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



Notice should be sent one week before change is to take effect WEDNESDAY, JUNE 4TH, 1902. -The question of a reciprocity treaty between Canada and the United States is still a live issue, and though in recent years, about the only advance made toward a freer interchange of products has been a collection of favorable resolutions from boards of trade and commercial organizations in the eastern states, there is now a more definite and practical support advanced from the American side. A few days ago the Massachusetts senate reconsidered its previous deliberations on this matter and its findings place one of the most important states in the union in direct support of the proposition to establish closer trade relations with Canada. Thus step by step, from the individual senator to the board of trade and on to the state senate the subject has been advanced and now its support is strong enough to command the respect of the United States legislature. Its next stage should show a development in which the principle is ready for adoption and to this end we have no doubt Canada will be ready at any time to treat in a spirit of unselfishnegs. The Boston Herald, a conservative, though pronounced, friend of the reciprocity movement, in the issue of the 27th ult., has the following to say of the situation and the prossay of the situation and the prospect: "The state senate took up yesterday under a motion to reconsider, its recent rejection of the resolutions in favor of reciprocity with Canada, with the result that not only were these resolutions reconsidered, but after a short debate were passed by a large majority. The reason why this action was not taken on the previous occasion was chiefly because of the exceedingly earnest effort of the senator from the Essex district, including the city of Gloucester, who apparently informed his colleagues that his political future rested upon the rehis political future rested upon the re-jection of this measure, since, if the Senate approved of it, it was almost certain that his constituents would send some one else in his place to send some one cles in his place to serve them next year at the State House. The little coterie which con-trols the fishing interest of Gloucester has, in a number of ways, exerted an influence inimical to the commercial interests of Massachusetts. Two years ago it succeeded in having the Republican state convention adopt resolutions opposing reciprocal trade with Canada simply because the case was taken up by it, and labor was bestowed upon it early and late for the accomplishment of this one point. But, whatever the interests of Gloucester may be, the great state of Massachusetts cannot be content to wheel ago it succeeded in having the Repubmay be, the great scatter of massachts setts cannot be content to wheel around that little shing port, a city which in population has made less gain than have most of the individual wards of Haverhill, Lawrence and Lynn during the same time. Now that the Massachusetts Senate has swung itself into line with the business sentiment of the state, it is possible that action may be taken elsewhere of a similar character, so that before long the question will become one that even practical politicians will 'find must be the question will become one that even practical politicians will find must be adjudicated. The joint high commission, while it has never been finally dissolved, has to all intents and purposes ceased to exist. If further negotiations are to be carried on, they must be either through the ordinary diplomatic channels or by the creation of a new board of negotiation. Probably the former method would be better than the latter, though in this respect it is exceedingly unfortunate ter than the latter, though in this respect it is exceedingly unfortunate that the American people are no longer to enjoy the valuable services of Lord Pauncefote as the representative in Washington of the British government. 
