London, June 14-Important sections of their front between the Lys river and St. Yves have been abandoned by the Germans. This is announced officially. British troops followed the retreating Germans closely and made considerable progress east of Ploegsteert Wood. The statement follows—

'Our further advance east of Messines, combined with the pres sure of our troops south of the front of our attack, has compelled Engine of Destruction Burst In injured. the enemy to abandon important sections of his first line defensive system in the area between the River Lys and St. Yves. Our troops have followed up the enemy closely and have made considerable progress east of Ploegsteert Wood. We also gained ground during the night in the neighborhood of Gaspard.

"We raided enemy trenches last night north of Bullecourt and south of Hooge, and captured a few prisoners in each case.'

The statement follows: "The enemy carried on a violent bombardment last night in the regions of Braye, north of Craonne, northwest of Rheims and on the left bank of the Meuse near Cum ieres. The bomb struck the roof squarely, cutting clean through and passing through two class rooms, one above the other, killing some childidren but sparing the majority. It finally exploded with terrific force in a room on the ground floor, where there were sixty-four little children from five seven years old, ten of whom were killed outright and all the others more or less injured.

The room was thirty-six feet by twenty-four and the force of the explosion in such a confined area was naturally terrific. A basin shaped hole several feed deep was made in the floor. Most of the eeiling was brought down and the furniture shattered into spillners. Some of the babies had arms and legs torn off, others were shockingly lacerated, some stunned and others buried in the screams and moans of the tiny sufferers, many of whom were crying distractedly for their mothers.

FEUDISTS DEFY THE GOVERNMENT

Sink Mutual Differences For Common End

Opposed to Conscription

Willing to Kill Their Neighbors, But Object to Being Forced to Slaughter Entire Strangers

is reported that the famous Hatfield-McCoy feudists of Kentucky have banded together to resist conscription, and will shoot the first government of-ficial who goes near them. They have constructed a fort, it seems, and are looking forward to a little private war of their own. At first sight it appears remarkable that these Kentuckians, who are fighting men if ever there were fighting men, should adopt pacifism for a prin-cipie, and that men whose hands have been reddened with blood of neighbors been reddened with blood of neighbors should show any dislike for killing Germans. Furthermore, these Kentuckyians are pure Americans. There is nothing hyphenated about them. There are no Germans among them. Almost invariably they are of Scotch, Irish lineage, men of the Boone type whose forefathers resisted the authority of King George III, and set up a govern-King George III, and set up a govern-ment of their own before Lexington. Against All Government

There are just two explanations. One is that while the Kentucky mountaineers have no objection to killing a man whom they dislike, they have a very strong objection to doing anything, even killing enemies, at the order of the government. They hate all governments, which they consider their natural foes, and probably fear that if they obey the American government in the matter of registering and being drafted into the army, they will have to continue to obey it, and that their liberties will thus be restricted. The other fact to be borne in mind is that the Kentucky mountain eers are the most isolated and primitive of Americans. They live in little com-munities cut off by towering mountains and almost impassable roads from each other. They hear little news of the outworld. Many of them are illiter-They have little feeling of kinship with the people who live fifty miles away, for the average mountaineer never travels more than twenty miles from his home from the day he is born to A Primitive People

Living as they do, intermarriages have for generations been the rule rather than mountaineers have thus been accentuated and the mental and moral outlook is about what it was a hundred years ago. This also explains to some extent the ramifications of a feud. Families are related in the most complicated manner. Thus it was that the feuds had a fashion of involving nearly everybody in a township or a county. Everybody was related in some way, distant or near, to one of the feudists. 

There is no final infallible authority. The greatest experts in the world have been deceived. The purchasers for the British Museum have a lumber room full of paintings and other antiques bought by other experts, which have been condemned as spurious. Dr.







In the spring of 1916, in order to de-termine the effect of additional fertiliztermine the effect of additional fertilizing on the limed and unlimed plots, the duplicate plots were fertilized at seeding time with 500 pounds per acre of 4-8 fertilizer (4 per cent. nitrogen, 8 per cent. phosphoric acid.)

The results in 1916 from these plots were: Unlimed, fertilized 1914 and 1916, 18 bushels per acre: limed, fertilized 1914 and 1916.

15 bushels per acre; limed, fertilized 1914 and 1916, 23.75 bushels per acre. Another experiment on a newly broken piece of land in a potato, grain and clover rotation gave equally striking results. The only application of fertilizer in the rotation was made in the spring in the rotation was made in the spring of 1914, it being a very light one consisting of 140 pounds nitrate of soda, 300 pounds acid phosphate and 100 pounds muriate of potash, per acre. On one series of plots, ground limestone at the rate of 4,000 pounds per acre was applied in the spring of 1914. It was not to be expected that there would be much hay crop in 1916 as the plant food had all been used by the potato and grain crop previously.

The following yields were obtained from the 1914 crop, potatoes, unlimed, fertilized, 76 bus, 13 lbs. per acre ; limed, fertilized, 88 bus., 45 lbs.

The yields for the 1915 crop, oats, were, unlimed, fertilized, 38 bus., 15 lbs. per acre. In 1916 the clover yields were, unlimed, fertilized, 675 lbs. per acre; limed, fertilized, 1493 lbs.

The limed areas yielded 5410 lbs. per acre, and the unlimed, 2400 lbs., a difference of 3010 lbs., per acre in favor of liming, or 15 tons clover hay at \$10 per ton, \$150. The fifteen tons of ground limestone cost approximately \$6 per acre, or stone cost approximately \$6 per acre, or \$60, leaving \$90 or \$9 per acre in favor of the liming, and in addition a much better soil resulting from the increas
