FIRST EDITION. WASHINGTON NEWS.

THE TARIFF BILL UNDER DISCUSSION IN THE SENATE.

The Five Minute Rule Enables the Senators to get Through much Work.—The Free Schedule Defeated—Dispositions in Free White Pine on the Free List—Hard Things Said About Canada.

(Toronto Mail.)

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 8.—The Senate continued today to discuss the tariff bill under what to them is a very novel proceeding, that of the five-minute rule. Several Senators who have been accustomed to arrange their speeches in a methodical and prosaic manner were unceremoniously cut short by the presiding officers' gavel just on the threshold of their remarks. Under this rule the Senate made such rapid progress as to enable them to complete the entire free list schedule, which was under discussion. There was a wide diversity of opinion as to the wisdom of the measure, and it was not until late in the afternoon that the bill was passed as reported by the Finance Committee. Tomorrow and Monday will be devoted to the consideration of the several amendments already proposed, chief among which are those relating to reciprocity. A vote also will be taken on Monday.

During the debate strenuous efforts were made to have placed on the free list white pine. Mr. Carlisle, in the course of an able argument on this subject, advanced the plan of a protective duty on the free list as so good lumber from Canada. He referred to the inconsistency of the policy which the one hand offered a bounty for the planting of trees, and on the other hand offers a bounty in the shape of a protective duty for cutting down trees. The members of the committee were opposed to the amendment. Several other Senators notably those from the North-West and from Maine, were also bitterly opposed to placing timber on the free list. Mr. Spooner, of Wisconsin, in speaking against the amendment, said he was not surprised at the proposition from the Democratic side of the chamber. AN AGENT ARRESTED. Senator Stewart, of Nevada, was most bitter and outspoken in his remarks against the amendment. He devoted five minutes chiefly to arguing that the United States had no competitor in lumber in any other country in the world. Canada was the last that ought to be favored in an attempt to make a prediction, as to the outcome of the proposition.

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FIRST EDITION. THE M'KINLEY BILL.

IT WILL LIKELY PROVE BAD FOR THE TARIFF.

But Time Will Ultimately Bring the American People to a Decision.—Members Advised not to Howl or Threaten.

(Special to the Gazette.)

WASHINGTON, Sept. 8.—Mr. J. H. Mandella, who is a close friend of Mr. McKinley, and has the entire confidence of the Liberal party, spoke to-day at the 'Outlets' feast here on the McKinley Tariff bill. He was, he said, in relation with many of the highest commercial standing in America, both free traders and protectionists. The measure was one of the most extreme measures of protection which was ever brought forward in any country. It was almost an insane measure and would be most injurious to the American consumers, and what was more, it would be most injurious to the American producers.
