free Peter Landi, an Hungarian, who had been arrested. The police fired a volley over their heads, they came on. Mike Marak was killed by the volley which followed and John Wulk badly wounded. The mob then retired. It was not properly a street riot, as there were no strikers concerned, but the affair arose out of the strike which began here on Saturday morning. The mob consisted of foreigners and were worked up to frenzy by agitators.

NEW YORK, To-day.
 The nations of the world are urged to join the States, Britain, Canada, Newfoundland, Australia and the Municipality of Ghent, in making the celebration of One Hundred Years Peace among English speaking peoples to signalize a new era of international good will. The invitation was issued by the International Conference now in this country, arranging this celebration for December 1914. The American Secretary of State and the British Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs were asked to transmit invitations to other governments.

DUBLIN, To-day.
 John Dillon, member of Parliament for West Mayo, surrounded by a band of suffragettes, opposite the Mansion House, on Saturday, told them he would vote against them every time. Early on Sunday morning Dillon's residence was bombarded with stones and many windows smashed. Three women were arrested on the charge of breaking a fanlight on the premises of the United Irish League about the same time.

BOSTON, To-day.
 Fire destroyed property on both sides of the Myrtle River, Charles-street, Sunday, causing a loss of \$250,000.

Woman Master Mosaic Work.

Miss Gertrude Martin Claims to be Only One in England.

London, May 1.—High above the dim precincts of Westminster Cathedral, her evrie platform surrounded by canvas, an accomplished lady is completing some beautiful mosaics. The work is of especial beauty; but it possesses an additional interest; inasmuch as the lady, Miss Gertrude Martin, claims to be the only woman master mosaic-worker in this country.

Miss Martin is engaged on designs by Mr. Anning Bell, representing Daniel, Ezekiel, Isaiah and Jeremiah. Each cartoon occupies a niche. The panel of the Virgin and Child behind the altar in the Lady-chapel has just been completed, and the effect of the figures, seen from a distance, is that of arresting beauty.

The work is particularly exacting, trying to the eyesight, and necessitates the ability to judge what will be the effect from a distance of the tesserae upon which one is working.

The tracing of the cartoon on the wall is preceded by an elaborate treatment in which special cements are used, and the worker needs to be continually clipping the mosaic material in order that it shall fill its allotted space and no more.

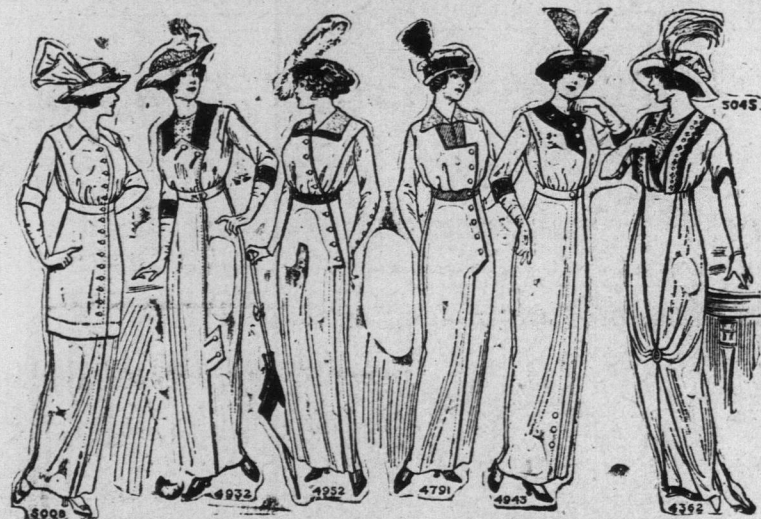

Capt. Gram Tells of Finding Scott.

Fort William, May 5.—On his way to attend the royal geographical society convention in London, Eng., Capt. Trygve Gram, passed through this city from the west to-day. Capt. Gram was a member of the Scott expedition to the South Pole and was one of the party which discovered the remains of the heroic commander and the others who perished on their return journey from the Pole. Capt. Gram denied emphatically that the loss of Capt. Scott and his companions could be blamed on any of the others of the party. The cause of the disaster, according to the Norwegian, can be laid only at the door of some fortune, who, while apparently camping on the trail of Capt. Amundsen, left the British party to the mercies of the elements and piled obstacle after obstacle in their way, until at last, after having reached their goal, the party that made the final dash was forced to give up the fight when practically within sight of the depot at One Ton camp on the return journey. In speaking of the finding of the three bodies in their tent, Capt. Gram said that Capt. Scott, who was the last of the party to die, had wrapped Wilson and Bower in their sleeping bags and both of them looked just as they had in life. One of them even wore a smile, which Capt. Gram said he had often seen on his face during life. Capt. Gram expects to leave with a party to explore the Himalayas after the meeting in London.

"All the News All the Time."

The Telegram's premier position as the People's Paper with the largest circulation and containing all the news all the time is disturbing the equanimity of the Honorable Editor of the Herald, because we "accused" him in publishing the returns of the sealfishery. Doctor A. White.

DIED AT TRINITY, MAY 10th.

"Death loves a shining mark."

—Young. As long as human affection holds its sway in our lives, so long will Death, the separator, be judged an enemy. The Hope that we have of another and better Life beyond, seems not to assuage our heart-broken grief.

The passing of Dr. Arthur White is terribly sad. Just in the prime of life, in the noon-day of his well-loved work, he has been stricken, and after a month or two of intermittent sickness he is dead. What it will mean to Trinity is hard to estimate. Sorrow will be universal. The "Doctor" there has always meant "Dr. White" for more than half a century and the "old Doctor" and "Doctor Art" (as they were called), knew pretty well all that could be known about the bodies of almost everyone around Trinity. And now in less than a year both have been taken. It is so hard to realize that Doctor Art is gone. It seems like a tree that has been cut down in the full bloom of summer. He was always at the call of every sufferer and in his ministrations he seemed not only the Doctor but the Priest. A man of marked ability, and a splendid speaker, he preferred to work quietly at his profession, rather than accept honors which would bring duties that would interfere with his work. He has always been of great service to the local paper, and unostentatiously has helped it along in a measure that perhaps only the publishers can fully appreciate. He graduated in medicine from New York and Philadelphia and in all branches of his profession has shown a skill that places him in the forefront and makes it extremely difficult to replace him in Trinity.

As a man he was respected and admired by all; he held high office in the local societies and was a prominent member of St. Paul's Church, Trinity.

And if his death shocks us; if it makes us pause to drop a tear on the slab of his memory, what must it mean to his poor wife and children? Alas, how weak words are to comfort them. May Grief as it often does, bring its own comfort, till Time, that great healer, brings the calmness of a patient waiting for the hour to come when they, too, and we, shall meet "Death, the gentle end of human sorrows."—Com.

The recital was made additionally enjoyable by the singing of Miss Clark. Those who have heard Miss Clark sing on previous occasions must have noted the exceptional progress, which she made in her work. Flirting A Crime In Ancient Egypt.

San Francisco, May 7.—Flirting was a crime in ancient Egypt, according to Professor George Barron, curator of the Golden Gate Park Museum. To prove it, he is displaying a new mummy, that of Hatason, a vestal and priestess who lived four thousand years ago.

In unwrapping Hatason the curator was horrified to find the skeleton of a small snake entwined about her breast. Further investigations re-

vealed a collection of vanity cases, which would delight the most fastidious woman. In the lot was a small fibrous affair, with an alabaster, jewel studded handle, which the curator identified without difficulty as a powder puff.

Next he came across a stained, yellow piece of papyrus. After opening it under a jet of steam he retired to his study, where he remained almost constantly for three days deciphering the hieroglyphics on the time worn document. He was then ready to explain to an interested group in the office of the museum what he had

learned. "Hatason," he said, "is described as a beautiful vestal who defied the priests of the temple to which she had been assigned by dancing before the tomb of a scarred cat. In other ways she aroused their ire, and finally when she was discovered in the arms of an archer of Pharaoh's guard a convulsion of high priests was called and the flirtatious young woman was condemned to death. A viper was secretly placed in her couch and in the morning her body was found."

Professor Barron went on to explain that the placing of vanity cases in the crossed hands of the beauty of four thousand years ago was not unusual for frequently he has found weapons and jewels in mummy wrappings and these in every case were the pet keepsakes of their owners. Hatason has been placed on exhibition.

Nickle Crowded Again.

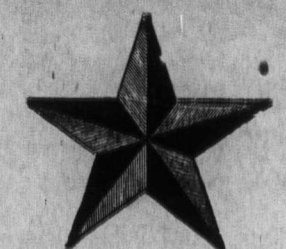


