



He had never been convicted of a felony before, althogh he had served time in a reformatory for a misdeameanor and he was entitled to an indeterminate sentence. The judge, it is said, had no right to mpose a flat sentence and will have to e-sentence him.

GREAT BENEFITS OF THE WORKMEN'S **COMPENSATION ACT**

Interesting Figures in Connection With the Receipts and Expenditures—Some Examples of the Hardships Relieved—A Progressive Policy Which is Being Warmly Praised.

Commenting upon the work of the orkmen's Compensation Board, an oficial of that organization, which has accomplished so much for those workmen who have suffered from accident, has given some interesting particulars and igures concerning the receipts and expenditures and how and why they vary—the amounts paid out in compensation and some of the changes and amendments to the act since it came into effect.

He notes that in the first annual report that was submitted it was shown that the compensation paid out increased from \$89,619.27 to \$128,108,75.

"This is caused," the official explained, by the fact that at Dec. \$1 a great many cases were running and drawing compensation. These cases have been finally completed and are chargeable to the fiscal year of 1919. There were also a large number of cases which happened in 1919, and which were not reported to us until after our provisional statement of 1919 was made up. The pension reserve, you will notice, has been increased from \$67,610.85 to \$181,654.33. The same are that increased the amount of compion paid partly applies to the information paid

of the pension reserve. As a man of fact, we had several accidents in 12219 which resulted in deaths in 1920, but which had to be charged up to the year 1919. In addition to this, it will be remembered that in 1920 an amendment was made to the act whereby the pension payable to widows was invessed from \$20 a month and \$5 a nonth to children until they were sixen years of age, the total payment in the aggregate being not more than \$3,500 to the sum of \$30 a month to the widow during her widowhood, and a pension to the children increased, in the case of male children to \$7.50 per month until they reached the age of sixteen, and to female children to \$7.50 per month until they reached the age of eighteen years.

"These increases to the widow and such time as it arrived at the age of sixteen. In addition to these amounts in the above cases, the undertaker's accounts to the sum of \$75 were paid. (This has now been increased to \$100). "In cases of permanent partial disabilities, where awards have been made to the injured workmen, lump sums have been advanced for the purchase of artificial limbs, and in cases where it seemed just to the board, sums have been advanced to meet outstanding bills, which it was necessary that the injured man shoulo pay.



Employes in every line of industry in the province are covered by the Act. In the administration it is worth noting the province are covered by the Act. In the administration it is worth noting that in the other provinces in a number of industries, unless more than in some cases five, ten, fifteen, twenty workmen are employed, these industries are excluded. The highest exclusion number in the province is three. This applies only to retail stores and lumbering, in all other industries, if one or more are employed, the employer is requested to comply with the provisions of the Act as to payroll assessments, etc.

Another important amendment authorizes the Board in case of accident to minor or apprenticed workmen, resulting in permanent partial disability, to consider in making the adjustment of the award on what the future or journeyman's wages might be and to adjust the claim on that basis.

Method of Payment of Claims.

Method of Payment of Claims. First, notice of accident is usually received from employer within three days after the accident. Workmen's and doctors' reports have been prepared in as

clear, concise and simple a manner as possible. As soon as the report from the employe is received, necessary reports are immediately forwarded for completion by the workman himself and the doctor in attendance. The reports of employer, workman and doctor complete the age. If these are in order and plete the case. If these are in order and completed, the cheque for the first week's compensation is forwarded to the injured workman two weeks from date of accident. Weekly cheques follow until the Board is advised of the workman's return to work. Canadian Government Employes.

Canadian Government Employes.

By an act passed by the Dominion Government in 1918 and amended 1919, Canadian Government Employes are brought within the scope of the Act. Prior to this legislation Canadian Government Railway Employes were receiving \$5 per week and medical and hospital atendance, according to a table of fees established by the Employes' Relief and Insurance Association. At the present time, these employes, if injured, are entitled to receive in addition fifty-five percent of ther wages, as provided in the Workmen's Compensation Act. Medical and hospital attendance accounts are being adjusted with the medical profession and hospital authorities on the basis of the Compensation Board scale, which is considerably higher than the Employes Relief and Insurance Association scale. Dependants of employes, where death results are compensated according to the provisions of the Act. In case of permanent disability benefits are paid also according to the Workmen's Compensation Act. Employes must, however, elect in case of permanent partial disability to accept adjustment either under the Provident Fund or Workmen's Compensation Act.

The Provident Fund, however, provides only for workmen who are unable through disability to follow their usual occupation. Since January 1, 1919, nearly 600 cases of accidents to Canadian Government employes have been disposed of Effects of Amendments of 1920.

Amendments to the Act, passed at the 1920 session, provide that all payments to widows and children date back to January 1, 1919, but increased monthly payments to date from January 1, 1920. Tsis weant that all windows' claims had to be adjusted, reserves reviewed to provide for pensions during life instead of up to \$3,500. As already noted the provide for pensions during life instead of up to \$8,500. As already noted the monthly allowances were increased to \$30 and \$7.50 per month, which meant additional reserves to the extent of approximately \$125,000 had to be provided. It is estimated that medical aid and hospital fees will cost about \$75,000 or \$85,000 per annum. These additional benefits are provided with very little if any increase in cost to industry.

New Brunswick Factories Act.

This Act has been re-drafted and is at present being administered by the Workmen's Compensation Board. A complete census of industry is being taken at present as to the number of employes, condition of machinery as to safety of employes, etc. A Board of Examiners Stationary Engineers has been appointed, composed of N. M. Stewart, Moncton; John Hooley, Fairville and James Sullivan, Newcastle. These men are qualified engineers and their appointments were recommended by their several organizations, and by the Executive of the New Brunswick Federation of Labor. Regulations required to carry out the Act, as it effected the examination and licensing of engineers, have been passed and this matter is receiving prompt attention. New Brunswick Factories Act.

QUEBEC YIELDS MUCH ASBESTOS

Between 85 and 90 Per Cent. of World's Consumption Met by That Province.

Canada leads in asbestos, and exportations continue to grow more im-

portations contario's pre-eminent position with regard to nickel is closely approximated by Quebec's wealth in asbestos. While a large part of the first-named mineral is refined in Canada, however, only a very insignificant portion of the asbestos output is retained for domestic manufacture.

Exports of Canadina asbestos in 1919 totalled 184,478 tons, with a value of \$9,886,460, according to the Canadian Customs Department. Of this quantity 95,976 tons of asbestos fibre, crude and mill stock with a value of \$7,282,744, went to the United States; 10,500 tons, with a value of \$1,490,155, went to other countries; 26,156 tons of asbestos sand and waste, valued at \$259,875, was exported to the United States and 150 tons, valued at \$900, to other countries.

While data as to conditions in 1921 is not yet available, it is believed that the outlook for Canadian asbestos for a reasonable distance into the future is favorable, especially with the Russian asbestos shut out. At the present time the deposits in the Province of Quebec are estimated to supply between 85 and 90 per cent. of the world's consumption. What the effect of the increasing production of the mines of Rhodesia, South Africa, will have upon the European Africa, will have upon the European market for Canadian fibres remains to be seen. The crudes and spinning fibres produced by South Africa are not of as pinch a quality as the Canadian but

produced by South Africa are not of as high a quality as the Canadian, but, owing to the higher prices of Canadian as compared with low costs in Rhodesia, many manufacturers are mixing a large percentage of Rhodesian with the Canadian to reduce total costs. The Rhodesian mines are producing substantial quantities of high grade shingle stocks, which compare favorably with the Canadian. Work of an extensive nature has been done on asbestos properties throughout the United States, but neither the quantities of fibre produced nor the grades are expected to have any bearing on the market, the total tonnage produced in 1918 being under 900 tons.

Production Over Ten Millions.

Shipments from the producing mines in the Province of Quebec in 1919 amounted to 135.561 tons valued at \$10,932,289, according to the report of the Department of Colonization, Mines and Fisheries of the Province, of the year 1919. To this must be added the shipments of asbestic a by-product of the mill treatment of the asbestos ore, which totalled 28,827 tons, with a value of \$63,011. For the previous year the figures were, for asbestos 142,2875 tons, with a value of \$8,019,899, and for asbestic 16,850 tons, valued at \$34,046.

Apart from this danger, the most serious for society of the institutional system, there are other drawbacks attached to it. First, the idea of bringing up children in large numbers is against the laws of nature; the family is the right and proper place for the child to be brought up, and every effort should be made by society to see that its children are brought up in the family whenever possible. Much can be done to facilitate this by the adoption of pensions for mothers. When the home bringing up is quite impossible and it is absolutely necessary that a child should be placed in a home other than its own, the system of foster parents is the best substitute, provided that a proper supervision can be kept over the homes in which the children are placed. This plan is being carried out in many countries and has been found to be most successful. The children thus cared for are in homes such as nature intended for them, they grow up surrounded by home influences, and unconsciously learn the laws of nature and society by free contact with their foster parents, brothers and sisters, besides being in constant touch with the educative influence of society at large.

To bring a child to its full development morally, intellectually and physically, constant and individual care must be given to it. This can be done in the foster home, but it cannot be done in the institutions. Children in institutions cannot be dealt with as units, but must of necessity be dealt with as members of a institutions. What Has Been Done For The Farmers

From the day the Foster Government assumed office the interests of the farmers of New Brunswick have been given every consideration. In striking contrast to the old government, a practical farmer was made Minister of Agriculture, and the record of this Department is a triumph of achievement.

In the first place, the Foster Government has encouraged the development of the cooperative spirit and has greatly aided in the marketing in this way of wool, live stock, fruits, etc., and assisted as well in the establishment of co-operative creameries. The farmers are getting results; in opposing government candidates they run the risk of going back to the regime which disgraced the province. Do they want that?

Or Do They Want Definite Results Such As These:

1. The present government provided the first system of extension of credit to the farmers of the province on a sound business basis. Fifty thousand dollars was provided as a fund to establish a line of credit at the banks for the use of farmers in purchasing breeding sheep. Four thousand sheep were purchased and added to the breeding flocks by this system. A strong campaign for increased sheep production was also put on at the same time. The effectiveness of all this work is shown in the increase of the sheep population of the province. In 1917 there were 140,000 sheep. The 1920 statistics show 280,000, or an increase of 100 per cent, in three years.

2. The minister of agriculture adopted the policy of grading all the pure bred rams for sale in the province. The system also encourages the pure bred breeder and raises the standard of his flock. Through this assistance and encouragement the number of rams offered for sale this year will be sufficient to supply the needs of the province. In the past it has been necessary to bring in from outside seventy-five to 100 rams each year to meet requirements. Another new policy adopted last year encourages the man who has never before used a pure bred ram in his flock to purchase one. A bonus of \$15 was given to such a person. This resulted in more than 100 farmers purchasing a pure bred to raise the standard of their flocks. 8. The provincial department of agriculture organized live stock associations in order to take advantage of the federal policy of loaning pure bred bulls. This resulted in over sixty bulls being placed in the province without any cost to the farmers. In addition to this 105 bonuses representing over \$2,000, were given to agricultural societies to assist them in purchasing pure bred bulls.

4. Twenty-six boys' pig clubs with a membership of 260 have been organized and started out with pure bred pigs. As a result of this start these boys now own over 3,000 pure bred pigs and supply their communities with breeding stock.

5. Thirty-six poultry clubs have been organized representing 450 members. These have been supplied with the best strains of bred-to-lay poultry available. These members now own 10,000 pure bred hens. This poultry has been in an egg laying competition open to the dominion and won first place.

6. Seventy thousand pounds of wool have been marketed co-operatively in 1920 under the direction of the department of agriculture. This has increased yearly since 1917 when only 5,000 pounds were marketed co-operatively. Assistance is given in the co-operative marketing of lambs, cattle and hogs. Over twenty-six carloads were shipped out last fall by the farmers co-operatively. This resulted in their getting from two to three cents per pound more for their live stock than would be secured locally. The department officials are now busily engaged organizing these shipping associations and are placing from four to five carloads of stock on the Montreal stock yards each week.

7. The dairy industry has been entirely reorganized. Attention has been directed toward the encouragement of central co-operative cream gathered creameries owned by the farmers themselves. The Moncton Farmers' Co-operative Creamery was organized in the fall and winter of 1917 and 1918. The first season they had 300 patrons and made 160,000 pounds of butter. In 1919 they had 600 patrons and made 312,000 pounds of butter. In 1920 the business has grown to such an extent that they have entirely remodelled and enlarged their plant and installed a mechanical refrigerator system at a cost of \$20,000. This is now the most complete creamery in the maritime provinces. Its output in butter this year will reach the half million mark in addition to a business in ice cream amounting to over \$30,mark in addition to a business in ice cream amounting to over \$30,000. The department of agriculture organized this creamery and to enable the company to get capital to start guaranteed all stockholders six per cent. interest on the paid-up capital subscribed. The company have paid out this year to the farmers \$225,000 for their

tream. A similar creamery is being encouraged in Fredericton. In two years' time it will have an output equal to the Moneton creamery and will provide an excellent market for the farmers- cream and at the same time is providing the consumer with high quality butter and ice cream at a cheaper rate than they have been paying. The Madawaska creamery is now being operated by the government for the benefit of the farmers of the northern part of the province. This creamery is rapidly going ahead and will reach an output of 75,000 pounds of butter this year. A good price is being paid the patrons for their cream and general satisfaction is being given.

8. The cheese industry has also been wonderfully strengthened. In 1917 buyers did not care to take chances on purchasing New Brunswick cheese. The cheese is now being supervised in its manufacture by department officials who also grade it. The buyers have no fault to find with the cheese and are now buying it according to grade. A cheese board has been organized where salesmen and buyers meet every two weeks and the cheese is sold on a competitive

9. An outstanding policy carried into effect by the present minister of agriculture is the development of a supply of ground limestone for the farmers. A soil expert was first employed to determine the need for lime in the soils of the province. A very thorough investigation was made in every county, which revealed the fact that there was a very great deficiency of lime in our soils and that the best results could never be obtained in crop production nor from the use of fertilizers until this was remedied. This investigation being completed, steps were at once taken to provide the farmers with lime at a minimum cost. The government has now purchased a large limestone quarry at Brookville, St. John county, containing inexhaustible supplies of high grade lime rock. A plant has been erected and machinery installed to convert the raw rock into finely ground limestone for agricultural purposes. This plant is now in operation and has a capacity of 80 tons per day. It is a most modern plant. The ground limestone will be delivered freight prepaid to farmers in the province for \$5 per ton, the cheapest lime being supplied anywhere in the dominion and the best. Its general use will be an enormous saving to the farmers in their fertilizer bills as it will put the soil in such condition that less fertilizer will give better results.

10. The organization of the district representative system, which was brought about by the present administration, has done a great deal to assist farmers. These are field agents of the department of agriculture and spend their whole time working with the farmers of their district. Much of the co-operative organization work for buying of supplies and selling of farm products has been brought about as a result of their activities.

11. The department's encouragement to the bee industry has resulted in an extension of this industry by over 100 per cent, in the province in three years. Statistics show that a quarter of a million pounds of honey were manufactured in 1919.

12. The assistance given the apple industry has been such as to place New Brunswick fruit foremost on the markets. New Brunswick apples are now commanding a very high price on the Montreal market and are in big demand.


13. In pursuance of the policy inaugurated by the late Hon. Henry R. Emmerson and because of the high price of flour consequent upon war conditions, the government upon the recommendation of the minister of agriculture has encouraged wheat growing in the province and provided modern wheat grinding mills. Since we have assumed office the bonus has been increased to larger mills. Fifteen thousand dollars has been given as bonuses to establish these mills. They are of very modern type and put out a grade of flour equal to the western mills.

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

fred Sullivan, retired chief justice of Prince Edward Island, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Edward Mc-Manus, Memramcook, today, after a week's illness following a stroke of

paralysis.

Sir Wilfred Sullivan was born in humble circumstances at New London (P. E. I.) Dec. 6, 1843. By frugality (P. E. I.) Dec. 6, 1843. By frugality and perseverance he accumulated sufficient money to educate himself at Central Academy, now the Prince of Wales College, Charlottetown, and St. Dunstan's College in the same city.

He studied law, becoming a barrister in 1867 and queen's counsel in 1876. He successfully practised his profession in Charlottetown and was one of the counsel for the provincial government in the interest of the tenants before the land commissioners court under the land purchase act of 1875. He sat in the Prince Edward Island legislature for many years, becoming attorney-general of the province and premier in 1879. He continued as premier until 1889, when he was appointed chief justice of Prince Edward Island and judge in admiralty. He served as administrator of the government in 1890. In politics he was a Conservative and in religion a Roman Catholic.

His wife was Miss Alice Maud Newberry, daughter of J. F. Newberry, formerly of London and Siena, Italy. She died in 1908. Sir Wilfred is survived by two sons, who reside in Montreal, and one daughter, Mrs. McManus. One son, Major Wilfred Sullivan, of the British Columbia Highlanders, commanded by a grandson of the late Sir Charles Tupper, was killed on Sept. 16, 1916, at the Battle of Courcelette. Sir Wilfred came to see his son in St. John when he passed through this city. when he passed through this city. When he heard of the death of Major Sullivan he closed his house in Charlottetown and went to live with his daughter in Memramcook. Sir Wilfred was knighted in 1913.


