

Japs Held Positions

General Kuroki Reports That Attacks on His Lines Failed.

Field Marshal Oyama Telegraphs That a Battle is Now Progressing.

Commanders Describe Operations at the Front up to Monday.

Tokyo, Oct. 12.—General activity has been resumed in the theatre of war.

Field Marshal Oyama has met General Kuroki's army with an advance of the main strength of his force along the whole front.

The first report from the headquarters of General Kuroki's right army was received today as follows: "On the morning of October 9th the Japanese crossed the Taitse river from the north at Weinyang toward Chiaocho, and attacked between Chiaocho and Boushiu.

The Japanese army was composed of infantry and 2,000 cavalry with two regiments of artillery.

The enemy in the direction of Pa pass consisted of a mixed brigade, there is one regiment of infantry at Mousaoung and another at Pachiatun, both of which are advancing south.

General Noda telegraphs as follows: "On the morning of October 9th the enemy, one division strong, held a line stretching from Chienchaito to Panchiatun and Laitunokow.

Make No Headway

St. Petersburg Advances Show the Battle Lasted for Three Days.

Struggle Was Greater Than First Reported But Proved Ineffective.

Definite News is Still Anxiously Awaited for at St. Petersburg.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 12.—5-22 p. m.—Still no definite news has been received at the war office up to this time of the battle of Schill river, reaching the conclusion that all the Japanese troops were still in progress this morning.

The latest reports indicate that the fighting there is of much larger proportion than supposed yesterday.

The battle has now waged uninterruptedly for three days and nights, and the Russians have been unable to make further headway since the check which they sustained October 10th.

It is now midnight on the battlefield below Mukden, and the failure to receive news that the Russians achieved decisive results in today's fight north of Yenki, coupled with the Tokyo report that the Russian Marshal Oyama is gaining ground, causes increased apprehension.

The despatch of the Associated Press from Tokyo was the first positive information that Russian troops in any force were moving north of the river, although it was already known that some cavalry had passed over the river.

\$800,000 Fire in Winnipeg

Prarie City Visited by One of Worst Conflagrations in History.

Fanned by High Wind Flames Get Beyond Firemen's Control.

From Our Own Correspondent. Winnipeg, Oct. 11.—Three of the largest business blocks in the centre of Winnipeg were burned to ashes tonight.

The loss is estimated at over \$800,000, of which the Ashdown Company will lose \$500,000. It is impossible to get a list of the insurance tonight.

The Woodbine Hotel, Baker block and Dulm block adjoining the Bulman block were all partly damaged.

The flames broke out in the second story of the block and within ten minutes had reached the roof.

The strong wind blowing rendered the work of the firemen almost useless, and the flames were soon out of control.
