ALL LIABLE TO CONSCRIPTION UNDER THE NEW REGULATIONS

Only Way to Raise Needed Reinforcements is to Order Out for Service All Men of Certain Defined Ages and to Abolish Exemptions in Such Cases.

Ottawa, April 16.—Owing to the critical situation which has with some suddenness developed on the western front and which is likely to continue until the allied nations have materially increased the strength of their forces, the Government of Canada, after the most careful consideration of all the circumstances and possible consequences, has reached the decision that it is not only desirable but absolutely essential that substantial reinforcements be secured for the Canadian expeditionary force without delay.

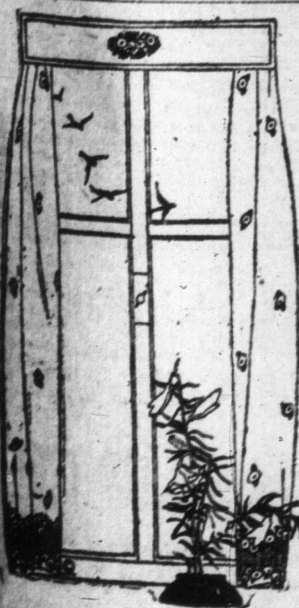

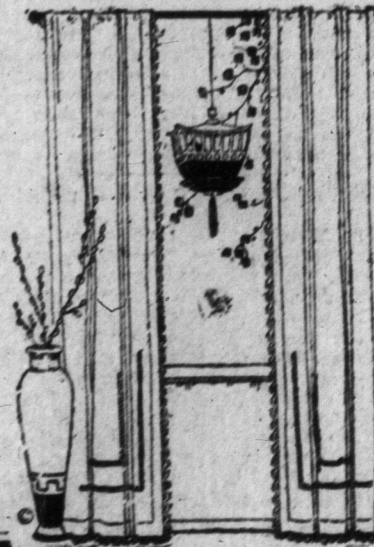

MAY WITHDRAW CASE

City Solicitor Ordered to Make Weekly Reports on Metropolitan Case.

"You tell Chairman McIntyre that the city knows its own business, and he has no right to come butting in," said Mayor Church last night referring to the statement made by the chairman of the railway board that the city had jumped into the purchase of the Scarborough division of the radial.

"The city has lost nothing under the agreement with the radial," said the mayor. "We are not operating the line, because it is cheaper for the company to operate it in war time."

May Cut Off Pay of All Enlisted Civic Employees

Following the action of the federal government in cutting off the pay of enlisted members of the civil service, the mayor has instructed the finance commissioner to report on the advisability of doing the same thing to men who have enlisted from the city's employ.

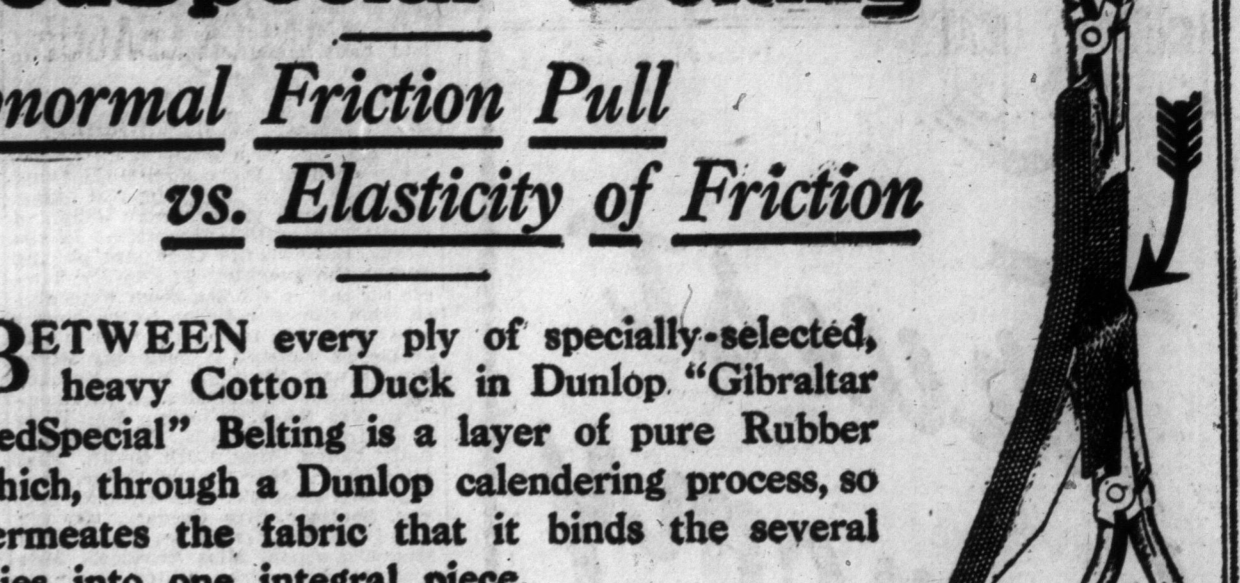

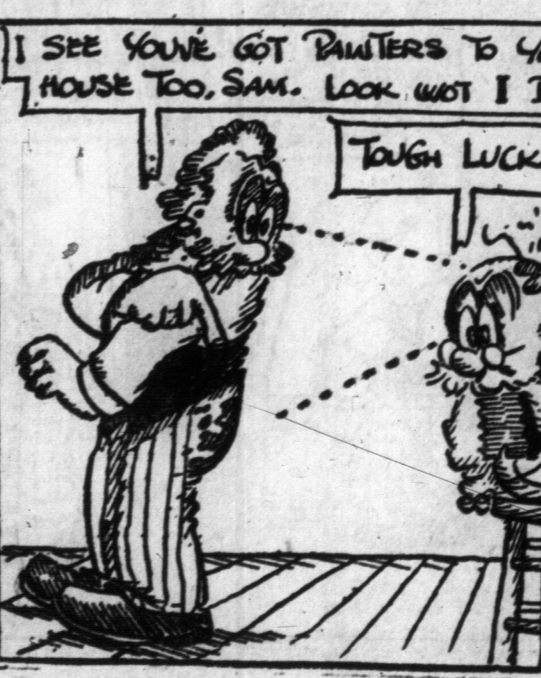

FOUND DEAD IN BED.
Mrs. W. Clarkson, 690 East Gerard street, was found lying dead on a bed in her home late yesterday afternoon by some friends who dropped in on a visit. It is thought that death was due to a stroke.
