

BOOKS AND NOTIONS, TORONTO.

THE Booksellers of Ontario are to be congratuated upon their annual meeting which occurred on the 31st ult. A hearty, harmonious meeting, a clear understanding as to what they met for, and a prompt business-like way of doing it, and finally, the election of an able staff of officers. BOOKS AND NOTIONS heartily welcomes them, new and old, and will work with them for the benefit of the whole trade.

COPYRIGHT legislation is at present attracting the attention of the whole civilized world, and an attempt is being made to establish a universal system. The Berne Convention, of which we have already spoken, is being adopted with and without variations in many countries, Great Britain has adopted it in its entirety, and the government of this country would have adopted it at last session of Parliament but for the prompt action of a few of the publishers and printers of this city, who perceiving that under existing circumstances such a course would ruin the publishing trade here, and would materially injure the printing, stereotyping, paper, and kindred trades, they organized a Copyright Association, and by vigorous action delayed the passing of the Act for that session.

Since that time the Association has had numerous meetings and consultations with authorities; they have drafted a new Copyright Bill which we print in another column and to which we direct your special attention. The gist of the proposed bill is:—

1st. That foreign publishers and authors are to have their rights protected in Canada under the following conditions: (a) That at the time of their first publication they register in Ottawa their intention to publish here. (b) That they publish here within two months first issue.

2nd. That reprints of such books, etc., as are thus registered and in process of manufacture, shall not be admitted into Canada during those two months.

3rd. That foreign publishers or authors neglecting to register or to publish as above stated, forfeit their rights, and after the expiration of the two months any person or persons may publish reprints.

Mr. J. Ross Robertson, the President of the Copyright Association, and Mr. G. H. Suckling, a member of that Association, appeared before the Copyright Committee of the Booksellers' Association and explained the situation of affairs and the features of the proposed bill, and that Committee referred the matter to the Annual Meeting with the result that our Association has taken hold of the matter heartily and will aid the sister association in securing desirable legislation.

We would be pleased to have our subscribers discuss the features of the proposed bill in BOOKS AND NOTIONS.

THE ANNUAL MEETING.

The annual meeting of the Booksellers and Stationers' Association of Ontario was held on Wednesday Oct. 31st, at the Queen's Hotel. Mr. H. Fred Sharpe, St. Marys, was in the chair. Among those present were Messrs. B. H. Rothwell, Brantford; N. T. Wilson, London; W. Middleton, Kingston; George Tait, St. Catharines; W. H. Murch, St. Thomas; J. G. Cloke, Hamilton; R. A. Cormack, Whitby; Donald Bain, Wm. Bryce, J. J. Dyas, J. T. Hornibrook, Henry Hutchison, A. S. Irving, S. R. Hart, R. T. Lancefield, J. B. McLean, D. A. Rose, A. F. Rutter, H. L. Thompson, G. R. Warwick, A. G. Watson, and S. Wallace, Toronto.

Letters regretting their inability to be present were read from Miss Karch, Peterboro, and Joseph Fletcher, Toronto. Miss Karch's name was received with applause, Mr. Dyas remarking that she was the only lady member of the Association.

The minutes of the last semi-annual meeting were read and adopted. Mr. J. J. Dyas read the secretary and treasurer's reports, which were adopted. The treasurer's report showed a balance on hand at last annual meeting of \$9.90. Receipts for the year were \$123.90 and disbursements were \$110.80, leaving a balance on hand of \$13.40.

The following is the secretary's report:

Since the last semi-annual meeting the question of copyright has been prominently brought under our notice, and on the suggestion of the city members of the Executive Committee, the President appointed a special committee to consider the subject. The report of that committee will be presented at this meeting. Postage on periodicals has also been a subject of con-

sideration. A joint meeting of the Executive Committee and that of the Toronto District Association was held, and Mr. Irving was appointed as a deputation to proceed to Ottawa to endeavor to have the matter settled. The result of that visit will also be made known at this meeting. No District Associations have been organized since last meeting. There was but one application made to organize such a body, which was made at a time when I could not comply with the request, nor have I since been able to fix a date. The payment of office rent by the Association is hardly warranted by the amount received for members' fees. It would be well to consider whether or not the expense of \$60 per annum should be continued.

Messrs. R. T. Lancefield and J. B. McLean were elected members on the recommendation of the Executive Committee.

Mr. John Ross Robertson was introduced as a representative of the Copyright Association, and addressed the meeting on the Copyright question. He explained briefly the objects aimed at by that body and asked the Association to co-operate with them in bringing pressure upon Parliament to pass a Dominion Copyright Act which would afford sufficient protection to authors and owners and be at the same time advantageous to the publishing trade and people of Canada. Mr. Robertson also answered a number of questions relating to the matter.

Mr. Rothwell, on behalf of the committee appointed to consider the proposed bill, reported favorably. He thought it was time that they, as Booksellers, should unite to have a Copyright Bill. The one reported, he thought, was complete. It might be well for a committee of the Association to confer with the Copyright Association on several matters in the bill. He suggested that blank memorial sheets be sent to every Bookseller throughout the country to get the signatures of all in the book, stationery, printing, and allied trades. He was heartily in accord with the proposal. Some parts might affect retailers a little, but they would have to give way a little to the publishers. They should each give way on certain points to the other.

Mr. Murch was afraid that this Copyright Bill meant that the day for cheap books in Canada was passed, and that under it the publisher would have a finger in the pie but that the retailers would not.

Mr. Sharpe did not agree with this view.

Mr. Bryce remarked that it would not have that effect. If the proposed Copyright Union took place between Great Britain and the States, Canadians would never be in as satisfactory a position to get one.

Mr. Hutchison wanted time to consider the bill. It had been drawn up by publishers and they might quite unwittingly insert something that might be unfavorable to the retail Bookseller.

Mr. Irving agreed with him. They would each have to give and take.

Mr. Hutchison replied that, as a Bookseller, he would like to take all he could. (Laughter.)

Mr. Rothwell moved, seconded by Mr. Hutchison, "The committee appointed to enquire into the Copyright Bill having reported favorably to the meeting on the proposed bill, we, the Ontario Booksellers' Association assembled, heartily approve of the draft bill, and we pledge ourselves, as Booksellers, to render all assistance possible in our power to aid the Copyright Association to bring the matter properly before the Dominion Government."

The motion was carried.

Mr. Sharpe suggested the formation of a committee carefully selected and not identified with the Copyright Association, to meet that Association to discuss a few minor points not quite clear in the proposed bill.

Mr. Hutchison moved, seconded by Mr. Irving, and it was agreed to, "That the president of this Association name and appoint a committee of Booksellers of this city to confer with the committee of the Copyright Association, and to co-operate with them in setting the matter before the trade generally."

The President appointed the following gentlemen: Messrs. H. Hutchison, S. R. Hart, and H. L. Thompson.

Mr. Irving gave an account of his efforts to have the duty removed from foreign periodicals. He had several conferences with the Minister of Customs and the Commissioner. The Commissioner agreed that if the plates were bound in they would come in free. He had that done, but that was not sufficient, for he was called upon to pay duty because they were not paged. They made him pay duty one day and the next they returned it to him and then made him pay it back the third. The department now held the money. However, the Minister had promised him that at the next session of Parliament he would have the matter fixed in a way that would be satisfactory to the trade. They would now have to use their influence on the Postmaster-General to reduce the postal rates on periodicals and books.

Mr. Wilson said something should be done regarding the reduction of postage. He suggested that petitions be sent round to Booksellers to have signed for presentation to the Postmaster-General.

Mr. Rothwell thought the old committee should be appointed to work upon the new Postmaster-General. He believed that the old rate of three per cent. on the sale of stamps could be returned.

It was decided on motion of Mr. Wilson, seconded by Mr. Middleton, that the Executive Committee take immediate steps to acquaint the Postmaster-General of the injustice the Canadian book and news trade are suffering through the facility afforded by the United States postal law for supplying our customers with English and American periodicals and paper-covered books. That petitions be prepared and sent to all the trade throughout the country for signature, asking for a uniform rate of one cent per lb. on this class of matter.

Mr. Dyas reported that the office of the Association was not patronized to the extent that it should be, and he suggested that it be done away with. It would save a rental of \$60 per year. This was agreed to on motion of Mr. Tait, seconded by Mr. G. Warwick.

The election of officers was then proceeded with. Mr. Sharpe, who was nominated for the presidency, said he did not care to accept it as there were other men who, he thought, could fill the position better than he. The Association, however, would not hear of it, and he was unanimously re-elected amid much applause. The other offices were filled as follows:—Vice-presidents, B. A. Rothwell, W. Middleton; secretary-treasurer, J. J. Dyas; executive committee, Messrs. Watson, Tait, Wilson, Cloke, and Bain.

Several members present reported upon the work done by their local Associations.

Mr. Wilson spoke for Middlesex. There had been a little trouble in Strathroy but that had been satisfactorily settled. In London an outside store had cut

school books 20 per cent., otherwise they were getting fair profits. The Association had been a decided benefit to the trade.

Mr. Rothwell said that in Brantford the trade were now working well together. The Association had done away with all disputes; in the year they had not one disagreement. They also furnished each other with information regarding persons who would not pay for their papers. When a customer refused or neglected to pay for his newspapers the dealer informed the other members of the trade. They therefore refused to let him have a paper unless he paid in advance.

Mr. Tait, reporting for St. Catharines, said the trade there were working very satisfactorily together. They were the pioneers in arranging newspaper rates. They advanced the price of the *Empire* and *Globe* to three cents, and they were now handling these papers at a profit.

Mr. Sharpe said that the trade was in a satisfactory condition in the Huron district.

Mr. Tait drew attention to the advisability of appointing an organizer to work up local Associations. This gave rise to some discussion as to the expense, which was decided by a resolution of Mr. Irving, seconded by Mr. Hart, that "Any expense incurred in organizing district Associations shall be borne by members of said district."

In reply to the Secretary, it was agreed that when a member was two years in arrears he ceased to be a member.

Mr. Dyas gave notice of a revision of the constitution.

Just before adjourning, Mr. Bryce drew the attention of the retail Booksellers to the number of Canadian copyright books that were being imported and offered for sale here. He asked them to refuse to handle these piratical editions.

Mr. Irving said he had seen the Minister of Customs but he said that there were so many books that they could not keep track of them all.

Mr. Wilson remarked that they managed to keep track of the music.

No action was taken.

TRADE NOTICES.

Guelph is thriving. Mr. W. G. Nelles has found it necessary to have larger premises to enable him to meet the growing demands of that city, and has taken possession of a fine store near the post-office.

Mr. Geo. H. Doran has succeeded Mr. H. H. Bebis, of the Willard Tract Depository. Mr. Bebis takes the management of the Standard Pub. Co.

The Willard Tract have control of the Canadian trade in Art Books and Ribbon Booklets. They report immense sales of this new venture in Christmas books. They are fine works of art for a small figure.

The wholesale dealers in Xmas goods in Toronto are very busy, and gas-light from cellar to attic is the universal order of the day. Taken as a whole trade is ahead of last year, with brighter prospects for the next six months.

Xmas cards—except booklets—have fallen off considerably this year, and wholesalers are looking for sorting-up orders late in December.

The stock of albums still unsold are very low and

the prices are proportionately stiff. These dealers' therefore, who gave import orders are appreciating their daily arriving stocks.

Retaliation is again being threatened by our friendly neighbors, their only reason for not enforcing it being the sure loss their own railways will incur by the step. That loss, however, is being felt already, for enquiry amongst our largest importers brings out the fact that they are all almost universally having their goods shipped *via* Halifax and Montreal, which by the way is a cheaper route than around by New York.

Failures in the Stationery and Fancy Goods trades have been conspicuous by their absence during the last month. Is it because wheat is \$1.25 a bushel?

Geo. Ashfield, one of the largest, though youngest, Fancy Goods dealers in Ottawa, had his place gutted by fire about ten days ago. His loss will be about \$7,000 fully covered by insurance. We hope he will be in shape again in time for the Christmas trade.

The weighty representative of Raphael Tuck & Co., commonly known as "John L. Sullivan," is in town looking after that firm's interests. He says that their trade keep up with past years.

Push goods are selling in greater quantities this year than ever. Opposition is keener and yet the old houses are doing more business than in previous years. Instead of being a fancy for a year or two they have developed into a staple line.

Square purses are becoming quite fashionable instead of the oblong shapes; some ladies going to absurd extremes.

PRESENTATION TO WARWICK & SONS

The following was omitted from last month's issue:

The address to Warwick & Sons which was decided upon at the annual picnic and moonlight excursion, was presented to the firm by the employees last month. It was beautifully illuminated by R. M. METHODIST BOOK AND PUBLISHING HOUSE.

Our cut gives but a faint idea of the new Methodist Book and Publishing House now in course of erection on Richmond Street, between Yonge and Bay Streets, and extending back to Temperance Street.

The building has a frontage of one hundred feet by a depth between streets of two hundred feet.

The property has been known as the old Richmond Street Methodist Church, and is situate in the heart of the city, very near to Yonge Street, and near the site of the new City Hall and Court House, and with its double frontage specially suitable for its intended purpose.

The church building fortunately stood in the middle of the lot, 60 feet back from Richmond Street, and 30 feet back from Temperance Street. On the Richmond Street end has been erected a four-story building across the full front, which is divided into stores and hall entrance. The latter occupies the centre of the block, and forms a tower starting from foundation and finished up to top of store cornice in cut stone and polished granite columns.

At the arched entrance to the upper stories the visitor may take his choice of the main staircase or the handsome hydraulic elevator, with its ever ready attendant.

The office, stock-room and wholesale department will occupy the whole of the auditorium of the old church. The entry clerks and shipping room will occupy the easterly wing of the Temperance Street or southerly extension, and for the convenience of their friends in the trade, they have set apart the western wing which will be fitted up as a sample room. The upper part of the church, along the gallery line, will be used as the case room, and the attic as the sheet room. The basement of the church has a height of twelve feet, and will be used as the press-room.

Our space will not at present admit of a complete description. Suffice it to say that the whole will form the most complete and admirably arranged premises for the special purposes for which they are intended.

During the past few years the business of this institution has rapidly grown, until now the old premises are far too small for the requirements of the business.

The increase in the number of employees is shown from the fact that some five years ago the amount paid each week for wages was about \$700, while now it amounts to about \$1,100.

The sales in every department are very much in advance of previous years, and new machinery has been added to both press-rooms and bindery.

CANADIAN COPYRIGHT.

A meeting of the Copyright Association of Canada was held on Thursday evening, the 18th Oct., at the Board of Trade Rooms, Toronto, Mr. J. Ross Robertson, the President, in the chair.

In opening the meeting, the chairman briefly reviewed the situation, showing that the Berne Bill, which had been introduced at the last session of Parliament, threatened the most disastrous consequences to the book, printing and publishing interests of Canada. After its adoption every British copyright book would be copyright in Canada, without requiring manufacture in Canada (as is required by the present law) in order to secure Canadian copyright. This of itself was felt to be a most serious menace to the printing and publishing interests of the Dominion, but in addition to this the Bill excludes all foreign reprints of British copyright books, thus throwing our market entirely into the hands of British publishers and printers. This is where the book trade and the public are deeply interested, as it is well known that the best and most popular books are issued in England at a very high price at first, and it is months, and in some cases years, before they are issued in cheap editions for the people. Haggard's books afford a good illustration of this. Many thousands of "She" and "King Solomon's Mines" have been sold in Canada simply because we have been able to sell the cheap 25-cent American editions. And yet the cheapest English edition of these books to-day is six shillings sterling, a figure utterly beyond the pockets of the Canadian people.

A rough draft of a bill containing suggestions for the practical operative clauses for a new Dominion Copyright Act, governing the reprinting in Canada of Imperial copyright works, the productions of British subjects, or of the subjects of those countries that have an International Copyright Treaty with Great Britain, was then placed before the meeting, and finally adopted. The following is a brief synopsis of the clauses of most interest to the trade and the public:—

Sec. 1 refuses copyright in Canada to United States authors until such time as the United States Government enters into an International Copyright Treaty with Great Britain and Canada.

Sec. 2 recites that the condition for obtaining the Canadian copyright shall be that the work shall be printed and published in Canada within two months after first publication elsewhere.

Section 3 recites that any work intended to be copyrighted in Canada shall before publication elsewhere, or simultaneously with its first publication elsewhere, be registered in the office of the Minister of Agriculture by the author or his legal representative, which registration and compliance with the provisions of Sec. 2, shall secure the exclusive Canadian copyright to the author or his legal representatives.

Sec. 4 recites that should the person or persons entitled to copyright under this Act fail to take advantage of its provisions, then any person or persons domiciled in Canada may print and publish the work in question, provided registration of intention to do so has been duly made with the Minister of Agriculture, and the necessary license obtained; but in no case is said license to convey exclusive rights to print and publish the work in question. This license is to be granted to all applicants agreeing to pay the author







or his legal representatives a royalty of ten per cent. on the retail price of each copy licensed to be sold.

Sec. 7 recites that from and after the passing of this Act the importation into Canada of foreign reprints of works of which the copyright is subsisting in Great Britain and which have been registered under sections three or four of this Act for re-publication in Canada, shall be and is hereby prohibited, provided the provisions of section two have been complied with.

Sec. 8 recites that this Act shall not apply to English copyrights granted prior to the passing of this Act.

After this draft bill had been adopted, it was decided to take steps to petition the Government to take this draft and incorporate the clauses into a bill to be introduced instead of the Berne Bill. In pursuance of this object the president was deputed to proceed to Ottawa to interview the Ministers with reference to the matter, so as to prepare the way for a larger deputation, which will proceed to Ottawa later on.—*Telegram.*

KINGSLEY'S "WESTWARD HO!"

Messrs. Macmillan have just issued the first volume of a cheap edition of Charles Kingsley's most popular works, consisting of "Westward Ho!" As a frontispiece is given the vignette portrait engraved by Jeens in 1876, which is far more characteristic than the full-length prefixed to the Eversley edition of the novels, 1881. From the skeleton bibliography printed on the verso of the title page, it is interesting to learn the following details. The first edition appeared in three volumes in 1855, and was reprinted in 1857. In the latter year appeared a new edition in one volume, which was reprinted three times before 1869. From 1871 onwards a new edition was called for in every year down to 1885; while in three years—1876, 1877, and 1879—the popular demand required two editions. By the way, it seems odd that no artist should yet have ventured to win for himself a name as the illustrator of "Westward Ho!"—*The London Academy.*

DR. MACKENZIE'S BOOK.

The text in full of Dr. Mackenzie's history of the case of the late Emperor Frederick was published on Sunday, the 14th ult., by a number of the leading journals of this country by a syndicate arrangement with the N. Y. Sun, which paid the English publishers £500 for advance sheets. The Milwaukee Herald was the only journal that had the exclusive right for America to publish the book in German. The German Booksellers, according to a cablegram, ordered 75,000 copies of the work. On the day the copies were received in Germany, the police in Leipzig and Berlin seized all the copies that could be found. It is stated that the sale in Berlin on the streets and in the shops was brisk, and that 2,000 copies had been disposed of when the police interfered. Messengers carrying bundles of the books to retail dealers were stopped on the streets by the police and their burdens seized. Messrs. Brentano will publish the matter in book form at once, and E. S. Werner, 48 University Place, N.Y., announces "Emperor Frederick III.: full official report his case, by the German physicians and by Sir Morell Mackenzie." The report of the German physicians printed in this volume has been translated by Dr. Henry Schweig. *Publishers' Weekly.*

CHAS SCRIBNER'S SONS WIN.

The Rev. Edward Towne, of Cambridge, who sought to recover the sum of \$10,000 from Charles Scribner's Sons, for work alleged to have been performed in compiling an index for the *Encyclopedia Britannica*, was awarded the sum of \$5,800 by a Boston jury. The defendants petitioned for a new trial, and subsequently, before Judge Holmes, in the Boston Supreme Court, the verdict was set aside, his Honor holding that the damages awarded were excessive.

The expected boom in the paper trade has not yet come off. It is true the mills are all unusually pressed with orders in hand, more especially for cheap printing papers. Several periodicals have announced an enlargement of their sheets and that, together with increased circulation, has given the mills that have the contracts a lucky addition; and one paper-maker, who holds the orders for one of the metropolitan evening newspapers, has had the quantity so much increased, that by way of diverting some expected orders without refusing them, he has raised the price of his paper an extra eighth of a penny a pound. Otherwise the prices for better class papers remain as they were, but should business improve as much as was hoped for, an advance may be expected before the end of next month. *The Stationery Trades' Journal*
