# STATUS OF IRISH CONSTABULARY DISCUSSED IN COMMONS

## Headway Made in Co-ordinating Canadian National and Grand Trunk

### DR. GEO. C. PIDGEON SPEAKS IN ASSEMBLY ON HOME MISSIONS

Presbyterians Hear of Efforts in West—Dr. Gandier Reports on Forward Work.

### CANON CODY PRESENT

Ottawa, June 3.—The second evening session of the general assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada was devoted entirely to hearing the progress made in the matter of home missions and social service in Canada.

### Influencing Foreigner.

The statement was made by Rev. W. McCloy of Yorkton that the work of the church was the chief influence in turning the foreigner into a good Canadian, as the church had its chief influence with the brighter minds among the younger people of the new-comers. Dr. Pidgeon pointed out that in two years a deficit of \$100,000 in home missions had been wiped out and the work kept up to standard. He said there were splendid men from the United States in the mission fields of Canada, and without them the work would not have been so successful as had proven the case.

### Rev. Dr. Macdormand of Halifax spoke on the work in Labrador and Newfoundland. He said the reason the missionary work was to join in the work of Christianizing the immigrants.

Rev. Wm. McCloy of Yorkton, Sask., said one missionary in the west had a district 60 miles long by 20 miles wide to look after. He pointed to the need of more missionaries and said the east had nobly supported the west.

## MONARCHIST PLOT THREATENS AUSTRIA

### Thousand Austrian Ex-Officers Plan to Cross the Frontier from Hungary.

Vienna, June 3.—The Austrian government has asked Hungary for an immediate explanation of a monarchist plot, which has been discovered in development on the Hungarian side of the eastern frontier. It is regarded as the most serious plot yet uncovered. Chancellor Renner said that the Hungarian minister, and said he had proof that under Hungarian auspices more than one thousand former Austrian officers were found to be organized on the Hungarian front, and that when the plot had been completed they planned to cross the Austrian frontier, seize the southern railway, and attempt to establish a monarchy. Ten million crowns had already been expended in the effort.

### Doukhobors Sell Land.

Leithbridge, Alta. June 3.—The Doukhobors, who have large holdings at Lambrecht and Cowley, have sold part of their land, which is believed to be the start of a movement on the part of the colony to leave Alberta.

## Many Garment-Workers Reported Out of Work

### Hundreds Are Said to Be Idle in Toronto and Montreal as the Result of the Imposition of Taxation Upon Clothing.

Hamilton, June 3.—Louis Marcovitz, Montreal, of the executive board of the Amalgamated Association of Garment Workers, was in the city yesterday investigating complaints of members of the local union that two clothing manufacturers had broken the agreement recently signed by the Clothing Manufacturers' Association and the garment workers. As a result of his conference with the manufacturers concerned, one of the disputes was adjusted by him, and it was agreed that the dispute with the other firm should be arbitrated. At the same time, however, it was noted that there is a permanent board of arbitration in the clothing trade. It was agreed that the Toronto finding will be accepted by the local parties. The question is in regard to the laying off of hands due to the slackening of trade thru cancellation of orders, following the imposition of the luxury tax on men's suits.

## ALLIES AND NEUTRALS COMBINE FOR RELIEF OF CENTRAL EUROPE

### Will Extend Credits Mainly in the Form of Raw Material and Food—Canada Has Been Approached, But Has Not Sent Reply.

Paris, June 3.—New and substantial credits for the relief and reconstruction of central European countries, including Austria and Hungary have been arranged by the governments of Great Britain, Denmark, Holland, Norway, Sweden and Switzerland. It was announced today by the international committee for relief credits. The credits are mainly in the form of raw materials and food, and although the United States is not officially represented on the committee it is co-operating in a large way. It is stated by providing extensive commodity credits for central Europe.

## THREE BADLY HURT IN CAR COLLISION

### Automobile Turned Completely Over—One Case Considered Serious.

Three people were injured last night when a street car collided with an automobile at the corner of King and Strachan avenue. Charles Le Gree, 759 Bathurst street, was most seriously injured, and is in the Western Hospital suffering from head injuries, and a broken rib which pierced the lung. His condition is regarded as serious. Miss Dorothy Nicholson, 61 Clinton street, suffered a broken nose and a shaking up. She was taken to her home. Harry Harrison, 509 Lansdowne avenue, owner of the motor car, had his arm broken and is in the Western Hospital.

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The automobile was southbound on Strachan avenue. Nearing King street young Harrison did not look to see if an eastbound street car was coming. Crossing the street, his car was struck by an eastbound King street car, and a case traveling at a fair rate of speed and hurled the automobile onto the south sidewalk, turning it over. Motorman J. W. Forbes, 152 John street, was in charge of the street car with Conductor Peter Olsen, of 6 Lakeview avenue. Olsen was held by Detective Crow and Johns, but was released with young Harrison and allowed to go. Assistant Crown Attorney McFadden instructed the police not to hold the drivers.

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## TORONTO VARSITY GIVES NOTABLES HONORARY DEGREES

### Opening of Convocation Sees Honoring of Two Great Soldiers.

Last night, at Convocation Hall, the initial session in the annual convocation exercises was held before a packed auditorium of friends and relatives of the post-graduates, who were recipients of honorary degrees from Toronto University. Fourteen notable men who have achieved great success in the field of study, and particularly two well-known members of the executive staff of the Canadian and imperial forces, in the persons of Sir Arthur William Currie, G.C.M.G., K.C.B., Canadian commander-in-chief of the Canadian forces, and Sir Charles Vere Ferrers Townshend, K.C.B., the hero of Kut-el-Amara, presented a very pleasing sight as they filed into the huge auditorium attired in their university gowns of sedate black, with here and there a blue, red or green cloak, to lend color to the scheme) to receive their degree from the hands of the chancellor, after they had been presented to him by the president of the university, Sir Robert Falconer.

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The list of those who received degrees, as well as a few facts as revealed by the president's address concerning them, are as follows: Doctor of Laws (honoris causa), Sir Arthur William Currie, G.C.M.G., K.C.B., commander-in-chief of the Canadian forces. President Falconer welcomed General Currie to this university as Canada's greatest soldier, and thru the whole of Canada, which this university has the honor of representing.

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## THREE YEARS MUST ELAPSE BEFORE IRELAND CAN CONTROL OWN CONSTABULARY FORCE

### During Transition Period It is Probable That Minister Will Be Guiding Hand Instead of Committee—If Home Rule is Used to Establish Republic, It Will Be Suspended and Necessary Steps Taken to Enforce Law.

London, June 3.—The greater part of the evening was devoted by the commons to the discussion of the status of the Irish police under the home rule bill, and the fact that neither the Laborites nor the Nationalists nor the supporters of Herbert H. Asquith are effectually participating in the debates did not prevent occasional warm and acrimonious passages. The absence of criticism from the opposition benches, however, is speeding the progress of the bill.

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The government finally accepted an amendment providing that the transfer of the constabulary should not be earlier than three years from the bill's coming into operation, and Walter Hume Long, as spokesman for the government, promised favorable consideration for Sir Edward Carson's suggestion that, instead of being transferred to the Irish parliaments, the constabulary should be disbanded and compensated, and the two parliaments allowed their own police forces when by identical act they called for the change.

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During the course of the discussion Mr. Long declared that if an attempt were made to use the bill to establish an Irish republic, the bill would be suspended and the imperial parliament would take the steps necessary to restore law and order. 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## GUARANTEES NEEDED IF BRITAIN AGREES TO NEGOTIATIONS

### Lloyd George Says Trade Discussions With Soviet Envoy Have Not Begun.

London, June 3.—Trade negotiations between the allies and Gregory Krassin, Russian soviet minister of trade and commerce, have not yet begun, according to a statement by Premier Lloyd George in the house of commons today.

## GUARANTEES NEEDED IF BRITAIN AGREES TO NEGOTIATIONS

### Lloyd George Says Trade Discussions With Soviet Envoy Have Not Begun.

Replying to a flood of insistent queries, the premier said there were certain questions Great Britain wanted cleared out of the way before it would undertake negotiations at all. Russia must guarantee that there will be no attacks on British interests in the east or at home while negotiations are proceeding. Mr. Lloyd George declared, and must guarantee to release all British prisoners, whether civil or military, and Great Britain must clear these questions out of the way herself. The premier added, after which allied negotiations could proceed.

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Representatives of the French and Italian governments are in London. The premier was asked whether the negotiations had been sanctioned by France and Italy. The question of M. Krassin's credentials and whom he represents also was raised. The premier replied that the decision of the supreme council to promote trade with Russia already had been made public. At San Remo the supreme council decided to authorize allied representatives to meet M. Krassin and a Russian trade delegation, including Maxim Litvinov, in London as soon as possible, with a view to beginning immediately trade relations thru the Russian co-operative movement and otherwise. It was decided, said the premier, that the allies delegates were prepared to discuss with the Russian delegates the best method of removing the obstacles and difficulties in the way of resuming peaceable trade relations in the general interest of Europe.

London, June 3.—The Irish secretary, Sir Hamar Greeshwood, speaking in the house of commons today, said he would consider sympathetically the suggestion of a medal for the Irish constabulary.

## DRURY STANDS FIRM ON SUPERANNUATION

### Reiterates Attitude at Balfour Meeting—Hint at Federal Election This Fall.

Burford, Ont. June 3.—(Special)—While he was in favor of the circular letter sent out by Secretary J. J. Morrison of the U.F.O., Premier Drury still stands behind the superannuation act. He reiterated his stand here tonight before 3,500 of the yeomanry of South Brant in presenting to them an account of his stewardship, following the closing of the farmers' government of Ontario. With the assistance of Hon. H. C. Nixon, provincial secretary, whose farm home is at St. George, North Brant, he held the attention of the audience which gathered in the open in the Burford Agricultural Society's grounds for three hours, despite the falling weather.

## DRURY STANDS FIRM ON SUPERANNUATION

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It was apparent from the tenor of the addresses delivered that the U.F.O. is looking for an early federal election. Premier Drury declared that he favored the proposed federal election and thought that it would be possible to hold it at an early date. 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## CONTINUE TO LAND TROOPS AT ENZELI

### Persian Government Negotiating With Moscow for Withdrawal of Reds.

Paris, June 3.—The Bolsheviks are continuing to land troops at Enzeli, according to despatches received here. At the same time Teheran is in direct negotiation with the Moscow government to obtain withdrawal of the Bolsheviks, of which, however, no signs are apparent, altho M. Tschicherin, the Bolshevik minister of foreign affairs, informed the Persian government by wireless that the Bolshevik troops would leave as soon as they had accomplished their mission of seizing the ships of Gen. Denekine, the former Anti-Bolshevik leader.

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## HORTOP MILLS BURNT TO GROUND

### Two Hundred Tons of Blazing Hay Illuminate Costly Spectacle.

The Hortop Milling plant, at Dufferin and Florence streets, was burned to the ground at 8 o'clock last night by fire which did \$21,000 damage before the firemen had it under control. More than 200 tons of hay and several hundred bags of feed were stored in the building, and all of it was destroyed. The cause of the fire is unknown, and when it was discovered the entire structure was a mass of flames. The building is of frame structure, covered with galvanized iron.

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When the firemen arrived on the scene, flames were shooting from every angle of the building. A second alarm was sounded, and the firemen were still working in the ruins at 11 o'clock last night. The downtown sections responded to the second alarm, and it was due to the strenuous efforts of Chief Russell's men that the flames did not reach other premises. It was a red-hot fire from beginning to end, and, on account of the hay being baled, it gave the fire-fighters much difficulty in beating out the flames. The loss, as estimated last night by the police, was \$15,000 to contents and \$6,000 to the building.

## Progress is Being Made In Railway Unification

### Series of Conferences Held and Details of Some Consolidations Agreed Upon Will Be Made Public in a Few Days.

Montreal, June 3.—The committee of management recently appointed in connection with the acquisition of the Grand Trunk system by the Canadian government, has held a series of conferences, at which plans have been outlined to insure the operation of the Grand Trunk system in harmony with the Canadian National Railways, treating the two systems as one. The work of this committee will continue until after the arbitration award has been made and the stocks held by the Grand Trunk shareholders transferred to the government.

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Careful and expert consideration is being given to the work of co-ordination and it is anticipated that details of those consolidations already decided upon will be made public in the course of the next few days. The committee of management has named a number of sub-committees composed of officials of both systems, to make reports and recommendations on their respective departments with a view to ensuring the maximum of efficiency and economy under the co-ordination plan.

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METHODISTS HONOR BRANTFORD DIVINE

Hamilton Conference Elects Rev. S. E. Mafshall President—Plans "Dry" Campaign.

HEARS BISHOP MCCONNELL

Woodstock, Ont., June 3.—(Special)—Rev. Sanford E. Marshall of Brantford was elected president of the Hamilton Methodist Conference at the opening session on today. The new president was ordained in the same church here twenty-six years ago as he was appointed president today. Prior to the opening of conference the laymen's delegates association met and elected officers and passed resolutions. The first resolution was addressed to the laymen of the Hamilton conference calling on them to give the liquor traffic a knockout blow in the coming vote on importation. The officers elected by the laymen were: President, A. Scribner, Brantford; vice-president, J. M. Denys, of Milton; secretary-treasurer, J. W. Shepperson, Brantford; convener of missionary societies, W. Treleven, Hamilton; convener of evangelism and social service, John Taylor, Jr., Galt; executive committee, Dr. Honoberger, Kitchener; W. A. Emory, Aldershot; H. E. Bluman, Hamilton; R. M. Hazelwood, Clifford; Fred Bean, Woodstock; C. R. Billings, Dunnville; and W. R. McCordick, St. Catharines. One of the speakers at the session was Dr. McCullen of Woodstock, for 45 years pastor of Knox Presbyterian Church. Rev. W. W. Prudham, of Wlartoz was elected secretary of the conference. The annual banquet of the Hamilton conference, held in the armories last night, was an immense function. Five hundred sat down to a sumptuous repast, and the feature of the event was a striking address by Bishop F. J. McConnell, LL.D., of Denver, Colorado. His theme was that of a true Christian internationalism, there had not yet been an attempt made by any of the nations to produce a sentiment which could truthfully be said to have as its aim a real Christian international spirit of Christianity. Christianity was made too much an individual affair, he said, and the world did not seem to realize that the greatest good and the highest form of citizenship could be achieved only by the nations developing a truer spirit of relationship based upon the fundamentals of Christianity. Most of the efforts in this direction have come thru the joys and joys of war.

"A truer Christian internationalism is what the world needs," he concluded "we must try to think of others, think of their welfare as well as our own, try to help the weaker, poorer situated, and apply the principles of true Christianity in our international affairs. If this is done, God's house will truly be established at the very pinnacle of the world."

DISFAVOR PRINCIPLE OF LONG PASTORATES

London Methodist Conference on Record—Rev. Geo. Jewett, Wyoming, New President.

Sturford, Ont., June 3.—The principle of extending the pastorate term beyond four years came before the London Methodist Conference at the general session late this afternoon, and the conference would have none of it. The issue came up with the recommendation of the stationing committee that certain ministers already four years on a circuit be allowed to return. Vigorous debate followed and one man, Rev. R. J. McCormick of Blyth was allowed to continue for another year because of the very exceptional conditions. The constitutionality of the extended term is based on clause 156, section 5, of the church discipline, which authorizes the stationing committee to set apart any field for exemption from the four-year maximum should interests of the church in general be considered so to require but there was no unanimity of opinion as to the interpretation. At the morning session Rev. George Jewett, of Wyoming was elected president.

MAYOR CHURCH ADDRESSES GOOD ROADS CONVENTION

Winnipeg, June 3.—(Canadian Press).—The keynote of all good work in western Canada and, for that matter, throughout the whole Dominion, was struck by the Hon. J. E. Laidlaw, minister of highways, at the concluding session of the Canadian Good Roads convention this afternoon, when he affirmed that the essence of patriotism was the home, and that the thing that touched the home nearest was the transportation facilities. Another speaker was Mayor T. L. Church of Toronto, who contrasted what the federal government of Canada had done for the railways with the lack of Dominion aid for road construction and reducing the high cost of living by good roads, and a system of internal waterways which would lead to a reduction in the rates for the freight and passenger traffic.

FOUR STATIONS BURNED.

Queenstown, Ireland, June 3.—The admiralty officials deny the report that an attack was made by Sinn Feiners or others against a naval station, but confirm that four coast-guard stations were burned. Two others were raided, but the raiders were repulsed.

HAMILTON

Hamilton, June 3.—The offer made by William and Mrs. Southern Jr. of their residence, Inglewood, for a Highfield memorial school, has led to an announcement that a site for Highfield had previously been purchased. Rev. C. A. Heaven stated today that an offer of \$16,000 for the residence of the late Dr. Russell, at the corner of Main and Queen streets, had been accepted. The mountain brow property is now entirely in possession of the city. The board of control this afternoon decided to accept the offer of \$300 made by C. E. Glover of the seven-tenths of an acre, which several years ago the city attempted to purchase for \$800, but was unable to do so. An agreement has been signed between the board of hospital governors and the stationary engineers in its employ in the matter of wages. A compromise was effected. The board offered the engineers \$100 dollars more than the scale previously mentioned. The annual day of Highfield School was held in the cricket grounds this afternoon. The weather was ideal and the event was keenly contested. It was followed with great interest by many of the parents and friends of the competitors.

VOTES TO REPEAL WAR TIME LAWS

U. S. House Makes Exception in Favor of Food Control and Trading With Enemy.

Washington, June 3.—By a vote of 328 to 3, the house today adopted a resolution to the senate a resolution repealing all war-time laws, except the Lever food control act and the trading with the enemy act. The supporting resolution, Democrats protested against continuing in force the Lever act, and expressed doubt whether the repeal bill as drafted covered all war legislation, particularly the espionage act. Representative Nash, Republican, Massachusetts, in charge of the repeal resolution, replying to the express doubts of the Democrats, said that all war laws, excepting the two specifically mentioned in the resolution and the liberty and victory loan acts, would be repealed by the measure. Continuance of the Lever act, Mr. Nash declared, was necessary so that the government would have a law to punish profiteering in food, clothing and other necessities.

No Class Government.

"I would have been a traitor to the people who elected me to have entered upon any form of class government," he declared, adding that it would be suicidal for the farmers to attempt to popularize the people's party, which was the party now in power. Explaining the government good road policy, he stated that they wanted to make the provincial highways market roads, not only roads for tourist traffic. As to Northern Ontario, the government was now investigating conditions ruling there, and he hoped to make these more agreeable for the colonists. The premier was given a rousing ovation. Hon. H. C. Nixon stated with regard to temperance legislation. "They had petitioned for a federal referendum, but nothing was possible until the next session."

MUST MAINTAIN LAW, DECLARES LLOYD GEORGE

London, Friday, June 4.—David Lloyd George, the premier, yesterday received a deputation from the National Union of Railwaymen with reference to the movement of munitions to Ireland, says the London Times today. A report of the proceedings of the conference is promised for today. The Times asserts that after the railwaymen put their case before the premier, Mr. Lloyd George made a forcible statement, declaring that the government would do all in its power to maintain law and order, and that the railwaymen seemed to be somewhat disgruntled by the uncompromising nature of the premier's reply.

HAVE ISSUED MANIFESTO

Dublin, June 3.—The strike committee in Dublin today issued a manifesto to the workers in Great Britain, asking them to support the Irish position by refusing to handle munitions destined for Ireland. The manifesto referred to the attitude of the labor leaders in England and the handling of munitions for Poland, and declared that the action of Irish labor in the matter was justifiable.

Lack of Rain Threatens Water Supply of Brantford

BACKUS INTERESTS MEET OPPOSITION

Ontario Publishers Ask Ontario Government to Refuse Further Concessions.

CHARGE UNFAIRNESS

Ottawa, June 3.—The announcement in the press tonight that the Backus interests at Fort Frances have applied to the Ontario government for additional pulp leases and power concessions aroused a storm of protest from the publishers of Ontario daily newspapers, who are in Ottawa this week endeavoring to prevent the diversion of their newspaper supplies to the United States. At a special meeting of these publishers here tonight, the following resolution was adopted by unanimous vote: "Whereas press despatches today from Winnipeg quote the mayor of Kenora as stating that the Backus pulp and paper interests at Fort Frances have applied to the Ontario government for valuable timber limits along the English River and power development rights at White Dog Falls, near Kenora. "And whereas the same interests have not yet fulfilled the conditions on which they secured from the Ontario government several years ago a pulpwood concession of eighteen hundred square miles in the Lake of the Woods district.

"And whereas these are the interests that control the Fort Frances Pulp and Paper Company, Limited, which recently cut off the newspaper supplies of its Canadian newspaper customers in order to ship its entire production to the United States and which is still refusing to supply the newspapers requirements of its Canadian customers even at the current contract price for export to foreign countries. "And whereas the same interests have not yet fulfilled the conditions on which they secured from the Ontario government several years ago a pulpwood concession of eighteen hundred square miles in the Lake of the Woods district. "Be it resolved, that this meeting of publishers of daily newspapers in Ontario that have been facing suspension owing to the threatened diversion of their newspaper supplies to the United States, express its unanimous opinion that in view of the attitude of the Backus interests toward domestic requirements of newspaper, it is not in the public interest that the Backus pulpwood or power concessions in Canada. "And that all pulpwood concessions previously granted to those interests in respect of which they may be in default, should be canceled forthwith. "And that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Ontario government with a strong recommendation that effect be given to the recommendations made."

COUNTER-ATTACK LAUNCHED BY POLES

Aimed at Bolshevick Move to Compel the Evacuation of Kiev.

Warsaw, June 3.—The Poles have launched a counter-attack south of Kiev, in the Ros River region, where the Reds have concentrated in an endeavor to drive to the northwest, in order to compel the Poles to evacuate Kiev. The Bolshevick forces gained some ground but the official communique today announced they were thrown back and several villages recovered. The fighting continues, the Bolshevick infantry aided by a flotilla trying to cut the Polish communication leading to Kiev along the Dnieper, until attacked by the Koziusko aviators, who used machine guns and bombs. One monitor was sunk. Gen. Pilsudski in command of the troops who returned from Kiev on May 18 is again at the front supervising an offensive designed to checkmate the Bolshevick plans to drive a wedge behind Kiev. On the northern front fighting progresses and territory is constantly changing hands. An official statement announces that the Polish counter-attack is gradually swinging the Poles eastward over the ground they lost when the Red drive began on May 15. The transportation of 15,000 Polish refugees from Kiev to Warsaw has begun.

Elect Geo. Mills, Liberal, To Succeed Late A. G. MacKay

Athabasca, Alta., June 2.—George Mills, Liberal, was today elected to the local legislature to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Hon. A. G. MacKay, defeating J. K. Cornwall by an overwhelming vote. Fifteen of the nineteen polls heard from tonight give Mills a majority of 280, the votes standing: Mills 470, Cornwall 219. Cornwall will likely lose his deposit.

ANOTHER MOTOR FATALITY

Winnipeg, June 3.—The seventh automobile fatality in this city since the first of the year occurred when a woman was struck by an automobile and died today. As a result of the campaign against automobile speeders, ten appeared in court today and were fined.

### ZIONIST FINANCIAL CAMPAIGN STARTED

**Fund Wanted for Restoration of Palestine as Jewish Homeland.**

"While our campaign for \$500,000 is not being conducted on the whirlwind system, it is being conducted along the soundest business lines," said an official of the Palestinian restoration campaign committee to The World yesterday afternoon. "Reports coming in from Brantford, Paris, Ont., London, Ont., and other provincial centres are most encouraging." It was stated that all the important Jewish business men's organizations and the synagogues in the province were contributing freely their time, energy and money toward this campaign, which was being conducted to enable Palestine to be restored to the Jews. Mrs. J. Selick is chairman of the campaign in Toronto and with her is a committee of four hundred men and women. A house-to-house campaign is being made among the Jewish community, but not among other sections of the social fabric in the city, although contributions will be gladly accepted from other sources. She said a member of the committee yesterday afternoon. M. Geiber and S. Kronick are treasurers in Toronto for the campaign, and M. J. Blom is the Dominion organizer. Ex-Ald. L. M. Singer is the chairman for Ontario. The \$500,000 will be devoted to the conservation of the water supply in Palestine, to the extermination of malaria in that land, to the development of agriculture there, to reforestation, to the institution of universities, and in a general way to the advancement of the best ideals of the Jews in their own land.

**Convention Closes With Address on Parents' Care of Children.**

Judge Mott of the juvenile court was the chief speaker at the closing session of the W.C.T.U. Methods adopted by the court in regard to the children with whom it has to deal were touched upon. A psychiatric expert examines the child as to his physical and mental status and the social surroundings and history, all of these being considered in making an adjustment in regard to the charge for which the child is presented. That there is an impassable gulf between the normal and the abnormal child was pointed out by the speaker, and between the normal and the defective there are different grades—the dull, the retarded, the child who lacks confidence and others. Conflicts raised by conditions at home in the school or elsewhere have all their effects. "Don't blame your boy," said the judge, "and tell your boy or girl what they ought to do, not what they ought not to do." Judge Mott returned to the Big Brother and Big Sister movement, which he said was one of the best of the times, the members staying with those they took in charge to the last ditch.

### Approves Work Done.

Rev. Mr. Williams expressed hearty appreciation of the work of the W.C.T.U., and thought that great sympathy should be offered to the young people who come to Toronto and have to live in crowded boarding houses. He was glad that the "movies" were in business until something better is substituted so that those who otherwise would have no place for recreation may have somewhere to go. 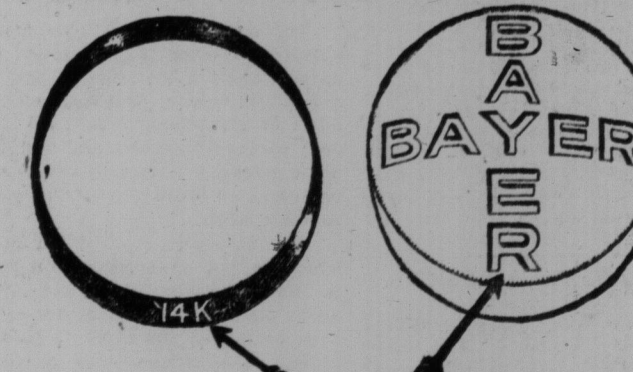
### WAITERS' UNION OUT FOR BLOOD

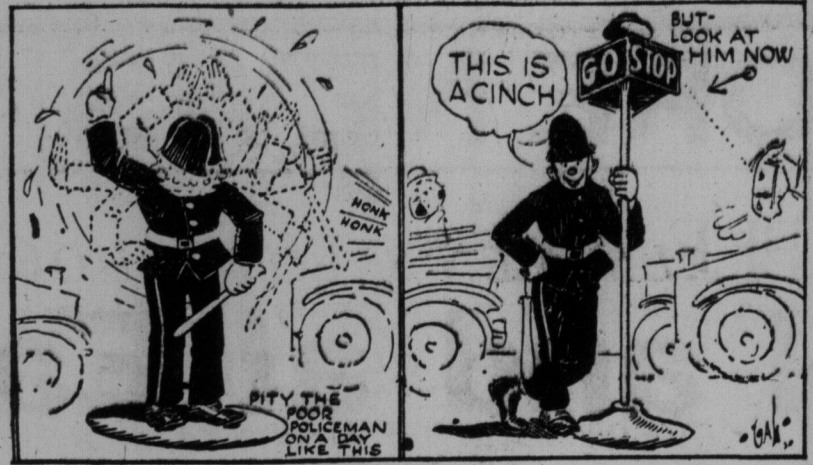

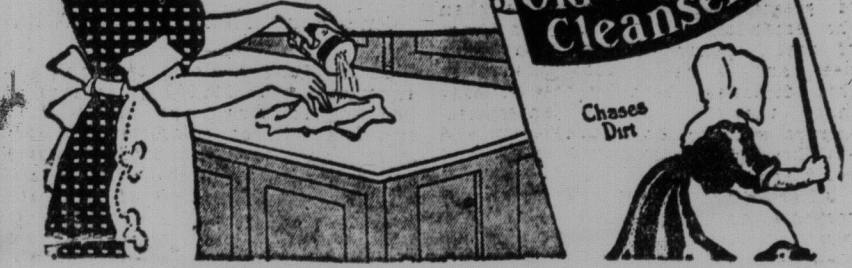

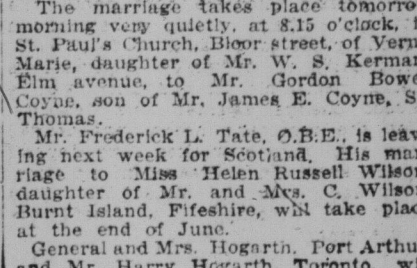

FORECAST REPORT REGARDING INDIANS

Committee to Recommend Adoption of Compulsory Enfranchisement Principle.

Ottawa, June 3. — (By Canadian Press.) Recommendations which will settle the status of Indians in Canada, so far as enfranchisement and compulsory education are concerned, are understood to be planned in the report of the special committee, which has been sitting here for several weeks on amendments to the Indian act.

Among the important items likely to be recommended is the establishment of a standing committee on Indian affairs. Hitherto the only course they have had been to apply thru the Indian department.

Another important item which is understood to be in the report is the compulsory education clause. Many of the delegates wanted this, while others thought it should be left to the Indians themselves as to whether they wished to send their children to industrial schools when there was no school on their reserve.

The clause will insist that the children be educated, and that they be sent to the nearest available school, or to an Indian industrial school.

Compulsory Enfranchisement. The principle of compulsory enfranchisement is to be adopted, but there will be no arbitrary proceedings. When before the committee several representatives of tribes were under the impression that the agent-general was to give almost near-like power in dictating who should be made a citizen. To this end a board of three, composed of a government representative, a member of the band to which the man affected belongs, and another to be chosen by the Indian department, shall decide the man's status. The man is then to be allowed two years in which to appeal.

SOCIAL DEMOCRATS IN AUSTRIA'S NEW ARMY

Many of the provinces failing to raise their quota, natives of the defaulting provinces residing in the cities were enlisted and sent to their home states.
