THE TEMPERANCE PEOPLE BLAME THE GOVERNMENT.

As we expected would be the case, the temperance people are now charging the Government with double dealing. The Montreal Witness, which all along has been the soul of the prohibition movement, states that one cause of the defeat was "the by no means negative position of the Liberal party throughout the province."

Further on The Witness states that "every observation points to the conclusion that the plebiscite in this province was a deliberately planned failure." From The Witness it appears that many people were not aware that the plebiscite was lawfully taken. Proclamations were hardly anywhere to be seen, while the official machinery for recording the votes was placed in the hands of the liquor interest.

A BETTER KIND OF PROHIBITION.

Our prohibition friends are not in the least in earnest in their desire to benefit humanity there are scores of different channels along which they may profitably divert their energies. We propose to refer to one such channel. The idea is suggested by an interesting article in The New York Medical Record of Sept 24 last. This article discusses at length the "State and municipal care of consumptives."

Just as there exists in nearly all States or municipalities a commission or a board of special examiners for the purpose of examining those who are proper subjects for State care in an asylum for the insane, so should there exist a commission for the determination of admission to municipal or State institutions for consumptives.

THE TEMPERANCE PEOPLE BLAME THE GOVERNMENT.

The institutions needed to carry out this plan would be: 1. A centrally located reception hospital and dispensary. 2. A dispensary should treat the ambulant tuberculous patients, whose admission into the sanatorium is impracticable or has to be delayed for want of room.


4. Several seaside sanatoria for the treatment of children afflicted with tuberculous diseases of the joints and other tuberculous (scrofulous) manifestations. 5. A maternity sanatorium. Of the requirements of such an institution I have already spoken.

WHEAT MARKETS STILL WEAK Chicago Futures Depressed on Saturday.

Continued Large Receipts at First Points and Reports of Freer Movement from Russia Chief Bear Factors—Interesting Statistics of This Year's World's Crop—Notes and Gossip.

Saturday Evening, Oct. 1. Liverpool wheat was heavy today. The spot article declined 1/4 to 1/2 cent and December futures 3/4.

Chicago receipts at primary points and freer offerings from Russia were factors in the maintenance of general weakness in the Chicago market today. The cash article declined and the remote options fell off about 1/4 cent bushel.

December wheat puts at Chicago, 61 1/2; calls, 62 1/2. Corn puts, 29 1/2; calls, 29 1/2. Total clearances to-day: Wheat and flour, equal to 626,000 bushels; corn, 556,000 bushels.

Exports at New York to-day: Flour, 3072 barrels and 20,000 sacks; wheat, 231,435 bushels.

Primary wheat receipts today, 1,601,000 bushels, against 1,308,000 the same day last year.

Wheat receipts at Minneapolis and Duluth to-day, 1,277 cars, against 1,183 the same day a year ago.

St. Louis wheat receipts today, 150,451 bushels, against 11,924 bushels the same day a year ago.

Car receipts of grain at Chicago to-day: Wheat, 62,000 bushels; flour, 17,300 boxes; oats, 25,000 bushels; barley, 10,000 bushels; rye, 5,000 bushels; clover, 1,000 tons; timothy, 1,000 tons.
