ARE COMPLETELY REPULSED WITH VERY HEAVY LOSSES

British and French Drive Back Teuton Hordes with Great Slaughter to Enemy on the Scarpe and on the Aisne Sector.

London, May 16.—"Exceptionally heavy losses" were inflicted on the German troops, which today were sent against the British between Gavrelle and the Scarpe river, according to the official report from British headquarters in France tonight. The British advanced posts were forced back by the Germans, but the latter were driven out of the ground they had gained almost immediately. The text reads:

"After a heavy bombardment a powerful counter-attack occurred this morning on the north bank between Gavrelle and the River Scarpe. The enemy's troops pressed forward under a destructive fire from our artillery and machine guns. For a short period, by weight of numbers, the enemy forced bock our advanced troops from their forward positions. Our counter-attack, however, immediately launched, regained all the ground temporarily lost, driving back the enemy and inflicting exceptionally heavy losses. A number of prisoners remained in our hands.


