London, May 27.—The report of the royal commission of the volunteer and militia forces practically recommends conscription as the only means of providing a home defence army adequate for the protection of the country in the absence or partial absence of the regular troops.

The commissioners are of the opinion that the principles adopted by all the other great European states must be largely adopted by Great Britain and that it is the duty of every able-bodied citizen to be trained for national defence. They point out that national training would involve a period of continuous service with the colors under an instruction body of specially educated and highly trained officers, and they consider that one year of such continuous training would suffice, with a few weeks' attendance at the manoeuvres for a year or two afterwards.

All-Night Session Weared the Members and Little Progress Was Made Friday.

Ottawa, May 27.—(Special).—The all-night sitting which preceded the vote on the third reading of the national transcontinental railway bill proved a little too much for the physical endurance of the house. Only a few members turned up at the meetings of the committee this morning, and fortunate were the promoters whose bills were among the orders of the day.

The sitting of the house to-day was uneventful. It was started off at 6 o'clock, Sir Richard Cartwright intimating that last night's sitting of the house had been a trying one. Mr. Cartwright is a member of the committee that has not yet definitely decided on a date for delivering the budget speech. He is still in Ottawa to-day, but the chances are in favor of Tuesday or Wednesday of the following week.

A brief discussion took place on Mr. Fisher's bill respecting the sale of the Bank of Canada. The bill differs from the one introduced last year in only one or two important features. Progress in committee was not good. Hon. Mr. Fisher being in his usual communicative mood.

There was a call from the opposition side of the house for the abolition of the Canadian exhibit at the Imperial Institute, London, unless the exhibit is improved. E. B. Oiler declared that the present exhibit is a disgrace to Canada.

The rules of the house were suspended to permit of the receiving of a petition to incorporate the Farmers' Bank of Canada.

Mr. Borden protested that the reasons given for the delay in presenting the petition with his objections were upheld by Sir Wilfrid Laurier. In view of the fact that no other interests were involved the petition was referred.

The following bills were introduced: An act respecting the Montreal Terminal Railway, Mr. March. An act respecting the Central Life Insurance Co., Mr. Morrison. An act respecting the Ottawa Fire Insurance Co., Mr. March.

An act respecting the Kingston and Dominion Central Railway Co., Mr. Harby. The bill to amend the criminal code, 182, fathered by Hugh Guthrie, was dropped.

Richard Cartwright introduced a bill to amend the general inspection act. Its object is to reduce the fees charged under the existing law.

Hon. Sydney Fisher moved a resolution restricting the sale of seeds of cereals, grasses and clovers and providing that the seeds of certain weeds containing the seeds of certain weeds should be sold in a standard of timothy and clover and alfalfa seeds No. 1 or otherwise designated as being of first quality, providing for the examination of such seeds and providing penalties for contravention of the act.
