French Front, Dec. 20—(Correspond-ence)—German soldiers from some of the towns of Prussia are sent to the front under armed guard "as criminals are led to the executioner," says a let-ter found on a dead German soldier, who was killed in a recent battle on the French front. The writer had given a vivid description of the scene at the de-parture of a detachment of reinforce-ments from Saarlouis, a town in Rhenments from Saarlouis, a town in Rhen-ish Prussia. The recruits were intend-ed to fill the gaps in a battalion which had suffered heavy losses. The writer

says: "The first battalion is ordered to furnish a reinforcing detachment of ninety-nine men. To escort them to the Saar-louis station 300 men have been ordered out, some of them with arms to march alongside the men going off and others to act as pickets on the way to the station. The men were all ready in the afternoon and had to wait some time for another squad of comrades from the first company of convalescents, who eventually arrived.
