BAKERS RAISE PRICE OF PIES AND CAKES TWENTY PER CENT. MORE FROM TO-DAY

Dominion Bakers' Association Assert That Cost of Materials Renders Advance Necessary - Wholesale Flour Men and Others Dispute Retailers' Allegations.

This is the day that the bakers boast the price of cakes and pies from 15 to 25 per cent, both wholesale and retail.

What They Will Do. Following the advance in the price of flour, butter, eggs and other raw material used in the baking business.

These cards were prominently displayed about the bakers' windows on Saturday.

Heretofore small cakes of the cookie, bun and roll variety have been selling at 8, 10 and 12 cents per dozen.

Some of the restaurants and boarding-house keepers, not to mention the thousands of housekeepers who purchase from the bakers, are marvelling at the great increase.

Remedy, Make Your Own. "The best medicine is in their own hands," if they don't want to pay the price they must make their own pies and cakes.

The bakers who were consulted all had the same story to tell. The ingredients, such as flour, butter, lard, eggs, etc., had all gone so high that they were obliged to make the increase.

"The price should have been increased about the first of April," said Mr. Weston, manager of the Modern Bakery.

Another baker said he was paying 20 cents a pound for shortening, such as butter, whereas some time ago he was only paying about 10c per pound.

THE LATEST ADDITION TO THE COST OF LIVING

It's only a fortnight or so since the bakers unostentatiously increased the price of bread by suddenly cutting four ounces off the weight of the loaves of bread.

Saturday most bakeries displayed a card announcing a 20 per cent. increase in the price of cakes, etc., "owing to the increase in the cost of raw materials."

RUNAWAY MOTOR CYCLE CARRIES FLAMING DEATH

Disaster at Bicycle Races at Berlin—Women Spectators Set on Fire and Crushed.

BERLIN, July 18.—Four persons were killed, more than twenty severely hurt, and a dozen others slightly injured as the result of an explosion of a motor cycle, and a fire which followed it, during a cycle race at the Old Ederland Gardens this evening.

One of the pace maker's cycles burst and the rider lost control. The benzene exploded in a burst of flame, and the machine leaped into the air.

The motor cycle crashing into the public stand, hurling spectators right and left, and setting on fire several women, who were crushed to death.

A panic ensued, in which a great number, including children, were badly trampled. Eighteen men and four women were seriously injured, and two of the men having since died.

COLLEGE OF THE ARCHBISHOP FOR OTTAWA

Interest in the Selection of Archbishop for Ottawa is Becoming General and Keen

MONTREAL, July 18.—(Special)—The question of appointing a new Archbishop of Ottawa, has become a burning one, contest being between the two leading nationalities of the country.

At first, it was confined to the faithful in and around the City of Ottawa, but now the laity and clergy of this city, and even the politicians are taking an English hand.

The dispute dates back to the days when a very lively attempt was made by the Rev. Father Falcay, then of the City of Ottawa, and the English-speaking Catholics of the capital, to make the Ottawa University an English-speaking institution.

When Archbishop Duhamel died, the same element set to work endeavoring to bring about the first appointment of an English-speaking gentleman to the vacant see, and secondly, the making of the university at the capital an English-speaking seat of Catholic learning.

In fact, it appears to be generally accepted that this powerful element has won over the past year and certain no less a factor than the papal delegate, who left the other day for Rome.

Taft Gets His Way And Raw Materials Have a Lower Rate

President is Compelled to Lay Down the Law and Insist That Party Pledges Be Fulfilled.

WASHINGTON, July 18.—President Taft will win his fight for free or reduced rates of duty on raw materials. Nearly every member of the conference committee on the tariff bill conceded this Saturday.

Indications are that when the new tariff bill becomes a law the rates on the articles which the president desired to come in free will be as follows:

Iron ore, free (present rate 40 cents per ton). Oil free (now protected by countervailing duties). Hides, 1-2 per cent. ad valorem (present rate 15 per cent.). Coal, 45 cents per ton (present rate 67 cents).

Lumber, probably \$1.25 on rough, with separate rates on finished. This would be a material reduction through the lumber schedule.

REMNANT HELD A BUZZ OF POWER

For One Night Last Week He Held the Fate of the Asquith Government in His Hands.

CHICAGO, July 18.—T. P. O'Connor cables The Tribune: Great Britain is still in the heart of the parliamentary jungle.

Winston Churchill, president of the board of trade, went to bed at 7 in the morning. Premier Asquith appeared at 8, and Lloyd George, chancellor of the exchequer, left at 9, having fought steadily for seventeen hours against all comers.

Lloyd-George's wonderful physique and more wonderful courage sustain him still, and he is the freshest and most good tempered and the most tenacious of all his colleagues.

Long Debate in Parliament. The house of commons is still discussing page five, and the budget contains seventy-four pages. Thus must mean that the house of commons can't get through the bill in time for Christmas.

John Redmond held the fate of the government in his hands. Any proposal to extend land taxes in the budget to Ireland with 2,500,000 of peasant proprietors existing or about to exist, had to be resisted by Redmond at whatever cost.

Pending Elections Add to Woe. For one week even the Irish members took no part in the decisions of the budget, while up to the present time they had voted usually with the government.

Reduced Salaries of Unmarried Government Employes. PARIS, July 18.—The grave problem presented by the declining birth rate again is distressing France, which is engaged particularly at this moment weighing the merits claimed for the plan proposed by Prof. Richet of the Academy of Medicine Leroy Beaulieu.

The scheme proposes a system of bonuses for children, the bonus growing as the number of children in one family increases. That is, while the parents get nothing in consideration for the first child, they are allowed \$100 for the second, \$200 for the third, and so on.

Richet further would reduce the salaries of unmarried employes of the state as well as those with only one child or none five years after marriage.

There are not lacking those who affirm that the prosperity of France rests on the principle of the small family and who see revolution, chaos, and national poverty if large families become general.

MOHAMMED ALI, HE KNOWS Doesn't Want to Receive a Deputation to Tell Him He's Deposed.

TEHRAN, July 18.—The Nationalists having requested permission of the British and Russian representatives to question the deposition of Mohammed Ali of the sovereignty, received the following reply:

"His majesty states that, having taken refuge in the Russian legation, he has no fact abdicated. Therefore he does not wish to receive a deputation to inform him of the deposition."

BEAUTIFUL SWANSEA
NEEDS STREET CARS
Transportation Will Make This
One of Best Suburbs of City
—Extend the Car Lines.

"However did you decide to locate
out here in Swansea, away from all the
conveniences of the city?" asked a
World reporter of a prosperous Toronto
business man who has built a pretty
residence on Ellis-avenue, about a
quarter of a mile north of the Lake
Shore-road.

"Just because I couldn't find a nicer
place anywhere in or around Toronto,"
was the self-satisfied reply.
And this gentleman is right. The
secret of Swansea's attractiveness is
its natural beauty, and that alone will
overcome all its present shortcomings.
Here is a district some 1500 acres in
extent, nestling alongside High Park
and extending westward until the
Humber River winds up like a silver
ribbon and separates it from Etobicoke
Township. Not in any of Toronto's
suburbs is there such a diversified
panorama as is presented here. Rising
ground and ravine are interspersed so
artificially that it would seem as if
nature had specifically arranged the
district to suit the most fastidious tastes
of scenery lovers. The central part
of Swansea is as yet thinly settled, there
is considerable building activity near
the lake shore, and a handsome eight-
roomed brick school has recently been
erected on Windermere-avenue.

Situated among the trees at the cor-
ner of Ellis-avenue and Thompson-
street is the Morningstar Presbyterian
Church, a quaint and picturesque little
building, while not far distant is the
Episcopal Church of St. Olave's.

Where Nature Reigns.
Going towards Bloor-street, however,
the district's northern boundary, nature
still holds undisputed sway. The
ground is covered with underbrush and
ferns, with here and there an open
grassy spot, quietly inviting considera-
tion as a site for a home. The land is
high, fertile and heavily wooded, be-
sides being altogether free from the
unhealthy vapors which so often prove
disagreeable for those living in low-
lying districts beside the sea. The scene
from one of the typical knolls for
which Swansea is noted, is unsurpass-
ed. The steep downward grades to-
wards the ravines adjoining, provide
a means of viewing the landscape, un-
impeded, while the trees that spring
from the hillsides are just high enough
to allow the green foliage to blend with
the blue waters of Lake Ontario in the
distance.

Improvement is the street cars. Those
who already reside here have learned
by experience how much a car service
is needed, and hosts of prospective prop-
erty owners are deterred from making
purchases thru the absence of the street
cars, and thru that alone.

Swansea is just now in a transitional
stage of its history. Toronto wants to
annex the district, but the residents
cannot see what advantages would ac-
cure from this, unless the street car
service is extended. Repeated confer-
ences with Mayor Oliver recently have
so far failed to bring about any definite
understanding as to what can be
done. Manager Fleming recognizes the
fact that street car extension would
mean to the district, but the expense
that would be incurred in bridging some
of the ravines, coupled with the com-
paratively short duration of the Toronto
Railway Company's franchise, makes
Mr. Fleming hesitant in promising the
extensions desired.

As a matter of fact, the whole future
of Swansea—its growth and develop-
ment—lies with the City of Toronto.
The district he annexed, let the city bear

Pastor Russell's Sermon

The Heathen For an Inheritance—Text, "Ask of Me, and I Shall Give Thee the Heathen for Thine Inheritance, and the Utmost Parts of the Earth for Thy Possessions" (Psalm ii, 8).

OAKLAND, Cal., July 18.—The Bible Students' Convention of Believers in the Atonement by the Precious Blood opened here yesterday. Pastor Russell of Brooklyn Tabernacle, New York, was the principal speaker on the program to-day. He made two addresses.

Let us be sure, dear friends, that any theory of ours respecting the heathen, or of any other feature of the Divine program, which in any degree implies superior wisdom, or superior energy, or superior love, on our part, as compared with that of our heavenly Father and our Redeemer, must be wrong. The sooner we learn to pray from the heart, "Thy will be done," the better it will be for us, the more we are able to get into harmony with our Father and the more will we be used as His ambassadors and representatives.

When we remember our Redeemer's love for the race, and His willingness to give up His life "to seek and to recover that which was lost," we are inclined to amazement that He has not yet asked the Father for His inheritance; and that with this will come the inheritance of all the earth, with power to fully subject things to Him, for the mere request: "Ask of Me." As a matter of fact, this world-wide dominion has not yet His inheritance; the utmost parts of the earth are not yet His possession. Indeed, as the prophet declares, "Darkness covers the earth, and gross darkness the heathen."

Our Lord did not ask for His great power to reign at an earlier date because He knew the Father's plan, and was waiting for the proper Divine times and seasons; He had no wish of change in this. He did not ask to receive the heathen for an inheritance at the present time, because He had not yet received the Father's promise, but has been content to wait and place that request in its due time in harmony with the Father's plan.

Meantime the heathen have been suffering no damage. Born in sin, shapen in iniquity, condemned to death, they have been waiting for the Redeemer, and going down to the great prison-house for periods of unconsciousness—until the Redeemer at His second advent shall call them all mankind from the great prison-house, the tomb. This He foretold saying, "All that are in their graves shall hear His voice, and shall come forth." This will include not only the church of the first-born, but the church of the second-born, and who, passing through the fire of death, shall be resurrected into life eternal, but it will include also all the remainder of mankind, that is, those who had God's approval, all of whom, because of their sin, shall come forth unto judgment—trial. A fair trial will be theirs, and the result will be their worthiness of life eternal by the manner in which they will receive or reject the Christ of God when, during the millennium, they shall be made fully known to them.

It was part of the Divine purpose also that the whole earth should be filled with people, and that it should be filled forth of a progeny is a part of the Divine will. The few short years of the present life, with its experience of sin and death conditions, will in due time be supplemented by the glorious period of the millennium, with its grand opportunities for lessons of righteousness and obedience and reward. Its corrective "stripes," or punishments, to the careless will be to the intent that no man shall be ultimately be entirely recovered from death conditions and brought into full accord with God in Christ. And others, demonstrating their willingness to come into heart sympathy with righteousness, will be utterly destroyed from amongst the people (Acts iii, 23).

So, then, our Lord's reason for not asking sooner for the heathen as His inheritance, and the remotest parts of the earth for His possession, was because He knew the Father's plan to be a different plan, and that it was the more excellent way, and He delighted to do the Father's will. The Heathen For an Inheritance—Text, "Ask of Me, and I Shall Give Thee the Heathen for Thine Inheritance, and the Utmost Parts of the Earth for Thy Possessions" (Psalm ii, 8).

being under present conditions is Christ arranged for a benefit—for the development in the minds of the royal priesthood of the sacrificing qualities, and the graces of the holy spirit—our meekness, gentleness, patience, faith, long-suffering, brotherly kindness, love.

Let us be sure, dear friends, that any theory of ours respecting the heathen, or of any other feature of the Divine program, which in any degree implies superior wisdom, or superior energy, or superior love, on our part, as compared with that of our heavenly Father and our Redeemer, must be wrong. The sooner we learn to pray from the heart, "Thy will be done," the better it will be for us, the more we are able to get into harmony with our Father and the more will we be used as His ambassadors and representatives.

When we remember our Redeemer's love for the race, and His willingness to give up His life "to seek and to recover that which was lost," we are inclined to amazement that He has not yet asked the Father for His inheritance; and that with this will come the inheritance of all the earth, with power to fully subject things to Him, for the mere request: "Ask of Me." As a matter of fact, this world-wide dominion has not yet His inheritance; the utmost parts of the earth are not yet His possession. Indeed, as the prophet declares, "Darkness covers the earth, and gross darkness the heathen."

Our Lord did not ask for His great power to reign at an earlier date because He knew the Father's plan, and was waiting for the proper Divine times and seasons; He had no wish of change in this. He did not ask to receive the heathen for an inheritance at the present time, because He had not yet received the Father's promise, but has been content to wait and place that request in its due time in harmony with the Father's plan.

Meantime the heathen have been suffering no damage. Born in sin, shapen in iniquity, condemned to death, they have been waiting for the Redeemer, and going down to the great prison-house for periods of unconsciousness—until the Redeemer at His second advent shall call them all mankind from the great prison-house, the tomb. This He foretold saying, "All that are in their graves shall hear His voice, and shall come forth." This will include not only the church of the first-born, but the church of the second-born, and who, passing through the fire of death, shall be resurrected into life eternal, but it will include also all the remainder of mankind, that is, those who had God's approval, all of whom, because of their sin, shall come forth unto judgment—trial. A fair trial will be theirs, and the result will be their worthiness of life eternal by the manner in which they will receive or reject the Christ of God when, during the millennium, they shall be made fully known to them.

It was part of the Divine purpose also that the whole earth should be filled with people, and that it should be filled forth of a progeny is a part of the Divine will. The few short years of the present life, with its experience of sin and death conditions, will in due time be supplemented by the glorious period of the millennium, with its grand opportunities for lessons of righteousness and obedience and reward.
