

"For the first time in the politics of the dominion a third party has entered the lists with some prospect, if its own proplets be credited, of holding the balance between Liberals and Conservatives. This party, which calls itself the Nationalist Party, is led by Mr. Henri Bourassa, a former follower of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and Mr. Monk, a former follower of Mr. Borden. This hybrid leadership to some extent proclaims its views. It agrees in some respects, and disagrees in some respects, with both the official parties, and it is understood to have some special guiding principles of its own. Its constructive notions are, however, much less in evidence than its antagonism. It is not surprising in these circumstances that increasing attention is being fixed on Mr. Bourassa's movement which is striking at the prime minister in the very centre of his strength. Observers in this country may perhaps be allowed to hope that Canadian politics are not to reach a condition in which the balance of power between the two chief parties will be held by a minor and sectional third."

Can you imagine a mother who deliberately handicaps a child by encouraging habits which are sure to lead to same physical defect.

Of course not. And yet how often you come in contact with cases in which hers have handicapped their children by encouraging habits of mind which to mental defects.

I am thinking especially just now of the child who is afraid of thunderstorms.

In nine cases out of ten when a child is unreasonably terrified by a thunderstorm it is the mother's fault. Sometimes she's to blame because she has deliberately encouraged the child by letting him see that he can hold the centre of attention whenever there is a thunderstorm if he will yield completely to his fear, and by talking in his presence about how terribly he suffers during thunderstorms and about his hig strung and nervous temperament. More often she is to blame because the does nothing or not nearly enough to overcome the child's fear. Most children are naturally terrified by heavy crashes of thunder and vivid lightning.

But there are two ways of treating that terror

One is to sympathize with it and make so much of it
and increase it by all the power of suggestion.

The other is to pass it off lightly as possible and interest the child in other
lhings or even in the beautiful impressive aspect of the storm itself.

I was with a very wise mother the other day during a terrific thunderstorm.

It was the biggest storm her little four year old daughter had ever witnessed and
of course at first she was inclined to be much frightened. Instead of yielding to,
and sympathizing with this terror, the mother drew her little girl's attention to
the great beauty of the lightning, got her to look for especially magnificent zigzags,
told her the dear old folk story of Hendrik Hudson rolling his great balls in the
inountains, explained to her how little reason for fear there was and soon had her
interested and comforted.

The child will doubtless grow up without the needless discomfort of terror
every time the sky darkens as if for a thunderstorm.

I am convinced that there are very few people—and I mean a VERY few
and it is a thousand to one you are not one of them—who are so full of electricity
that a thunderstorm does affect them physically.

They CANNOT wholly overcome their terror.

Further there is a certain amount of absolutely reasonable alarm, natural fear
of being struck when a thunderstorm isclose at hand. That you cannot blame
anyone for feeling although I think that "to reckon danger too seriously, to hearken too intently for the threat that runs through all the winning music of the
world to hold back "the hand from the rose because of the thorn and from life
because of death," is to lose half the worth of living.

But aside from these two conditions, I think that fear of a thunder-storm is
something to be very much ashamed of and that the mother who does not do everything in her power to help her child overcome it, or better still keep him from acquiring it, is doing a very wrong thing.
