Alaskan Boundary Dispute
Can't Be Settled Without Their Big Fees.

THIS THE PREMIER ADMITS
The Question is What Russia Really Handed Over to the U. S. by Purchase.

SIR CHARLES TRIES HIS HAND
But Sir Wilfrid Says Talk Won't Untangle It Till the Lawyers Get in Their Work.

Ottawa, June 5.—(Special.)—At the opening of the House this afternoon, Sir Wilfrid Laurier held on the table protocol of the Anglo-American Conference, which was published in The World this morning. After reading the portion relating to the offer to refer the Alaska boundary to arbitration, the Premier continued:

"With regard to the rest of the proposals of the United States Commissioners, I need not go into them just now, because they are in purely formal, but I want to call the attention of the House at once to the difference existing between the proposition made by the British Commissioners and the proposition made by the American Commissioners.

"The first difference of opinion was with regard to the composition of the tribunal. The tribunal proposed by the British Commissioners was a tribunal of three jurists of repute, one to be selected by the Judicial Commissioners of the Privy Council for Great Britain, one to be selected by the President of the United States, and the third to be selected by the two, or, in the event of disagreement, the friendly power, however, not being named. With regard to the possible question which might arise on account of occupation, the British Commissioners proposed to follow identically the rules laid down by the Venetian treaty. The rules laid down by the Venetian treaty were in substance the following: That if the equivalent of possession, should constitute a title.

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G. T. R. STRIKE GETS MIXED.
Company Won't Take the Strikers Back as a Body, But All Must Apply Individually.
HAVE THE MEN BEEN BEATEN.
Roadmaster Ferguson Claims That They Have—Were the Executive Led Away?

There is still a mix-up in connection with the Grand Trunk trackmen's strike, as far as the rank and file of the men are concerned. The truth seems to be that the rank and file of the strikers have been "jollied" owing to phantom promises by outside parties being accepted by their executive at Montreal. It turned out yesterday morning that the Grand Trunk Company would not take the men as a body, but that they must make application individually, and that the company would accept the men only until the camp on Saturday night put the men back and file—just where the management wanted them apparently. The company state that they had no conditions for their return; that the understanding, and complete surrender, it now turns out that about 500 men will not be taken back in any form until the men have worked for a number of days. This is how it stands today, as far as can be gathered.

COMPANY'S CONDITIONS.
The Men Must Make a Formal Request to Be Restored to Their Places.
Montreal, June 5.—(Special.)—The fact of the matter is the company will not take back all of the men, as they declare that it would be unfair to displace men who had stood by the company while the others were out on strike. The only three-quarters of the eighteen hundred men will be taken back. The officials state that the process of taking back will begin when the men make a formal request to be restored to their former places. The situation of the locomotive engineers and the engineers presented a schedule to the company, the details of which were not known, and they will return for their answer on July 1.

THE STRIKE THAT FAILED.
This Montreal Despatch Says the Executive Went to Conference Since Last Night.
Montreal, June 5.—The Executive Committee of the Grand Trunk trackmen and Organizer Lowe held a conference to-night in regard to a long chain of events. The Grand Trunk simply agreed to take as many men back as they required, and the men will now have to work until the men who were taken on during the strike.

SHREWD MANAGERS HAVE GATHERED IN PROFITABLE BUSINESS IN NEW YORK AND LONDON.
Montreal, June 5.—(Special.)—The annual meeting of the Bank of Montreal took place here today. Hon. Senator Drummond occupied the chair. Before the report was adopted Mr. E. S. Clouston, the general manager, said that the only important change in our liabilities is the large increase in deposits, amounting to about \$5,000,000, which arises from no special deposits, but appears to be a general increase in all classes. The increase in deposits in all the banks for the same period amounts to \$32,000,000, so we appear to have received our fair share of them. Mr. Clouston said that the business of the bank in the United States and on the continent, manufacturers are faced with the present depression, and it is not clear whether the present depression will be a general one or not.

BRITAIN'S HONORS TO
LORD KITCHENER

The Crushing of Mahdism
Was Due to the Genius
of the General.

REMARKS OF MR. BALFOUR
In Introducing the Vote for \$150,000 for the Sirdar in the House of Commons.

SIR H. CAMPBELL-BANNERMAN
Supported the Motion, While Expressing Regret at the Treatment of the Mahdists.

London, June 5.—Mr. Balfour, in introducing the vote of \$150,000 for Lord Kitchener in the House of Commons, said the fact that the power of Mahdism was crushed was due to the genius of the man they desired to honor and reward. The Government leader expressed the hope that those who objected to the policy of the Sudan advance would not think that was a reason for relating the vote, as such a course would be introducing politics into military matters.

He then dwelt with admiration on the way in which the Sirdar had surmounted difficulties and organized victories by "his unswerving and almost superhuman industry." He deserved a signal mark of gratitude and honor, and he (Mr. Balfour) believed that in proposing the vote he was only carrying out the wishes of the House and the country.

Opposition Leader Supports.
Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman, the Opposition leader, cordially supported the motion, while expressing regret at the treatment of the Mahdists, which he regarded as an error of taste and judgment. Mr. Balfour did not refer to the incident of the Sirdar's head, excepting indirectly when he said he believed that there was only one question before the House in connection with his reference to mixing politics in military matters. Mr. Balfour admitted that the Sirdar wished to withdraw from a successful general a merited reward because he had carried out the wishes of the House.

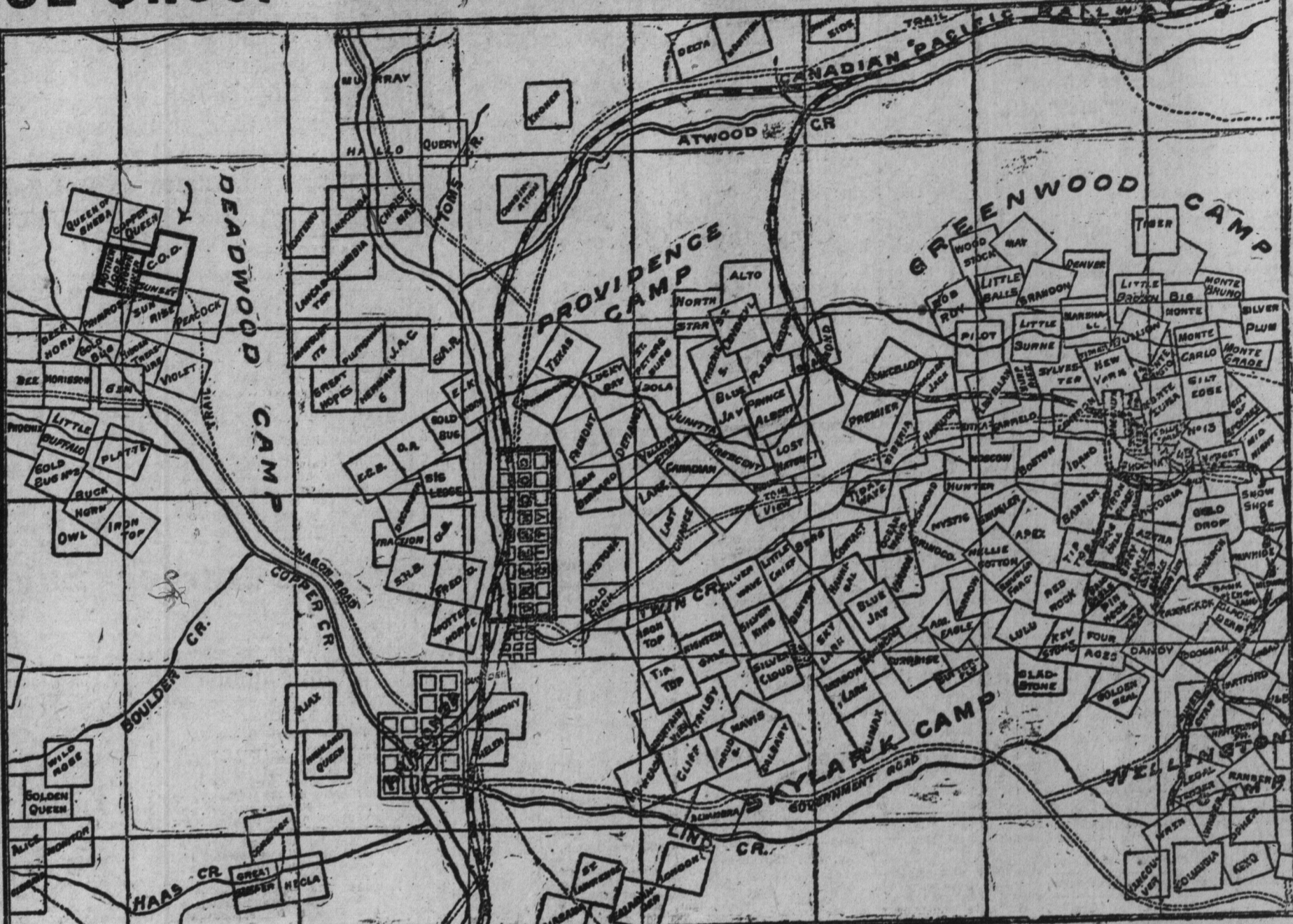

In a distance of 247 feet, it will have to be driven about 200 feet further before the hanging wall of the big main ledge will have been encountered. M. R.
