BORDEN TO THE PEOPLE OF CANADA FEARS FOR GOVERNMENT OWNERSHIP

SIR WILFRID'S RETURN KILLS FOR 100 YEARS PEOPLE'S OWN RAILWAY

Liberal-Conservative Party Believes That What the People Pay for, the People Should Own and Control.

PUBLIC MONEY FOR CANADIANS NOT TO UPLIFT FOREIGN PORTS

Government's Railway Policy Imposes \$150,000,000 of Liabilities and Fails to Safeguard National Interests.

Montreal, Oct. 25.—(Special.)—The leader of the Conservative party, Mr. Borden, has issued the following manifesto:

Halifax, N.S., Oct. 24, 1904.

TO THE PEOPLE OF CANADA:

Parliament is now dissolved and political parties must submit themselves, their actions and their policy, to the judgment of the people.

Since my election to the leadership of the Liberal-Conservative party, it has been my privilege to address audiences in every province and territory of Canada, Dominion, the Yukon, excepted, and with my colleagues to discuss in Parliament many subjects affecting the public weal. Our policy has been clear, defined and consistent, the same in every quarter, alike to every class.

The records of Parliament show where we stand on the public questions which have been before the country since the last elections. These cannot all be discussed in this message, but in regard to some of the principal issues involved in this contest, I submit in a few words the platform on which we appeal for your judgment.

Transportation.

The subject of most immediate concern is transportation. Having regard to the enormous obligations which would be imposed upon the people by the government's rash transportation projects; to the certainty that its adoption by YOU WOULD SHUT OUT FOR A CENTURY GOVERNMENT OWNERSHIP OF RAILWAYS, AND TO THE VITAL IMPORTANCE OF CONTROLLING OUR OWN TRAFFIC AND COMMERCE, THIS QUESTION IS THE MOST MOMENTOUS AND FAR-REACHING THAT HAS EVER BEEN SUBMITTED TO THE ELECTORATE OF CANADA. The immense territory and over-increasing population of Canada, demand the best and most economical transportation.

We know that the people are willing to provide generously whatever money may be necessary for the development of the Dominion and our policy is to extend and improve its transportation facilities by land and by water. BUT WE INSIST THAT WHAT THE PEOPLE SHOULD OWN AND CONTROL; THAT PUBLIC MONEY SHOULD BE USED FOR CANADA AND FOR THE PEOPLE AND NOT TO PROMOTE THE TRADE AND WEALTH OF FOREIGN PORTS.

Country's Needs.

We fully realize the country's need for increased facilities of transportation. Efficient service and reasonable rates must be assured. In utilizing the public credit for these purposes we must thoroughly guard against the diversion of our trade into the hands of foreign competitors.

The government seeks to impose upon the people liabilities amounting to at least \$150,000,000 for the construction of a transcontinental railway under conditions which absolutely fail to safeguard our national interests. The important and immediately profitable western division is to be owned and controlled by the whole to be a monopoly controlled by a corporation interested in diverting our trade away from our own ports. We oppose to this our declared policy of constructing the new transcontinental railway as a public work to be owned and controlled by the people and to remain a national highway in the truest sense. I beg you clearly to understand that it is still open to you to decide whether this shall be done. Do not be misled by any assertions to the contrary.

We affirm that the management of the Intercolonial Railway and of other railways operated by the government

Montreal, Oct. 25.—(Special.)—There has grown up in the public mind, and not without reason, the impression that campaign subscriptions mean something sinister and, indeed, according to present usage, there is much to justify this feeling. At the same time the legitimate expenses of an election campaign are heavy and justifiable, and it is for defraying these outlays that subscriptions are received by both parties. The habit of taking campaign funds from almost any source has become a matter of some notoriety and, having this in mind, Mr. Borden has decided not to accept any contribution from any special consideration on account of assistance granted at election time. The leader of the Conservative party has, therefore, issued the following statement to WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

To avoid misunderstanding it has been thought best to distinctly declare that the Conservative party will receive subscriptions only from those who have no special consideration or assistance granted at election time. Such a declaration is deemed desirable in order that the party may have an absolutely free hand in framing its policy in the future of the whole country. Try upon the return of the party to power. Deep Resentment of British Public Alayed, But Admiralty Proves It Is Ready to Act If Needed.

London, Oct. 25.—The inevitable delays of diplomatic procedure appear to retard a complete and satisfactory settlement of the acute differences between Great Britain and Russia, arising from the deplorable North Sea affair. King Edward has received from Emperor Nicholas himself a cablegram, expressing the deepest regret and practical acknowledgment that Great Britain's peremptory note will meet with a reply conceding every demand for apology for the act of aggression against the British flag, compensation for sufferers and punishment for the officers for what is everywhere conceded to have been a gigantic blunder, and the Russian ambassador to the court of St. James has expressed to Foreign Minister Lansdowne his sorrow and sympathy.

CZAR SENDS CABLE TO THE KING FULL OF REGRET AND PROMISES

Canada Feels It.

And Lord Onslow May Be Taken at His Word.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable.)
London, Oct. 25.—Referring to Lord Onslow's remarks at Buchlyvie, to the effect that the government would not remit the cattle embargo, the weather to British appeals, but might act differently if Canada showed strong feeling, the Glasgow Herald says that crown ministers nowadays permit themselves strange liberties in their references to imperial affairs and suggests that he might find himself in an awkward position if the Dominion breeders jump at the chance of rescinding their agitation. Scotch feelers will resent this and suggest that the minister's first interest should be to the British empire. At this crisis of the empire, ministers should walk delicately.

London, Oct. 25.—The morning papers display great patience over the delay of the Russian government in according satisfaction for the Dogger Bank affair. The emperor's communication, while it relieves the immediate tension, is held to be only a personal expression of regret, and it is argued that unless the Russian government speedily follows suit a situation of great danger will arise. Editorial articles demand that the second Pacific squadron must be stopped in its irresponsible career, for otherwise there is no safety for the shipping of any nationality.

MR. BORDEN ON GOVERNMENT OPERATION.

It is commonly said by friends of the government in this campaign that Mr. Borden does not favor the "operation" of a new transcontinental railway by the government. On this point we may quote some testimony from a source hostile to Mr. Borden.

AN OPPORTUNITY RECORD.

On the principle "qui s'excuse s'accuse" there must be some truth in the general belief that with regard to various matters of importance, upon which by one and another in the past the vast majority of the people of Canada are at one, the Liberal government, or at least a section of it, was at one time not quite so sound as it is to-day.

Mr. Borden favors state operation as well. This is implied by the resolution just quoted, but he made it clear in his speech. He might well have said, "I am for a while until a public sentiment on this point is fully developed." But he did not.

Later on he says that in advocating government ownership "and operation" of railways, Mr. Borden has cut loose from the faith and traditions of Conservatism, and that he is now hailed as the leader of the "advanced" liberals.

It is the proper thing to tell this story at the expense of a party that is in opposition. The persons who do not enjoy the office are supposed to be lean, bilious, pessimistic, etc., and certainly some so-called Liberals fit the description.
