



Homeland Dairy Herds Badly Depleted by Foot-andmouth Disease.

How devastating has been the effect of the foot-and-mouth disease upon the live stock in Great Britain during the past few weeks is indicated in a communication by Dr. J. H. Grisdale, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, Ottawa, says the Toronto Globe correspondent there. He wires that a total monetary loss of £750,000 has already been sustained. As a result of the total of 978 outbreaks of the disease in the past three and one-half mouths 65,250 head of live stock have had to be slaughtered in Britain, of which 2,500 were cattle, 15,500 were sheep and 17,750 swine.

Call for Canadian Cattle.

Owing to the serious depletion of Britain's dairy herds an acute shortage of milk has developed and a flood of petitions has reached the British Government urging that every step be taken to facilitate the importation from Canada and elsewhere of cattle suitable for the re-establishment of those dairy herds. The petitions also urge that the Government hasten to discover some other and less destructive means of stopping the spread of the foot-and-mouth disease, as slaughter on the wholesale plan as now practiced might in a few months almost exterminate Britain's live stock.

Nearly Six Billions Expenditure For Buildings Makes Record

New York, Jan. 3 .- The Copper and Brass Research Association's annual survey of building construction, places the total expenditure during 1923 at \$5,922,900,000, the largest of any year n the history of the building industry. During 1923 the expenditure for residential buildings, including dwellings, apartments and hotels, amounted to \$2,302,240,000, so that nearly 40 per cent. of the total expenditure went to relieve the housing shortage.

Essentials are Preserved

- The creed of the United Church contains the "Doctrines of Grace" that made the Reformation.
- No minister can be ordained in the United Church until he accepts the Church's creed.
- The ordained eldership is retained in the United Church.
- Congregations of the United Church have the right to "call" their own minister, subject to the Settlement Committee's approval, as Presbyterian Congregations are now subject to Presbytery.

When Anti-Unionists deny the above truths, it is only necessary to place their charges side by side with the provisions of the official "Basis of Union":-

The Charges

1. "The Ministers will not be pledged to any system of truth."

2. "The ordained eldership will be dropped."

3. "The right of a congregation to 'call' its own Minister will be taken away."

4. "The right of a Presbytery to ordain and induct its Ministers will be taken away."

Geza de Kresz was born in Hungary, the land of violinists. He was long a pupil of Hubay. Later he became a favorite disciple of the Bohemian master, Sevcik, who holds him in highest esteem. Eugene Ysaye, hearing him play induced him to accompany him to Brussels and Godinne, becoming not only his master but his close friend.

Geza de Kresz was brought out by the great Belgian musician in a concert in Vienna in 1907, and the success of this and several subsequent concerts was such that M. de Kresz was appointed to succeed Carl Flesch as Professor of the Violin Master-class at the Bucharest State Conservatory. 




