in Murder Trial JURORS FOLLOW TRIAL WITH AID OF GUIDE BOOK.

FLORENCE, Italy, May 8 .- Locked in a huge iron cage in the court room, 138 Anarchists and Communists, including three women, went on trial to-day for the murder and robbery of nine Italian marines and carabiniers on March 1, 1921, during the general

The prisoners, a motley crew, glared at the jurors through heavy iron bars. Each sat on a numbered stool, and each juror had a 300-page guide book containing the photograph, penal and political record of each prisoner to enable quick and intelligent following of the trial.

In numbers the defendants exceeded those of the famous Camorra trial at Viterbo. They are charged with deiberately killing the soldiers and in-juring a score of others near Empoli when the marines and carabiniers were on their way to Florence from eghorn to help restore railway ser-
