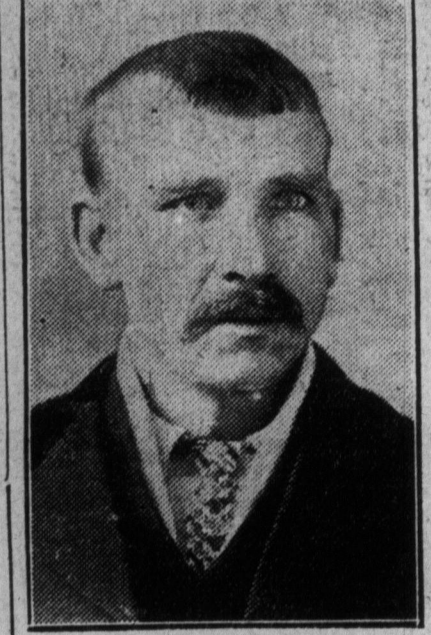

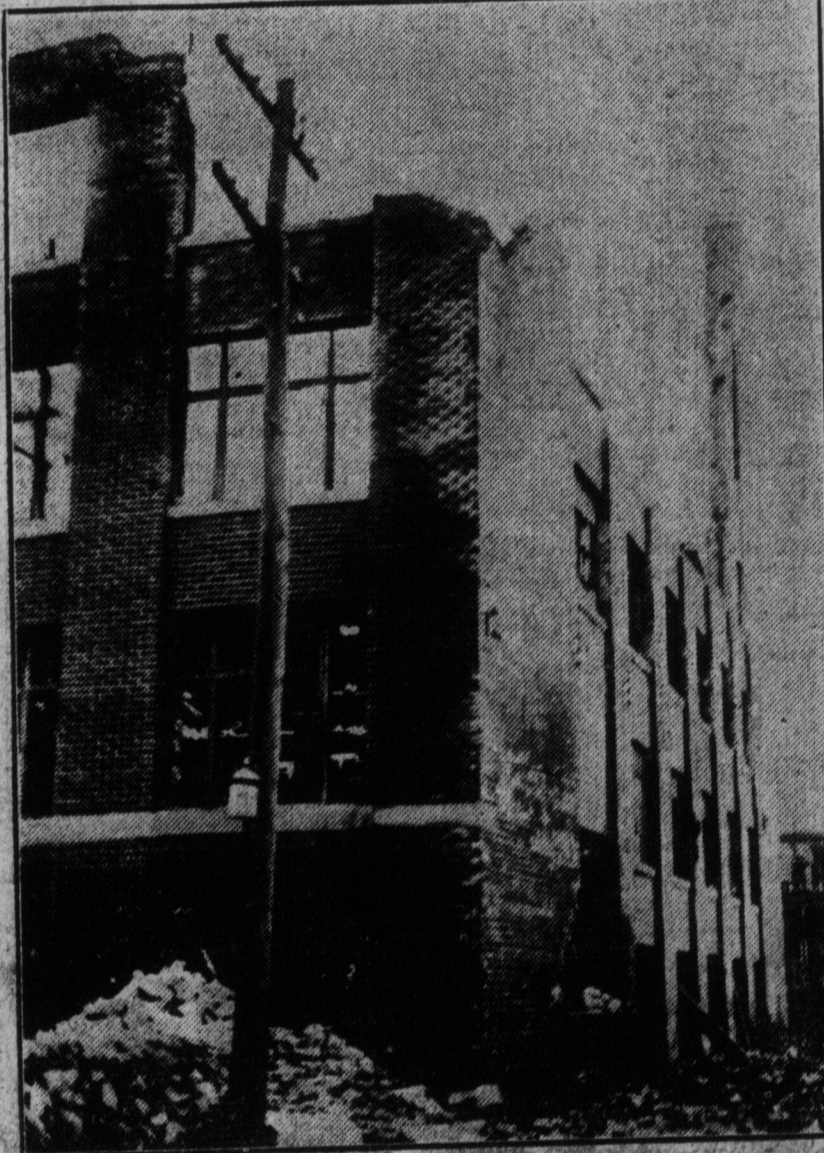
YOUTH KICKED OLD CAN MAY LOSE RIGHT EYE

Peter Bolahood, Aged Twelve, Terribly Injured by Explosion Caused by Playful Act

Peter John Bolahood, aged 12, of 123 York street, kicked a tin can in his back yard yesterday afternoon, and since then Peter John and all his family have been wondering what was in that can. Following the kick there came a tremendous explosion, which knocked the lad of his back, tore the left side of his face open, and cut open his leg from the knee half way to his thigh. He was conveyed to the General Hospital, where it is stated he may lose the sight of one eye.

TWO KILLED, ONE FATALLY INJURED AND THREE OTHERS PAINFULLY HURT WHEN WALL OF BUILDING COLLAPSED

THE WALL THAT GAVE WAY



Six Workmen Were Buried Under Bricks and Debris When Wall of Independent Cloak Company's Fire-Gutted Building Gave Way. Owner of Building and His Foreman Tell Different Stories of the Methods Used to Demolish the Building.

Caught in an avalanche of bricks, timbers and broken masonry when the two upper storeys of the west wall of the Independent Cloak Company's fire-gutted building at 578-585 West Richmond street, collapsed yesterday afternoon, two laborers met instant death, a third was fatally injured, and three more sustained injuries which may result in permanent disablement.

DEAD AND INJURED

Dead: Harry Cohen, 29 years, 130 Wilham street. Jacob Sanderky, 23 years, 4 Danvers avenue. Injured: Benny Finkler, address unknown, scalp torn off; internal injuries. Seriously Injured: Benjamin Beatorowsky, 138 Portland street, scalp wound; left knee fractured; internal injuries. Mike Keritsky, 412 West Adelaide street, scalp wound; left ear torn off; severe body bruises. Max Nymal, address unknown, left thigh fractured; body bruised and cut.

This photograph, taken by The World's staff photographer, a few minutes after the accident, shows the west wall of the Independent Cloak Co.'s burned building on West Richmond street near Bathurst. The corner and side of the wall fell in at 3.45 yesterday afternoon and buried six workmen, killing two.

Who is Telling the Truth??

There is a startling dissimilarity between the stories told by Contractor Weidnerman and Albert Strong, foreman of the demolition work on the Independent Cloak Co.'s building until noon yesterday; and not until the acid test of the witness stand of a coroner's inquiry has been applied will the actual cause of the disaster be made known. Weidnerman declares that the workmen never touched the interior beams which were supporting the wall. Strong emphatically declares that this was the reason why he quit at noon. The men were pulling out the bottom timbers, he said, and he quit. Here are the stories:

THE CONTRACTOR THE FOREMAN

Henry Weidnerman, the contractor in charge of the demolition operations, was seen at his home at 29 D'Arcy street at 7 o'clock last night by The World. When the reporter called at the house he was informed that Mr. Weidnerman was in bed—sick. Permission, however, was given the newspaperman to enter and he was taken to the contractor's room. "Are you badly injured?" he was asked. "No," replied Mr. Weidnerman, who had gone to bed with his clothes on, "I was not hurt. I am only excited, that's all." Pressed for information with regard to the cause of the accident, the contractor could assign no reason. He thought that the walls were weak and had perhaps got out of plumb. "Did the men remove any of the interior beams?" "They did not touch any of them. They were engaged in clearing away the debris from the third floor. At no time did any of them touch the timbers or joists, and so that could not be the reason for the collapse." Mr. Weidnerman could give no information regarding the men he had employed, most of them being strangers whom he had hired to do laboring work. "Who was in charge of the men?" He hesitated a moment before replying that he was. He qualified this statement, however, with the admission that he had not looked after the men. This foreman, he said, had been drinking and he had discharged him at noon yesterday.

INJURED BY DERRICK IN DUNDAS STREET YARD

Jamies Taber First Thought to Have Been In Richmond Street Accident.

It was reported yesterday that James Taber, 578 Eastern Avenue, had been injured in the collapse of the Independent Cloak Company, but when he was seen at his home by The World, he explained that he had not been near the place when the accident occurred. He had nevertheless, been injured. While working with some other men at the stone yard of Hitchall and Company, Dundas street, yesterday afternoon, about 2.30 a large derrick had fallen upon him, injuring a shoulder and leg, but not seriously. He went to the Western Hospital, where his wounds were dressed. The fact that he arrived there about the same time as the fatality, was in his opinion, the reason why the hospital authorities had mistaken him for one of their number.

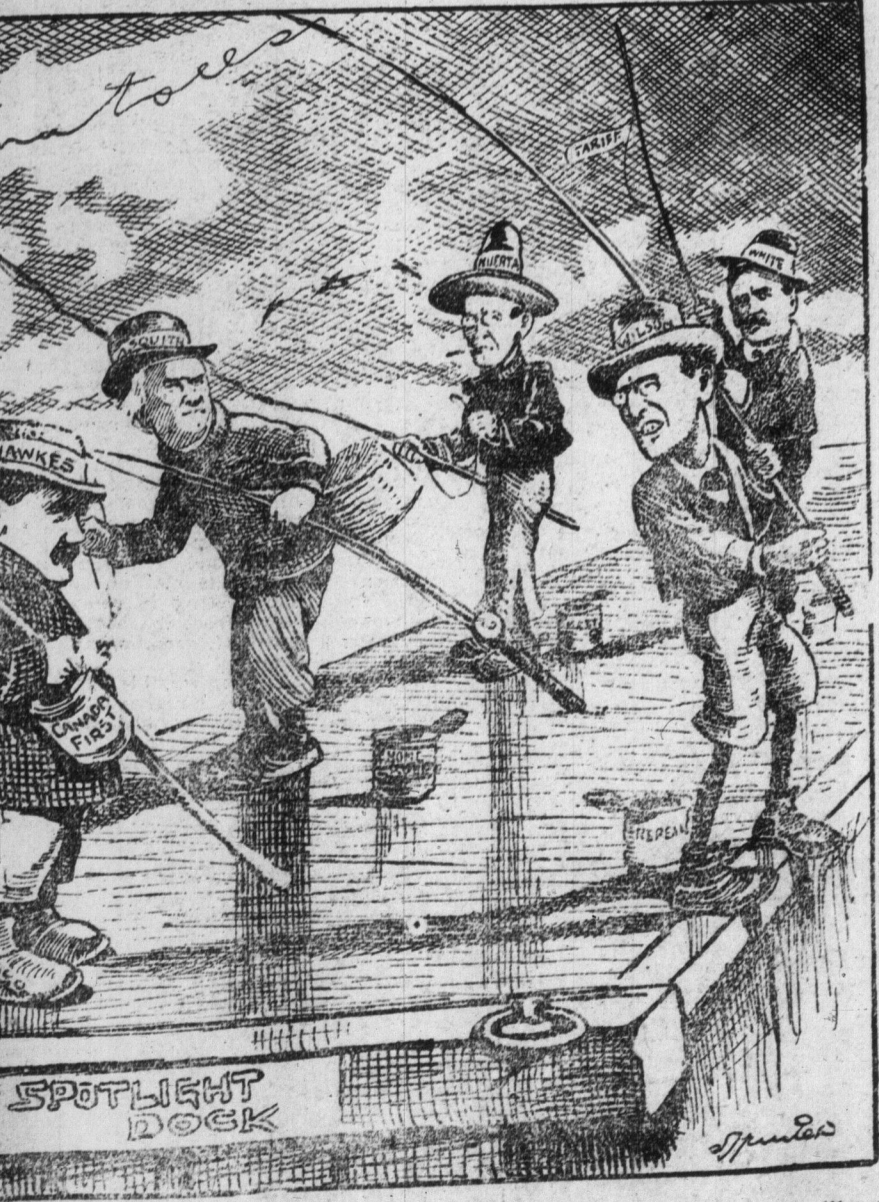

The question had been raised whether Mr. Martin, as an ex-officio member of the board of commissioners for the city, could hold another paid public position.

RETALIATION BY IRISH FARMERS

Will Not Allow Officers of Curragh Camp to Ride Over Their Lands.

LONDON, April 8.—Announcement was made last night that the popular Irish race meeting, Carlow Hunt Sportsmen races had been abandoned under very remarkable circumstances. One of the prizes offered for competition at the meeting is a military cup. Notices were yesterday served on the promoters of the races of a resolution which was passed on Sunday last by the Tullow branch of the United Irish League. It read that in view of the attitude assumed by military officers at Curragh in connection with the home rule bill, the farmers of County Carlow protest against their raising over our lands in the future and request that the military cup be withdrawn from the program of the Carlow Hunt Sportsmen's Races.

Squall to Recent Fire

Yesterday's disaster comes as a squall to the fire on Feb. 25, which swept the new five-story building of the cloak company. So complete was the work of the flames that practically nothing but the iron walls were left standing. A portion of the third and second floors, which the flames had not succeeded in consuming, ran from the south to the north wall, and it was on the upper floor that the men were engaged in working when the collapse occurred.

The Baby Escaped

There were other near fatalities, however, in addition to those of the workmen in the building. A few yards west of the wall, separated by a narrow lane, is a two-story brick house tenanted by two Jewish families, Louis Sneiderman, his wife and baby, occupy the upper flat of the house, and when the disaster happened the Sneiderman baby was sleeping in a rear room. The first indication the parents had of the calamity was the roar of at least three tons of bricks plunging on to the roof and battering their way thru.

MILITANTS HURT CAUSE OF WOMEN

Mrs. Arthur Van Koughnet Refers to Them as Nerve Sick.

NEED TO BE PROTECTED

Presidential Address at Centre and South Toronto Ladies' Tory Club.

Outspoken criticism of the militant suffragette featured the presidential address of Mrs. Arthur Van Koughnet at the annual meeting of the ladies' branch of the Centre and South Toronto Conservative Association meeting last night at the association rooms, Simcoe street.

Mrs. Van Koughnet reviewed the year as one of activity, chiefly along educational lines. The meetings had held a number of meetings of which minor phases of national life had been discussed by well-qualified speakers. The fact had become recognized that one of the greatest influences for the solution of the various problems of rural life as well as industrial and urban problems was by means of the development of the Hydro-Electric System.

Speaking of the militant suffragette Mrs. Van Koughnet declared that her course was deplored. Not only were she detrimental to the progress of their own cause, but it was a great injury to the best interests of womanhood throughout the empire. Their conduct, she said, had brought a bad name to the name of the woman and nerve-sick women were more fitted for protection within the walls of their homes than to be trying to obtain the reins of government.

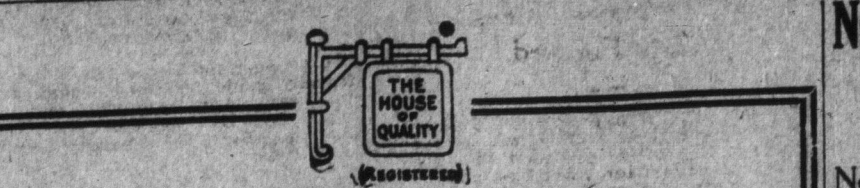

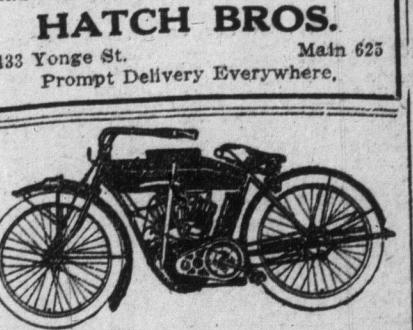

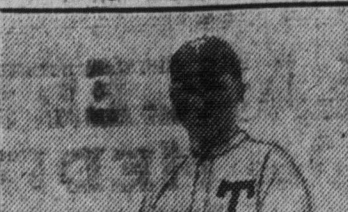

Douglas, general manager of the Mutual Transit Company, operating steamers on the great lakes, testified that the carriers had exhausted every effort to improve their methods of handling freight, particularly package freight, and had been convinced that existing methods were the best available. 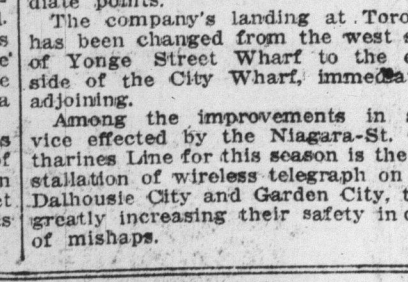
SPANISH BANKS IN PROVINCE'S CONTROL

British Columbia Won Important Legal Victory Over Federal Government.

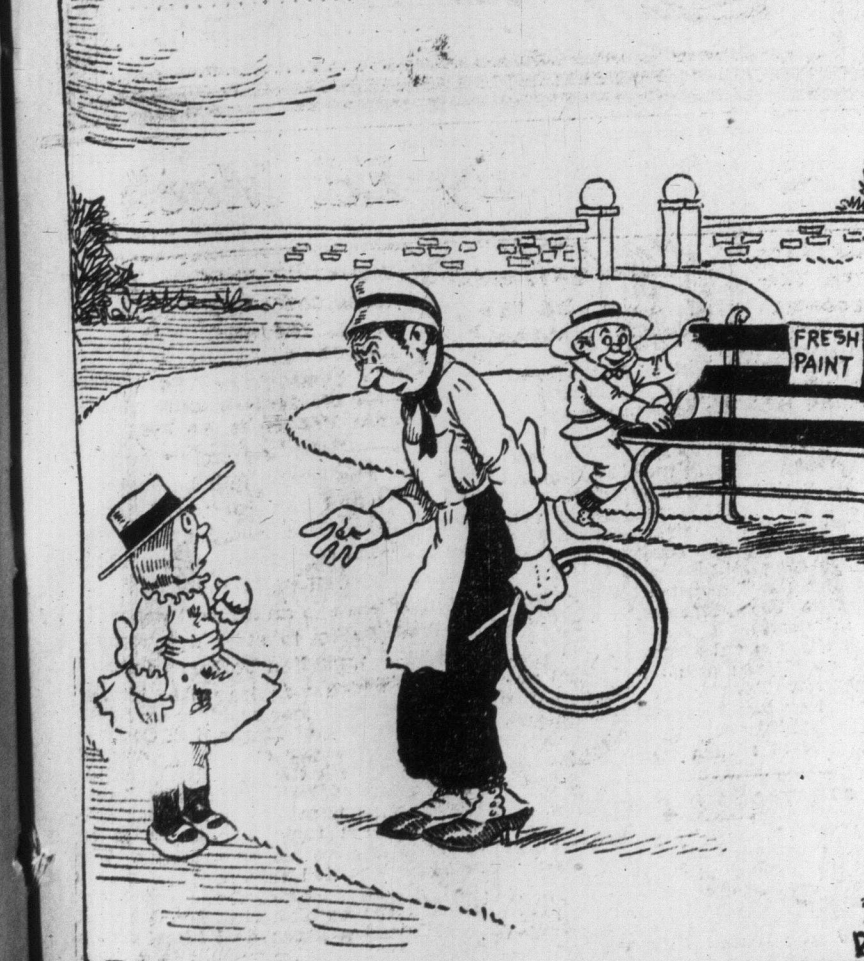

The history of Canadian water power opens with the model of the "first hydraulic engineer"—the beaver—at work building his dam. It is but a step in the story from the Fells at night and the water wheel, famed in picture and story.

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### FROST DAMAGE TO WHEAT IS FEARED

#### Prices Held Firm at Chicago in Face of Official Report.

CHICAGO, April 8.—Misgivings about the chance that wheat would be damaged by the freezing temperature southwest helped to offset today the bullish influence of the government crop report. Accordingly prices closed firm at a shade to 1-4c net decline.

Monday night, on New England wheat and provisions with a gain of 5c to 2 1/2c.

Good buying brought about an early recovery from a weak start. The selling drive on account of the government figures did not become as severe as expected. Not only was the cold snap a cheater in the north but the steady cables and the outlook for both delay in seeding and for falling off in receipts northwest tended to favor the market.

Some confusion arose in regard to what sized crop the returns would indicate. It is explained by a leading expert here that the assumption of 13 bushels an acre as par and a resulting estimate of 662,000,000 for the total yield is not official, but a more realistic calculation and, in fact, a more correct indication of what the government is using in 17-1 1/2 bushels as par. On this basis and on an average amount of winter killing the government would suggest a crop of 651,000,000 bushels. Disregarding winter killing this year, however, as a virtually negligible and figuring the crop on a basis of new tillage, the result would indicate a crop of 609,000,000 bushels.

Much spirit was shown on the buying side of corn. At one time the first actual sale of a cargo of Argentine corn for delivery in Chicago led to a setback but the effect failed to last. It appeared that the cargo might not come here, but might be more profitably disposed of in New England, and a result would suggest a crop of 609,000,000 bushels.

Receipts of farm produce were 100 bushels of grain, 15 loads of hay and one load of straw.

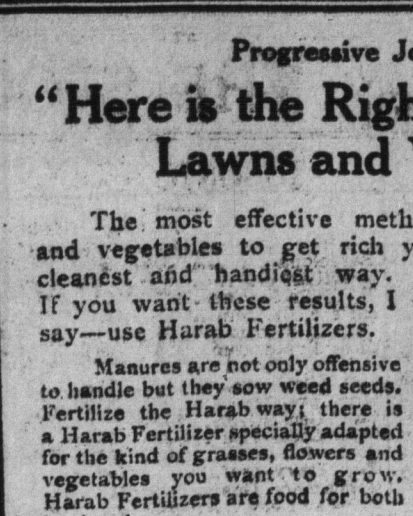
