way.—The increase of business daring the last few weeks on the Great Western Railway has been such that the road is crowded to its utmost extent in both the passenger and the freight departments. The rapid succession in which trains follow each other on the line is more remarkable than it has ever been known to be before in the history of the more remarkable than it has ever been known to be before in the history of the road. The receipts have consequently jumped up to a very high figure, and the resources of the management were never so severely tasked as at present, nor greater efforts made under adverse circumstances to satisfy the deminds of the public. The horse disease had an unfavourable effect of delaying the delivery of goods to merchants. When the epizootic was at its height, for days together there were no teams to carry away freight, which was thus allowed to accumulate; and, though the most strenuous efforts have been made by Hendrie & Co., the accumulation has never been entirely overcome. For more than a week there has been a sort of political crisis in France. A portion of the Assembly are clam ouring for changes in the constitution some of which Thiers refuses to con cede, and threatens, rather than make such consessions, to retire altogether His friends and supporters in the Assembly and throughout the country are alarmed at this threat, and ar using every argument and agency they can to induce the veteran states man to remain at his post. Although unwilling to grant all the concessions asked for by the more extreme Republicans of the Assembly, the President has sent a message to the House in forming them that he is quite ready to make certain altera tions, which he thinks should satisfy all parties.

The principal changes he proposes to make in the constitution are, the creation of a second or upper chamber, which in its functions would be somewhat analagous to our Senate, and would represent the conservative element in the country. He is also willing to have a Vice-President, and concede ministerial responsibility, but he reserves to himself the right to sit in the Assembly, and participate in its debates, which is something unusual for a President, and which has met with considerable opposition from a portion of the members. Then in order to conciliate the more extreme Republicans, he offers a new election for the Assembly which a good many of that section believe would result in securing a majority for them. These propositions, however, though concurred in by a portion of the members, have met with much opposition from the more extreme men of the monarchist and republican party and if a compromise is not effected by a union of the more moderate representatives of all the sections ar appeal to the people may have to be made in order to ascertain whether or not they will support the President in his proposed changes in

A Beam of Light Directed upon the Lungs.—Beautiful as well as useful are the inter-relations of the different sciences. For instance, it is a well known fact in surgery that when air gets into the tissues of the lungs in consequence of the perforation of the lung by a punctured rib, it does not excite putrefaction or suppuration, as it is apt to do when it act upon an external wound. In a letter to the London Times, Prof. Tyndall has connected with this fact his interesting and valuable observation, by means of a beam of light, that air expelled from the lungs by a forced expiration contains no floating particles, and considers that together these facts afford a complete demonstration that germs in the air, removed by filtration, are the cause of putrefaction and its associated phenomena of animalcular life.

THE LATE SIR JNHN BOWERING .- The

death of this well known diplomat and litterateur was recorded some days age. He founded and was for some years editor of the Westmintster Review, which he conducted with great ability and success. He sat in Parliament as member for the Clyde Borough from 1835 to 1837, and for Bolton from 1841 to 1849. He was a prominent member of the House, and was instrumental in promoting many good measures connected with the revenue and commercial affairs of Great Britain. Having made the economies and literature of trade and commerce an especial study, he acted at various times as commercial commissioner for Great Britain. In 1849 he was appointed British Consul at Canton, and in 1854, after receiving in the meantime the honor of knighthood, he was promoted to be Governor of Hong Kong. In 1855 he groceeded on a special mission to Siam, and concluded a treaty with two kings in that country. He had charge of the European affairs of the Hawaiian Government for some years, and in 1851 was sent abroad by the British Government to report on the state of the commercial relations between Great Britain and the new kingdom of Italy. Sir John Bowring was an ardent disciple of Jeremy Bentham, whose works he published, accompanied by a biography, in twenty-three volumes. good measures connected with the rev-

of local millers which are far greater than the supply coming in can meet. The Liverpool market, is reported without change. Barley remains inactive; in Toronto, holders are not willing to accept current rates, and are shipping to Oswego on owners account. Oats are two cents. lower in quotations since last week, bringing only 40 cents. Dressed, hogs may also be quoted lower, no such price having been reached through the week as \$5.75, the figure obtained last week by Mr. J. Phin. \$5.12 cents, may bequoted as the prevailing ontside price for superior specimens, although \$5.30 was offered on Wednesday; Toronto quoting only \$5.25, and \$5.50 in some instances by butchers for choice small pigs. Hay has been sold as low as \$14 during the past week, although reaching as high as \$20 during the same period. We understand loads of hay have actually appeared on the Guelph Market all the way from Durham, a distance of some \$64 miles! The butter market is at present somewhat sluggish, 14 cents being about the top price, but buyers seem indifferent even at that. They complain loudly of the wretched condition in which most of the butter is marketed, and which must ultimately re-act very detrimentally to the farmers interest in this particular department. At Afony for the week ending Nov. 24, the castile market opened briskly but drooped somewhat at the close on Saturday, in consequence of the inferior quality offering. We notice Canada steers quoted at \$4 to 64, whilst some Illinois steers are quoted as high as 8 cts. average 1400 lbs.
