## THE COST WAS TOO GREAT

Government to Discontinue the Redemption of Postage Stamps.

The Post-Office Department has decided not to redeem any postage stamps after October 1st. At present the department redeems stamps at a discount of five per cent. It appears that some of the postmasters are paid a commission on the business they do instead of a salary. The commission in some cases is as much as 45 per cent on the business done. It is sespected that some of these postmasters have indirectly been redeeming stamps sent to them for sale, making a profit of forty-five per cent. on the transaction at the expense of One month the Government. recently the redemption amounted to \$70,000. To meet this state of affairs the discount rate was raised from one to five per cent. It is now decided to discontinue altogether the redemption of postage stamps two months hence. do business through the mail.

At present postage stamps are largely used for the transmission of small sums of money through the mail. Hereafter, however, their places will de taken by postal notes. The Post-Office Department is now issuing to all accounting postmasters postal notes of three denominations-25 cents, 50 cents, and 70 cents. Larger denominations will be issued so soon as they are received from the printers. postal note is about the size and shape of a dollar bill.

## STAMPED ENVELOPES.

Hartford Firm Submits the Lowest Bid for the Work.

Four bids were submitted to the U.S. Post-Office Department for supplying stamped envelopes and newspaper wrappers to the department for the ensuing four years.

## Penny Postage.

Ottawa, Sept. 13.—Concerning Canada's domestic postal rate, the Postmaster-General makes the following brief statement of his purpose: "It is my aim to reduce the domestic letter rate to. two cents at the earliest possible moment, consistent with the interests of the taxpayers of Canada. Any deficit in the working of the department each year must come out of the general taxation, and therefore I do not desire to increase that burden more than is absolutely necessary. During the present year many changes in the department are coming into effect. one of which, namely, the adoption of the Imperial penny post, it is contedned by some, will reduce our revenue materially. My own judgment is otherwise, but time will determine which view is correct. I think it only fair to the public to test the effect of the reduction to two cents on letters to the mother country before going into the larger scheme of reducing the domestic rate."
