If only the French and British are able to hold their own for the next week, Germany must weaken from the great Russian armies which have begun to invade Germany and Austria on the east. The news from Italy seems more assuring than it was on Saturday night. Then it appeared doubtful if Italy intended

Any applicant for service, forwarded by the proper authorities and not accepted after arrival at Headquarters, will be provided with a free passage and maintenance back to his home.


