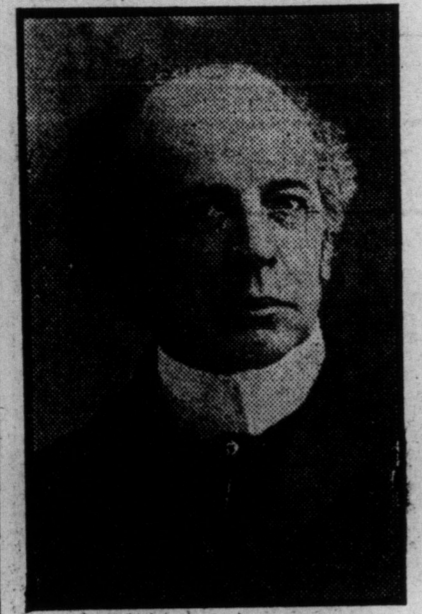

LAURIER SURPRISED AT ENGLISH DOUBTS OF U.S. INTENTIONS

Scoffs at Idea of Annexation Being Seriously Considered on Either Side of Border and Protests His Own Loyalty—A Prominent Figure at Pilgrims' Dinner in London.

SIR EDWARD GREY ON THE MONROE DOCTRINE

(Canadian Press Despatch). LONDON, May 23.—The dinner of the Pilgrims' Society to-night, in honor of the colonial premiers, was historic because of unexpected and noteworthy plain speaking by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the premier of Canada.

He began by expressing amazement that during his three days' stay in England he had heard so many people of standing voicing their doubts concerning the designs of the United States regarding Canada. He scoffed at the idea of the possibility of annexation being seriously considered on either side of the border.

LIBERALS WAGE BIG CAMPAIGN IN QUEBEC

Holding 250 Meetings Throughout Province in Next Seven Weeks—Opposition Also Active—Everything Points to Hurred Election—A Difference of Opinion.

(Canadian Press Despatch).

MONTREAL, May 23.—Following by a few hours only the opening of the political campaign by the Nationalists of this province, the Liberals will open the biggest political campaign ever made outside of a general election campaign in this province. It now appears that the general elections will take place in the fall, and M.P.'s back from Ottawa since Saturday do not hold their feelings that whatever campaign may be waged between now and the 18th of July, at which date parliament will reconvene, is the prelude of an exceedingly short one, that may be decided on at any time after the return home of Sir Wilfrid Laurier from attending the Imperial conference and the coronation celebration.

Not less than 250 Liberal meetings will be held throughout the province during the next seven weeks; there will be at least three or four meetings in every electoral riding and large general mass meetings will be held in the different districts.

On the opposition side also the campaign will be waged with activity. In Conservative local members for one of the counties surrounding Montreal is authority for the statement that a fund of \$2,000,000 will be available to defeat reciprocity, and that this immense amount could be gathered together within two weeks.

TWO POINTS OF VIEW. The World's special forecast in yesterday's paper as to the chances of an early election does not chime with an article in The Globe of the same date. The Globe says that it is granted that when the house meets in July the opposition will oppose supply, will oppose a redistribution measure, and will force the government to go to the country.

SOME SIGNIFICANT STATEMENTS. The Globe's article is worth reprinting for the political information it contains. It runs as follows: THE OPPORTUNITY OF THE WEST.

Globe, May 23.—In an interesting forecast of political probabilities the Ottawa correspondent of The Globe says that the Liberal members of parliament were warned before the election that if a general election might come very soon after recess. They were asked to make all necessary preparations for the coming census of the population in the event of continued obstructive tactics on the part of the opposition.

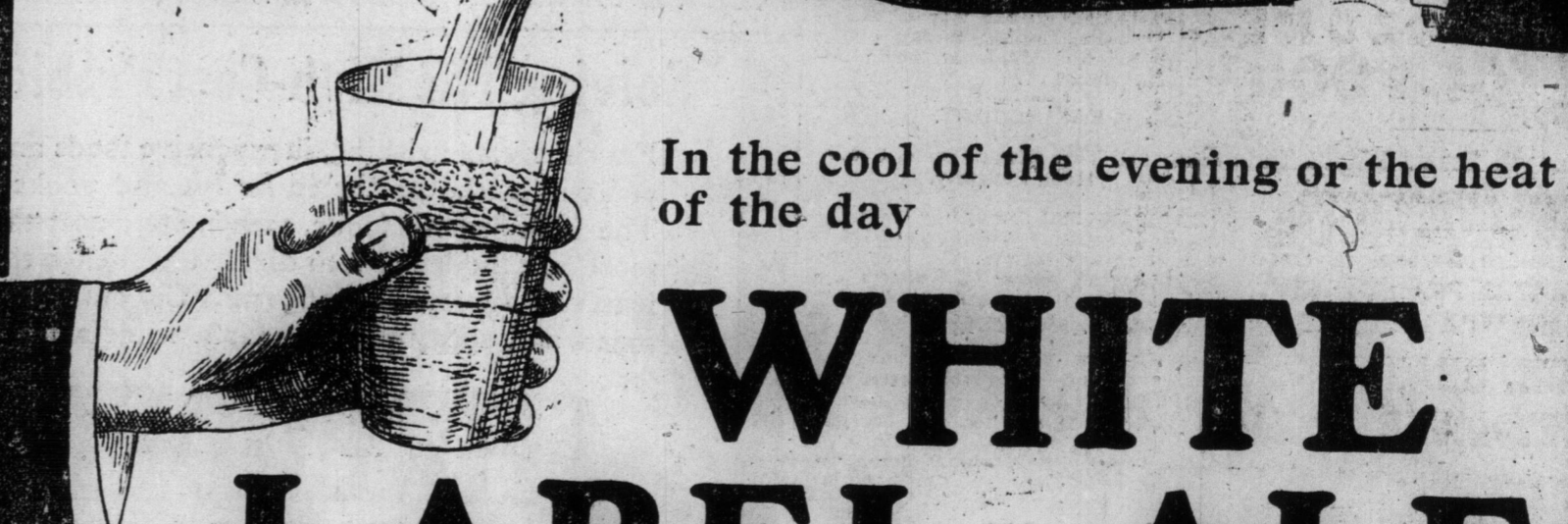

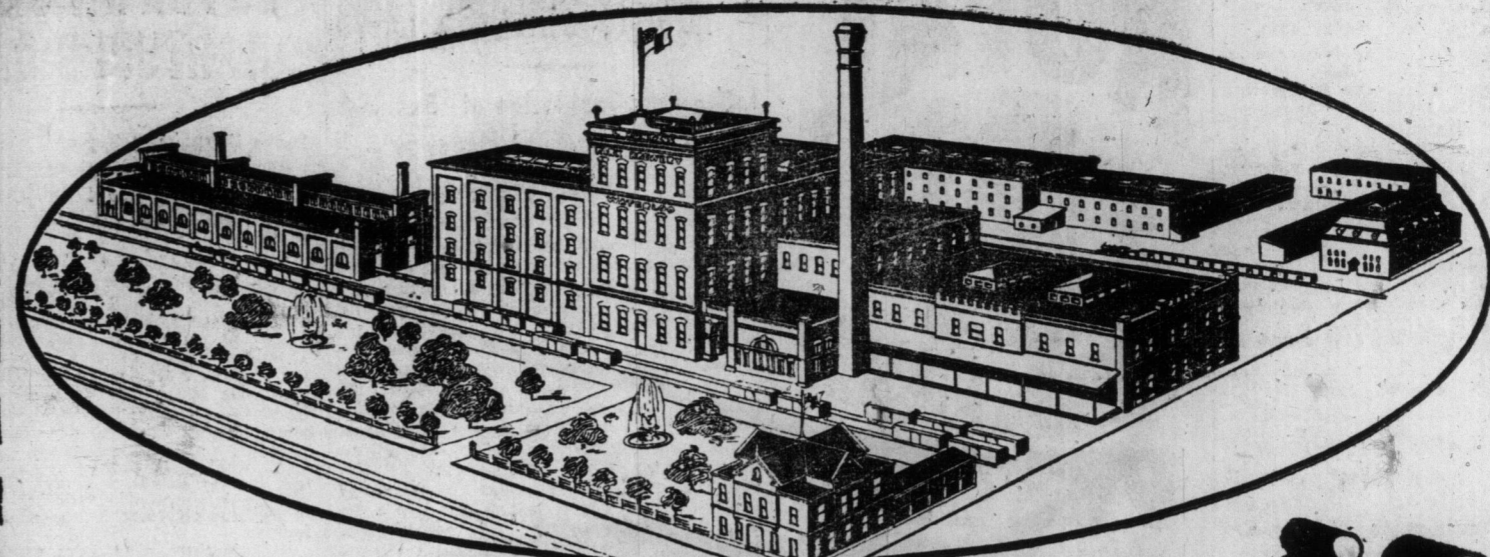

CIVIC IMPROVEMENTS DIFFICULT IN ENGLAND

T. H. Mawson, Liverpool, Speaks
on Town Planning—Praise
For Civic Guild.

T. H. Mawson, lecturer on civic planning in Liverpool University, was the guest of the civic guild of art and board of trade at luncheon yesterday. The difficulties in carrying out improvements in the old country were much greater than in Canada, Mr. Mawson declared, as this was a new country and had not such acute problems. The housing problem was a very serious one in England. It must not be thought, however, that organization was lacking in England. Collective action in building villages and towns was coming more into vogue and a great deal of prejudice was being overcome. It was in Germany, he stated, that the most far-reaching policies of such kind were laid down.

Philadelphia Conference.
The conference on city planning, held in Philadelphia last week, was by far the most important yet held in America. There were from 150 to 200 delegates present, representing every important city of the United States, as well as cities in Canada and Europe.

The exhibition of city planning contained over 1000 drawings, maps, photographs and models, showing city planning, and improvement undertakings from all over America, and many cities of Europe. Such exhibits as these, illustrating the improvement plans for Chicago and Washington, were exceedingly valuable, both as planning exhibits and as works of art.

Toronto Prominent.
Among the multitude of exhibits, the civic guild's plan for the improvement of Toronto made a very creditable showing. The outstanding lesson of such an exhibition probably is that every city's problem of development is an individual one, which it must solve for itself by the application of right principles.

Baltimore is making an effort to secure the conference next year.

PASSED GARBAGE BYLAW

Fire Limits of Brockville Also Extended by Council.

BROCKVILLE, May 23.—(Special.)—On the recommendation of the board of health, the town council passed a by-law providing for the collection and removal of garbage at the expense of householders. The prescribed area includes the bulk of the town. The fire limits of the municipality had also been extended, with a view to better fire protection, and all private vaults and outdoor closets are to be closed by May 1, 1917.

WIDOW GETS NOTHING

Estate of Farmer Suicide Goes to His Children.

BROCKVILLE, May 23.—(Special.)—George Burt, the South Crosby farmer who committed suicide in April, left an estate valued at \$14,000. It is divided among the children of the testator, nothing being left to his widow, who is a native of New York State with a neighborly view to the care of the neighborhood.

Church Struck by Lightning.

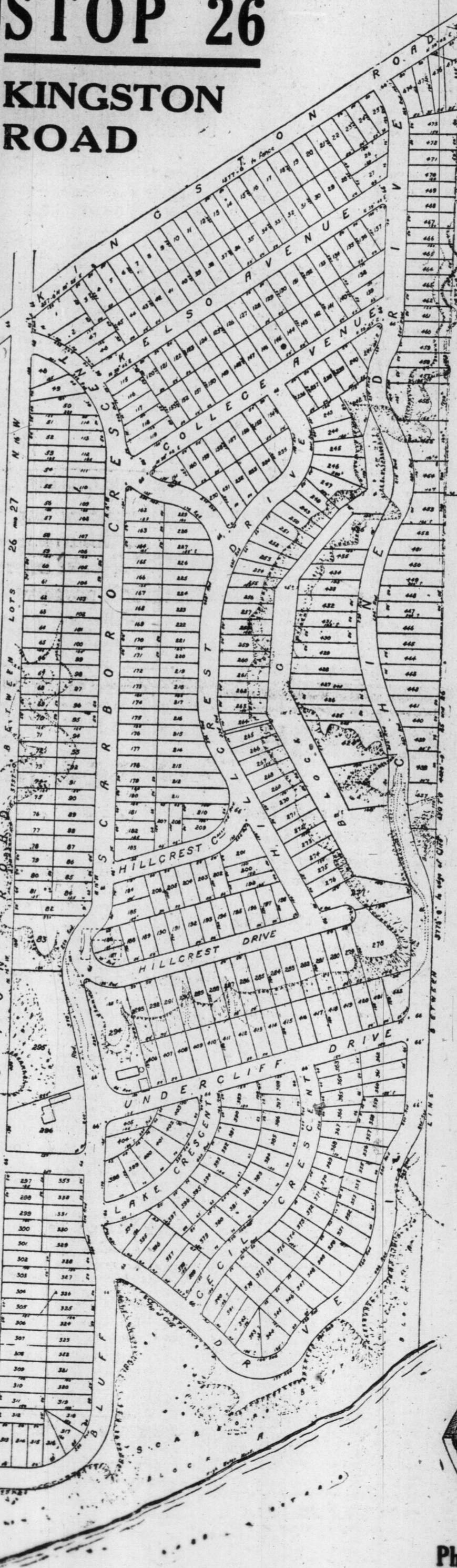

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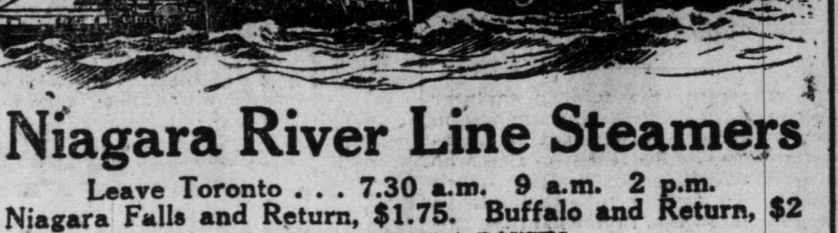

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Hollinger Shows It Can "Come Back" --- Advances 80 Points

Porcupine Market Boils Over Fire Loss Was Overdiscounted

Hollinger and Rea the Star Performers, But Other Issues Move Higher Also—Cobalts Show Few Signs of Vivacity.

World Office, Tuesday Evening, May 23. There was a strong undercurrent of bullish sentiment on the gold stocks in evidence on the mining exchanges today, the general feeling in brokerage circles favoring the idea that the losses incident to the fire in the Porcupine had been much overdiscounted, and that in consequence the market was due for a good advance.

Trading was founded on this idea all day, and the improved buying bore eloquent witness to the fact that the deduction had been a good one. It was also likely that there were some or less short covering over the holiday; if this be true, then the insecurity of the immediate short position was ably demonstrated, for prices were raised in a manner which could only indicate that holders were not disposed to put out stocks, except at good advances, and even then only in dribs and drabs.

Hollinger continued the star performer, and the net advance for the day in this one stock ran into 80 points, placing the shares back within speaking distance of the recent high record established. The opening price was \$11.50, or ten points below yesterday's last sale, and the stock was up to \$12.45 by noon, and later resumed its advance, until \$12.70 was reached, the close being at \$12.70.

The announcement that a new deal was pending in Rea was taken as a matter of bullish import, and the shares opened up 40 points at \$8.40, but lost half of the advance by noon. Toward the close the shares firmed up again, and \$8.34 was reached before the close of business.

Advances of greater or less extent were made by the other Porcupine stocks which followed the course of the big issues. Swastika moved up 3 points to 64; Dome Extension up 2 to 61; Pearl Lake advanced 1 1/2 in the rally, selling up to 58, or four points above the opening price. Vipond, on the other hand, was easy, the shares dropping back to 45.

The Cobalts showed no appreciable change from the apathy which has characterized the market recently, and outside of an advance of a point in Beaver, which sold up to 41 1/2, there was nothing in the dealings worthy of comment.

AN OBVIOUS INFERENCE. A mining engineer calls attention to an article on the Doble mine published in The Sunday World this week. It is stated in the item that diamond drilling has been finished and good results to the 1250 depth in five holes have been indicated. This should have read 1250 feet of depth in the aggregate, as Mr. Fox's intention to convey the idea that five holes had been bored, to an average of 250 feet, or in all aggregating 1250 feet, is obvious.

AIDED THE SUFFERERS. The Vipond crew were magnanimous to their attempt to help the Hollinger men, and the camp was thrown open to the sufferers, and food and bedding supplied to fill all needs. The Vipond itself was not injured in any way.

Miles Flynn, one of the original holders of the Vipond, cabled from London yesterday that he had succeeded in getting a large block of Hollinger stock in that market during the slump incident to the over-exaggerated reports of the fire.

REGULATING SUMMER RESORTS

Pure Water and Sanitary Garbage Disposal Insisted Upon. Vigorous enforcement of the provincial board of health regulations for the supply of pure water at summer resorts and the disposal of sanitary refuse was determined upon by the board yesterday. Port Colborne and Thorold sewage disposal plants are now under way. Analysis of the water to be supplied to the general Y. M. C. A. camp, Lake Couchiching, will be required. If satisfactory the camp plans will be approved. Harriston's water supply system was approved, subject to a satisfactory report of the board of health on the proposed sewage and waterworks for Cochrane.
