

County expenditures. The cost of publishing reports would be grumbling at the taxpayers and as the papers have no subscribers should they should the Council pay for publishing these with information. [Laughter.]

Adjourned until 2 p. m. YESTERDAY AFTERNOON. Coun. Leggie read petition from S. U. McCallay, relating to two properties in Glenora, which he pays taxes and which he claims are overvalued—containing some 500 acres of wilderness land, with no improvements thereon, being valued at \$800 and \$600 respectively. The petition shows that when compared with other properties in the district having fishing and other privileges the valuation of his property is excessive. This petition was read by Geo. Corwin, presented by Coun. Saunders, and Wm. Forrest, presented by Coun. Flanagan, were referred to committee on petitions.

CONCERNING ROAD. Coun. Williamson moved following resolution, which was seconded by Coun. Parks. Resolved—That the Council ask the Local Legislature to take steps whereby any owner in the Municipality of Northumberland shall receive the sum of \$2 per day, over and above his mileage for each day in session.

Coun. Ryan said Council had no right to pass such a resolution. No councillor was compelled to attend here, and if any representative was dissatisfied he could give notice to others who didn't look for pay. Coun. Saunders said he felt like supporting the resolution. He could not get a man to spend his time for him for nothing, and as this principle was a good one he would support it in private affairs, but he did not think the people should be representatives to spend their time at the council for nothing.

Coun. Williamson said that was the right way to look at it. He was contented that people in his parish were willing to pay him for his services. [Laughter.] He cited Kent County, where the councillors were paid so much per day during each session.

Coun. Sullivan was opposed to increasing pay of councillors just now, and said people had all the taxation they could stand.

Coun. Flanagan said he could not support the resolution. The taxation now was heavy enough, and this question of daily pay meant additional taxation, for the January and July sessions, of \$300.

Coun. Saunders introduced a by-law relating to the Barnaby River boom, asking for increase from \$c. to \$c. per M. for booming logs. The mover explained that unless the increase allowed there would be no boom in a very little time, the remuneration at present being insufficient to pay for the labor. Of the amount of the boom-master had to pay \$40 for rent.

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Coun. Sullivan brought in a bill from W. F. Smallwood for \$4.50 for booming and attending an aboriginal lunatic. This bill was left over from last year. Ordered to be paid.

On motion of Coun. Sullivan, Jas. Greagan, commissioner by-roads, Hardwick, having failed to make returns, is ordered to do so at July session.

Coun. Sullivan, from the committee to examine jail, reported as follows:—Your committee appointed to inspect the jail have to submit the following report:—We visited the jail and found six prisoners incarcerated there. We found the building clean and well maintained, but would recommend that a well be furnished for each bed in the front cell on the lower floor, and also that a pair of blankets be provided for each of the beds.

MIRAMICHI VALLEY RAILWAY. Coun. Whelan moved the following resolution:—Resolved, That the County Council of the County of Northumberland in general session convened, having learned with regret that the Local Government of this Province have entered into a contract with the Northern and Western Railway Company, commonly called the Miramichi Valley Railway.

And Whereas, in addition to the sum of \$2000 per mile granted by the Local Legislature, the Dominion Parliament at its last session did further subsidize a portion of the said road by a sum of \$200 from the I. C. R. to Dunphy's, so-called.

And Whereas, the road, if built will be a great public advantage to the people of the County, and will open up for the most fertile lands and increase the business trade of this County.

Resolved, That the Council has learned that an application will be made to the Dominion Government to effect changes in the Statute Act of 1882.

Therefore resolved, That in the opinion of this Council no change or alteration should be made by the Government or Legislature so as to effect the location of such road, but the line of such railway be and remain as provided by the said Statute Act.

And Further Resolved, That copies of the resolution be forwarded to each member of the Local Government, the Local and Dominion members for the County and also to the Dominion Government.

The resolution was seconded by Coun. Morrisey.

Coun. Campbell said such an important resolution, coming as it did before the council without notice, had better remain over until next morning, so as to give members a chance to think matters over.

Motion to receive and adopt to lay over until next day at twelve was made.

Coun. Morrisey signed his motion for the adoption of the resolution which the Warden put without asking if the Council was ready for the question. The years said says were called and thirteen of the Councilors voted yes, and the Warden declared the motion carried.

Coun. Leggie protested against the matter being forced along in this way, as the resolution dealt with a very important subject and should not be sprung on the council and carried through in such a hasty manner. He understood the last motion to be for the postponement of the discussion.

Legislature should see that it kept to its bargain. Coun. Saunders said it was singular that Coun. Whelan's objection to hearing what 'the bargain' really was.

The Warden said Coun. Saunders had spoken several times and was out of order. Coun. Saunders asked to be heard again, but the Council would not hear him.

The motion to lie over was carried and the resolution made the order of the day for Friday at 12 o'clock.

On motion of Coun. Leggie a resolution was passed requesting the Local Government to grant a sufficient sum out of the Great Road Appropriation to erect appliances for raising up, lowering the water-ends of alps or roadways of the steam-ferry crossings of Chatham and Newcastle, so that they may be easily adjusted to low level during the time of fall of the tides and to obviate the present old-fashioned and cumbersome device now carried at each end of the steamers.

Coun. Leggie presented the petition of John L. Robins, of Black Brook, for the establishing of a ferry for foot passengers between a point in the vicinity of Mr. James McMurray's and the opposite side of the Miramichi. The motion was adopted.

PARISH OFFICERS' RETURNS. Coun. Campbell presented a resolution requiring Road Commissioners and other Parish officers to make returns for examination by Councilors and for the purpose of recertification by them, at least thirty days before the January session of Council. He referred to the inconvenience resulting from the present mode of audit and said many accounts were very difficult to understand, owing to the incompetency of making them out.

Coun. Adams said the Act Assembly now provides when returns shall be made and the Council could not enforce Coun. Campbell's resolution unless by seeking amendment of existing legislation. Deacons, Councilors have trouble enough as so to give a vote at such elections to verify a British subject who is not an elector, and also to vote on representative in the Dominion Parliament. [Applause.]

Coun. Williston,—I include the ladies! Coun. Scudell,—My reason— Coun. Warden,—The resolution is not necessary. Coun. Whelan scolded the resolution. Coun. Scudell,—My reason, Mr. Warden, for—[Applause.]

The Warden,—Do you move the adoption of the resolution? Coun. Scudell,—I have the promise of a majority in its favor.

Coun. Leggie,—Give him a chance. Coun. Scudell,—My reason for bringing up this resolution is the fact that I look upon our present election laws as being antiquated and in need of amendment. It has been transplanted and is still lingering on North American soil. [Applause.] They create and maintain class distinctions, place property-holders and non-property-holders on a par, and keep them there, irrespective of their mental or moral qualities. It does not acknowledge the fact that all men in the community contribute to the general revenue and therefore should have a voice in its expenditure. They ignore the fact that taxation without representation is robbery. [Applause.] No man should have to contribute one cent to the revenues of a country without having some say in the distribution, and the resolution I have introduced asks for them this privilege. There cannot be free government in every sense of the term in a free country without universal manhood suffrage, with the limitations mentioned in my resolution. Though we may not be successful just at present, the day will come ere long when right, rising in her power and strength, will break the iron fetters upon her, and by the brute force of right, which has so long ruled the world. [Great applause.]

Then, justice will reign triumphant throughout the land, giving to every man, irrespective of his worldly possessions, the glorious blessings of a free, untrammelled franchise. [Cheers.] The franchise cannot be too far extended. Give us manhood suffrage and you give every man the right to bear the burden and heat of the day! Who would pour out freely their hearts' blood in its defence? Who would spare most conscientiously in the lists of blood and iron? Who, did I say? Go and consult the statistics of any war from Waterloo to Tel-el-Kebir, [applause] and you will find it the non-property holders, the very class a barbarous and unjust law allows no voice in the affairs of the nation. [Hear, hear.] Gentlemen, support my resolution and you will give your influence to a movement having for its object the emancipation of the non-property holders from the bondage of taxation, and placing them—where they should be—on a political level with the richest in the land, for as Burns says: "The rank is but a guinea's stamp."

"The rank is but a guinea's stamp." Coun. Adams said if the mover had included the ladies the resolution would be heartily endorsed [hear, hear].

Coun. Morrisey—Why don't you get up and get one yourself [laughter]. He felt that no good-finding citizen of the county—whether he possessed property or not—so long as he paid taxes, should be debarred from having a voice in the selection of representatives. It often happened that young men had mothers or other members of their families depending on them for support, but for whom they would perhaps accumulate property, and he would like to ask if these were to be debarred from enjoying the franchise?

CHATHAM FIREWARD REPORT. Coun. Leggie submitted annual report of the Chatham Fireward, as follows:—The Firewards of the town of Chatham have left to submit their Annual Return, accounts and vouchers for the year 1893.

Their receipts for the year were: Balance from last Treasurer, \$79.00; from Col. of Roads, \$100.00; from Rev. R. Flanagan, \$5.00; and from other sources, \$100.00. Total, \$284.00.

Their expenditures were: \$100.00 for leaving a balance of \$184.00. There were seven fires in the fire district during the year: one damaging Mrs. McArthur's house and destroying some out buildings; one damaging tenement owned by the Bishop of Chatham; one of necessity burning at Herby's warehouse, doing little damage; one destroying an outhouse; one burning the upper part of the log at 100 feet, while the book man laughed at him.

He (Coun. Fish) saw the log on top, when it did not turn out sufficient merchantable lumber to make a box of matches. It was not the book or caliper but the men's judgment, experience and capability.

Coun. Scudell also related his experience in a similar matter, in which the book surveyor was worsted and shown to have entirely under-measured the logs.

THE RESOLUTION BEING PASSED. THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY. Coun. Scudell moved the following resolution:—Whereas, in the opinion of this Council the laws relating to the election of representatives in the Dominion Parliament are not sufficiently liberal for this progressive age.

They resolved, that this Council ask the Dominion House of Parliament to alter and amend the present laws relating to the election of representatives to said House, so as to give a vote at such elections to every male British subject who is not an elector, and also to vote on representative in the Dominion Parliament. [Applause.]

COMPLAINTS AGAINST A BY-ROAD COMMISSIONER. On motion of Coun. Leggie Mr. Thomas Baldwin, of Upper District, Chatham, was permitted to be heard before the Council in reference to charges preferred by him and others against Mr. John Riley, Mr. Baldwin read a statement, setting forth a number of sums of money granted for pieces of road, etc., some of which he alleged were not expended; the aggregate of default—according to the statement—being some \$20.00.

Coun. Flanagan enquired whether the statement read was sworn to by Mr. Baldwin or anyone else. Mr. Riley's own accounts had been before the Auditor, fully examined and found correct, after which they were passed upon by the proper committee. It was, therefore, but fair that those who brought charges against him should also present their statements under oath.

On motion of Coun. Leggie the statement of Mr. Baldwin, when sworn to, was ordered to be referred to the regular Committee.—Coun. Adams, Leggie and Morrisey.

Council adjourned until 10 a. m. tomorrow. [We are obliged to break off Council report here and will publish the remainder of it next week, when we will perhaps also give the Parish Officers. We find that in order to report the proceedings with sufficient fulness it is necessary to adopt this plan, so that we may find room for other necessary matter.—Editor.]
