Petrograd, Jan. 6.—The Novoe-Vremya says that a recent sortie by the Austrian garrison which is defending Przemysi, the date of which is not given, resulted in the complete annihitation of the Austrian force.

The sortie was preceded by extensive cavalry scouting. Then Austrian infantry advanced in force in the direction of that woods near the city. The Russians opened fire, but the Austrians rushed forward and gained the cover of the woods. They continued to push forward and the Russians permitted them to advance liose to their positions before making a serious effort to halt them. London, Jan. 6. Apart from the Russian victory over the Turks in Trans-Caucasus, which is described in a despatch to the Russian Embassy from Petrograd, as "complete," interest in the warfare now lies chiefly in the stub-WITH DEFEAT AT ARDAHAN AND SARI-KAMYSH born fight which the French and Germans are carrying on for the roads to Cernay and Muelhausen in Upper Alsace.

The battle in that region, which has been raging for a week, is described in a Berlin despatch as the most violent of the war. The Germans succeeded in regaining one of the trenches which they had lost, but on the whole the French reports appear to show that the Frenchmen maintain their advantage for every bit of which they had to fight, in many cases with the bayonet.

Along the rest of the western front the tide of battle continues to ebb and flow. On either side of Rheims and particularly to the east of that harrassed city, the French, according to reports, daily push their lines a few yards forward, while in the Argonne, where more hard fighting is going on, first the Germans and then the French report the capture of the other's entrenchments.

NIBBLING AT GERMAN LINES IN WOEVRE REGION

Another region where the French seemingly keep nib-bling away at the German lines is in the Woevre, where the gains reported by them last night and again today must, when consolidated, have gone a long way toward rendering the German long occupation of St. Mihiel, on the Meuse, less

The Russians, with all their other fronts to cover, have found another army with which to take the offensive against the German position at Miawa, on the East Prussian frontier, and tonight report the capture of a village on the road to that town.

The Germans are still hammering at the Russian line drawn directly across the roads to Warsaw from the west, but it is reported, with less force behind them. In Western Galloia, however, where they have reinforced the Austrians they have held up the Russian advance near Gorlice.

The Russians continue to drive the Austrians through the snow covered passes of the Carpathians, and out of Bukowina, and simultaneously are dealing in detail with the remnants of the Turkish armics in Trans-Caucasia, which are reported either to have been routed or sur-

The Turkish dash into the far off province of Russia is described by military men here as having been an unwise manoeuvre. Military operations in the winter in that part of the world would be difficult at any time, they say, but this year, with a particularly severe winter raging, there was little chance of the poorly equipped Turkish troops succeeding in their efforts.

Altogether, the Russians engaged the Turks in ten pitched battles, in many cases while knee deep in snow, and at an altitude of from six thousand to ten thousand feet.

New York, Jan. 6-The worst accident in the ten years' history of New York's subway occurred during the morning rush hours today, when 700 Norting rush hours today, when 100 passengers in two stalled trains were stricken with panic in the darkened tubes, by the invasion of dense smoke and acrid fumes from a short circuit in the cable. In the easting struggle to escape some two bundred persons were injured, one, a woman, fatally. Others were overcome and were rescued by police and firemen in an unconscious condition, while scores of others struggled to the street, unnerved or hysterical, their clothes torn and faces blackened by smoke.

As the result of the accident, the city was tonight in the throes of a transportation tie-up without parallel in its history. It was not until late this afternoon that a wheel again turned in the subway, and only a limited local service was in operation them.

"Our troops, on January 5, made a sudden attack against the village of Rozrowa, to the west of the road from Przanyez to Miawa, near Groudousk. The enemy, who occupied this village, were almost entirely bayonetted.


