**New Digging Mystery**

SEARCH IN RUINS OF VILLAGE INN—WIFE WHO VANISHED IN A FIRE.

The Hertfordshire Police have just taken steps to elucidate a mystery which has been puzzling the people of this part of the country for nearly seven years.

It concerns the death of Mrs. Emily Brightling, wife of Mr. Joseph Brightling, at one time licensee of the Red Lion public house, in the little hamlet of Aspenden, a mile from here.

In the early morning of August 18, 1917, when Mr. and Mrs. Brightling were the only occupants of the house, the Red Lion was burnt to the ground, and Mrs. Brightling, a woman of 57, perished in the flames.

It was not possible to hold either an inquest or a funeral service, for no trace of the woman could be found, although the debris of the building was searched several times. About a year ago a man named Barker, working casually on the debris, unearthed the wedding ring which Mrs. Brightling was wearing at the time of her death. He was quite bright, having apparently in no way suffered in the intense heat through which it must have passed.

Five Hours' Search.

Although they were satisfied with the inquiries they made at the time of the fire, the police decided on Thursday to make a fresh search, and four constables, under Detective Sergeant Herbert, from Haslewood, visited Aspenden, and dug and probed among the ruins of the Red Lion. They dug holes and searched cess-pools and wells, and after five hours' work went away no nearer a solution.

I found Mr. Brightling, now a white haired man of 70, working, as he goes every day, in the Red Lion grounds; and asked him if he could shed any light on the mystery. He replied:

"I should like to know what it all means. They are saying that I murdered my wife—the accounts. We were as happy together as could be. Of course we had a jangle occasionally, like every married couple, but I always gave her everything she wanted.

We went to bed almost directly we closed on the night of August 18, 1917, and it was, I think, about four o'clock in the morning when my wife woke me up saying, 'Joe, the place seems full of smoke.' She jumped out of bed and went to the window and said, 'Joe, the place is on fire,' and then tumbled down at the foot of the bed."

I went downstairs, and, directly, I opened the door, found the flames shooting out of the bar and out of the stairs. Twice I tried to get to my wife, and once nearly got to the top of the stairs, but had to turn back and attend that I don't remember much more, because they found me senseless under the back door. See, here are the burns on my hand and throat.

It is understood that for the moment the police are satisfied with the investigations they have made, and may not renew their search about the ruins of the Red Lion for some days, if at all.

**Tourists Fight on a Bridge**

TURNED BACK BY FIREMEN'S JETS.

NEW YORK.—Yuma Bridge, famous for many melo-dramatic encounters in the gold-rush days of 1849, was the scene yesterday of an amazing conflict arising out of the prevalence of foot-and-mouth disease in California. The bridge connects the States of Arizona and California. At this point, for a week past, crowds of tourists have endured agonies due to the rigid quarantine regulations imposed by the Governor of Arizona, who refuses to allow any travellers to cross the boundary.

After having been without shelter, baked by the sun in the daytime and almost frozen by death during the nights, motorists yesterday in desperation broke the chain across the bridge and invaded Arizona, only to be met by a barrage of water aimed at them by the brigades and State troops.

National guardsmen, armed with machine guns, are to-day patrolling the Arizona side of the bridge, while on the California side the police, who have been equipped with shot guns, are foolishly proclaiming their intention of firing on the Arizona troops if they dare to cross the border.

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
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**Belgian and Italian Ministers Agreed on Experts Findings**

**Harbor Breton Schooner Badly Damaged in Collision—Pleasure Yachts Destroyed by Fire—Senate Over Rules President's Veto—Mother & Child Burned to Death.**

**HIGH COMMISSIONER JAMES BROWN.** AYR, Scotland, May 19. The customary Sabbath calm of the mining village of Annbank, where he is to represent the head of a court, the old man's wife, still unperturbed by the honours thrust upon them, received the greetings of friends and acquaintances with unruffled ease, and at the usual service at the little church where they joined in worship, as they have for the last forty years. Afterwards the Minister, Rev. Mr. Johnston, who is to act as Jamie's chaplain at Holyrood, presented, on behalf of the elder and parishioners, an illuminated address, expressing gratification at the appointment. Perhaps the most noteworthy incident of the day was the fact that Jamie, for the first time in 36 years, failed to conduct his Sunday school class, owing to the general disturbance of his sabbath routine.

**BELGO-ITALIAN REPARATIONS CONCERN.** MILAN, May 19. An official communique here to-day announced that the conference of Belgian and Italian ministers here, has agreed to the necessity of speedy settlement of the reparations problem

by carrying out the findings of the Experts' Committee, and that as soon as the exchange of views between the Allies was sufficiently advanced, it would be advisable to convene an inter-allied conference. It was also agreed that the question be regarded as connected with the reparations problem.

**HARBOR BRETON SCHOONER IN COLLISION.**

**HALIFAX, May 19.** The Newfoundland schooner Jean E. Bullen, from St. Braxton, Nfld., was rammed and badly damaged in a fog this morning off Halifax Harbor by the car ferry, Prince Edward Island, which plies between Borden, P.E.I., and Cape Tormentine, N.B., and which was coming to Halifax for her annual overhauling. Both boats made harbor without assistance, the steamer not having suffered any damage. The schooner had her bowsprit broken off of the stem, windlass smashed and deck near the stem started slightly.

**TWO BURNED TO DEATH.**

**BRANDON, May 19.** Mrs. Walter Faggetter, of Douglas, Manitoba, and her three year old daughter, were burned to death in a fire which destroyed their home this morning. Mr. Faggetter and two daughters managed to escape.

**PRISONERS OF WAR REVOLUTION RELEASED.**

**PRETORIA, South Africa, May 19.** Nine Europeans who were convicted in connection with the attempted Rand Revolution of two years ago were released from prison yesterday. The released man when interviewed thanked the prison officials for considerate treatment given them especially those who originally were sentenced to death and whose sentences were later commuted. One of the latter, the Premier Smiths publicly for his release.

**COSTLY WATERSIDE FIRE.**

**OGDENBURG, N.Y., May 19.** Eleven pleasure yachts were destroyed, and coal valued at a hundred thousand dollars ignited, when fire swept away an entire city block, adjacent to the St. Lawrence River today.

**TREMENDOUS EXPLOSION IN KEARNEY, N.J., May 19.**

The moulding and plate shop of the Federal Shipyards is in complete ruin to-day, as the result of a tremendous explosion, of unknown origin, which rocked this section last night, doing damage to property estimated at \$1,500,000.

The blast, which was heard more than five miles away, was followed immediately by fire, which destroyed the building and large quantities of expensive machinery and equipment, and for the time threatened to wipe out the entire place. Between 500 and 1,000 men were thrown out of work temporarily.

**EVELYN WITHDRAWS MOTION PHILADELPHIA, May 19.** Wm. A. Gray, Counsel for Evelyn Nesbit, divorced wife of Harry K. Thaw, to-day announced she would withdraw her motion for a new trial. Thaw was declared sane recently by jury in Common Pleas Court.

**THE FAVORITE DEFEATED.** PARIS, May 19. Epinar, the great French four year old filly of turt racing Europeans went down to defeat to-day at the hands of Sir Galahad the Third, at St. Cloud.

**GERMAN-AMERICAN RUM TREATY WASHINGTON, May 19.** A rum treaty, similar to that recently concluded with Great Britain, was signed here to-day by diplomatic representatives of the United States and Germany.

**SENATE OVER-RULES PRESIDENT'S VETO.** WASHINGTON, May 19. The senate to-day passed the Soldiers' Bonus Bill over the President's veto. The veto was 59 to 26. The measure now becomes law, the House having taken similar action. There were two more votes than the necessary two-thirds majority.

The Nationalists, he added do not desire war, if they got into power they would try to improve conditions and would not touch question of secession.

**NEW AEROPLANE EXPRESS FOR LONDON-PARIS ROUTE.**

**LONDON, May 19.** Night flights to Paris by after dinner express airplanes travelling at a hundred miles per hour are to be attempted in the near future by New Imperial Airways Limited to enable business men to dine in London after days work and get to Paris at bedtime. The planes are also being made for service of big planes equipped with comfortable sleeping berths for flights during night from London to distant European capitals.

**FRENCH AVIATOR ARRIVES AT CANTON.**

**HONG KONG, May 19.** Captain Pelletier Dolsy, French aviator flying from Paris to Tokio arrived at Canton yesterday afternoon says a message received here.

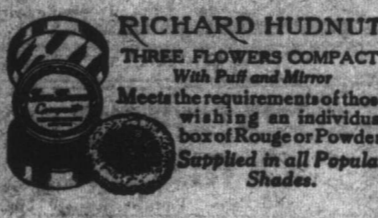

The prisoners, a motley crew, glared at the jurors through heavy iron bars. Each sat on a numbered stool, and each juror had a 300-page guide book containing the photograph, penal and political record of each prisoner to enable quick and intelligent following of the trial.

In numbers the defendants exceeded those of the famous Cossava trial at Viterbo. They are charged with deliberately killing the soldiers and inflicting a score of others near Empoli when the marines and carabinieri were on their way to Florence from Leghorn to help restore railway service.

 basis of Saturday's close of 31 1/2, the  
 6,000 shares outstanding had a mar-  
 ket valuation of \$60,843,750.  
 The record high was 195 Oct. 22,  
 1921, and record low 15 1/2 Dec. 1, 1913.  
 All transactions in Studebaker  
 during the above period exceeded 50-  
 60,000 shares, although the average  
 number of shares outstanding was  
 less than 425,000, so that Studebaker's  
 capital has been turned over on the  
 Stock Exchange more than 117 times  
 in 12 years. It is safe to say the aggre-  
 gate volume of trading represents  
 a money value of more than \$5,000-  
 60,000, although average par value of  
 the stock was only \$42,000,000.

It is interesting to figure present  
 market value of the original 100 shares  
 of Studebaker traded in. This invest-  
 ment of \$3675 in 1912 would have been  
 increased to \$10,065 by subscription  
 stock offered in 1914 and in 1920,  
 while the original holding of 100 shares  
 would have increased to 270 by these

 10% in 1922. The 270 shares at Sat-  
 urday's close had a market value more  
 than double the total original invest-

 representing a cash value consider-  
 ably in excess of \$10,000 on his hold-  
 ing. In other words, during 12 years

## Cleansing Public Life

In his ponderous Manifesto, which the Advocate published last week, Mr. A. E. Hickman declared that he is going to clean up the public life of Newfoundland. Mr. Hickman is notoriously ambitious, but even those who know him well never credited him with possessing a desire of this sort. In fact, it is because they know him well, that they were thunderstruck when they read of his avowed intentions to clean up.

Since the Advocate has been loud in its praise of Mr. Hickman, it is only natural to suppose that the proprietor and editor of that paper can estimate his true worth. That being so, when the Advocate says Mr. Hickman is corrupt, then it must be right. Not so long ago, the Advocate reminded us that in 1920 the present Premier (by the grace of Coaker), was found guilty of Bribery and Corruption. And yet this paper is singing the praises of Mr. Hickman as an uplifter of public morals!

This is the same Mr. Hickman, too, who cleaned up three thousand dollars of the public's money on a coal contract, and who wanted to know what there was in it for him, when asked to join Mr. Warren's Cabinet a few weeks ago.

Controlling the Hickman Executive is Sir William Coaker, who has gained unenviable notoriety during his many years of political activity, and whose Union Trading Co., made a profit of \$10,000 in connection with the Pitt Prop Relief Account.

A leading member of the Hickman-Cabinet is W. H. Cave, who is said to have handled thousands of dollars of public money as so-called relief, during a recent election.

Another member of this clean-up Government is Harris M. Mosdell, notorious as the worst character assassin known to Newfoundland journalism, which is saying a great deal. This Dr. Mosdell was mentioned in the Walker report as having signed a cheque for \$46,000, knowing there were no funds in the Bank to meet it.

Then, we must not forget Mr. Halfyard, who thought he deserved so well of his country that he charged the public for his cigars and soap when he travelled to Port Union.

These are only a few of the party who profess political purity for themselves, and profess also, a desire to clean up public life. There is not much left in the public chest, but what little there is would be soon cleaned up if the Hickman-Coaker party were afforded the opportunity. Fortunately, however, the people of Newfoundland do not intend to vote for Hickman, Coaker and more graft, but knowing where their own best interests lie, will plump for Monroe and Clean Government.

## To the People Desolated By Coakerism!

Men of the South of Newfoundland! Surely you can recall the year 1919 when everything was going well with you, and then, like a bolt from the blue came the drastic Fish Regulations which brought chaos and misery in their train. Transmission of photographs from Cleveland to New York City over the long distance telephone lines was accomplished yesterday in a demonstration by the laboratory experts of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company. The method achieved after several years work was described by officials of the Company as a simple, rapid and accurate picture transmitting system. It will be installed on the Company's various long distance lines in accordance with the demand which arises for this type of service.

**TWO CHILDREN LOSE LIVES IN FIRE.**  
QUEBEC, May 20.

Juliet Tremblay aged eight and Marie Tremblay aged five are dead and the house in which they lived with their parents is now a mass of ruins as a result of a disastrous fire which broke out last night at Toberval Lake, St. John County. The other members of the household including Mr. and Mrs. Tremblay and their oldest daughter Josephine, as well as two others had great difficulty in effecting an escape. It appears that the oldest daughter was engaged in pouring oil into a lamp in the upper part of the house, when a two gallon can she was holding fell from her hands and communicating to the stove. Within a few seconds the upper part of the house was blazing fiercely and five children already asleep were awakened by the members of the family. Three of the children including the two victims were being carried down stairs by Josephine when they slipped to the ground and in a second were a mass of flames. Efforts to save two of the children who fell to the ground proved unavailing.

If any one thing is clearer than another just now, it is that the Liquor Control scandal must be probed to the bottom, and Monroe is pledged to that.

## Torbay in Line for Monroe Policy

**Higgins, Fox and Vinicombe Receive Rousing Welcome.**

The Liberal-Conservative Party campaign under the banner of W. S. Monroe opened at Torbay last night with a monster meeting in St. Michael's Hall. The candidates Messrs. Higgins, Fox and Vinicombe received a most enthusiastic welcome. Bonfires and volleys of musketry were in evidence everywhere and Torbay undoubtedly showed to the full its appreciation of the Fighting Trio and the worthy cause led by Mr. Walter S. Monroe. Not within memory has such united support been given by Torbay to the standard bearers of any party. When the meeting was called Mr. William Gosse, the veteran of numerous campaigns was unanimously chosen chairman and in his hands the meeting was most capably conducted.

**THE MENACE OF GROUP CONTROL.**  
Mr. W. J. Higgins on taking the platform was greeted with prolonged applause. He recorded his heartfelt appreciation of the endorsement accorded himself and colleagues, just a short year ago, and he knew that the same support and good will still existed. Political situations had suddenly arisen each in turn only to be surpassed by one more eventful. Throughout them all he had been called upon to play a part. Within the past month he had been brought face to face with the real political domination of W. F. Coaker and his undignified intention of continuing to boss and direct our political future. As in 1913, 1919 and 1923, Mr. Higgins had stood before the electors of Torbay and preached the menace of group controlled Government so in 1924 he re-affirmed that principle.

**THE ISSUE TO-DAY.**  
To-day the people are again called upon to face the issue which was continued corruption, extravagance, squandering and debauchery of public monies, or the end of such misrule forever. It is Newfoundland's good fortune to-day to have a man of the Monroe stamp to step to the helm of our sinking ship of state, and pledge himself to carry us safe, and dry to a port where ordinary livelihood is certain and national prosperity a real possibility. The Monroe promises are simple, straightforward and unadorned, the promise of a man who honest and untainted in himself, could not give his word without the determination of his honor and integrity to fulfill it. The issue was plain and Mr. Higgins left it to his hearers to choose between a continuance of past misrule and a square deal fighting-chance under Monroe. The hearty prolonged cheers and applause of the entire audience left no doubt as to Torbay's purpose.

**SHOWS UP DECEITFUL PROPAGANDA.**  
Mr. N. J. Vinicombe when called on to speak was accorded a magnificent reception. He began by reviewing some of the events which have stirred the country since 1923 election and unfolded for his hearers the web of deceit and propaganda that had been employed during the year to continue hood-winking the electors. Last year the Humber had been advanced as cause for a renewed support in the Squires maladministration. By narrow majorities the bluff had worked, but the people soon found that there was little or nothing in it for them. The huge promises of plentiful employment had not materialized and the hunt of the Humber meant prosperity for everyone but Newfoundlanders. Foreign labor was being imported wholesale and all the jobs worth while went to those who could pull strings with English Directors and contracting bosses. To-day they found themselves no better off than a year ago. Throughout the length and breadth of our island to-day the people are resolving to bring in a Monroe Government that will be of the people, for the people and by the people.

Mr. C. J. Fox brought the meeting to a close with a stirring speech in which he reviewed the history of the recent Governments, controlled as they have been by corruption and

wanton waste. Taxation stands to-day at ten millions as against four millions ten years ago. Either there must be retrenchment or Newfoundland must soon go to the wall. Salvation lay in the new order of things which were fearlessly promised by Mr. Monroe's manifesto. A complete change is necessary. Economy is the urgent need of the hour unless extravagance and squandermania can never be heard of again if our national existence is to continue.

**FIGHT AGAINST WASTE AND CORRUPTION.**  
The fisheries have to be sustained and fostered, and new industries introduced to care for the large numbers of our people who are in need. The good news that is pouring in from all sections of the country demonstrates that the fight against waste and corruption is being carried on successfully in other districts besides St. John's East, and in two weeks more the last of group Government and political dictatorship will have been witnessed. Midget ringing cheers and loud applause, Mr. Fox concluded.

With the singing of the National Anthem the meeting was brought to a close. Numerous bonfires with loud prolonged cheers for the Fighting Trio and the Monroe Government marked the occasion and send of given Higgins, Fox and Vinicombe on their campaign to roll up bigger majorities than ever before.



## The Question

This time the question to be answered is clean-cut and definite. Do we want an honest Government? And the answer is in our hands. We have the power of the Franchise. We, the people are the last court of appeal. We pronounce judgment on all unjust slanders of the people's estate. I do not see any other argument in it. There is no question of party or personality—but are we going to re-employ the servant whom we have just dismissed, or are we going to look for one who has not been convicted of the most flagrant dishonesty. "Give us men—never mind their names, or any of the old stock-traders. Men who have handled their own affairs properly may be invited to handle our business somewhere near the mark. If we make any mistake, be assured that we are the ones who will pay for it. We are now at the cross-roads. One leads to clean honest administration of the affairs of the country, the other leads back to the same old den of thieves. In this great crisis of our national life, we should pay great attention to the character of the men who presume to be our leaders. We can only predict a man's future from our knowledge of his past. The evils from which we suffer must be eradicated at the point of germination. You cannot get a clear stream from a foul source and it is no use to expect honest measures from any but honest men. If we have made mistakes in the past, and no doubt we have, let us use them now as the homeward bound mariner uses the beacon-lights he passed on his outward voyage. Only in this way can we arrive at the port of Heart's Desire in the grand old colony of Newfoundland.

The policy of the burglar who politely requests the homeowner to leave the door unlocked for his second visit is not likely to appeal very forcibly to an intelligent electorate. "Breathes there a man with soul so dead who never to himself hath said—this is my own, my native land." JUSTUS.

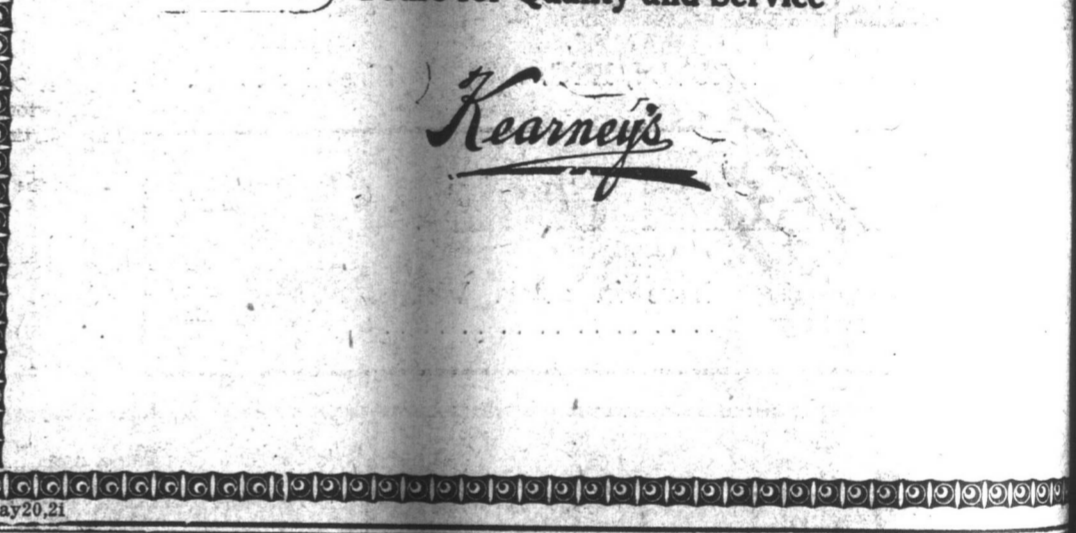

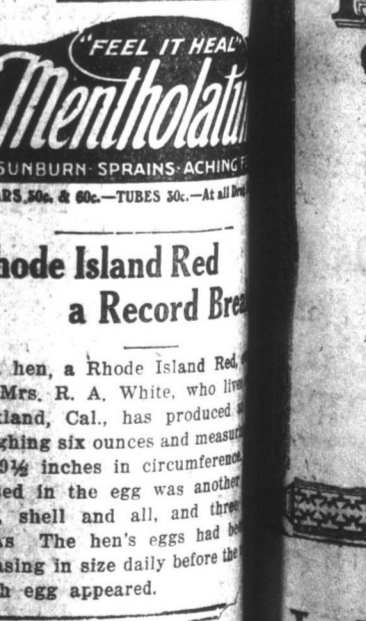
## Another Suggestion for Our Councillors

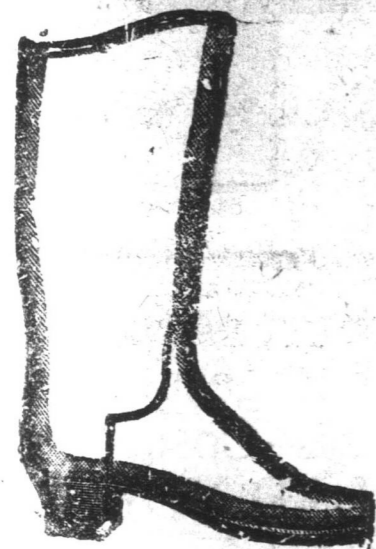

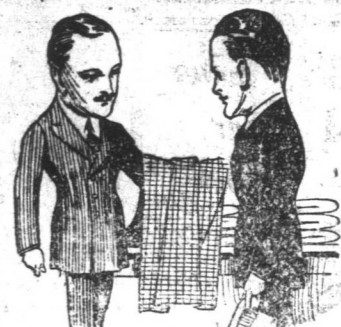

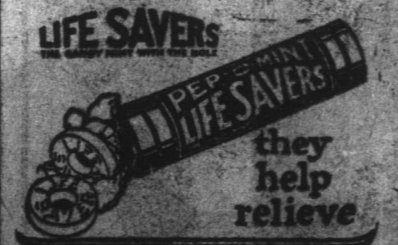

### Denies Theft of Eskimo Woman

FREDERICTON, N.B., May 10.—(Canadian Press)—The public has become acquainted with an incorrect version of the circumstances leading up to the recent conviction and execution of the two Eskimo men for the murder of Corporal William Deak, of the Royal Mounted Police, formerly of Fredericton, and Otto Bisher, an agent for the Hudson Bay Company, in the Arctic Circle, according to Eldon Merritt, a returned Anglican missionary here for the Diocesan Synod. The story referred to by Mr. Merritt was that of the "stealing" of an Eskimo woman by a white man, employed by the Hudson Bay Company, from her Eskimo husband, thus precipitating a chain of circumstances culminating in the murders for which the Eskimos were convicted and hanged. The correct circumstances, said Mr. Merritt, arose from the arrest of an Eskimo for the murder of some of his people, an unusual occurrence among the Copper Eskimos of Coronation Gulf, added Mr. Merritt, who has lived and worked as a missionary among them since 1912. Becoming despondent because of his arrest and detention, he continued, the only possible solution of the predicament to the Eskimo lay in killing his jailers to obtain his freedom, and it was thus the unfortunate circumstances were brought about. "Murder is not charged with the Eskimos," declared Mr. Merritt.

### Welland Slayer Admits His Guilt and Dies Calmly

"Jesus Lover of My Soul" Drags Camfield's Confession - Callous Crime - Killed Wealthy Farmer On Christmas Day And Burned Body. William Camfield, confessed murderer of Albert Morningstar, last Christmas morning, was hanged in Welland jail this morning at 5:30 standard time.

It was during the singing of "Jesus Lover of My Soul," by the Clergyman and Salvation Army officer broke down and admitted his guilt. He warned young men and women against drinking and immorality, declaring these to have been the cause of his downfall. "I also warn you all to attend some place of worship. Had I done so I would have had sufficient light to guide me. Avoid all bad habits and live each day as if it were the last."

**Cried For Mother.** After the confession, Camfield partly drew the curtain on his relatives whom he had previously refused to refer to. He stated that his father died when he was a child and he was given over to a home in England, coming to this country with some other children 20 years ago. He believes that his mother and three sisters, Elsie, Maud and Lily, are still alive in England, although he has not heard from them for some time. He repeatedly cried for his mother whom he said he had intended to bring out to this country this year, but was unable to locate her.

Under the direction of Sergeant Ellis, the execution worked smoothly. Only a few police and officials and one newspaperman witnessed the hanging. Camfield walked up the steps of the scaffold, and without any guiding hand he placed his feet on the trapdoor, evidently having schooled himself beforehand. His hands were tied behind his back but his legs were not pinioned.

The black cap was adjusted by Ellis. Camfield submitted without a tremor. A guard, whose duty it was to hold his hand on his shoulder, said there was not a tremor of the man's body. He was not asked if he wished to say anything and he did not speak a word on the scaffold. The trap was sprung, the body shot down, and those nearby heard the neck crack. Some thought it was the scaffolding creaking. Seven minutes after the trap was sprung the physician in attendance pronounced the heart still.

**Callous Planned Crime.** Camfield's crime was a peculiarly callous one. There are reasons for supposing he had planned the whole thing away ahead seeing the opportunity offered by a man like Morningstar, living alone, seldom visited and having a big bank account. On Christmas morning last he killed Morningstar with a shovel.

Camfield says they had a quarrel, but this may be fiction used to try and excuse his act. He poured coal oil on the woodwork and set the house on fire and placed the body near where the fire was hottest, then, taking all handy valuables and Morningstar's bank book, he left the place. At first it was supposed to be an accident, and that Morningstar had been burned to death when his house caught fire. This theory might have persisted had not a bank manager at Dunville, to whom Camfield applied, presenting a large cheque, signed with the name of Morningstar and claiming to be Morningstar himself, become suspicious and telephoned to Welland. He was informed Morningstar had been burned to death in his home. Camfield's arrest followed, and he subsequently confessed the murder. Afterwards he repudiated the confession but the jury at Welland found him guilty. Efforts were made by his lawyer to have Camfield's sentence commuted to life imprisonment, but the circumstances surrounding the murder were so cruel and callous that they met with little sympathy by the public.

**Buried In Jail Yard.** Camfield's body was immediately viewed by a watching coroner's jury and as no relatives can be found, it was buried in the jail yard. Camfield, who has been looked after by Captain Johnston, of the Salvation Army, asked the Army to try and locate his mother. He was a Barnado boy, born in Whitechapel, England, it is understood, 28 years ago.

As far as could be noticed by the death watch, Camfield appeared to sleep soundly after midnight.

## French and British Conditions Shaken

### ANTAGONISTIC VIEWS ON BRITISH BUDGET AND CANADA.

QUEBEC, May 12.—After a three months' tour of England and France, Saturday morning, Major Eaton, of the T. Eaton Co. and E. Clark, a well-known lumber merchant of Toronto, said they had found conditions very unsettled in both countries.

Employment in England and the fluctuation of French currency were sources from which both countries were suffering. They criticized the debt system in England for encouraging laziness as many workers preferred to accept it rather than employment.

In Paris, accompanied by Lieutenant-Governor Cockshutt of Ontario and General Newburn, they had dinner with Hon. P. C. Larkin, Canadian High Commissioner in London. Their great prophesied great things for Canada from the recent British tariff reductions, but Mr. Clark said he was of the opinion that the revised tariff would have a very bad effect on Canadian industries.

There were 367 adults and 63 children amongst the third class passengers who came under the Canadian Government bonus arrangement. The majority of the cabin passengers remained on the Montrose for the trip to Montreal while the third class were placed on two west-bound trains.

## Wembley Opened

After months of anticipation, the 100 million dollar British Empire Exhibition at Wembley, near London, is open, and a proved success. To a world so sophisticated that it judges the success of any scheme by the figures associated with it, 100 million dollars will mean a great deal. But the figure will not convey to people who do not see Wembley any idea of the immensity of this "Empire of the World."

When it is remembered that the British Empire embraces forty or fifty different peoples, different in color, tongue and social order, it can be imagined how interesting a miniature Empire Wembley has been made. Tremendous ferro-concrete buildings, the largest in the world—so large that the expand and contract several inches, according to the mood of the temperature—the Stadium, in which 110,000 people saw the King open the Exhibition, and grounds covering an area of 260 acres—have given plenty of scope for the far-flung Empire to come home in its ships and show the Old World what has been achieved in the New.

There are points where the American spirit is in sympathy with the spirit of Canada, Australia, Africa, and New Zealand. These countries, in the same way as America, have been settled and made by British people who, still loyal to the traditions of the Old Country, set out to till new soil and carry the traditions of English husbandry across the seas.

The Empire Exhibition, towards which the eyes of the world are turned, is a gigantic and successful effort to prove to the world, that even through the tragedy of her War, and the strain that came after, Great Britain and her Dominions have grown, in fact and in vision, making the greatest Empire of them all.

## 1,000 Children Terrified

### MADMAN RAN AMUCK AT MASS IN N.Y. CHURCH—REQUIRED EFFORTS OF 17, INCLUDING SEVEN POLICEMEN TO SUBDUED HIM.

New York, May 19th.—John Gorman, aged 50, a longshoreman, who became violently insane while kneeling in prayer this morning, terrified more than 1,000 children who had just received Communion at the children's Mass in the basement of St. Bernard's Roman Catholic church at 328 West 14th street.

The Mass, which begins at 9 o'clock, is given over to children, though, occasionally a few adults attend. Gorman was one of the few such who attended the children's Mass today. Fathers Smith and Duggan were conducting the service.

As the children began to file from the basement, Gorman, who had been kneeling in prayer, in a rear pew, suddenly sprang to his feet, flung his hands into the air and shrieked. He ran down the aisle and grabbed two collection baskets, which he flung into the pews. He ran back toward the rear, still shrieking, and shouting, and started to tear his shirt.

The priests called to the children to be calm. The eight other adults in the basement also assured the children they would not be harmed, and urged them to file out quietly. Many of them, however, were greatly frightened.

Meanwhile the two priests had gone forward toward Gorman and grasped him. He threw them aside. The eight other adults combined in an effort to down the longshoreman, but his strength was again too much.

Calls of people in the street attracted Policeman Panzelle. He ran into the church and sprang at the 200-pound longshoreman. They wrestled in an aisle and Panzelle managed finally to place chain snappers on the insane man's wrists. Gorman broke them off with an angry jerk and resumed his fight against those who were trying to calm him.

Somebody brought a stretch of rope and the policeman and the others slipped it around Gorman's feet. They threw the longshoreman to the floor, but he continued fighting. Parishioners shield him by the arms and head until a patrol wagon came. He was taken in the patrol to Bellevue Hospital, struggling all the way.

## Columbus at Wembley

The original anchor used by Christopher Columbus has been carried from Trinidad to London for display at the British Empire Exhibition.

The claim that it is the original anchor used by Columbus has been very closely investigated and finally allowed by antiquarians.

It was shown at the Paris Exhibition, and also at Caen. At the Chicago Exhibition it was awarded the gold medal.

The anchor must have belonged to one of the caravels which the Admiral deliberately ran aground in 1502 in what is now known as Kingston Hr., at the termination of what proved to be the last, and, for himself, the most disastrous of his voyages.

After returning in fetters from the scene of his glory, he had been repatriated and given the title of Duke and High Admiral of the Indies. As suddenly as he had been elevated, he was allowed to fall into extreme poverty.

Queen Isabella came to his assistance, and on May 5th he again set sail for what he always believed was part of the Indian Continent. He encountered terrific weather on his way to the Canaries and was obliged to retreat to Tenerife. His flagship, the Santa Maria, was lost through had steering at San Domingo, and the other caravel arrived at Kingston so waterlogged that Columbus ran them aground and waited for nearly a year for Orvando's vessels, which had been deliberately delayed.

Columbus returned to Spain in 1504, and died broken-hearted. The anchor at Wembley will fire the imagination of many a lad, to whom the tale of

## A Four Pound Dinner

The "Roast Beef and Yorkshire Pudding" Englishman or the American will find plenty to surprise him in the £4 dinner which the Hong Kong Restaurant is putting on daily at the Wembley Exhibition. Like most rich Chinese meals, the dinner takes several days to prepare. Indeed the cooking in the restaurant started five days before it opened. This fantastic £4 meal, described as the Prince of Wales Menu, starts off with soup made out of birds' nests. The second of the 11 courses is stewed shark's fin; and the third, which sounds a little more intimate, a Kong-nan chicken stuffed with rice. Then comes fungus of Hehen from Manchuria served with soup, soothed a while, and then duck, stewed with ham. Then there is custard in clear soup and several other dishes, until you come to the sweets. Here the Chinese excel in preserved fruits, many of them floating in honey. Mr. Stanley O. She, Assistant Secretary of the Hong Kong Section, says that the Chinese make many stranger dishes than these, including rats, which are caught and fed entirely on vegetation, but are not eaten until the fourth generation in captivity. He also said there is a special mountain in China from which actual parts of the earth, rare and hard to find, are boiled for many days until they become one of the most expensive dishes of the Chinese menu.

The Chinese Restaurant in the Hong Kong Section is lavishly decorated with the heavy colours and carvings which suggest its Eastern origin.

## Youth Returned by Roentgen Rays

**ITALIAN DOCTOR SAYS RAYS GIVE BACK LOST VITALITY.**  
NAPLES, May 8.—Dr. Pais, a noted Roentgen ray specialist, of Rome, addressing the Gynecological Congress here yesterday declared: "Roentgen rays of radium not only excite living cells but even produce the phenomenon in reversion, giving back to the cells their lost vitality."

He presented innumerable biographical facts to confirm this theory. Exposing the endocrinal glands of animals to prolonged irradiation, Dr. Pais claims to have obtained the true phenomenon of returned youth, with vitality immensely increased. If his theory is proved correct, scientists here believe that the problem of rejuvenation is entering upon a definite and practical phase.

Dr. Pais has experimented extensively with Roentgen rays in connection with the cure of malaria and tropical diseases and has lately been extending his experiments to rejuvenation. He is the author of several publications embodying his studies of radio activity and its therapeutic value, but has written nothing yet on this new principle of rejuvenation.

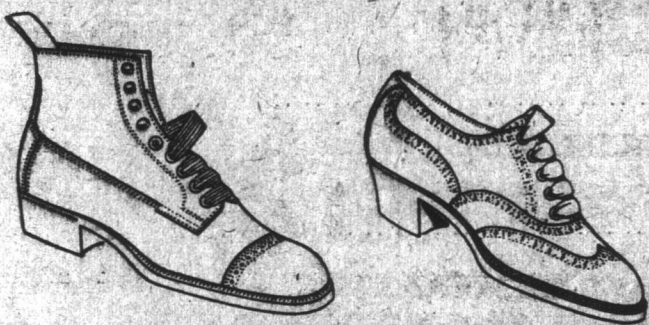

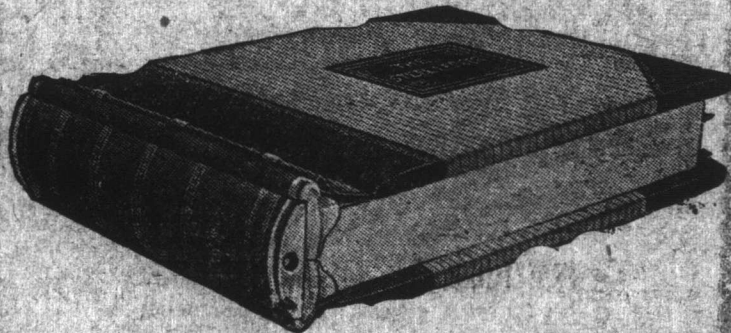
