She was launched again, and the last that the writer heard of her was that she was sailing from Bideford, Devon, for Durban, in South Africa, a voyage of six thousand

But all the vessels mentioned are babies compared with the Italian ship Anita, which was broken up during the present century at Genoa. She was built in the days of Queen Elizabeth, and for well over three centuries had sailed the world's seas. She was not only the oldest but the slowest ship in existence. No wonder, for her hull was of oak twelve inches







Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir.-It is pleasing to note that popular interest still adheres to the question of development of our coal areas as shown recently in the appearance in your columns of several articles dealing with the matter. Those articles attracted much attention from their timeliness and from the capable manner in which their writers dealt with the important sub-

That there remains a real and living interest in such a time-worn question goes to show how earnestly the people consider it, and the writer of this desires to show that popularly considered nobody could do us a greater service than to demonstrate by whatever means most practicable the absence or presence of commercially valuable coal in our coun-

The courage and devotion to the matter displayed through years of unrequited labor on the part of the St. George's Coal Fields, Ltd., deserve our gratitude and support. If the company engaged in the exploration of those coal areas needs assistance from the country I think they deserve it and should receive it.

I am not learned enough in such matters to know just in what way such assistance could be given to insure the maximum benefit, but, I gather from such writings as above referred to, it might take the practical form of boring operations on the more scientific sie of a thorough survey. 


