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President Gooderham Makes Important Statement Regarding Both Properties.

RESUMPTION OF DIVIDENDS Likely to Be Delayed a While Terminating at Subsidy-Mining Stock Sales Yesterday.

Mr. George Gooderham, president of the War Eagle and Centre Star Mining Companies, who has just visited Rossland, has given the following statement to The World last evening:

"Generally speaking, I consider the conditions at Rossland more reassuring than at any time in the history of the camp. During more than a year past the attention of the managements of the War Eagle and Centre Star mines has been directed towards the solving of the problem involved in the treatment of the low grade ores. Formerly it was thought that the cost of mining and of freight and treatment in Rossland was so high as to preclude the possibility of attempting to deal with any ore excepting from the high grade shafts. There is a large amount of high grade ore in the developed chutes of both mines, and the properties look very promising.

"The standpoint adopted yet as a matter of fact there is probably a great deal more value in the low grade ores than in the high grade, and there ought eventually to be more money in their treatment. We have always thought that the success of mining in Rossland depended upon the solution of the problem of treating this class of ore.

"Mr. Kirby, our general manager, has for this reason during the past year directed his attention to the equipment of our mines and the organization of the force so that the introduction of the contract system would be possible.

"The shafts in both mines are being dug down at the rate of about 50 feet per month under the contract system, being nearly twice as fast and at nearly half the former cost. Thus, by the introduction of a new plan we have done away with the delay that formerly took place during the excavation of the shafts on the different levels, so that it is now hoped that striking will go on almost continuously through the year.

The cost of drifting, raising and hoisting has also been greatly reduced, in consequence of the contract system being adopted, and has naturally taken a considerable time of the mines for a certain period.

Clark & Co. discuss the copper and nickel situation in Ontario. The absent from the city at the time of his publication, our attention has been recently called to an article in The World of Aug. 20, on Canadian industrial development, as shown by Mr. P. M. Clarke's works at Sault Ste. Marie.

It is well known that, commencing near the South end of the lake, the line of the St. Lawrence and Ottawa River, is a very wide belt of mineral-bearing rocks of various ages. Nickel, copper and gold are found largely in this region. In fact, around Sudbury,

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
